GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Extracts from October meeting

PUBLIC SESSION

New street lighting Keeley Russell, Head of Client Liaison, Balfour Beatty, briefed on the PFI with Cambridge County Council to upgrade and replace street lighting. (See article in November 2014 *Village News* page 23 on Street Lighting and County Council report in this issue, page 5.)

Superfast broadband Dr Mundell of The Orchards briefed on the inability of the four houses in The Orchards to connect to Superfast Broadband despite a BT Superfast Broadband cabinet being located on Hinton Way very close to The Orchards. It seemed they had been overlooked by Connecting Cambridgeshire when the contract with BT had been drawn up. Discussions were still taking place with BT and others. Dr Mundell was grateful for the support of the Chairman and Parish Council; he would be interested in hearing from anyone else in a similar position. (See page 10.)

SPORTS PAVILION

The Clerk said that Tim Page (Architect and Project Manager), who was unable to be present, had taken legal advice and engaged TRADA (the timber trade association) to inspect the timber cladding. This had taken place. Preliminary findings were that juvenile, defective timber had been used and should be replaced. As the fault appeared to lie with the timber supply, Omnis wished to resolve it with their supplier. Mr Page had told the Clerk that he recommended this approach. The Council **agreed**, but expected to see the TRADA Report before it was passed to Omnis. **Action**: Clerk to inform Mr Page.

The Clerk confirmed that Mr Page had said that legal and TRADA charges would be shown on his next Interim Certificate as costs due to Omnis. The Clerk said that the cost of the recently completed Recreation Ground repairs should also be included.

MINUTES of 17 September were **confirmed** as accurate records and signed by the Chairman.

PROGRESS ON MATTERS ARISING

Speed limit reductions The Clerk said that the 40 mph signs had been removed on Cambridge Road. Work had not yet started on Hinton Way.

SSYI insurance cover in respect of using the Sports and Social Club premises: The Chairman said this was in place.

Jesus College Science Park Briefing Meeting for Councillors at Stapleford taking place on 22 October. Clerk to be informed of those wishing to attend.

Village Plan Cllr Fane briefed on the preliminary meeting he had convened

recently. This had covered the following areas:

- the status of the plan, the way it should be drawn up and the possible issues it might cover
- that we should at least consider progressing a formal neighbourhood development plan, giving the plan (to include an updated Village Design Statement) some teeth in planning terms
- that it was felt important the views of the wider village community be sought at the earliest stage, starting with a public meeting in the Memorial Hall, probably in November
- that others in the village, possibly also in neighbouring villages, should be involved in any working group
- that Cllr Hodge had agreed in principle to chair the working group, at least in its initial stages.

The Chairman had booked the Memorial Hall for an Open Meeting on 14 November at 7.30 pm and had invited two experts from SCDC. He would also be inviting representatives from Stapleford and Little Shelford. It was noted that the Histon and Impington plan was a good example.

Advertising/notice boards The landscaping sign by the Memorial Hall required Planning Permission. This was regretted, particularly given the benefit derived from the planting and maintenance generously provided free by Sterling Plants. The Parish Council was grateful to Daniel Lee for this. It was suggested that the sign, or a similar one, could be placed within the adjacent Parish Council notice board. It was **agreed** that Cllr Harwood should explain the position to Mr Lee. Action: Cllr Harwood.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES AND REPRESENTATIVES

Cemetery and allotments Cllr Harwood's report had been circulated and was noted. It was agreed that Seamus (Village Man) had sufficient time to undertake strimming and other work through the winter months at the cemetery and allotments.

RISK ASSESSMENT/RISK MANAGEMENT

Cllr Watson referred to the risk assessment/management matrix circulated at earlier meetings. He and the Clerk had worked through it carefully. It was **agreed** that Cllr Watson and the Clerk should continue their work. **Action**: Cllr Watson and Clerk.

REQUEST TO PLANT TREE ON RECREATION GROUND in memory of William John Wood, a long-time and popular resident of Great Shelford. **Approved**.

