Summary of items from December meeting

MATTERS ARISING from November meeting.

Chancel Repair (minute 6) Following the proposal that Jesus College should be approached for a deed of rectification of the 1928 conveyance by extending the indemnity on the cemetery land, the Chairman has contacted the solicitor seeking his advice.

VACANCY PARISH CLERK

The committee was brought up to date on the interview that took place earlier in the month. After a full discussion it was proposed that the position of Clerk/Responsible Officer should be offered to this candidate. A contract of employment and job description will be sent.

WORK SCHEDULE

Cllr: Smith distributed a copy of the work schedule for the village man; the previous schedule needed to be updated. Following a few adjustments it was proposed that the revised list should be put in to action as soon as possible.

FINANCE

(a) *Accounts* It was **resolved** that 7 accounts totalling $\pounds 2,836.12$, as presented by the Clerk, be approved for payment.

(b) Salary increases An increase of 2% was agreed.

(c) *Precept* The proposed budget requirements by each committee, together with all other annual costs, were presented to the meeting; as the proposed increase is higher than in previous years a full and extensive discussion followed. After much deliberation a compromise was reached and a figure agreed for the 2014/2015 precept. This will be presented to the full Council for approval at the meeting in January.

Following the Government's localisation of council tax support, the B and D council tax base for 2013/14 and the District Council's decision not to pay the parish council a portion of the grant it will receive from the Government, the increase on the Parish Council precept will be a far higher percentage on council tax billing than in previous years.

ROAD WORKS ON CHURCH STREET

Due to gas main replacements, there will be traffic lights and possible delays on Church Street. At the time of going to press the dates have not been confirmed, but it seems likely that these works will begin on February 17 and last for two weeks. BH

PLANNING DECISIONS

Planning approval was granted for extensions at 14 Shelford Park Avenue, 2A Shelford Park Avenue, 11 Red Hill Close and 24 High Green and for an advertisement at 49 Woollards Lane.

The footbridge at Websters crossing, a detached garage at 3 Trinity Lane, a games room at 1 Maris Green and a variation to condition 2 on the planning approval for 18 Coppice Avenue were also approved.

Alterations to 26 Maris Green, a listed building, were refused, as were plans for extensions at 1 Birch Trees Road and the request to remove the condition requiring affordable housing on the Rectory Farm site. The appeal against refusal of planning permission for extensions at 1A Elms Avenue was allowed.

COUNTY COUNCIL

City Deal for Greater Cambridge Cambridge City, South Cambs and the County have been awarded a share in the local taxes raised by Cambridgeshire from businesses. We will be allowed to keep some of the increased income from future growth in the County. This should amount to $\pounds 1$ billion over five years. It is to be spent on infrastructure such as transport and housing as well as a revised package for affordable housing and for skills to meet the needs of local businesses. The three authorities will work as a combined authority. Hopefully our severe transport needs will now be addressed.

£7 million in housing investment proposed by South Cambs This will kickstart a property company run by South Cambs to protect the Council against future National Government cuts. The government grant to South Cambs will be cut by 24% this year. A cross-party group will be set up to work up a detailed business case. A portfolio of 40 houses will be in the pilot scheme. The housing company *South Cambs Ltd* was registered last year to allow the District to sell at market prices and put the money into District services. This will run in conjunction with the District's building programme.

Energy saving in South Cambs owned homes £100,000 has been allotted for renewable energy installation in South Cambs owned properties. External cladding, 18 air-source heat pumps and 18 solar devices to heat water have been added to 120 homes, many of which are in Shelford.

Homelessness: the B&B bill plummets South Cambs has decreased the number of emergency B&Bs it needs by building new accommodation for vulnerable people. The District has purchased 10 empty houses for emergencies. The hostel in Waterbeach is being renovated at a cost of ± 3.3 million into 30 apartments. In Linton, a building programme of 1000 homes has started. The first four houses are now occupied and the tenants seem very pleased with the high quality of the specification. All the rent collected will stay in South Cambs for future needs.

