GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of items from 19 March Council Meeting

Elaine Westwick said she is a local resident. She currently teaches Pilates in the Johnson Hall, Stapleford and would like to add an outdoor class on the Recreation Ground on Friday afternoons throughout the summer months. She hopes to attract around 10 people, probably fewer to begin with, and would charge around £5 per person. It would be based outside only and would avoid any grass which has been damaged by the rain. She is a member of the Register of Exercise Professionals and the Body Control Pilates Association and has insurance cover.

The Council had no objection and would contact Elaine to agree a suitable fee.

MATTERS ARISING

Festival of Wheels Cllr Shelton said he is concerned that conditions on the Recreation Ground will not be fully recovered in time for the Festival of Wheels.

Abberley Wood A further incident has occurred at the pumping station; fortunately, this time, the response from Anglian Water was much improved.

Tree Work Cllr Hodge said she feels that if the hedge behind the houses at the top of the Recreation Ground is cut back too severely it will be detrimental to the appearance of the area. She suggested that the only tree that needs to be removed is the dead one overhanging the seat. A tree inspection is being arranged.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Recreation Ground: Talking about the groundwork at the new pavilion Cllr Smith said he and Cllr Knowles had worked with forks on the flooded spots in an attempt to disperse the water. He understood that a contractor would be coming on 24 March to start work on the area. The Chairman disputed this, saying he had been informed that they would not be coming until April.

Concern was expressed that the ground might not be in a suitable condition for the Festival of Wheels or the Feast. Following further discussions it was resolved that should the contractor not arrive on 24 March, an Extraordinary Meeting be called to discuss what action should be taken.

Highways: Cllr Shelton said he is frustrated that the County Council had lost information and the petitions regarding the reduction of the speed limits on Cambridge Road and Hinton Way. Cllr Kenney agreed to look into this.

He then expressed his concern regarding the volume of traffic along London and Cambridge Roads between 8 and 9am; with the increasing development the County Council will have to address this problem.

Cemetery: Referring to Chancel Repair Liability, Cllr Harwood said Jesus College had informed the Parish Council that the College accepted full Chancel Repair Liability and, further, that the CRL does not derive from land. The tithe entitlement of the lay Rector was redeemed by a payment to which liability for the chancel repair attached, which resolved entirely the CRL issues regarding any liability of the Parish Council.

Sustainable Shelford: Cllr Winter talked about a proposed new grant for insulating older houses. A further meeting will be held in April. He hoped to bring further information to the next meeting.

NEW PAVILION

Cllr Watson introduced provisional fees for the hire of the pavilion and recreation ground by the sport clubs. After some discussion it was agreed that Cllr Watson should initiate discussions using these figures.

Cllr Seeking said the Bowls Club is worried about the security of its grounds; it has been advised by the insurance company that the original fencing removed by the contractor needs to be reinstated. The Club had been led to understand that when the fencing was removed it was put in to store and would eventually be replaced.

PAVILION FURNITURE

To commemorate Doug and Will, the Ellum family has offered to purchase furniture for the new pavilion. The chosen style of chairs and tables was presented to the meeting. The family would like a small commemorative plaque placed in the alcove where the chairs will be stacked when not in use. Approval was given for both the furniture and the plaque.

PAVILION CLEANING

Cleaning the new pavilion is becoming problematic, taking more of the Village Man's time than envisaged, and also requiring the use of specific cleaning methods. With this in mind Cllrs Knowles and Hodge met with a professional cleaner to look at what this involved, how many hours it would take, and whether she would be prepared to undertake the work. Following a heated discussion it was proposed that the Architect be asked to collate the manufacturers' cleaning instructions before further action is considered.

FEAST INSURANCE

On a proposal from Cllr Coggins, seconded by Cllr Talbott, it was **agreed** that the Parish Council would pay the Feast insurance of approximately £500.

Cllr Shelton said sponsorship for the majority of the Festival of Wheels has been obtained but asked for back up from the Parish Council to cover the £150 insurance fee, should it be necessary. This was **agreed**.

