EXTRACT FROM DRAFT MINUTES OF MARCH MEETING

Public Concerns

Five members of the public present stated their concerns over:

Buristead Rd, (Yew impeding footpath); Inadequate lighting on De Freville Rd; Plans for the Riverbank; Road signs missing (reported); Cycle way rubbish build up (Clerk to arrange Village Man for tidy up); General Street, drains and pavement cleaning; Clean for the Queen (not being actioned by the PC); Village litter pick (depending on adequate support); Electronic Bus signs (grants to be reviewed).

County Council

- City Deal: Initial A1307 consultation discussed at length (see County Councillor Report below).
- Successful 2016/17 Local Highways Initiative grant to Parish Council.
- Local County, District and Parish Councillors have opposed the proposed removal of land from the Green Belt near Addenbrookes in the Draft Local Plan Consultation.
- The Great Shelford Branch of Cambridge Building Society is not subject to either Branch refurbishment or closure.

Highways

- Grant funding for Zebra crossing has been successful.
- Main work programme and Hinton Way changes are awaiting input from CCC
- Tesco delivery parking has now been agreed prior to 0630hrs
- An application for a convex mirror at High Green has not been successful. A parking bay outside No 20 is to be removed.
- Street and Drain clearance still awaited.

Recreation Ground

The Clerk requested quotations for cricket ball catch protective netting.

Cemetery and Allotments

A recent volunteer working party had removed rubbish, weeded beds and established a new planting area. More volunteers are needed to continue to keep the cemetery attractive.

Police Liaison

A series of Crime prevention presentations is being planned for the general

public. Parking monitoring initiative continues with Great Shelford participating.

Speedwatch group will be re-contacted with regard to availability of potential Parish Council funding for local equipment.

Social Media

It was agreed that issues raised on Streetlife would not receive any official response from the Parish Council without first agreement with the Chairman. Any agreed official response would be issued by the Clerk in the Parish Council's name.

Riverbank Project

- An Expression of Interest for Grant has been submitted.
- An Application for flood defence consent has been submitted to Environment Agency.
- SCDC funding offer of £2,000 signed and witnessed at meeting.

Neighbourhood Plan

A Neighbourhood Plan meeting had been poorly attended. Improved circulation of events to be considered with at least an article in Village News as proof of wide public consultation was necessary for a Neighbourhood Plan to be approved.

Defibrillator

The Shelford Support Group has offered £400 contribution for a Village Defibrillator. The meeting agreed to pursue this, especially if a location could be found to make it easily accessible.

Grange Field

Recent letters had declined any discussion and the potential purchase was at a stalemate. The Chair will make enquiries with South Cambs as to current ownership and how to progress the acquisition.

Finance

Clerk Mike Winter presented a schedule of payments and receipts for the month of March 2016 (known to date). This was accepted and 11 cheques valued at $\pounds 5,641-04p$ for payment duly signed by two councillors.

The Clerk presented a monthly review of budget to year-end. Although the bank accounts had a healthy current balance, considerable expenditure had still to be received for March 2016 and it included a significant value of protected S106 funds. Year-end balances are expected to be approximately as forecast.

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Concerns were expressed at the very small distance between the buildings, new road and the watercourse to the south of the site. We believe the 20m buffer as proposed in the Local Plan should be adhered to, so a good landscape edge to the site can be created.

The proposed multi storey car parks would be visually intrusive and have an adverse impact on the open landscape and views from the south. In addition every effort should be made to reduce the number of car journeys to the site to lessen the impact on surrounding roads and villages.

We believe the indicative building heights to the east of the site are too great and do not give a stepped down effect as would be expected at the edge of the site.

In addition they would be overbearing in relation to the houses on the Bell school site.

DISTRICT COUNCIL PLANNING DECISIONS

Extensions were *approved* at 19 and 29 Hinton Way and 8 Tunwell's Lane. A double garage at 4 Birchtrees Rd and a cycle shed at 23 Coppice Ave were also approved.

Fascia signs for Tucker Gardner were *refused* at 39 and 48-50 Woollards Lane, as was an extension to form a new dwelling at 19 Hinton Way.

An application for planning was *withdrawn* for Railway Tavern, Station Rd. demolition of existing building and erection of 12 dwellings. (This is the amended application).

Street Lighting

Balfour Beatty started to replace the street lights in Cambridgeshire in 2011 and now a total of 49,126 have been upgraded as well as 5,380 bollards and signs. The replacement lamps are much more efficient and save 4.5 tonnes of carbon a year and £1 million. Since new streetlights have been installed the number of faults reported has decreased from 53 to 26 per day and the average time to repair faults is now 4 days. The percentage of lights currently working across Cambridgeshire is 99.25%. All this is absolutely great but most of our residents have had difficulties because the Central Government mandated that the streetlights have to be reduced in number by 10%, and this could only happen on minor roads where there are no buses. Apart from this it took weeks to repair the holes We have been really upset by the length of time to get our villages back to their pristine condition but it is happening slowly. City Deal.