Winter Gritting In consultation about the roads gritted, a common request was to upgrade some secondary routes to primary routes and there were a few requests for new roads to be added. The gritted routes can be found on *www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk*. A further consultation will be held after the winter. *Gail Kenney and Tony Orgee*

SHELFORD SCHOOL

The spring term has started but there are plenty of memories of the Christmas celebrations at the end of last term. KS1 and Foundation Stage pupils put on excellent stage nativity performances for the rest of the school, parents and members of the local community. KS2 led an uplifting carol service in St Mary's church; the school is fortunate to have the use of such a wonderful setting to present and appreciate the Christmas story. We are very grateful to the Rev Simon Talbott for facilitating this, to the staff and others who led the musical preparation and performance, and most of all to the children who performed so well. The collection was in aid of Save the Children's Philippines typhoon appeal.

The last day of term has become established as the school 'Christmas Day', with the children wearing their own choice of Christmas outfits. The day began with collective worship, including the lighting of the final Advent candle, followed by gifts for all pupils and staff, with an emphasis on the importance of giving as well as receiving. The children then divided into house groups for Christmas-themed party games. The lunch menu had a traditional look, and there was entertainment throughout as each house group in turn took its place on the stage to sing a song they had prepared during the morning.

In the afternoon the whole school enjoyed the film 'Happy Feet 2', but judging by the children's response, the highlight of the day was the staff pantomime. I believe there to be some doubt about whether the activities portrayed actually happen behind the staff room door, but regardless of that the entertainment was much appreciated. Quite how the staff found time to prepare this during the busy last weeks of term remains a mystery.

Staff and pupils have returned refreshed after the Christmas break, hopefully with plenty of good resolutions for the New Year. The mild weather has avoided any worries (up to the time of writing!) about potential 'snow days', but unfortunately the excessive amount of rain has meant the playing field is out of use. This has also delayed the moving of the tree planted in February 2012 to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, from its temporary place to its permanent position in the new extension to the school grounds. We are most grateful to Mr Iain Wilkinson, who has been key to this project, from assisting with the original selection by the children of the type of tree, through lots of watering, to (hopefully) overseeing the move very shortly.

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ALICE IN WONDERLAND

'What's the difference between an angry audience and a cow with laryngitis? One boos madly and the other moos badly!' We were certainly booing madly at the Little Shelford Pantomime this year, but not in anger, in delight, upon the terrifyingly entrance of the imperious Queens of Hearts (played by Rosanna Larter) and Spades (Hannah Jones). 'Off with her head!' they screamed at the commendably unflappable Alice, who lost her composure amid all the mayhem inexplicably when only misaddressed as 'Mary Ann' once too often.

Hats (if not heads) off to the

production team (can they be human?) who light up our January each year with this great village treat. Katie Marshall, with seemingly inexhaustible wit and energy, writes the script; Dick Wallin (aka Superman) directs; Lucy Barlow masterminds the music and Sarah Coppendale masterminds everything else. Accomplished choreography by Hazel Stevenson and Erica Christodoulou ensured that the whole was suffused with life and movement; additional coaching by Heidi Meikle ensured that the characters were well defined. Mariann Bienz directed the little ones; and the amazing Sam Cochrane dressed everyone, big and little, in the most spectacular array of costumes. All these people (and more – the brilliant Francess Richardson, who presides over scenery painting, and Andrew Jones, whose lovely drawings adorn the programme) give unstintingly of their time and expertise, and say they enjoy it. I know a number of parents who certainly enjoy Friday nights in the autumn term, when their 10–16 year olds leave the house, to rehearse for a couple of hours in the Hall.

Pippa Cameron was Alice to perfection. Calm in the face of adversity, full of common sense when confronted by the absurd; but it would have been asking too much to expect her actually to shrink and elongate, as the story demands. In these feats she was ably assisted by her younger sister, Cara (small Alice) and the gracefully willowy Persephone Bell (tall Alice) who obligingly took her place when she needed to transform. Her on-stage sister, the bookish Edith,

was played to great effect by Corinna Hudson – whose (real life) brother, Tom, was in the chorus. Panto is truly a family affair!

The chorus, required at various times to be oysters, playing cards and teapots, rose zealously to the occasion and enjoyed every minute. Some of them never stopped smiling and might have been contenders for the part of the Cheshire cat if Jess Franklin hadn't got there first. Jess Henry dashed hither and thither as the White Rabbit, once again demonstrating an astonishingly mature talent and endearing herself to all, especially when she descended into the audience and settled gleefully into a vacant seat, to watch the show. ('Ooh, this is exciting!')