MOBILE WARDEN SCHEME

A request has been received for financial assistance towards the cost of renewing police checks for staff and helpers, at a cost of approximately $\pounds400$. It was **agreed** that the Council should offer a donation to cover this expenditure.

LIBRARY READING SCHEME

Plans are underway for this year's Summer Reading Challenge 'The mythical Maze'. Since its inception the Parish Council has made a contribution each year towards the scheme. It was **agreed** that a donation of £250 should be made.

FINANCE

It was **resolved** that 20 accounts totalling £19,054.90 be approved for payment.

CORRESPONDENCE

An irresponsible person or persons dropping bags of dog waste on the footpath between Elms Avenue and the High Street is making the area hazardous for children who use the footpath on their way to and from school. Environmental Health will be asked to consider installing a dog bin.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

The Village signpost on the junction of High Street and Woollards Lane needs to be re-furbished; also the original telephone kiosks around the village are in need of attention.

Cllr Harwood reported a further epidemic of vandalism at the railway station and would inform the PCSO.

GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of items from 26 March Extraordinary Council Meeting

The Chairman explained that the reason for the meeting was to discuss the external landscaping at the new pavilion. A recent letter from the contractor states that a specialised landscape contractor has been engaged to commence works, weather permitting, on 7 April.

The Chairman had been advised by Scotsdales that if the area is seeded it would not be fully usable by July. With the Festival of Wheels scheduled for early May and the Feast in July, he feels the only option would be to turf the top end of the damaged area. Asking each Councillor to comment, the general consensus was that the whole area needed to be carefully handled and the top area should definitely be turfed.

The Architect said although we had experienced unusual weather conditions, it was poor judgement on the contractor's part not to have laid an access road; much of the damage was caused by the movement around the site of heavy equipment.

Problems have occurred with the alarm system which appears to be electrical. Until a separate system is in place to isolate the three areas (toilets, changing rooms and main hall), it is not practical to let the sports clubs use the facilities.

Cllr Seekings asked about the replacement of the Bowling Club's fencing. The Architect said it was always intended that yew hedging would replace the fence and act as a barrier.

It was resolved that the Penalty Clause should be invoked should the works not be completed by Monday14 April 2014.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT TO ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

The New Pavilion is nearing completion. Unfortunately, due to a long wet winter, the ground works were delayed. Let's hope, when this impressive building is complete, all residents of the village, and the sports clubs, will approve of the hard work by the Parish Council over the last three to four years. The next objective for the Parish Council is to obtain the Grange Field for much needed extra recreation space.

Over the past year I've been working on completing the Hinsby roundabout at Shelford Bottom. We missed the daffodil season last year, but I think we made up for it this year (see photo on front and back covers). Can I thank our sponsors: Hill Residential and Scotsdales. Sterling Plants and Gardens have taken over the shrub bed outside the Village Memorial Hall and will be replanting and maintaining it.

Arthur Rank is planning to move to Shelford Bottom. A planning application will be submitted in June with a starting date later this year. New plans for the former Railway Tavern Site are also due be resubmitted to the Parish Council.

On 7 July the Tour de France will pass through our Village. We are planning a small event on the Memorial Green to coincide with the Tour, supported by the Twinning Committee, who will have their opposite numbers here from France that weekend. We will be offering tea and coffee in a marquee, and are hoping to have ice cream and sweet stalls.

This year is the 100th anniversary of the start of World War One. I have asked the Rev Simon Talbott if we could arrange a candle-lit service at the Memorial on 3 August. The Plough Pub has offered to arrange some light refreshments for the event.

