GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL SUMMARY OF MINUTES OF AUGUST MEETING

MINUTES

Minutes of the Finance & General Purpose Committee (F&GP) meeting held on 16 December 2014 were confirmed as being an accurate record and were signed by Charlie Nightingale.

Minutes of the Parish Council meeting of 15 July 2015 were confirmed as being an accurate record and were signed by the Chair.

1 London Road, Section 106 money

The S106 indemnity for S/0562/14/FL was reviewed, signed and witnessed for the Clerk to proceed with the claim.

Allotment Fee year was revised back to its original September date as it was considered more suitable to the growing year for allotment holders.

The following quotations were reviewed.

a) Ball Catch netting at the Pavilion Boyd Sport & Play preferred but planning and consultation with the cricket club and their possible contribution to the cost was necessary.

System objectively in place by start of 2016 cricket season allows time for further review prior to resubmitting for approval with all financial evaluations available.

- **b) Drainage channel to Village Hall car park** Quotation from Gatward of £1,794 plus VAT was accepted and Clerk instructed to proceed with the work as soon as possible.
- c) New slabs to front of Skateboard Ramp Quotation from Steve Bond Carpentry at £960 plus VAT was accepted. Clerk instructed to proceed with the work after completion of item 'b' above.
- **d)** Ramp and paving to rear of Pavilion entrance steps Quotation from Steve Bond Carpentry at £450 plus VAT was accepted. Clerk instructed to proceed with the work after completion of item 'c' above to allow for use and disposal of redundant material from item 'c' above.

FINANCIAL PLAN

The 2015/2016 Financial Plan was presented and should be available for review at each Parish Council meeting.

The year to date status at the end of the first quarter confirms expenditure of £21,821 with significant budgeted expenditure to be allocated in the next quarters. This was considered to be on budget.

The re-phasing of S137 grant for the SSYI was discussed with three payments falling due in this financial year due to a delayed payment in 2014/2015. Clerk to process payment at next Parish Council meeting.

Forecast to the end of the 2015/16 financial year was also considered to be on budget target, with major expenditure and revenue items reviewed. However, the Village Traffic Issues and unconfirmed costs to the Parish Council for all the measures proposed could result in a dramatic reduction of reserves and require a further increase in precept for 2016/17. This will become clearer at the c meeting in December 2015.

Highways Councillor Mike Nettleton presented plans and arrangements for the Village meeting on Traffic Issues scheduled for Tuesday 8 September 2015. Question & Answer pre meetings with any interested parties were arranged for 24 and 26 August and 3 September 2015. Full expenditure proposals were not yet confirmed, however a budget of £31,000 to £46,000 (assuming no Local Highway Initiative Grant), should be considered. Gavin Wiseman (Highways officer at CCC) has been requested to check the proposed costings for a more accurate prediction.

FINANCE

The Clerk presented a schedule of payments and receipts for the month of August 2015 for £2,726.54, which were approved.

CORRESPONDENCE

These were reviewed and replies agreed as follows:

- a) Request for additional Bee Hives at Stonehill allotment A further four hives agreed subject to no one person having more than two hives and their experience or qualifications in bee keeping being suitable. Clerk to respond accordingly to current and past applicants.
- **b) CGM** Parish Council grass cutting contractor notified council of inability to cut outside 150 Shelford Road due to evidence of Japanese knotweed. Cllr Nightingale confirmed a previous incidence of this at the same location and will progress with the necessary control methods by the District Council.
- c) Christmas Lights Cllr Nightingale had received confirmation from a large number of sponsors for the Christmas street lights. However, further sponsorship was expected and updates will follow.
- **d)** VAT Issues Cllr Watson confirmed he had received agreement from Robert Plumbly of PEM to assist with VAT issues and annual sports team contracts at a cost of £500. A meeting will be arranged with the Parish Council and Robert Plumbly to progress.

a) Critical Succession and Critical Illness plan to be produced for future discussion.

- **b) Network Rail** Presentation/engagement from Network Rail on footbridge proposal and impact of increased train schedules on level crossing closures and local traffic.
- c) Street Lighting Update on response of proposal to disperse cost of street lighting to local residents by September 2015.
- **d**) Review of internal field maintenance costs in comparison to external contractor potential costs.
- e) Review of Allotment sizes and fees.