Amongst the host of highly entertaining creatures, talent abounded. Kate Crawley was an exquisitely snappy crab. Kate Rainsford (Chicken Licken last year) could have been forgiven for tiring of flapping her wings yet again as the Lory, but beamed good naturedly throughout. Thomas Hawthorn brought a touch of Californian cool to his role as Bill, *'the fastest, quickest-stepping lizard in Wonderland'*. And there was multi-talent, too: the Frog Footman (Tommy Barlow) proved himself a most proficient drummer, the Gryphon (Niall Larter) played the trumpet with aplomb, and Prudence Penguin (Rachel Atkins) metamorphosed into a gifted exponent of ballet.

Joe Lever was unnervingly good as the inscrutable Blue Caterpillar, wreathed in smoke and trance-like utterances. There was a marked migration from the front seats (reserved for tinies) to reassuring laps further back, when he appeared. No such migration attended the appearance of Hugo Bell, who, as Duchess, gave an uproariously anarchic performance, and gloried in the panto dame's licence to play fast and loose with his lines as well as with any unfortunate man within flirting distance. His sidekick, the Cook, played most imaginatively by George Kaye, seemed exempt from these advances possibly because, even by Wonderland standards, he was just too weird.

Sammy Meikle and Laurence Hunter played Tweedledum and Tweedledee as a pair of Scousers, complete with matching shell suits, perms and paunches. Their double act was jaw-droppingly slick and brought the house down. And then it was brought down all over again. The Mad Hatter and the March Hare (Freddie and Christian Barnes respectively) held their famous tea party, so riotous that it verged on the apocalyptic. The Hatter had a habit of shaking himself like a wet dog, but not to get dry, rather to shake the madness out of his head. Hardly surprising if the audience felt some drops! As the Cheshire cat says to Alice, '*We're all mad ... you must be mad, or you wouldn't have come here.*' That may be so, but we'll certainly all be queuing up again to get into the Little Shelford Panto next year.

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GREAT SHELFORD LIBRARY

The last twelve months have been a year of consolidation and stability at our Library. There are two main issues currently. Firstly, there is ongoing resentment that opening hours remain restricted; and secondly, the use of the computer terminals is periodically compromised by the malfunction of the present IT system. The County Library Service has been endeavouring to deal with the computer issue, but the problem persists. It appears to come down to difficulties with recent network failures. These have been investigated. Unfortunately the overall slowness of the system is less easy to remedy as we the poor broadband infrastructure in are limited by the village generally. Cambridgeshire County Council is committed to the provision of public computers in libraries and is currently reviewing its IT provision in all libraries; we hope to be able to report a resolution of the problem early in 2014.

The number of paid-up Friends is now 60, and we have a volunteer force of 20. Friends membership has increased by 20% in the last year and we continue to recruit more as the months pass. The work of the Volunteers is much appreciated and enables our library to function in the face of staff reductions.

The Committee have organised more than half a dozen evening events at the Library this year. We have to be careful that attendances at these, and other events, do not overstep the seating limitations for fire security purposes. We do not anticipate being able to accommodate as many evening meetings this year given the amount of time available to Committee members, most of whom have work and undertake other volunteering commitments.

The library is also the venue for monthly early afternoon ENGAGE sessions for senior citizens and occasional RHYMETIME sessions for babies and toddlers up to 18 months in the area. These are run by the Library Service with help from the Friends' Committee, as was the Children's Summer Reading Challenge presentation of certificates and medals event held last year.

As a result of our stall at the Village Feast last year the Bunch awarded us funds to purchase, for the library, two large children's book boxes, a magazine rack and leaflet holders.

The usage of all the County's libraries is regularly monitored, and the latest official figures supplied to us are that in the period April to September 2013 our Library issued 22,446 items, which represents a drop of 4% on the same period last year. Great Shelford library had the highest issues of all ten libraries in the South Cambs library group.

As regards future library operations, a recent press release from the County Library Authority includes the statement: *The proposed budget, which forms the County Council's Business Plan, will be looked at by Scrutiny Committees* and is subject to change. A final version will then be debated by Full Council in February. The Friends' efforts to defend further cuts to our Library funding will be strengthened by users continuing to register their views in the Comments Book in the library. We are very fortunate in the Shelfords and Stapleford local area to have such a great modern library facility and the helpful staff to run its services. WEBSTER'S CROSSING FOOTBRIDGE

Dear Editors

I write in reply to Duncan Grey's letter about the proposed footbridge at Webster's Crossing.