We are losing two of our long serving members of the Parish Council: Joy Amis after serving 40 years, and Martyn Seekings who has completed 30 years, including two years as Parish Chairman. Gill Hinsby and Eric Knowles are also standing down, both having served for many years. We will miss their tremendous experience. Sadly, we have also lost our long serving Parish Clerk, Wenda Burbidge, after completing 23 years. She has supported eight Chairmen whilst guiding 15 Councillors to make the Village what it is today. We presented Wenda with a stone birdbath and flowers. We hope she will enjoy them and more time in her garden. I would like to thank all the County, District and Parish Councillors for all their hard work and support over the past year. I welcome our new Parish Clerk, Mr Ian Kydd.

SOUTH CAMBRIDGESHIRE LOCAL PLAN

This is a set of policies and land allocations that will guide the future of our district up to 2031. Once adopted, all planning applications will be assessed against these policies.

The draft local plan was published last summer to provide an opportunity for comment. The District Council considered the comments at a meeting on 13 March and decided to submit the local plan to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government for independent examination, together with the comments received. These documents were submitted on 28 March.

An independent inspector will establish whether the plan is sound, taking all the representations into consideration, and there will be a report on the findings. Where it is considered that more information is needed, a series of examination hearings will take place. These are likely to occur sometime after July 2014. COUNTY COUNCIL

A cautious welcome to schools funding announcement Cambridgeshire pupils will receive an extra £275 per pupil in 2015–2016. It is well known that Cambridgeshire has been the most poorly financed County for education, and head teachers, governors, County Councillors and MPs have all been lobbying to secure more money for our schools. Although this extra money is a start, we are still very poorly funded in comparison to most Counties and we will need to continue to raise this as an issue.

The Compass Centre, Sawston This building is owned by the Council and has just been sold. Contracts were exchanged last week. The property was offered to the Parish and the District Council before being sold, but they did not need it.

TWIST2: a motorcycle campaign to learn from others' mistakes CCC and Peterborough Safety Partnership has launched a campaign, Twist2, to encourage motorcyclists to enhance their skills. It comprises short animated films and a data base of training courses. Motorcycles are less than 1% of traffic but are involved in 12% of accidents, and motorcyclists are 30 times more likely than car users to die on the road. The videos show dangerous manoeuvres that get motorccyclists into trouble, and encourage them to enhance their skills and become safer. The four shorter films focus on the mistakes drivers make that have implications for others, and try to help them anticipate other people's mistakes. The database of courses and films can be found on the website *www.twistandride.net*.

New household recycling service CCC has one of the highest recycling rates in the country and is looking how to best deliver this service for the future. We want to reshape the service and deliver savings of £440,000 from April 2015. The review will look at accepting trade waste at cost, service management by the voluntary sector, and changing opening hours. With the expected extra 70,000 homes in Cambridgeshire it is essential that we plan now for our future waste.

New approach to highway maintenance CCC is planning a new approach to improving the condition of roads and pavements. This strategy recognises the importance of all roads and adopts a preventive approach to maintenance and repairs. It will coordinate works on the highway throughout the County and reduce the supply chain. This might cut costs by up to 20% in the long run and local priorities will be taken into account.

Another new no-calling zone to freeze out rogue traders Trading Standards have been working with the police and the local community to protect vulnerable people and to establish a new no-calling zone centred on sheltered accommodation in Swavesey. There are now more than 100 such zones in Cambridgeshire. These no-calling zones are established with the cooperation of the local residents and protect them against unscrupulous traders and salespeople. Residents are offered help and advice and also an information pack which enables them to have confidence to say 'no' when cold callers come. Nationally there are more than 10,000 complaints about cold callers a year. We have started to send reminders about booked appointments to your mobile phone. If you have told us your number, and given consent for us to use the number for this purpose, then you will receive an automatic message at approximately 1pm the day before your appointment is due. If you no longer need that appointment, please get back to us to cancel it so that we can free it up for somebody else.

If you would find this service helpful, please fill in a form at Reception.

TEST RESULTS

Requesting test results

It is important for you to check up on the results of any tests that the surgery takes. A doctor or another member of surgery staff may contact you about a particular result, but it is important that you also check on any other tests you had done at the same time.

If you have any tests ordered by the surgery, you should enquire about the result as a matter of routine. You cannot assume that there is nothing you need to know.

