### Summary from draft minutes of the December meeting

### Half-term opening of the Pavilion toilets

The Parish Council is considering opening the Pavilion during the daytime over the February half-term to allow Rec users access to the toilets. It was agreed that it would be necessary for someone to take responsibility for the toilets whilst they were open. Cllr Nettleton will contact local organisations to see if there are volunteers who would be willing to supervise the opening of the toilets.

#### Sale of tractor, topper and derv tank

The Rec grass is now being cut by contractors. It was therefore decided to sell the old tractor and topper, which were proving costly to maintain, together with a tank of derv (diesel fuel). It was unanimously agreed to accept the offer of £5,555 for these from Rectory Farm.

#### **Finance**

14 cheques to a value of £8,313.28 were accepted.

#### **Precept**

The proposed budget requirement for each committee together with all other annual costs were presented at the meeting. The resultant precept proposal was recommended for approval at the full Parish Council meeting on Wednesday 18 January. The Clerk was requested to circulate the full detailed proposal to all Parish Councillors prior to the meeting.

Recommend refusal. 41 Tunwells Lane forms part of a group of buildings which are identified as positive buildings in the Great Shelford Conservation Area Appraisal and ones which could be candidates for article 4 directions. Hence there is a presumption that original features should be retained.

The proposal to replace the original small dormer with a large flat-roofed zinc clad dormer would be contrary to advice contained in SCDC's Design Guide and would not preserve or enhance the character of the conservation area.

The proposed two-storey side extension with a flat roof and a four-metre single storey rear extension would also be contrary to the advice in the Design Guide, and would both cut out light and be overbearing to the adjoining property.

#### **COUNTY COUNCIL**

#### **Local Highway Improvement Schemes**

Details of the 2017–18 round of the Local Highways Improvement scheme were circulated to Parish Councils in early September. Great Shelford Parish Council made a successful bid in 2016 and are making a bid for another pedestrian crossing in 2017. A panel to consider all the bids in the local area will meet on 30 and 31 January, and we will be supporting the Parish Council's bid. As in previous years, the maximum County Council grant is £10,000 and parishes are required to agree a financial contribution of at least 10% towards any approved scheme.

#### **County Council motions**

At its December 2016 meeting the County Council considered two important motions, one relating to winter gritting and the other to street lighting. In its spending plans for 2016–17, the Highways and Community Infrastructure Committee decided to reduce funding for winter gritting and on street lighting. This then formed part of the overall budget approved by the council.

There was an expectation that there would be consultation with parishes before any winter gritting reductions were implemented, but there was no such consultation and parishes were surprised to be told in the autumn that many roads would only be gritted in prolonged periods of cold weather and not automatically whenever the gritting teams went out. Following many public expressions of concern, the County Council decided to reverse the decision and reinstate its previous pattern of winter gritting. In 2017 roads will therefore be gritted as in the 2015–16 winter.

The decision could not be implemented immediately because fewer vehicles were being leased and a smaller number of drivers had been trained. In the event, sufficient vehicles and drivers were available by noon on Thursday 12 January 2017 for the previous pattern of gritting to be fully implemented.

The County Council had decided to turn off some street lighting in the middle of the night and to further reduce the illumination levels of street lights earlier in the evening. Unsurprisingly this also proved to be controversial, and the County Council decided to reinstate lighting in the night and to stop reducing illumination levels. Unlike the reinstatement of winter gritting, this could be implemented almost immediately. However, the street lighting was only turned off in the night in those villages connected to the street lighting central management system, so did not apply to Great Shelford, Little Shelford and Stapleford.

As this is my first newsletter of 2017 may I start by wishing my constituents health and happiness in the New Year. Let's make it the best yet!