I'm not an influential dog-walker (I haven't even got a dog), but I did attend a meeting with Network Rail and the County's footpaths team on behalf of the parish council to discuss the possible closure of the footpath.

I should say right off that I feel strongly that the footpath is worth preserving. For one thing, it's the only one we have (if you exclude the two village 'shortcuts' between streets). There's little enough access in the village, and though we now have some additional permissive paths, these can be removed without redress at any time. The Webster's Crossing path does give a very useful shortcut between Cambridge Road and Granhams Road, and gives Cambridge Road folk access to the cycle path and walk round Nine Wells. Better still, it avoids a long walk along roads by giving a short cut across open fields. I've heard, though I can't find it in the paperwork, that a survey of use was done, and gave 200 users per week. If that's so, then it's certainly worth keeping.

But why do we need a footbridge? Duncan mentioned the slow speed of passing trains. Well, the trains are only slowed down **because** of the level crossing. I guess we all know that Network Rail has been much in the media over level crossings for the past few years. The company was fined £1m over the death of two girls in Elsenham, and there have been a number of other incidents. Health and safety regulations for level crossings are becoming more stringent by the year. As a result, Network Rail has surveyed every one of its level crossings, and is either improving them or closing them.

The stretch of line which carries Liverpool Street trains should operate at 90 mph, but that wouldn't give pedestrians enough warning of the oncoming trains; so a permanent speed restriction is in place. Greater Anglia are keen to speed up the Liverpool Street service, so that's clearly a problem. Then there's the King's Cross line. Here, the train comes round a very steep curve, and therefore visibility is limited for pedestrians. The difficulty of Webster's Crossing lies not in either one of these, but in the combination of the two: pedestrians have to cross both lines at once. The area has been surveyed, and there is no spot that would give an acceptable level crossing which would allow trains at the full speed. So it's close the crossing, or build a bridge.
I agree with Duncan that the bridge looks awful. But that's because it has to deal with the wires over the line, and the possibility of vandalism. Nor is it the case that we can say, 'Use the money for a footbridge elsewhere in the parish'. It just doesn't work like that. The parish council did try to get provision for cycles to cross the bridge. But unfortunately, because it's a footpath, we are informed that bikes are not part of the deal. I wish they were. So these are all things I wish were otherwise, but it's the best we're going to get in the circumstances.

Finally, one ray of hope for those of us who like walking is that the Southern Fringe Local Plan has set out plans for looking at landscape improvements and improved access in our area, and states the need for more footpaths. Perhaps the footbridge will, in the future, be part of a plan to give us more scope for walking.

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At Trading Standards, the most frequent type of consumer complaint we receive relates to the purchase of second-hand cars. They are one of the most expensive purchases we make and it can be a daunting process to buy one. Below we provide some advice to help you.

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- Check the validity of the MOT on VOSA's website (*www.gov.uk/check-mot-status*) and check the car's details are correct on the MOT certificate. If it states there were advisory points, make sure you see the details so that you know what work is likely to be needed before the next MOT.
- Check the VOSA website to check the vehicle has not been recalled.
- Check its service history. How often has it been serviced, and has it been serviced in line with the manufacturer's recommendations?
- Carry out an HPI (*www.hpi.co.uk*) check to make sure there is no outstanding finance on the car that could lead to it being repossessed by the finance company. An HPI check will also tell you if the car has been written off or if it is stolen.
- In terms of physically checking the car, carry out a walk around the car, check it and test drive it. If you are not mechanically minded we would also strongly recommend you have the car checked by an engineer.

Your rights against the seller

If you buy from a private seller and you find a fault with the car after buying it. your rights are limited. The seller must have the right to sell the car and the car must be 'as described', but other than that you have no recourse if things go wrong with it.

By comparison, if you purchase the car from a trader, again they must have title to the car and it must be 'as described', but in addition it must be of satisfactory quality, taking into account its age, mileage, etc. For instance, it would be reasonable to expect a brand new car to be free from wear and tear issues when you buy it. However if you buy a ten year old car with a mileage of over 100,000 then naturally there will be wear and tear. If faults arise due to this, it is unlikely you will have any recourse against the trader. Where a fault occurs which is not due to wear and tear, you may be able to seek a repair by the trader in the first instance.