The city is trying to grow its tourism, retail, education and business opportunities but without consideration for impacts elsewhere. We cannot go on like this and we must provide a long-term strategy. Businesses must be encouraged to set up outside the city core but within the county envelope, where, we hope, there will be good transport links facilitated by the City Deal.

Devolution.

Differences of opinion rage about what would be the best devolution strategy for Cambridgeshire. The government has suggested Cambridgeshire joins with Norfolk and Suffolk along with Peterborough, but others think that just joining with Peterborough would be OK. Others think that staying the same would be the best course. Some Councillors were not willing to countenance a Mayor in charge of the three counties at any price, but the government will not devolve power to the East of England without it. They need someone responsible for East of England affairs who can be held accountable. All the areas have signed up for looking into devolution further, except Cambridge City. I have always felt that there is too much power centrally and what we can have in the East of England we could use better and more efficiently.

Home Care and Looked after children

Changing the way Home Care is delivered. Can we deliver better care to our frail vulnerable people? We have 610 children in Local Authority care at the moment, 59 of whom are unaccompanied asylum seekers. *Tony Orgee and Gail Kenney*



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HEIDI ALLEN'S NEWSLETTER



The last month or so has been incredibly varied involving everything from education to road and rail infrastructure projects and the Child Support Agency. There is almost nothing that an MP doesn't need to get up to speed with.

Since I last wrote, I have visited five primary schools and co-hosted a meeting at Cambourne Village College with the Regional Schools Commissioner. Difficulties with teacher recruitment was probably the main topic of

conversation and we floated the idea of running a recruitment fair to help schools fill their vacancies. I'll be looking at this over the next few weeks.

At a sixth form level, the principals of Hills Road and Long Road came to Westminster this month to meet the Minister Nick Boles. The Government is currently reviewing sixth form provision across the country, so we were relieved to hear he was fully aware of the excellent education these institutions provide and has no plans to change the way they are structured.

From schools to roads, I met with the Secretary of State, Patrick McLoughlin and his special advisor to ensure funds remained in place for the upgrade to the A428. I had heard rumours that the project may be delayed, however I was told that was not the case. It will be a complex and expensive project from an engineering point of view, but I will ensure local residents are kept informed at every step of the way. Highways England are currently identifying possible outline routes and I will share these as soon as I have them.

After Christmas, I met an inspirational group of mums who shared with me their difficulties with the Child Support Agency over the years. My brave ladies came down to Westminster to meet the Chair of the Work and Pensions Select Committee, of which I am a member, to convince him that this was an area the Committee should look at. I am absolutely delighted to report he agreed, so the Committee will now formally review the failings of the system and make recommendations to the Department of Work and Pensions.

And finally, over the last month I have been trialling a new way of running my surgeries. I held two "no appointment necessary" drop-in events in Sawston and Comberton. The sessions proved really popular with dozens of residents coming along to talk to me on a wide variety of topics. 

ALL CHANGE

The more observant among you may have noticed some changes at the front of the Free Church recently; the noticeboard has been replaced with a fresh one bearing our new logo, and a headstone commemorating a 19th century minister has been removed. In place of the headstone, a wooden cross has stood for some weeks, almost covered in colourful ribbons. The first ribbons were placed there by members of our congregation, and the subsequent ones by people in our village community as they passed by. It was an encouraging task to refill the ribbon bag as they got used up, for each ribbon represented a prayer.

Some people pray every day, some occasionally, and some never, but it is a rare person who does not cry out to God in life and death situations. Yet prayer is more than just asking God for things; it is a two-way conversation that requires at least as much listening as talking. It is saying sorry, giving thanks, praising God just for being who He is, but yes, it is also asking for something for others or ourselves. We have no way of knowing what prayer each of those ribbons represents, but we can know that God will have heard and answered each one. However, that doesn't mean each answer will have been 'yes'.

Many of you will be familiar with the phrase, 'be careful what you wish for'. The same applies to prayer. As a parent, one of the greatest joys is to be able to give good gifts to one's child, maybe things that they have longed and yearned for. Yet any parent also knows that much as a crawling toddler earnestly desires to be allowed to explore the fireplace, the answer to that request has to be 'no' – not because you do not love the child, but because you do. Similarly, to the young teenager who begs for the latest smartphone, the answer may well be 'wait awhile – not yet'.