PROPOSAL FOR FISH AND CHIP TRAILER AT MEMORIAL HALL CAR PARK

It was noted that there were precedents, but not for six days per week trading. Several Councillors expressed empathy with nearby residents and users of the Memorial Hall sharing their concerns in respect of noise, smells, litter, and traffic congestion. After taking note of views expressed by members of the public and by prior submission, and comments by Mr S Dara Bahadirgil, in addition to those in his letter of 17 September 2014 to Cllr Hodge, it was **agreed** to allow the venture to proceed on a trial basis for two months, three days a week, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, from 1700 to 2200 hours.

FINANCE Cheques (11) as presented by the Clerk amounting to $\pounds 9,948.09$ were signed and receipts of $\pounds 54,819.67$ noted. The Banking Arrangements paper circulated by the Clerk containing details of Standing Orders and Direct Debits was **approved** and signed by the Chairman and Cllr Hodge.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Clerk advised that the **External Audit** for 2013/14 had been concluded. The final Audit papers had been displayed publicly for the required number of days.

Mobile Warden Scheme A request had been received for a grant of \pounds 3,300. It was agreed that this should be on the Agenda for the next meeting.

Remembrance Day Wreath The Clerk had been advised that this was ready for collection. There was no charge but a donation of £20 was given.

COUNTY COUNCIL

Street Lighting The County Council's street lighting columns are in many cases well beyond their design life and there are structural problems with the old concrete columns in particular.

About five years ago the County Council decided to replace its street lights with more modern energy efficient lighting. A procurement process was gone through and an approved contractor selected. Just before the contract was signed the government decided that it would only provide street lighting credits for 90% of the cost as against an original expectation of 100% funding. This meant that at the last minute the contract had to be revised so that only 90% of street lights would be replaced.

The County Council insisted that consultation with local residents was built into the contract and that the first point of contact would be with local parish councils because, in the County's view, they were the people best placed to comment on the detail of any designs put forward.

There have been problems with parishes being given less time than expected to comment on initial designs put forward, but many parish councils have organised special public meetings or drop in sessions where residents can see the initial detailed plans for their roads and comment on them - and in many cases changes have been made to the designs. Meetings or drop in sessions have been organised in Sawston, Harston and Hauxton by the parish councils, and in other villages parish councils have set aside the first part of a parish council meeting for a presentation on the replacement programme. As with existing lights, if particular residents have problems with specific replacement lights, for example, a light shining directly into a bedroom, then a back-plate or front baffle can be fitted to address the problem.

The time for local consultation in Great Shelford was too short in my view and I have raised this issue with council officers. However, I have successfully taken up specific lighting issues raised by local residents and will continue to do so.

County Council electoral divisions The Local Government Boundary Commission England (LGBCE) contacted the County Council earlier this year to inform the council that LGBCE was going to carry out a review of the County Council's electoral divisions. At present Great Shelford is part of the two-member Sawston division that covers the seven villages of Great Shelford, Harston, Hauxton, Little Shelford, Newton, Sawston and Stapleford and has just over 13,000 electors. In an initial response, the County Council has suggested that the total number of county councillors should be reduced from



69 to 63, with each county councillor representing about 8,000 electors, rather than the current average of just over 7,000 electors. There will almost certainly be changes locally since the Commission has made it clear that it very much favours single-member wards.

The LGBCE is now carrying out a consultation about Cambridgeshire's county electoral divisions that can be viewed at *www.consultation.lgbce.org.uk*. In my view it is important that the Parish Council and local residents respond to the consultation so that any new division that includes Great Shelford has some local and geographical coherence. This first round of consultation ends on 19 January 2015.

Highways Minor highway improvements are being ordered. Several of our villages are involved. Sawston's zebra crossing near the school stands at 14th on the list, Stapleford's 40mph limit on Haverhill Road is 16th and Newton's improvement is just below that. We know that there is £200,000 to play with but we don't know how much each improvement costs.