In the twilight of 2016 I visited the Blood Donation Centre in Long Road, Cambridge for my first ever blood donation. I have to say, it was utterly painless, parking was free and I had my choice of biscuits afterwards! Giving blood is easy, very quick (I was in and out in less than an hour) and it saves lives. The blood service have come up with a great resolution for the New Year – 'don't give up, just give'. The Christmas period also gave me time to visit the Cambourne Food Bank, a poignant reminder that Christmas isn't easy for those struggling with basic needs. It is open every Thursday from 10am to 12 noon at the Old Blue School on Eastgate.

The Food Bank is run by kind, dedicated volunteers who try their very hardest to help with the many issues that bring someone to a Food Bank. I'm hoping to be able to work with them more in the future, unlocking some of the housing and benefit difficulties that are often at the heart of food poverty.

I'm delighted to share the launch of Cambridgeshire County Council's Communities Innovation Fund, which gives community groups the opportunity to apply for funding for initiatives which will improve lives. December saw the publication of the National Schools Funding Formula from the Department of Education. I'm still analysing the data and will be writing to my schools for feedback on proposals. The consultation closes on 22 March.

I'm continuing to push for safer and more efficient roads in our region and joined the A1307 Forum last month. Constituents from Babraham or those who

work at Granta Park will know the impact this road has on the surrounding region and the A505. These roads are no longer fit for purpose, so alongside an improved road crossing at Foxton, I'll be pushing for these initiatives in 2017. With the city deal, devolution deal and the £1.1bn announced in the Autumn Statement for road congestion pinch points, I am confident we can build a strong case to put to Government.

Turning to buses and trains, I'm inviting constituents to contact me about any issues they have with existing public transport services. I have been contacted by a number of residents about unreliable services, so if you too have experience of this, please contact Nicola in my office on the contact details below.

One of the best parts of my job is getting to know you at my surgeries and events. If you have a concern you think I could help with, or some feedback you'd like to share with me, please get in touch.

We had a complicated start to the year, returning from the New Year break to no phones or heating – thank you for your forbearance.

#### APPOINTMENT SYSTEM

Over recent months we have shared with you an increasing frustration over booking appointments. We are constantly looking to improve the quality of the service we offer and have been doing much research. We believe that fundamentally changing our appointment system will bring significant benefits and by Easter we plan to move towards a Rapid Access Clinic system which involves a formal separation of urgent and routine work.

**Urgent medical problems, needing action today** Rapid Access appointments will be available to anyone who needs to be seen today. They will be five minutes only, with the duty clinician, who will be able to give rapid assessment and treatment for single problems. (We will ask you to rebook for a routine appointment if you have more than one problem, or something which can wait for a routine appointment.) You can expect that when you phone to request an appointment, our Receptionists will enquire about the broad nature of the clinical problem so that they can guide you towards the most appropriate appointment. If you do not wish to describe the nature of your urgent request you will be booked for a telephone call rather than a face-to-face appointment.

**Routine appointments** These will be available to book online, via phone or in person, and will allow you to choose the clinician you would like to see. We hope to have routine appointments available within seven days and up to four weeks in advance – no more ringing at 8am!

**Medication reviews** When a medication review is due this often requires an appointment for a blood test or a blood pressure check before, or instead of, a face-to-face GP appointment. When you believe your medication review is due, please let our reception staff know, and we will review your records and ensure you are offered the most appropriate appointment.

**Telephone appointments** We are doing an increasing number of telephone appointments, which can be a real time saving for all. If you request a telephone consultation, please make sure we have your correct telephone number. If you are happy to receive texts, this is a great way for us to communicate test results to you.

**Repeat prescriptions** Please order online where possible, and please help us by giving us **at least** 48 hours' notice for a repeat prescription to be issued.

Over the next three months we are welcoming to the practice two new receptionists (Gemma Boudall and Annabel Burns), a new temporary secretary (Thelma Fison), two new project managers (Pete Grantham and Becki Davies), a nurse practitioner (Michaela Harris) and a new GP (Laura Armitage). We are looking forward to serving you through 2017 with a changing team and an improving appointment system. At the time of going to press we have not set a start date for the new system but will update the website as soon as we know.

