GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL Summary from draft minutes of the meeting held on 20 July 2016

PUBLIC SESSION

One member of the public was present. No issues were raised.

ADDITIONAL PARISH COUNCILLORS

Two applications for additional Parish Councillors were reviewed. Both applicants, Richard Davies and Stefan Harris-Wright, were accepted and coopted onto the Parish Council.

MINUTES AND MATTERS ARISING

Minutes of the Parish Council meeting of 22 June were confirmed as being an accurate record and signed by the Chair. There were no matters arising from the meeting of 18 April.

REPORTS FROM ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES

District Council: no District Councillors were present

County Council: County Councillor Gail Kenney reported that:

- Consultation on the City Deal was available on the website until 1 August and there would be an exhibition at the Memorial Hall on 21 July.
- Consultation on the Access to Cambridge Strategy started on 11 July and will run until 10 October.
- Consultation on devolution with the combined Cambridge and Peterborough proposal would run from 8 July to 23 August.
- Various accidents causing injury to pedestrians due to lack of pavement maintenance were reported by the Parish Council for investigation. Funding for maintenance is recorded as limited.
- The issue of HGVs transiting the village was again raised by the Parish Council for investigation.

REPORTS FROM STANDING COMMITTEES

Highways: Mike Nettleton reported that:

- A revised location of the pedestrian crossing was under discussion due to safety concerns.
- Lack of progress of the main work in Woollards Lane was to be addressed.
- The speed indicator display installation progress was to be progressed by Councillor Ashurst.
- Extension of the parking enforcement patrols was to be confirmed to Chief Inspector Southerland by the Clerk.

Planning: A joint group has been formed for the Neighbourhood Plan. Wider external issues are to be considered, with the planning committee responding to the A1307 consultation.

Recreation Ground: The proposal to have CGM cut the grass on the Recreation Ground, Memorial Corner and Freestone's Corner was passed unanimously. The Clerk is to produce alternative proposals for the Village Man's time.

Cemetery and Allotments: Councillor Barrie Ashurst had personally attended to various outstanding jobs. Councillor Helen Harwood was to progress any further outstanding work directly with a suitable contractor.

Police Liaison: Councillor Barrie Ashurst reported that:

- Operation Hunter (awareness raising by the police of security issues) had been successful in the village.
- A speedwatch survey on Hinton way showed 10% of all vehicles were speeding.
- Hinton Way, Granhams Road and Abberley Wood pavements were being reduced in usable width due to overgrown hedges and grass growth.

Library: Councillor Helen Harwood reported that funding continued to be a concern. The library was a service to the wider local community and co-location activities were under consideration..

Pavilion: A report from the Parish Clerk was circulated.

- A request from the bowls club for a contribution towards a new sprinkler system was not supported.
- Faults on the fire alarm system and one CCTV camera were scheduled for repair.
- The Recreation Ground emergency gate combination lock had been replaced again; further loss would require review of use.

Riverbank Grant: The Clerk reported that the grant application of $\pounds 25,174$ had been successful and that work on the project was expected to start imminently.

Parochial Charity Land Development Plans: Mr Ian Wilkinson, representing Trustees of Great Shelford Parochial Charities, stated that any development of land at Bridge Close, Mores Meadow and adjacent farmland/wild grassland was at a very preliminary stage with no direct plans or funding. Considerations were extremely speculative and without relaxation of Green Belt planning restrictions were unachievable.

Councillors Mike Nettleton and Gail Kenney expressed opposition to any Green Belt relaxation. A further update is to be provided within six months.

Purchase of a defibrillator for general village availability: Item adjourned for further consultation on site location, use and administration of equipment. The Chair would review the potential site within Tesco.

The Clerk would not deposit the cheque from Shelford Support Group until all administration arrangements were documented and in place with Tesco.

FINANCE

Clerk Mike Winter presented a schedule of payments and receipts for July. This was accepted with 11 cheques valued at $\pm 10,585-02p$ for payment.

APPROVAL OF PARISH CLERK WORKING HOURS

A proposal to increase working hours from 20 to 25 hours per week effective from June 2016 was carried by unanimous vote.