A10 We are concerned about the amount of traffic flowing (or not!) through Harston and bisecting this village. About 16,000 vehicles pass through Harston between 7.00am and 7.00pm now, and many of them are heavy lorries. The traffic will get worse as building along the A10 continues apace. A bypass is essential.

Solar Farm There are plans for a solar farm just outside Sawston on the Green Belt. The first plan was for 1,000m x 600m and was turned down by South Cambs. The new development was for a reduction in size by 60% but still in the Green Belt. We are opposed to any building on the Green Belt as it will change the nature of our villages and make them into suburbs. There is also a plan for a burial ground for 8,000 people on the Green Belt just outside Newton. Quiet neighbours at least! Babraham Institute has also got approval to build on the Green Belt.

Connecting Cambridgeshire The superfast Broadband has reached 42,000 premises, nearly halfway to the 90,000 promised by the end of 2015. The takeup in Cambridgshire is consistently above average. Most people are excited when they see the green cabinets but some are distressed when they spoil the view. The sitings take into account the location of power and the width of the pavement as well as the need to avoid underground services. Planning Consent is not needed and Councillors are not consulted but Connecting Cambridgeshire works closely with local people. Mark Heath has received the Points of Light Award for voluntary work campaigning for better Broadband and helping people to get online in Spaldwick.

SHELFORD SCHOOL NEWS AN INSPECTOR CALLS

Children make good progress because they are taught well.' At playtimes, there is a delightful atmosphere ...'

During our last inspection in February 2010, Ofsted judged our school to be good, which meant that we would be inspected less often than other schools. An interim assessment carried out by Her Majesty's Inspectorate two years ago showed that the school's performance had been sustained and that its next full inspection could be deferred until the summer of 2014 at the earliest. We have therefore been 'awaiting the call' for some time, and in the week before half term, it finally came.

Readers of a certain age will remember that period in the early 1970s when Britain changed to decimal currency and every transaction was accompanied by a mental calculation into 'old money'. Trying to compare past and present Ofsted judgements is by no means straightforward, as the inspection framework has changed twice during the time since our last inspection. However, what is certain is that the bar has been raised. Achieving SATs scores which are higher than national and local authority levels is not enough. It must be comprehensively demonstrated that all groups of children make good or better progress given their starting points. Furthermore, and quite rightly, it is not just Achievement of Pupils that informs the inspectors' judgement; they also judge Leadership and Management, Behaviour and Safety of Pupils, Quality of Teaching and Early Years Provision.

We are therefore delighted, and justifiably proud, that our school has once again been judged to be 'Good' in all areas. The full report will soon be available on the Ofsted website, but in the meantime, these are some of the main findings. The inspectors highlighted the fact that children make good progress in the Early Years Foundation Stage, settling quickly at the start of the year and rapidly learning new skills. They felt that pupils are prepared well for the next stage of their education, achieving well and flourishing socially. Across the school, teachers were seen to have good expectations of what pupils should learn, teaching in ways that engage pupils fully and inspire a love of learning.

The children's personal and social development was singled out, with pupils demonstrably keen to do well and behave sensibly both in and out of lessons. They were friendly and polite and spoke of how they feel safe in school. The school's provision of many memorable experiences was praised, experiences which contribute well to the children's personal development and ensure that they leave school as confident, kind and tolerant individuals.

As governors and senior leaders we are of course not complacent and are well aware of the areas in which we need to consolidate practice and move forward. The inspectors recognised that it is the elements of both support and challenge within our team that have ensured improvement since the previous inspection, and we are confident that despite financial constraints and changing governments we have the capacity to improve further. Last but not least, the inspectors noted the very positive partnership the school has with parents, who were overwhelmingly supportive. So, many thanks to the parents for providing such delightful children to work with, and to Mrs Evans and all the team for their hard work and steadfast dedication to their education.