**Major roof repairs** Steady progress is being made on the nave roof repair project and we appear to be on schedule to complete the works by mid-March. However, this is weather dependent

and if we have periods of very cold weather in the next few weeks, then things may be delayed. It is not possible to work with lead if the air temperature is low.

Thankfully the church is now feeling warmer (relatively!) as a fair proportion of the new sheet lead is now installed. This means that the gaps between the ceiling boards are now covered, thus preventing heat loss.

Church security Given the number of lead thefts from churches in East Anglia in recent weeks, the police and our Diocesan authorities have asked rural churches to be especially vigilant. This applies in particular to parish churches where roofing works are taking place, as the scaffolding could provide easy access. Our contractors secure the site at the end of the working day and the scaffolding is alarmed and monitored. However vigilant eyes and ears locally are particularly valuable, so if you see **anything** suspicious around the churchyard at night or over the weekends, please report it directly to the police.

**Come & sing** Do you like to sing or have choir experience at whatever level? Then we would like to hear from you at St Mary's. The parish choir is keen to recruit new members who enjoy singing in a group and who would like to sing during some of our services. 



Sometimes just being present and available to a loved one who is having a hard time is the greatest gift you could possibly give.

As a parent or grandparent, do you enjoy watching your children share with each other? One of the primary lessons of life is learning how to share. When you see your children being unselfish, you're happy about that, and God is the same. When He looks on us and sees us being generous with each other, He is so pleased because God is generous, and he wants us to become like him.

In Contact with God, Anthony De Mello writes: 'Give' says Jesus, 'and gifts will be given you. Good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured out into your lap; for whatever measure you deal out to others will be dealt out to you in return.' (Luke 6:38) If you are tight-fisted and calculating with the poor, the needy, with those who ask you for help and service, how can you expect God to be generous with you?

Although we live in one of the most affluent parts of the country, Cambridge is very much 'a tale of two cities', and to a certain extent our villages reflect that. Every day people turn up at food banks near here looking for their next meal. Often, they are already receiving help but have hit a crisis; their benefit has not been paid this week, or they have had an unexpected expense. A few suffer from an addiction, and this week's money has been wasted on that. Even very well-paid people can suddenly lose part or all of their income. Many families rely on free school dinners for their children's main meal; what do they do during the holidays?

Our nearest food bank operates from the John Huntingdon's Charity (JHC) at Sawston, serving Sawston and the surrounding villages. JHC works closely with the Great Shelford Parochial Charity, so it covers 'our patch'. Just inside the door of the Ashen Green entrance to our church, you will find a basket to receive gifts of food. A notice with ideas and guidelines is inside it, but items must not need refrigeration, so fresh or homemade foods can't be used. Really useful items are starchy food like pasta, beans or rice, some protein, vegetables and tinned fruit; the makings of a main meal for a couple of days. Something to give a spot of comfort too is always welcome; maybe coffee, tea and a packet of biscuits. We will take your contributions to JHC as the box fills up. So you help those in need, you help yourself and you make God happy too! As the saying goes, 'What's not to like?'.



#### MARCH ISSUE OF THE VILLAGE NEWS

#### NEW HOME FOR SHELFORD POST OFFICE

Regular readers will have been aware for some time of the likelihood that Shelford Post Office would close. So would the village be left without a Post Office? Given recent Shelford shop closures and Post Office closures across the country, we were worried that we might have no Post Office at all. So there was great relief when it was announced that Kash Stores will take over Post Office duties from 7 March – and redesign the shop to fit it all in.

Prakash Yadav and his wife Jayshri came from India in 1992 and have run Kash Stores in Shelford for 20 years. They took over the lease from Jerry Brown in 1997 and built up the business until they were able to buy the freehold in 2007. Now in 2017 Prakash is making another big step when he becomes Village Postmaster too.