What is an appropriate length of time?

- If a doctor or nurse requests a blood test, an X-ray, or a swab test, the results will be sent back to the surgery within a matter of days from the sample being taken.
- Any test ordered by the hospital or specialist will have results sent back to them, and not to the surgery. They should tell you at the time of testing what you will need to do. If they do not automatically tell you, you should ask them what you need to do.

Phoning the surgery for results

Please phone for results after 11am, or at any time in the afternoon. The receptionist who takes your call will be able to give you the results and any comments written by the clinicians. If you then require further advice you will need to make an appointment with a clinician. Receptionists are trained to manage these queries, but they cannot answer medical questions.

Printout of your results

You are welcome to request a printout of your results, either by phone or in person. We will print the results for you to collect from the Health Centre. Jennet Ashton, Practice Manager

Community groups, charities and schools can apply for the monthly award of 'Get Painted' which gifts up to 240 litres of paint to improvement projects.






Beating the Bounds is a part of Rogationtide. We walk our village boundaries so that we know where they are, and to celebrate the spring.

Early in March came the call to our membership and friends: 'Could we provide homemade jams, marmalades and homemade cakes for our stall of British produce at the annual Salon de la Gastronomie in Verneuil-en-Halatte?' This two-day event is similar to our farmers' market, only on a larger scale. It is organised by members of the Verneuil-en-Halatte tourist information bureau for vendors of local produce, also for vendors from other areas of France ... and for ourselves.

The weeks prior to our departure saw our members busily baking, marmalademaking, shopping for 'deals' of Yorkshire tea for hard water and packets of shortbread; also for a variety of English cheeses. Then there was the labelling and pricing ... 'How much was it last year?'

On the eve of our departure all our prepared and boxed produce was tightly packed into the back of the Jeffersons' car, leaving just enough room for the five of us, including Colin our driver, plus our personal belongings. Early Friday morning saw us speeding towards the Channel Tunnel. After a 'Flunch' lunch at Calais and a refreshing break at Beauvais – including a visit to the Cathedral – we drove on to arrive safely at Verneuil, where we were made most welcome by our respective hosts and friends.



We had to be ready for the opening official of the Salon at 10.00 on the Saturday morning. An early start found us hooking up red, white and blue bunting, 'twinning' posters and maps, and setting out our wares on our three allocated trestle tables; our cakes of varying flavours, shapes and sizes were attractively displayed by Janet on the left; teas and biscuits in the

centre next to the jams and marmalades; with the cheeses on the right ... and, of course, bite-sized portions had to be prepared for prospective clients to taste!

All around us were colourful and well stocked stalls which filled the hall. There were cheeses, 'charcuteries', wines and champagnes, preserves, specialist chocolates and nougats, gingerbreads, organic herbs, soaps and remedies, fruit, vegetable and flower displays ... and more.

Buyers and sellers alike were amply and continuously fortified throughout with wine, beer, aperitifs and strong black coffee from the bar. (We actually made a profit which will go towards the continuing work of our twinning association.) We also found that we were on nodding acquaintance with several of the vendors, some we had met on previous Salon visits. Our time with our French friends ended with an evening aperitif together to celebrate the success of another Salon de la Gastronomie.


CRICKET CLUB

LANCE PEARCE

My father-in-law, Lance Pearce, lived in Great Shelford throughout his life and a book he wrote before his death in 2003 *Ace of Spades (Lucky for One)* detailing his war memoirs, starting in the Home Guard in the village, has recently been published. WATER LILY WONDER

May sees the magical re-appearance of the water lily. Fleshy ropes have stretched upwards from the rhizomatous tangle of roots embedded in the murk and mud of stretches of still water, to open out once the surface is breached into round leathery lily pads. These are followed by the gorgeous blooms, often scented, consisting of many whorls of satiny petals in a range of colour from pure white, through peach and pink to deep red. The flowers and lily pads are a hive of activity all summer, providing landing spots for dragonflies and damselflies as well as shelter and food for all sorts of snails and invertebrate larvae.