Christmas and New Year opening hours

The Health Centre will only be closed on the Bank Holidays, that is, Thursday 25 December, Friday 26 December and Thursday 1 January. We shall be working our normal hours on every other day. The Christmas fortnight is usually particularly busy, what with students coming home for the holiday, people wanting last minute prescriptions and so on. If you are able to arrange for routine appointments outside that fortnight, you will have a wider variety of choices. We shall be issuing double prescriptions in advance of that period to try and avoid you having to go to the pharmacy in their equally busy time.

If you need any special arrangements for prescriptions because you are going on holiday we will try and accommodate them, if you let us know. If you can give us as much warning as possible, that will help both you and us.

The national NHS Friends and Family Test

The Government introduced what they call 'The NHS Friends and Family Test' into hospitals a couple of years ago in order to gain feedback about NHS services. They are implementing the test in GP surgeries throughout England on 1 December. Every patient who uses a GP surgery from then on must have the opportunity to fill in a card that will ask 'How likely are you to recommend our service to friends and family if they needed similar care or treatment?' The choices are: Extremely likely; Likely; Neither likely or unlikely; Unlikely; Extremely unlikely; Don't know. There is also a space to say why you said what you did. (I am not allowed to alter the wording to correct any grammar mistakes!) Every month, we will count the number of cards filled in, and enter the number of responses that say either 'Extremely likely' or 'Likely' into a national database. The Government will then put the results on the NHS Choices website. I shall discuss results with the members of our Practice Patient Group.

Other means of feedback direct to the practice will continue. They include: feedback forms on our reception counter and on our website; our complaints procedure; written and verbal comments in person, by post, by phone and by email through our website. I would welcome any suggestions, complaints or compliments about the practice.

MAGOG TRUST SINGING TREES – WHATEVER NEXT?



At Magog Down this winter, thanks to the generosity of several Members and Friends, we will be planting several **'singing'** trees in the hedge on the western border of the arable area. It is true that, should you walk along the perimeter path next spring, you are unlikely to hear a rendering of the Hallelujah Chorus but what you may be able to hear is bird song, particularly the songs of the Magog yellowhammers and corn buntings; these birds choose hedge trees from which to proclaim their fitness to breed and to warn potential competitors to stay away.

We will be planting attractive flowering trees – Crab apple, Rowan and White beam – not only to promote song but also to provide pollen and nectar for bees and other insects, and later in the year berries to help the birds survive the winter.

To date we have received donations to buy eight trees planted about 20m apart and as the western hedge is about 500m long we would be delighted to receive additional donations if Christmas has not already put you in debt!

POPPY APPEAL COLLECTION

It may be recalled that I appealed in a recent GSVN for extra people to help with house-to-house collections. Although this produced only one volunteer, three other new helpers came forward. These welcome offers were unfortunately offset by the loss of two volunteers who can no longer manage the task, the temporary absence of three others. I have, however, been delighted to receive offers for next year from two new volunteers.

Although Little Shelford achieved a record total, the overall figure for the two parishes was £619 less than in 2013. Collections in shops, pubs, banks, the post office and the school were down by £268 and house-to-house collections down by £177, though the amount collected outside Scotsdales on the first Sunday was £83 more than last year.

Details are as follows: boxes in shops, pubs, banks etc. $\pounds 1073.25$, house-to house collections $\pounds 2369.65$, collection outside Scotsdales $\pounds 461.02$, church collections at St. Mary's and the Free Church $\pounds 135.10$, and a late donation $\pounds 15$.

Thanks, as always are due to the many shops etc. which welcomed collecting boxes, to the hard-working house-to-house collectors and to the residents and shoppers in Great Shelford who gave so generously. Although, due to Alan Varty's efforts, Little Shelford continues to be thoroughly covered, it is impossible to call at all the houses in Great Shelford, and more help to cover them adequately would still be greatly appreciated.

30 YEARS OF SINGING IN STAPLEFORD

On Saturday 20 December at 7.30pm Stapleford Choral Society will hold its regular Christmas concert in Stapleford School Hall with carols and other seasonal music. It should be an enjoyable start to the festive season and we hope a goodly number of you will come and share it with us, especially as this will be a landmark occasion for the choir, 2014 being our 30th anniversary year.