CORRESPONDENCE

- Train Station Barrier Closure report from Duncan Grey.
- Train Station Report on an incident from Helen Harwood. County Councillor Gail Kenney to progress.
- Jim Chisholm's contribution on Streetlife, suggesting that the Sustrans route from the Station should be extended towards the bridge.
- Peter Fane requested the Parish Council should comment on the A1307 City Deal consultation. Item referred for consultation response.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATES

HIGHWAYS

The Parish Council set out a number of plans as part of the April 2016 to March 2017 budget to address village residents' concerns with Highways issues. The following is an update on progress with some of the issues to date.

Woollards Lane Zebra Crossing

The County Council's detailed design work for all the Highways changes agreed last year is progressing, though more slowly than we'd like. One significant issue which has come up is the location of the zebra crossing. It was intended to be opposite the Cambridge Building Society. A CCC safety audit raised concerns about traffic turning left from Robinson Court. The zebra crossing will therefore have to be located outside Solutions/Haarts, which unfortunately means the loss of two of the three parking bays outside McColls. The remaining bay will be designated for disabled parking.

Parking Patrols

The Parish Council has requested the continuation of PCSO patrols enforcing village parking for a further period of six months.

RECREATION

The Grange Field

We are all aware that we have insufficient public recreational space in the village. The only significant public space is the Recreation Ground itself. This covers an area of about 4.5 hectares (this for a village of 4,900 people, which is growing). The national recommendation is 2.4 hectares per 1,000 people (i.e. 12 hectares in total).

The impact is obvious:

- Expansion of the existing sporting facilities is limited and almost not possible.
- The Tennis Club would like to increase the number of courts available.
- The Playscape project, although it has come up with an excellent master plan, is severely constrained for space to accommodate all the proposals.
- On busy summer weekends the Recreation Ground can feel overcrowded.

Adjacent to the Recreation Ground is an area of 3.1 hectares known as the Grange Field. This is in unclear and fragmented private ownership and is only used sporadically for grazing. It is the only land of significant size which might be available for recreational use and would dramatically improve the space we have if we were able to acquire it.

The Parish Council has made a number of attempts to acquire this land for the village, going back over 40 years, but has been rebutted on each occasion. We are now writing again to each of the presumed owners, telling them that we wish to buy the land. We are also progressing matters through a potential Open Space designation and through the Neighbourhood Plan. None of this will be easy and we suspect that we may have to resort to a Compulsory Purchase Order to acquire the land.

One of the key things in all of this is demonstrating community support. We will need your help through surveys and questionnaires for whatever process is eventually adopted.

JOIN THE GARDEN GANG!

Would you like to join a group of public-spirited gardeners working around the village?

I am setting up a 'Garden Gang' to do some gardening on the various green spaces around the village – the beds in High Street, the flowerbeds outside the Memorial Hall, the cemetery in Cambridge Road, for starters. And there are lots of other spaces we could move on to with enough

man- and woman-power.

The Parish Council will never have enough money to spend on the finer aspects of gardening but, as a group, we could achieve wonderful things, and brighten up the village for everyone. My ambitions include roses, hollyhocks, lavender beds, more cardoons, and lots of spring bulbs: all the plants that bring joy to the heart.

You need no particular skills, as guidance is available, though any expertise you may have will be appreciated. Tasks will range from weeding, pruning and watering, through to digging.

Initially we will meet once a month on a regular day (the first Thursday in the month, as an example) for a morning session, possibly including coffee afterwards, but we'll decide which day when we know who is interested. You needn't commit to more than the odd day and the odd couple of hours – but every little helps!

COUNTY COUNCIL

Devolution: It's not long now until your say on the Devolution Deal is completed. Cambridgeshire and Peterborough and the Local Enterprise Partnership will ask for some extra responsibilities and funding. It is proposed that Cambridgeshire gets £20 million a year for the next 30 years (£600 million) for infrastructure and transport. We will also get £170 million for new housing. We will be building a case for a Cambridge to Wisbech railway, and a new station at Soham. We expect road improvements on the A14 and A142 and upgrades on the A10 and the A147. There will be improved roads at Whyton and a new masterplan for St Neots. There will be a new Peterborough University for local tertiary education, and a Peterborough Enterprise Zone. Ely Southern Bypass: The Ely Southern Bypass will connect the A142 at Angel Drive with Stuntney Causeway. The total cost will be about £35 million, and it will be a 1.7km single carriageway with a bridge over the Great Ouse and two bridges over the railway. Work will start in early 2017. There will be a walkway attached to the river bridge. This provide a circular walking route linking Fen Rivers Way and Ouse Valley Way, and will improve access to the River Great Ouse Wildlife Site. The existing underpass will be remodelled to include a subway for cyclists at its junction with Stuntney Causeway.