At the Botanic Garden, our Glasshouse Range allows us to display some really supersize water lilies and this month we reopen our Tropical Wetlands house starring the Santa Cruz water lily, *Victoria cruziana*. Initiating germination is horticulturally very challenging as a steady hand is needed to wield a penknife to prise off the operculum, a

sort of lid, on the large round seeds, which are then submerged into warm water to germinate. Once the first hastate leaves give way to the first 'proper' rounded lily pad, growth is rapid: it take just 90 days from germination for this native of the Paraguayan waterways to unroll a giant leaf up to 2 metres in diameter! The leaves are very strong and are intricately webbed underneath to spread the weight and allow the huge leaf to float. They also have a distinctive upturned, crimped edge, up to six cm in depth, with a couple of notches let in to allow rainwater to drain out.

But even more extraordinary is its floral biology. On the first evening, the bud opens to reveal a crown of beautiful white petals and emits a pineapple aroma. Chemical changes within the flower heat up the inflorescence, making it irresistible in the wild to scarab beetles, which arrive and scramble into the large internal chamber, intending to use this boudoir to feast on the special starchy food parcels made available and to seduce other six-legged visitors. The flower is currently female but as the second day dawns, it closes up, trapping the beetles within, and undergoes a sex change. The flower loses the pineapple aroma, the petals start to turn pink and the male stamens ripen to release pollen. On the second evening, the now male flower opens up for the second time to release its hoard of imprisoned beetles, which in scrabbling to leave become covered in pollen, which they carry off in search of another pure white, pineapple scented, and crucially, sexually female bloom. So when you next notice pollen beetles climbing in and out of one our native *Nymphaea* on the more sluggish stretches of the Cam or Ouse, spare a thought for the kidnapped scarab beetles overnighting in the Santa Cruz water lily of Paraguay!

You can come and see how this year's Santa Cruz water lily is growing at the Botanic Garden's Festival of Plants on 17 May, 10am–4pm. Admission is $\pounds 4.50/\pounds 4.95$ gift aid ($\pounds 3.95/\pounds 4.30$ concession) and accompanied children 16 and under are admitted free of charge. SAWSTON MEDICAL PRACTICE

Over the past few years the practice has made considerable changes to our appointments system in response to feedback from our patients. A consistent theme has been about increasing accessibility to quick medical opinions and telephone advice without losing the ability to also plan ahead and book with a regular and known GP.

Our innovative Rapid Access Clinic was designed to help meet this need. Patients with an urgent condition can be seen by a member of the Rapid Access Clinic on the day. The team includes a GP, a Nurse Practitioner or a Sister. At present about 45% of all our appointments are booked on the day and the feedback is largely very positive.

The same team also provides a telephone advice and triage service for those who have urgent problems. On a busy Monday we can deal with in excess of 130 urgent face-to-face appointments and 100 phone advice calls, in addition to our normal booked surgeries. The system depends on it being used only for genuinely urgent conditions. We are very grateful to all our patients for working with us in making it such a successful model – one that other surgeries both locally and nationally are trying to emulate.

We are aware from our regular patient surveys that the vast majority of our patients are happy with our current accessibility. But we also know that there is a group who find the times difficult, even with our early opening from 7am on Fridays and late opening to 8pm on Mondays.

As part of our ongoing commitment to improving our service, and in response to your feedback, we have recently applied to the Prime Minister's Challenge Fund for additional funding. If we get this it would allow us to move towards 8am to 8pm opening during weekdays, with a plan to provide regular Saturday and Sunday clinics too in the medium term.

Competition to get funding for any new service in an ever-squeezed NHS is fierce. We think we have a great bid but are also aware that the fund is many times oversubscribed. We can expand our service but only if we get the funds.

By the time of next month's newsletter we should know whether or not we have been successful in our bid. Let's all keep our fingers crossed.