They have made many changes in their 20 years, first improving the shelving and storage and bringing the shop up to date, then buying up the shops next door (who remembers *HairForce One* and *Tack 'n' Togs?*) to expand the space and range of goods. There isn't much you can't get from Kash Stores!

For a while the family lived over the shop before letting the flat and moving to their present home on Cambridge Road. Jayshri still has family in India but apart from his sons who still live in Shelford, Prakash's nearest relatives are in

Leeds, and though he does go back to India occasionally he is in no doubt that Shelford is his home.

I asked him why he took on the responsibility of the Post Office branch. 'At first I thought it would be too much work for me but I was persuaded by so many local people who said how much a local Post Office was needed. I see it as a public service in the same way as I offer free deliveries to people who can't get out by themselves. Yes, it's a big commitment – after all it's like running a small bank, including currency exchange, but it's a big help to the community. And of course people who come to the Post Office will also buy from the shop.'

Local people are delighted to retain a village Post Office and work has already begun to adapt the shop to its new role. The official opening date is 7 March but Prakash hopes the new arrangements, new counter and changed shelving will be ready well before then. You can find Kash Stores on Hinton Way, just beyond the railway crossing within short walking distance of the village centre.

The shop will have its usual opening times of 7am to 7.30pm, while the Post Office counter will be open from 7.30am to 7pm. It will employ an extra 1.5 people and offer the usual facilities such as parcel collection and currency exchange though not passports, at least for now.

Having kept the shop for 20 years, open more than twelve hours a day, closed only for Christmas Day, Prakash and Jayshri understand hard work and they know more local people than most: 'Shelford people have supported us, so we hope to give something back. And if it benefits the business too, then we all win!'

Kash Stores will be offering almost identical services to those provided by the existing Post Office, but with greatly extended opening hours. We wish Prakash Yadav and his wife Jayshri luck and hope everyone will support them in their new venture.



## READER'S BOOK REVIEW THE ISLANDERS BY PASCAL GARNIER



It's a wonderful feeling when you discover a new author and the first book you read of their body of work is excellent. It's a sublime feeling when you read their second book and it is just as good, or even better.

I've been lucky enough to have this experience with the French novelist, Pascal Garnier. In this review column we've already had one of his superb books: *Moon in a Dead Eye* (2009). For February, we will have his funny, dark and addictive novella: *The Islanders* (2010), which romps along at a frantic pace.

Just before Christmas, Olivier returns by train to

Versailles as his estranged mother has died. Knocking at her neighbour's flat he finds Jeanne, his lost childhood sweetheart, and her sightless brother Rodolphe. Over the course of several days, events darken.

The plot has twists and turns galore. *The Islanders* is just as weird as Garnier's *Moon in a Dead Eye*, but far funnier. The character of Rodolphe is reminiscent of John Kennedy Toole's gluttonous protagonist Ignatius J. Reilly in *A Confederacy of Dunces* (1980). And in a story without likeable characters, Rodolphe wins out with his witty one-liners. Also, this has a whiff of Albert Camus's novella *The Outsider* (1942).

Successes in Garnier's novella are plentiful: tight prose, zinging dialogue and shocking moments. A nod must go to Emily Boyce's lively translation making it feel as if nothing got lost.

You'll find a copy of *The Islanders* sitting on the orderly stacked shelves of the Great Shelford Library. I read this in a couple of hours; it is unputdownable! A marvellous story penned by a skilled author.

## BOTANIC GARDEN CARING FOR ORCHIDS



It's that time of the year again, the heady days of summer seem so far gone and spring is still a couple of months away. The garden is short on flowers, but for a few winter staples. This is when houseplants step into the fold to provide

some much needed winter colour. Amongst these is the moth orchid (Phalaenopsis) which has saturated the market with its exotic blooms and affordable price. It does, however, remain an enigma to many when it comes to watering regime and re-flowering. This is one of the most common questions I get asked, so here is a quick guide to orchid care.