The choir actually has its origins back in 1982/3 when a collection of musicians associated with St Andrew's church thought it might be a good idea to start a village music group. As a result, two, mainly orchestral, concerts were organised in that year. The success of these events prompted the formation of 'Stapleford Singers' in 1984 under the direction of Helen Tooke.

Since that time we are proud that the choir has survived, albeit with a name change, no mean feat in these days of increased work and family pressures that have resulted in the demise of many community groups. It has thrived under the batons of a sequence of five able and enthusiastic directors: Helen Tooke, Janet Wrightson, Jane Chisholm, Keith Bickle and our present conductor Adam Pounds (not forgetting the benefit of a series of very committed accompanists who have been equally important to the choir's success). We have rehearsed and performed a large and varied repertoire of music ranging from 13th century songs to 21st century compositions, including pieces by choir members and Adam himself; a whisk through available past programmes reveals works, sacred and secular, by at least 60 composers, familiar and not so familiar.

Above all we have enjoyed ourselves. In addition to the regular concerts in the village, and also latterly in Cambridge, there have been many other memorable occasions: the Victorian Music Hall staged, in costume, in a marquee on the recreation ground to celebrate the centenary of Stapleford Gala and Flower Show, the trips to France, in co-op eration with Shelford Twinning Association to perform alongside the Verneuil Chorale and the Chorale's reciprocal visit, the performance of 'Dido and Aeneas' in a member's barn when there was a very timely thunderstorm, the fire in a neighbouring building site that nearly put paid to the ascent of 'Elijah's fiery chariot', the weddings and, sadly, the funeral ... the list goes on.

SAWSTON MEDICAL PRACTICE

Jenny Aston, Advanced Nurse Practitioner at Sawston Medical Practice, has recently received a Royal College of General Practitioners faculty award. This recognised her work seeking to standardise and improve the organisation of General Practice both nationally and locally. She has worked tirelessly to raise the issue of Practice Nurse training. There is currently no nationally recognised Career Framework for Practice Nurses, and no specifically identified funding to train either Nurses or Health Care Assistants. Individual practices pay for training from an ever decreasing income. The recent 'Put Patients First: Back General Practice' campaign has highlighted the lack of investment in General Practice. It receives 8.4% of the NHS budget but provides 90% of all NHS contacts.

As Chair of the Royal College of Foundation General Practitioners Nursing Group, Jenny (pictured right receiving her reward) has a powerful role and has been influential in developing national standards and competency frameworks for Health Care Assistants and Nurses working in General Practice. The lack of nurse training placements in General Practice has fuelled the recruitment problems as students do not experience General Practice and so it is not always considered as a career option. Jenny Aston's goal is to see all Health Care Assistants and Nurses trained to the highest possible standards so that the best care can be provided for patients.



The Practice is pleased to celebrate the success of the two Flu Saturdays we held this year. Over the two days we were able to administer in excess of 2,000 vaccinations to the Practice population.

And finally, Christmas and New Year are upon us again. The Practice is only closing on Thursday and Friday, 25 and 26 December, and then again for one day on Thursday 1 January. Apart from those three days it will be business as usual. If you have any problems on the days we are closed, remember – you can call 111. A very Happy Christmas and Happy New Year to you all.

BOTANIC GARDEN POTTED PAGEANTRY



You don't need to go abroad to catch a bit of winter sun: in the darkest months, warm up inside with a bit of potted plant pageantry for the festive season! Our Glasshouse Range at the Botanic Garden is a great place for some inspiration.