In the meantime we welcome all feedback about our services and constructive suggestions for improvements. GARDEN CLUB SIX OF THE BEST GARDENS

Andrew Sankey presented a slide show illustrating some of the best gardens to visit. If Shrewsbury is used as a centre point, Dorothy Clive, Hodnet Hall and Powis Castle are all within easy reach.

Hestercombe, Cheddon Fitzpaine, Somerset



Hestercombe Gardens

The garden is a masterpiece of design resulting from the collaboration between the architect Edwin Lutyens and garden designer Gertrude Jekyll. A series of terraces joined by formal stone steps overlooks a sunken garden known as the Great Plat, crossed with long, narrow water brooks. On the east terrace a pale blue and yellow planting scheme gives way to oranges and reds. A massive pergola clothed with clematis, jasmine and honeysuckle frames the countryside beyond. The Dutch garden is a parterre of lavender, yuccas, roses and lamb's ears punctuated with large terracotta pots. Beyond is a restored 18th century landscape garden with woodland, lake and impressive Great Cascade waterfall.

Knighthayes Court, Tiverton, Devon (National Trust)

These Victorian gardens remained largely unchanged until the late 1950s, when an ambitious replanting scheme was undertaken by the owners. Near the house the south facing terraces are planted with shrub roses, peonies and herbaceous plants in soft colours and silvers. Yew encloses a paved garden in shades of soft pink, purple and grey with two standard wisterias. Battlemented hedges frame a tranquil pool garden and topiary hounds chase a fox along the top of a hedge. The woodland garden has been opened up to create dappled shade, allowing a succession of plants to flourish through the seasons, from magnolias, rhododendrons, cornus and bluebells to the later flowering foxgloves, hydrangeas, and cyclamen. The walled kitchen garden constructed in tiers around an ornamental pool has been restored to its former glory.

Chatsworth Garden, Bakewell, Derbyshire

Chatsworth is gardening on a grand scale, developed over 400 years. The early French-style parterres have long gone but remaining from this period is the stunning great cascade, a broad stairway of water, which tumbles gently down a grassy hill from various spouts and dolphins arranged around a pavilion at the top. A copper willow tree modelled on one dating from 1692 spurts surprise showers from its branches. Capability Brown designed the landscaped woodland park. The great Victorian head gardener Joseph Paxton planted rare conifers and brought in enormous rocks to create a rock garden. His Emperor Fountain with its 84 metre high water jet still remains impressive today. From the 20th century come the orange and blue-and-white borders, the rose garden and old conservatory garden, together with wildflower areas. A yew maze and double rows of pleached limes and serpentine beech hedge are neatly clipped to give formal structure to the garden.

Powis Castle, Welshpool, Powys (National Trust)

The castle has a stunning cliff edge location and the gardens were originally laid out in the late 17th century as a series of terraces on the south east face of the castle rock. Influenced by French and Italian Renaissance design styles, they feature innovative planting with architectural statuary and urns together with an orangery and an aviary. The long hot border is backed by a massive yew hedge, rising to over 15 metres high in places. Planting is exuberant and tender plants grow well in the shelter of walls and hedges. The garden is steep but has superb views.

Hodnet Hall, near Market Drayton, Shropshire

Below the late Victorian Hall the gardens focus on a series of descending pools, surrounded by interconnecting water gardens. Fine swamp cypress, flowering cherries and a handkerchief tree form a canopy and backdrop for mass plantings of candelabra primulas, Iris *kaempferi*, giant leaved Gunnera and Astilbes in shades of pink. In April and May blossoming magnolias, camellias, rhododendrons and azaleas are an attraction.

The Dorothy Clive Garden, Market Drayton, Staffordshire

Originally created by the late Colonel Clive in memory of his wife, the garden is based on a quarry planted with rhododendrons and azaleas. Rising on the south facing slope above it, is a giant scree and rock garden with a pool at its base. There are herbaceous borders, Mediterranean-style plantings and a bog garden. A cascading waterfall is a distinctive feature of this garden.