It has been said that our lives are like the reverse side of a great tapestry. From the back, all we can see are the apparently random knots, the imperfections, the chaotic colours. Only from the front is it possible to see how it all fits together, see how every stitch and knot forms an integral part of an amazing picture. So do not be discouraged if you have prayed, and felt your prayer has gone unanswered. Trust in God - the artist who designed your life's tapestry. *Liz Jenkin, Elder*





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SHELFORD GARDEN CLUB IN CELEBRATION OF TREES

Former wildlife police officer and keen wildlife photographer, Barry Kaufman-Wright returned to give us some interesting facts about trees.

Oaks can grow up to 80 feet tall and with roots potentially 160 feet long are one of the deepest rooting trees in the world. In high summer a mature oak can provide a habitat for up to 100,000 insects. Oak is a slow growing tree, which produces a heavy, hard wood. The age of an oak can be calculated by measuring the girth of the tree 1 metre up from the base and allowing for 1 cm growth a year. Hatfield Forest has a line of oaks which are 700 years old. A completely hollow 750 year old tree has tawny owls nesting in the canopy and badgers living below. Another tree has a massive oak gall, which is 3 feet across. Just outside Thaxted is a tree with two joined trunks, which appears to have been formed by branches having rubbed together over a long period to form a natural graft. Sherwood Forest has an enormous tree known as the Major Oak considered to be over 1000 years old, which has many heavy branches supported by props.

The oldest tree in Britain is thought to be a yew growing in the churchyard of Fortingall village in Perthshire in Scotland with an age of between 2000 to 3000 years.

Elm trees used to be common but Dutch elm disease caused 9 million trees to die in just over 5 years. Some of the elms seen growing around Huntingdon are a hybrid of the smooth leaved elm and the wych elm, which appear to have some resistance to the disease. Beech trees have very shallow roots and the storms of 1987 brought down many of these, including those growing at Wandlebury. A large beech tree at Aysgarth Falls in Yorkshire, has an interesting tangled network of roots exposed by the constant flow of water.

Field maple is a tree traditionally used in hedgerows, some of which date back 300 years. A very old copse of field maples can be seen at Hatfield House. Field maples look particularly attractive when backlit by sunlight refracting through the leaves. Hazel woodland is often managed by coppicing which entails cutting stems back to near ground level every few years, enabling the wood to be harvested. Hundreds of years of this practice have resulted in coppice stands up to 30 feet across. In the past certain trees would have their branches cut at 8-12 feet above ground level to produce successive crops of wood, while preventing stock and deer grazing them. This is known as pollarding, and hornbeam, ash and willow all respond well to this procedure.



Silver birch are known as pioneer trees as they are one the first trees to colonise land and will seed in the roots of fallen trees. Older trees have fissured bark and can live to 100 years old.

Horse chestnut was introduced to Britain by the Romans and gets its name from the oracle or horseshoe shape left when a stem is removed from the branch. Cattle will eat the leaves and the conkers complete with spiny cases, while still attached to the tree. Horse chestnuts have been badly affected by leaf miners causing the leaves to brown and die and parasitic wasps, which lay eggs in the bark causing the trees to bleed. Sweet chestnut is a native tree, which is not related to the horse chestnut. *Helen Chubb*

A CELEBRATION OF PLANTS

May is probably the best month of the year to visit most British gardens - the spring tulips are still out, but joined by irises and the early summer flowers, creating a mass of colour and hopefully some warm sunshine too. The Cambridge University Botanic Garden is no different, and in spring we particularly celebrate our flowering trees as well as our herbaceous plants. But the Botanic Garden isn't just about the beauty of plants, it's also an important focus for plant science research, particularly in Cambridge but also around the world. The Garden's collection of 8000 species is used by researchers exploring how plants work, how they evolved, how they are related to each other, and how they can be used to address global problems as challenging as food security and climate change. Some of the species we grow are the focus of conservation projects because they are so rare, some are the focus of projects to extend the range and yield of important crops. And on May 14th 2016 we hope you will visit the Garden to find out about all of these exciting projects. Our annual Festival of Plants is a celebration of all things plant, and combines great stalls from specialist nurseries with activities for the children, folk music on the main lawn, free tours and talks, all underpinned by the opportunity to find out more about the plants we grow and the science they support. And of course, the Garden will be at its best too, so please do come along and enjoy the atmosphere.

The Cambridge University Botanic Garden is open from 10am – 6pm, April
September, 7 days a week. The Glasshouses and Café close 30 minutes before the Garden and the Botanic Garden Shop at Brookside closes 15 minutes before the Garden. 