The tropics provide Christmas cactus and poinsettia. The Christmas cactus is a forest canopy cactus from the coastal mountains of Brazil with arching spidery sprays of segmented, succulent and toothed leaves. As the days shorten, the plant is triggered to produce beautiful waxy flowers in bright pinks, purples, scarlets and oranges. The flowers are made up of very many tepals – as many as 40 – the outer ones reflexing and the

inner ones lengthening to give the impression of a flower within a flower. Shortening days are also key to vivid colour in another great Christmas plant, the poinsettia, which is in fact a Central American member of the spurge family, Euphorbiaceae. The central knot of unprepossessing flowers is surrounded by the huge bracts which colour up in response to short winter daylength. To have them at their best for Christmas, try to restrict the plant's exposure to day or artificial light to a maximum of 12 hours a day from November onwards and keep the temperature constant at around $18^{\circ}C$.

The Mediterranean and Middle East provide wonderful winter-flowering bulbs including hyacinth and narcissus which bring not only their richly-scented flowers, but some Greek mythology into the house. Hyacinth was so named after a flower sprang from the blood of the young man, Hyacinth, struck down by a discus during a fight between jealous gods, Apollo and Zephyr; Narcissus was the boy so vain and in love with his own reflection in a pool that he took root and became a flower, while the unnoticed nymph in love with him, Echo, faded away until just her voice was left. Heat treated hyacinth and narcissus bulbs will flower in time for Christmas and can be closely packed into a pot.

In fact, closely packing potted plants together not only creates a fantastic centrepiece but increases the ambient humidity which will improve display. It's also sensible to site somewhere with good but indirect light and avoid spots with great temperature fluctuations such as in a draught or above a radiator.

GARDEN CLUB THE VERY BEST CLIMBING AND RAMBLING ROSES

Ian Limmer of Peter Beales Roses in Attleborough, who have won over 20 gold medals for their rose displays at the Chelsea Garden Show, spoke about their climbing and rambling roses.

Climbers usually have large single-headed flowers and most will flower repeatedly through the year. To maintain flowering they require good soil and feeding. To prevent flowers being produced only at the top of the plant, the stems can be trained horizontally, which should encourage new growth to emerge all along the stem. Climbers are best grown on walls and pergolas.

Ramblers have large clusters of smaller blooms and generally flower once over 3–6 weeks of the year. They are tougher and once established, will withstand poorer soil conditions and shade. Ramblers are good for trellis and arches.

CLIMBERS

Height up to 3metres (10 feet)

Blush Noisette Fragrant lilac-pink flowers, ideal for a small space.

Aloha Sumptuous, many-petalled, pink rose with strong fragrance.

Breath of Life Apricot, hybrid tea-like, fragrant flowers, freely produced.

Casino Clusters of scented, globular mid-yellow fully double flowers on strong stems.

Sombreuil Pure white base to the classically-formed flowers, sometimes flushed with pink.

Souvenir du Docteur Jamain Velvet, red-wine flowers, suitable for a north facing wall.

Height 3-4.5 metres (10-15 feet)

Gloire de Dijon Very large, full tea-scented, buff to orange flowers.

Alchymist Strongly scented double flowers, with a mixture of yellow and yolky orange, colouring, paling with age.

Meg Large buff yellow, flushed apricot single flowers with rust-red stamens, followed by large hips.

RAMBLERS

Height 3-4.5 metres (10-15 feet)

Sanders White Scented, rosette flowers of pure white in cascading clusters. Bright green foliage.

Chevy Chase Large clusters of small, double, deep crimson blooms produced in great profusion in early summer.

City of York Semi-double, creamy white flowers with lemon centres. Free flowering and suitable for a north facing wall.

Mannington Mauve Rambler Large showy clusters of mauve flowers in mid summer. Discovered growing in the grounds of Mannington Hall in Norfolk, as a seedling of the white daisy-like flowered rambler, *The Garland*.

Height 4.5–5 metres (15–20 feet)

Ethel Large clusters of small, pale pink flowers on a vigorous, pliable plant.

Banksiae '*Lutea*' Large trusses of unusual, small pale yellow, primula-like, double flowers born on almost thornless stems. Needs a sunny, sheltered wall for flowering in April to May.

Height over 6.5 metres (20 feet)

Kiftsgate Masses of creamy white flowers in large clusters followed by many small, orange- red hips. Vigorous, tolerating shade, so an ideal tree climber.