UNDERGROUND, OVERGROUND

It seems this month as though the Botanic Garden is waking from its winter sleep. Bulbs push through the soggy ground to paint it white, gold and blue, with a smattering of mauves, as the snowdrops, early narcissus, scilla and crocus of our spring bulb belt come into rapid flower, to be followed by the rich Venetian colourings of the tulips.



While above ground the branches have been bare, there has been much underground activity taking place unseen over the winter months. The great majority of spring-flowering bulb species require a warm-cold-warm sequence to complete their lifecycle, and in fact the flowers we see emerging this month had their genesis last summer, when flower meristem tissue began to differentiate in response to the higher temperatures. The bulbs then lose all above ground photosynthesising parts, and cease root growth to go into a dormant state for late summer, just right for retailing at the garden centres! Breaking dormancy in spring-flowering bulbs is influenced by, among other factors, the drop in temperature over the winter which induces the underground shoot and flower stems to grow and elongate through the soil, powered by the starchy reserves in the bulb. This is why when you find a net bag of forgotten fritillary or iris bulbs in the shed in January, you will find they have produced green shoots in response to the cold, despite being out of the ground. This does make late planting a ginger salvage operation - damaged young bulb shoots will be a great deal more vulnerable to disease and to flower damage.

As the shoot emerges from the dark soil into the spring light, the plant is able to detect the increased light levels and corresponding changes in growth and metabolism occur. (We also can respond to light without using our eyes: think of how we tan in the summer sun – the result of skin cells producing more melanin in response to increased ultraviolet light intensity.) The leaves unfurl, position themselves for maximum light capture and begin to photosynthesise. As overhead the trees begin to leaf up and the colour and density of light changes on the woodland floor, spring bulbs respond with rapid growth and the spectacular floral displays of spring, which really are the plant equivalent of the 100m sprint, as they compete for available sunshine and resources before the canopy knits over for a summer time out. Flowering and seed set is the equivalent of crossing the finishing line!

This is available from the Reception Desk. We will contact you within seven days of receipt of your form with advice about vaccinations or other treatments you may need such as antimalarial tablets. If treatment is needed, you should book an appointment in the Travel Clinic **at least** four weeks prior to departure, and if visiting a high risk area we advise that you complete the form at least three months before travelling. The Travel Clinic runs weekly on a Monday.

Under the NHS services a GP provides for travel, we are able to give vaccines to provide protection against hepatitis A, typhoid and tetanus, polio, diphtheria and basic travel advice free of charge. In addition, our Travel Clinic is able to offer a more specialist, non-NHS service with a greater choice of vaccines, for example rabies or yellow fever, and also antimalarial tablets.

In addition, we can provide you with a Practice handout which also offers healthcare advice to travellers and directs you to some helpful websites. The Practice website, *www.sawstonmedicalpractice.co.uk* also contains travel advice and links to many other useful websites.

The NHS choices website is an excellent resource for minor illness and injuries and can be found online at www.nhs.uk – it provides information about a wide range of symptoms and the treatments of common problems.

And finally, we plan to investigate the feasibility of extending the Practice hours and would welcome patients' input. Our core opening hours are currently from 8 am to 6 pm, with late clinics on Monday until 8pm and early clinics from 7am on Friday. We realise some patients may value even greater access, particularly those who work full time, and we are considering the possibility of opening for longer during the working week. There are three options under current consideration:

Option 1: Monday to Thurs 8am to 8pm, Fri 7am to 6pm

Option 2: Monday to Thurs 7am to 7pm, Fri 7am to 6pm

Option 3: Monday to Weds 8am to 8pm, Thurs 7am to 7pm, Fri 7am to 6pm

PLATELET DONORS NEEDED

More platelet donors are needed at the Cambridge Donor Centre. Platelets are part of the blood and are vital for treating patients with cancer, leukaemia sufferers and transplant patients. One platelet donation can help up to three adults or 12 children. Platelet donation takes a little longer than blood donation – up to 90 minutes. Because red cells are returned and only platelets are collected, platelet donors can give more often, ideally 12 times a year. Platelet donation takes place at the Cambridge Donor Centre on the Addenbrookes Site. There is free parking for donors and appointment times are between 7.45am and 6.30pm.