Phalaenopsis is a mainly tropical genus, so these orchids are best grown at temperatures above 18°C. In their natural habitat they grow on trunks and limbs of rainforest trees in medium to low light, and so when kept as houseplants they are best kept on an east-facing windowsill which receives the gentle rays of the morning sun. They should be potted in a coarse bark and watered with a wet-dry cycle allowing the roots to dry, but not desiccate, before re-watering. The key to keeping orchids healthy is to avoid overwatering them. Between Halloween and Valentine's Day watering should be reduced considerably, with moisture being added a couple of times during this period. And finally re-flowering: you can initiate this by a drop in temperature of 2–3°C for a couple of weeks. Do this during the winter period when you reduce the watering, or move the orchid to a cooler location in your house. It should then be a matter of weeks before you see a new flower stalk emerge. Watering should remain as described above, but also be governed by light and temperature.

If this has whetted your appetite for a bit of winter colour, then why not visit the Botanic Garden, where our Orchid Festival will run from 12 February to 12 March in the warmth of our Glasshouse Range? This year's theme is India and will showcase an array of South Asian orchids, many drawn from the Garden's reserve collections, to provide a colourful taste of the subcontinent – enough to brighten up any dreary winter day.



#### GOODBYE TO THE ELMS

For in the true nature of things, if we rightly consider, every green tree is far more glorious than if it were made of gold and silver. Martin Luther

As passers-by on the Hinton Way / Mingle Lane junction may have noticed, we have said farewell to two ancient residents: a pair of Huntingdon elm trees, probably over 100 years old.

The wonderful silhouette of the branches against the sky, especially in winter, was a delight; the equivalent to having our own giant sculpture on our property.

Spring brought the fresh, green leaves and hundreds of seeds drifting down like pale green snow. The cool giant sunshade was enjoyed by passers-by who stopped underneath to chat on a hot summer's day. The giant umbrella gave protection from the rain.

A good October treated us to the elms' wonderful autumnal colours. For the past 37 years sweeping and disposing of those golden leaves for several weeks was a seasonal chore, but cheaper than a gym subscription, and we all know that working hard in the fresh air is beneficial to our well-being.

However, the elms had both become very seedy-looking, producing very few leaves in the past two years. Experts assessed the health of the trees, and we all agreed to give them more time to see if they would produce leaves again. But this year there were no leaves at all. Disease and age have taken their toll. Because of the proximity of the trees to the road and to neighbours' properties we had to consider the possibility of huge dead branches breaking off and causing untold damage.

The high cost of having them taken down was a shock, but we had no choice. Believe me, if those trees could have been left just as they were we would have done that. However, the thought of winds and weather attacking dead wood (weighing several tons) and causing it to crash across Hinton Way meant we had no choice but to remove our beloved trees. Unfortunately, insurance companies only pay up after damage is done. Being responsible for any worst-case scenario by doing nothing would have been difficult to live with.



The extent of the damage to the very thickest branches became very obvious as they were removed, revealing enormous hollow tubes, like giant organ pipes with more hole than wood. The sap had stopped rising long ago. Although the remaining stumps look quite solid, those giant branches were certainly a liability.


Some words of praise for Eastern Tree

Surgery. They did an amazing job. Both saws and wood are very, very heavy and to be high up in weakened branches requires strong nerves, physical strength, great skill and experience.

We regret to say that, although most passers-by were understanding, some were quite aggressive and rude to our team. Apparently, it is not uncommon for people to be indignant and a bit abusive to the tree surgeons when they see trees being removed, for it can be an emotive occasion. However, please ask, then listen to the reasons why it is happening, and consider how you would feel if you, or a loved one, was hit by falling branches of a neglected problem tree. Trees do all have a natural life span and someone has to be responsible for their maintenance and safety.

The gap created by the loss of our elms will eventually be filled by a new young tree for future generations to enjoy.