This is a somewhat difficult proposal on which to comment as similar but full width two-storey extensions to the boundary of the site were refused at 2 and 35 Davey Crescent on the grounds of reducing the gap between properties which would harm the character of the area. Subsequently a two-storey extension was approved at 35 Davey Crescent but the first floor element was set further back than this proposal. Therefore SCDC needs to be convinced that approving this application would not adversely affect the amenities of the neighbours and set a precedent for similar two-storey side extensions to the detriment of the character of the area. If approved there should be provision made for the storage of bins in the front garden. No recommendation.

COUNTY COUNCIL

County Council Electoral Divisions

The Boundary Commission for England will announce its decision on new County Council electoral divisions on 29 September. The new electoral arrangements will come into force for the County Council elections in 2017.

During the consultation, my colleague Gail Kenney and myself argued that the villages of Great Shelford, Little Shelford and Stapleford should remain in the same electoral division. However, the revised single-member Shelford division, as set out in the Boundary Commission's consultation document, was for a division covering Great Shelford, Harston, Haslingfield, Hauxton, Little Shelford and Newton.

The decision announced in September by the Boundary Commission is effectively the final word, as it is only open to challenge on whether the Commission followed correct procedures in arriving at its decision.

Cambridgeshire Energy Switch

This is a scheme procured by the County Council which aims to help residents save money on gas and electricity bills. The scheme uses the collective bargaining power of residents to bid for better gas and electricity prices and is open to all residents, including those on either credit or pre-payment meters.

Registration for the scheme is free and does not commit to switching supplier. Collective switching enables energy providers to offer a unique tariff, outside of their four main tariffs, that can be better value. There is no obligation to accept the Cambridgeshire Energy switch offer and participation does not incur any charges, even if the decision is not to take up the offer.

Registration for this round opened on 1 September and closes at midnight on 12 October 2015. This is the fifth round of the Energy Switch scheme. So far over 700 Cambridgeshire households have saved an average of £150 on their energy bills. Travellers

The issue of travellers parked on County Council land at the northern end of the Sawston bypass is being dealt with by the County Council's enforcement officer. In such cases, the County Council has to take out an injunction that then has to be served on the families concerned. The travellers then have a short period of time to leave the site.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT - VILLAGE MEETING

On 8 September, a village meeting was held in the Memorial Hall to review the traffic management plans as prepared by Mike Nettleton, Chairman of the Highways Committee of the Parish Council, in consultation with many from the village. Derek Crosby, CCC Police Traffic Management Officer, and Charles Nightingale, PC Chairman, also attended. There was an audience of about 140, some from neighbouring villages.

Mike Nettleton went through the details of the proposed changes. In general, these were as summarised in last month's issue of the *Village News*, and as described in documents that had been made available in the public library for several weeks. However, following consultations, three items had been added.

Firstly, it had been noted that the Cycle Shop in Woollard's Lane regularly transferred stock between Shelford and Pampisford by non-HGV vehicles, and that this would require a special permit to use the proposed HGV-only parking bay. Secondly, it was proposed that, at the junction of Ashen Green with High Street, the yellow line on the corner by the Free Church should be renewed as a double-line down to the surgery, whilst on the opposite corner there would be a double yellow line down to the first driveway and the line would be removed down to opposite the surgery junction (this gives another 6-8 parking spaces). Thirdly, there were minor changes proposed to the double yellow line outside the old vicarage. Mike Nettleton also confirmed that the Parish Council had agreed to undertake a six month trial of enforcement of parking restrictions by means of £1,000 worth of PC funded police (PCSO) overtime.

The audience was then invited to ask questions or to comment. Among the many points covered were the following.

- Alison Evans, Principal at Shelford School, was very concerned about the risks from traffic and road rage to children outside the school. She stated that the benefits to traffic calming of the current, temporary lights had been dramatic, although she understood that the cost of installing permanent traffic lights (previously quoted as between £150,000 and £650,000) was a serious obstacle to their adoption. However, she believed that the various local authorities should look at this problem more closely. Mike Nettleton stated that he was happy to table this issue at the next Parish Council meeting on 16 September, with a recommendation that we ask Cambridgeshire County Council to undertake an initial study to establish a narrower range of costs.
- King's Mill Lane was difficult for traffic to exit.