I will continue to listen to the needs of all sectors and ensure the needs of South Cambridgeshire are at the heart of the Cabinet's negotiations.

Onto the more light hearted duties of your constituency MP, I was delighted to be invited to pull the first pint at the Shelford Feast. The event was part of a week-long series of fundraising events and not only did they raise an incredible amount of money (I believe they are still counting!) I managed to remember how to pull a pint!

Just ahead of breaking for the Summer holidays, I was able to visit three more schools in Stapleford, Trumpington and Guilden Morden (I am slowly getting around, please bear with me if I haven't visited your school yet!) The hard work and commitment of teachers, parents and governors is always plain for me to see so I was absolutely devastated when our new Secretary of State Justine Greening announced that the Department for Education would delay the introduction of the new Fairer Funding Formula for another year. Although Justine was very clear that no local authority would receive less funding than the top up amount we had received this year, I have asked officers at the County Council to digest what this will mean for us in real terms. I want to assure you that I am supporting our schools 100% on this and am seeking to meet with her as soon as possible.

The two parishes share the concerns of housing, transport, green belt, countryside access, shops and businesses. Not least, members of our two communities emphasised the need for more and better recreation facilities,



Health Centre provision, speed limit reductions and affordable housing. These community facilities and the overall infrastructure are elements which have been stressed at meetings and at the two shows. We need to manage growth for the good of the local communities.

Whilst several people have indicated their willingness to be involved, we now need a substantive list of people who will take on tasks. We have to get the whole community involved, not just those who read the village magazines, therefore we intend to use social media to contact all members of the community. Cambridgeshire Historic Churches Trust Ride, Drive or Stride Day – Saturday 10 September: A sponsored event

Major Roof Repairs: Last month we received the good news that our application for a government grant towards the re-leading of the nave and north aisle roofs had been successful. The grant means that we can undertake all the roof and associated stone work repairs in one large project. Work will begin in October and may last for up to six months, depending upon the weather conditions and what the contractors find when the roof is stripped. The church will have a temporary scaffolding 'roof' for the duration of the project and there may also be some scaffolding props within the church. Services will continue as normal, but the project does mean that those thinking of marriage services will need to take account of the repair works.

Rural Dean of Granta Deanery: After consulting members of the Deanery, Chapter Bishop Stephen has invited me to succeed The Revd Dr Julie Norris as Rural Dean of Granta Deanery. I have accepted Bishop Stephen's invitation and will be Commissioned as Rural Dean later this month. It is a privilege to take on this important leadership role and I ask for your prayers as my five year term of office begins.

Festival and Gift Day – Sunday 2 October: A highlight of the autumn is always Harvest Festival and there will be a chance to support local good causes and those in need as part of the celebrations. The weekend also includes an annual **Gift Day**, where we encourage generous financial giving to support the work of the Parish Church. Most Christians don't really feel like they are a very good sign, and often we might feel ashamed that our lives don't really point to God at all, but we are a sign, a sign that God works in our imperfect world with his imperfect creation, a sign that God does desire to call out to everyone, with the Christian message of peace, hope and love.

I pray that you might see a sign of that love in our community and in Christians everywhere.

MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

mental health first aid england We all know how to look after ourselves if we become physically unwell. But what about looking after our mental health and wellbeing? Mental health problems cover a range of issues including stress, anxiety, depression, schizophrenia and many others. One in four people will experience a mental health problem within the course of a year, and one in six employees is likely to experience problems with stress, anxiety and depression.

There is a huge stigma surrounding mental health, which can lead to a delay in recognising problems, and a delay in people seeking help. Early intervention can help slow down or even stop mental health problems and lead to a faster recovery. However, most of us know very little about mental health. We often don't spot the signs in ourselves or someone else until very late.

A Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) course would enable to you to recognise the early signs of a mental health problem and give you the confidence and knowledge to help. MHFA is a certificated course accredited by the Royal Society of Public Health. We are running two courses locally during October 2016 and January 2017. ARTHUR RANK HOSPICE Team Arthur needs you!



Do you know someone who might like to join TEAM ARTHUR and become part of an extraordinary future? Arthur Rank Hospice Charity needs to bolster their fabulous volunteer team, ahead of moving to their new hospice home in Shelford Bottom.

Volunteers have been at the heart of the Hospice since it first opened its doors on the Brookfield Hospital site on Mill Road 35 years ago. It started with just a handful of volunteers and now the Hospice relies on a fantastic team of over 360 who support the clinical, fundraising and administrative teams. Often it is their presence and warm welcome which can help normalise experiences for those receiving the Hospice's care.

There are some exciting new roles created by the Hospice's move to their new home, including patient group activity leader, education receptionist, education assistant, café assistants and meet and greet representatives. 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ARE YOU A POTENTIAL (OR ACTUAL) MUSICIAN?

Duxford Saturday Music Workshop offers junior and adult would-be musicians the chance to learn one of more than 20 different instruments at Duxford School on Saturday mornings in term-time.

From late September onwards, Workshop holds group tuition sessions, where children from Year Five onwards are helped to learn an instrument. There is also a 'junior music group' for children from Year 1 upwards, as well as classes for adult beginners and several groups for improvers. In addition to the tuition classes, there are also groups ranging from junior drama, an adults' community choir, folky fiddlers, groovy(?) guitarists, ukulele er ... users and banjo ... bashers (didn't mean it folks, honest), to recorders, strings, jazz and wind bands – and a full orchestra.

Workshop is a registered charity (so support from donations, bequests and sponsored marathon runners is always welcomed!) and is all about learning and performing together in a supportive environment. Members include adults who have always wanted to learn an instrument but haven't had the opportunity, or who learned as children but 'haven't played for donkeys' years'. Since its foundation over forty years ago, several thousand musicians (including many who never thought they could!) have begun their musical adventure at Duxford Workshop; so why not **you**? Even if you think you're only slightly musical, so long as you're keen enough to do some practice between lessons there is almost certainly an instrument you can learn to play. So come and join Workshop and see what **you** can achieve!

If you don't have an instrument of your own, Workshop has a selection of string and wind instruments available for members to hire at reasonable rates.

Finally, Workshop also welcomes experienced musicians who would like to help our learners and to broaden their own skills, and is currently appealing for a few more volunteer instrumental tutors. So, if you are a musician who may be interested in joining the crew and helping others to learn to play, please make contact with the Director, Arwen Gilbert *now*, by emailing *director@duxford saturdayworkshop.org.uk*. Your tutoring involvement can be as little as a single session during the morning, but of course you'll also be most welcome to play in any of our ensembles. BOOK REVIEW GOODBYE, MR CHIPS BY JAMES HILTON

For many of us the beginning of September means one thing: school. For those that left school too many years ago to remember, we will often need a little help to revisit those glorious days. So what better way than to read a book about school that is as charming as it is nostalgic?

James Hilton's enjoyable novella, *Goodbye, Mr Chips* (1934), will have you pining for your lost youth and flicking through the photographs of old sports days and school fetes.

From his lodgings opposite the school, where he hears the bell, Mr Chipping, a retired, beloved master at a boys' school, looks back on his life at Brookfield Grammar School spanning several decades before, during and after the First World War.



This novella floats along like a warm breeze in a lush meadow. Every chapter develops Mr Chipping, and a steady character arc brings him into our hearts, making us care for him like the schoolboys do. Hilton's skill in evoking innocence, happiness and the safe school system is the ultimate pleasure of this work. His ability to create an atmosphere of pre-war boarding schools feels familiar, even to today's readership.

Goodbye, Mr Chips sits well alongside Muriel Spark's amazing novella *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie* (1961). Both titles mentioned are available to order into the wonderful Great Shelford library.