- Do we need 'build-outs' in Woollards Lane as well as the pedestrian crossing? (Answer: it prevents parking on the corner of Rayments driveway and makes crossing easier to/from the Memorial Hall car park).
- Car drivers would ignore the restriction of the 'HGV-only' parking bay in Woollards Lane. (See comments on enforcement above.)
- Enforcement would only be of parking, not traffic speed limits.
- Would drivers take notice of 20 mph limit?
- It was suggested that the proposed double-yellow lines in Church Street were not optimally located.
- When will we get the 20mph limit/zone implemented? (Answer: the Parish Council will produce an updated schedule once we know whether we have a grant contribution towards the zebra crossing this is likely to be in about three months' time.)
- The proposed 'build-ups' would provide a degree of traffic calming. Road humps were not being proposed.
- Can the public report parking offences. (Answer: The police will only accept reports of safety related offences.)
- Spinney Drive suffered from all day parkers (London commuters?) and should have extra yellow lining. Mike Nettleton agreed to look at yellow lines in this area, but pure parking issues were outside the scope of this package of changes.
- Should the 20 mph limit in High Street extend as far as Lloyds Bank, as proposed? (Answer: Stopping it at the Co-Op or Ashen Green had been considered but the present proposal was preferred by local residents.)
- Stapleford and Whittlesford Parish Councillors suggested that local parish councils should work together on traffic problems.
- Will comments made at this meeting be reacted to? (Answer: Yes. Reaction to some already noted above.)

After a total of just over 1½ hours the meeting closed with a vote of thanks from Cllr Nightingale to Cllr Nettleton for the extensive hard work he had put into preparing the proposals. (A view expressed informally by many at the meeting.)



THE HARE BROOCH





BOOK REVIEW THE WOMAN IN BLACK BY SUSAN HILL

October means one thing: Halloween, and what better way to make you stay awake wondering if there's something under the bed than to read an English gothic masterpiece. Susan Hill's excellent novella, *The Woman in Black* (1983), is set in a time when cars and horse-drawn carriages co-existed. A solicitor, Arthur Kipps, is tasked with visiting creepy Eel Marsh House, in the frightfully named village Crythin Gifford, to tie up the affairs of a deceased client: Mrs Drablow. As Arthur arrives, he notices the villagers do their best to avoid talking about Eel Marsh House. Resolute to complete the job he heads out to the house. Alone, with only a stiff upper lip, things begin to go more than bump in the night.

Hill uses some nice novella principles here, especially the framing story. There is a loose comparison with Daphne du Maurier's *Rebecca* (1938), but Hill's novella is tighter, focusing on a single story; also Henry James's novella *The Turn of the Screw* (1898) comes to mind; and published three years after,



although quite different in breadth, Stephen King's superb *IT* (1986) has the same skill at making a reader whistle in the dark. All three titles can be ordered at the Great Shelford library.

Success for any horror story is to frighten, and Hill builds tension brick by brick in a plausible way that never makes the reader call out exasperated at the protagonist's actions. It's the little touches Hill does so well that really tingles your spine when reading this, such as the evocative chapter titles: 'Spider'; 'In the Nursery'; 'Whistle and I'll Come to You'.

I loved this book! A real winter's evening, by the fireside, English gothic tale, which had me sleeping with the lights on, many nights after I finished it.

SAWSTON MEDICAL PRACTICE

Flu Vaccination The Practice Flu Saturdays are 10 October and 7 November and we will be running seven clinics in parallel from 8.30am until 2pm. The criteria for NHS flu vaccination this year are:

- Patients aged 65 or over
- Patients aged from six months to less than 65 years of age with a serious medical condition
- All pregnant women, including those who become pregnant during the flu season
- All patients aged two, three and four years, i.e. those born on or after 1 September 2010 and on or before 31 August 2013
- Patients living in long-stay residential care homes
- Patients who are in receipt of a carers' allowance or those who are the main carer of an older or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if the carer falls ill.

Please contact the Practice to check if you are eligible for the free vaccination. For those not eligible a private vaccination can be offered.

Shingles vaccination This is for eligible patients aged 70, 71, 72, 78 and 79. If you were born on or between 2 September 1942 and 1 September 1945, or 2 September 1935 and 1 September 1937 you may qualify for a free vaccination. This is a one off vaccination against what can be a very painful and uncomfortable illness which can last some time. For more details please contact the Surgery.