A pleasant story, full of wit, nostalgia and an Englishness that is almost faded. I adored Hilton's novella and will try to re-read it every September when the bell for school rings. *Garry Pope*

25TH ANNIVERSARY FETE SATURDAY 10 SEPTEMBER

A huge fete will be held at Emmaus, Green End, Landbeach, CB25 9FD (access from the A10) from 10am to 4pm. On-site parking is available. The community opened in 1991 after a local man, Selwyn Image, was challenged by a man at a soup kitchen to do something different to help homeless people. Emmaus now provides people who have experienced homelessness with a stable home, as well as meaningful work. Representatives from more than 20 of the Emmaus communities will be travelling to Cambridge to hold stalls at the fete, selling a wide range of vintage items and bric-a-brac. Emmaus UK's President, Terry Waite, will also be speaking at the event, and there will be a range of food and drink stalls. All money raised will be used to fund training and development opportunities helping homeless people to gain the skills and experience they need to move forward with their lives.



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THE RIVERBANK ON THE RECREATION GROUND

The Recreation Ground riverbank restoration was completed on Friday 12 August after two weeks of work by Wiltshire-based contractors Five Rivers.

The bank was being steadily eroded away and needed fully rebuilding. Instead of simply replacing the hard wooden planking, there is now a 'softer' bank of compressed hazel branches below coir rolls which have been pre-seeded with river-friendly plants. The new bank will provide a better habitat for aquatic flora and fauna.

There are three stone access ramps for dogs, ducks and other animals to get in and out of the river without damaging the new planting. The parallel ditch has also been dredged of rocks and toxic rubbish. A new path covered in bark chippings has been built along the river to allow access throughout the year ... it was getting a bit too muddy in the winter.

An alder tree growing out of the bank had to be cut back to allow access, but it has been coppiced under supervision and should grow back big and healthy. Some of the lower hanging branches of the riverside trees were also cut back to allow access for machinery, but they too should return quickly. At the moment the riverbank might appear a little bare, but the grasses, wildflowers and weeds should all regrow soon to make the area a beautiful haven of peace once again. Currently the river water level is about 25cm (1 foot) below its normal level with little to no flow. This should be restored by Thursday 18 August.

The bulk of the project costs were provided by a grant from landfill firm Amey which the Parish Council successfully applied for through the Cambridgeshire Community Foundation. A further small grant came from South Cambridgeshire District Council, with the small remaining balance being met from Parish Council funds. Many thanks to all organisations who contributed to the costs. Our thanks should also go to Councillor Stephen Chittenden for leading the project over the last year or so, Clerk Mike Winter for supervising the implementation, Rob Mungovan, Ecology Consultancy Officer, SCDC for assisting with the project design and all village residents who contributed to the consultations.

The project represents a major long term improvement to the riverbank area and at little cost to the village. The Parish Council have always stressed that this was only the first phase to stabilise and clean up the riverbank. We would really appreciate village residents' ideas on what should be done next to add to the enjoyment and use of the riverbank area. Game, set and matched: how a visit by a former Shelford girl revealed a 1950s love story on the village tennis courts

Great Shelford Tennis Club was visited during the summer by a former village resident, Christine Henning, who now lives in Norfolk. The clubhouse was locked, so she peered through the door but was unable to see what she had come for.

Undeterred, Christine wrote to the club secretary, 'I made a nostalgic visit recently, and looking through the windows I saw that the engraved boards of club captains, cup winners etc. were relatively recent. Do you still have the old boards going back to late 1940s or early 1950s?'

What Christine was seeking was a record of her parents' time at the club from around half a century ago.

She continued, 'I wonder if there is any mention on them of either a Tony (Antony) Henning or a Phoebe Edmiston. I would be very interested to know, if you have any information from that time.'

GSTC Secretary Sarah Franklin was able to provide the good news, along with a photograph of one particular name on the club board. So Christine finally got to see that little piece of family history.



'That's my mother, Phoebe Rose Edmiston,' replied Christine. 'She lived in Coppice Avenue. She and my father met at Great Shelford Tennis Club and were married in St Mary's the year of her secretaryship. At that time, as you probably know, tennis clubs were THE place to meet and socialise and they really enjoyed all that went with it. They were both good players and we went on to have a court at our home in Wokingham.'

We now hope that Christine will join us as guest of honour at the club's annual dinner. After all, she simply would not exist if her parents' eyes had not met across a tennis net in Shelford all those years ago. She is living proof of the GSTC motto: 'May friendship flow through sport'.