Meningitis B vaccination This programme for babies started on 1 September 2015. This will be offered to babies born on or after 1 July 2015 and will be offered routinely with other vaccinations. It will protect your baby against infection from meningococcal group B bacteria which are responsible for more than 90% of meningococcal infections in young children. These infections can be serious and are most common in babies and young children.

Again both of these vaccinations are available privately if required.

Meningitis ACWY Campaign This was introduced for young people between 17 and 25 years of age. The vaccine has been introduced in response to a rapidly growing increase in cases of a highly aggressive strain of meningococcal disease, group W. Please contact the Practice to book an appointment for this.

LITTLE SHELFORD LITERARY EVENING

On Saturday 5 September, as part of its 'Fun Weekend', Little Shelford held a literary evening in the Little Shelford Memorial Hall. The event took the form of an informal discussion, hosted by Little Shelford's Parish Chairman David Martin, with local authors Allison Pearson and Sarah Vaughan.



Allison Pearson, who lives in Great Shelford, is columnist and chief interviewer of the *Daily Telegraph*. In 2002, she published her first novel *I Don't Know How She Does It* which has since sold some 4 million copies, in some 32 languages, and in 2011 was made into a film starring Sarah Jessica Parker. It describes the life of Kate Reddy, aged 34, as she tries to cope with her high flying job whilst managing her family, including two young children. She

is soon to publish a sequel in which Kate, 'fast approaching 50' and fighting the prejudices against 'older' women in the workplace, is also dealing with the problems of nurturing teenagers and caring for ageing parents.

Sarah Vaughan lives in Little Shelford and is a former *Guardian* journalist. Her first novel *The Art of Baking Blind* was published in hardback a year ago and has just been released in paperback, and has been translated into 9 languages. In Sarah's tale, five amateur bakers compete in a baking competition and discover that the vision of perfect domesticity they aspire to may not be the whole truth. Her second book, set on a farm in north Cornwall, is in its final stages and is due to be published next year.



A third local author, Liza Colingham, whose books include *Curry: A Tale of Cooks and Conquerors* and *Taste of War: World War II and the Battle for Food* was scheduled to take part, but was unfortunately indisposed.

The two authors spoke about their books, gave a few readings, and answered questions, firstly from David Martin and then took further questions from the audience. They were both delightfully interesting and funny and kept the audience greatly entertained, and the two hours passed all too quickly. Everyone appeared to greatly enjoy the event and I am sure I was not the only one who went away with the thought 'when will they hold the next one?' DF

HOT PLANTS!

Earlier this summer thousands came to witness the dramatic flowering of one of the Garden's rarities, a titan arum from the rainforests of Sumatra. Also known as the corpse flower for the stink of rotting meat it emits in flower, the titan arum produces one of the largest single flowering structures in the world – ours reached 130cm and this was tiny compared to others! The dramatic structure is not actually a flower at all, but an inflorescence, comprising a central, spike-like spadix, surrounded by a frilly, funnel-shaped spathe. At its base, the spathe, really a highly modified leaf, forms a protective chamber enclosing thousands of actual flowers. These are arranged in rings; the lower rings of female flowers open on the first night of full flowering and the upper rings of male flowers open on the second night.

When the female flowers are ready for pollination, the spadix heats up through a series of chemical reactions - a process known as thermogenesis. As night falls, temperatures in the middle of the structure can reach 40°C, which is higher than human body temperature. heat helps to distribute sulphurous compounds – the atrocious stench for which it is famous - across vast distances to lure its pollinators, thought to be carrion beetles and blow flies. With the help of volcanologist Dr Clive Oppenheimer and his phenomenal thermal imaging camera, we were able to record the titan arum heating up over the course of its two-night flowering and a sequence of remarkable images clearly shows the spadix heating up from the tip downwards, rather like a Star Wars lightsaber but in reverse!

This ability to self-generate heat is not unique to the titan arum but is seen in quite a number of plants. Heating up helps the plant to disperse the smells (chemical compounds) and it may also help cold-blooded insect pollinators get up to operating temperature. Our Santa Cruz waterlily in the Tropical Wetlands house also heats up to release its pineapple scent to lure in pollen beetles.


