GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Summary from the draft minutes of the 15 February 2017 meeting

Cllr Stephen Chittenden has resigned from the Parish Council with immediate effect. The vacancy will be publicised as soon as cleared by SCDC Electoral Services.

In an adjournment for public participation, Jim Rickard, Ashen Green resident, reviewed the current position of the Neighbourhood Plan group. The Parish Council offered support. The terms of reference of the group will be brought to both Parish Councils for ratification.

Matters arising from meeting of 18 January 2017

- Modifying the Recreation Ground shelter. Removal of the integral screens may weaken the shelter and cause a serious safety hazard for seating, so the Clerk recommended not going ahead. However a structural review will be carried out to see if changes can be made.
- There is a proposal to fit a defibrillator outside Tesco. This will need an outdoor pack costing £1,400 and will not be insured. More research will be undertaken into costs and fitment details.
- A Precept of £185,000 has been agreed with SCDC. This will give a band D equivalent of £93.81 in 2017/18, (a decrease of 40p or 0.40% below the charge in 2016/17).

Reports from Elected Representatives

District Councillor Ben Shelton

- Refuse collection dates for Great Shelford change from Monday to Tuesday on Monday 27 February 2017.
- SCDC proposed a Council Tax increase of £5 on a band D property. This is equivalent to a 3.8% increase.
- The SCDC Central Government Grant has been reduced by £700,000 and various local initiatives were expected to fund £300,000 of the reduction.

County Councillor Tony Orgee

- CCC Budget approved at 0% Council Tax plus 2% for Social Care precept. This is an increase of £24 on a band D property.
- Cllr Tony Orgee announced he would not be standing for office again. The Parish Council thanked him for his long-standing support of Great Shelford village issues.

Standing Committee Reports

- **Recreation Ground** The Copse Project is underway with white lines marking the proposed planting areas and pathways.
- Cemetery and Allotments The Parish Council expressed their thanks to Mr Taylor who as a volunteer has helped for many years with the upkeep of Freestones Corner green area.
- **Playscape Liaison** Further funding for a planning application will be reviewed at the next Pavilion and Recreation meeting.
- Social Media Updating of the new website has been delayed.
- **Community Association** The use of the Pavilion over half term proved very successful. The heating system is again causing problems.
- Annual Parish Meeting A letter will be delivered to all residents in mid March.

Christmas Lighting 2016 Contributions received totalled £300, representing a £2,500 shortfall in contributions to break even. Plans for Christmas 2017 will be reviewed well in advance, and the Clerk will take overall responsibility for all events. The lights will be switched on by a non-political representative.

Finance 14 cheques valued at £6,350.27p were presented for payment. A schedule of CCC charges for street lighting was circulated. The Clerk will determine how to bill private locations directly.

The Grange Field Grange Field representative, Land Partners, confirmed a meeting on 22 March.

PLANNING DECISIONS

Approvals Extensions at 22 Granhams Road, 5 Cambridge Road, 235 Hinton Way, 41 Tunwells Lane, 38 Buristead Road and Paddock End, Buristead Road. A porch at 5 Spinney Drive. Outbuildings at 41 Tunwells Lane, 3 Halatte Gardens and 34 Woollards Lane.

The demolition of a bungalow and its replacement by a pair of semi-detached houses at 48 Cambridge Road. Alterations and extensions to existing buildings at Scotsdales

Refusals A first floor extension at 5 Elms Avenue and the change of use of outbuildings at Chandos Farm, Cherry Hinton Road.

An application to install steps and an additional car parking space at the Glebe, Rectory Farm was withdrawn.

The appeal against refusal of planning permission for extensions at 32 Buristead Road was dismissed.



HEIDI ALLEN NEWSLETTER

I had the pleasure of meeting the new chief executive of the City Deal, Rachel Stopard. You won't be surprised to hear I shared my concerns with her about the Cambourne to Cambridge busway proposal known as 3/3a, which would cut

across green belt north of Coton. We must of course find an effective public transport link, but spending upwards of £140m on a guided busway that cuts through swathes of green belt and doesn't even connect with the city centre is sheer madness to me. Local groups are proposing alternative, cheaper options and I will fight hard to ensure they are considered fully before a final decision is made. Public money is tight and we must spend it wisely.

I've also coordinated a number of meetings with stakeholders including Highways England, Abellio Greater Anglia, Govia, Laing, Network Rail, District Council Leader Peter Topping and County Councillors to name but a few! I want us to bid for some of the Government's Autumn statement money for a number of local improvements. It may be that we can combine funds with those available in the existing City Deal and our devolution deal due to go live in May. I'm interested principally in upgrading the A505 from the M11 to the All including the bridge at Whittlesford (I haven't forgotten about a cycle path linking Duxford and Whittlesford!) and the well overdue Foxton level crossing. I've also held meetings to understand progress on plans for the A428 upgrade and Oxford-Cambridge rail link. Last but by no means least, I have pulled together a programme board to really move things forward with a new train station at Addenbrooke's Hospital. I'd also like to blow the trumpets of our local constabulary! They have recently launched an initiative to tackle parking issues across South Cambridgeshire. They have developed an online form for complete to report any parking issues vour in http://tinvurl.com/SouthCambs-Parking

I cannot believe it is almost a year since we tragically lost Jo Cox, my colleague at Westminster. On June 17/18 this year, her legacy charity will be promoting 'The Great Get Together' a weekend long event which aims to bring us together to celebrate friendship and community. Some of the UK's biggest organisations will be taking part, including the Women's Institute, Oxfam and the Royal British Legion. Details at https://greatgettogether.org/ or on Jo's charity website. If you are interested in setting something up, please let me know so I can spread the word, join you, or help in any way. I'd love it if we could have a number of events taking place all over the constituency.

SHELFORD SCHOOL

School is about enjoyment and should be rewarding. As an experienced inspector that is a view I hold to, as do many others. It is worthwhile reminding you that our children are encouraged through a range of rewards, which are headed up 'Secrets of Success'. There are not only half-termly Head Teacher Awards, but also Maths Investigator, Star Writer, Golden Mile and even Dinner Winner. I will leave it to your imagination for the latter. But parents/carers always (hopefully) want to know how well their children are doing and the Spring Term round of pupil/parent/teacher consultations has taken place. Really importantly parents/carers were reminded in the newsletter not to forget to bring their child to these meetings. Why? The process provides the opportunity for the teacher and pupil to discuss what has been achieved in the past months as part of self-assessment and for parents to watch and listen.

Pupils can rate themselves 'green', 'yellow' or 'red' as to how well they think they are achieving and how much effort they are putting in. There is no hiding here, and there are also Additional Support Plans provided for our children who are identified with special educational needs, as well as an attendance and punctuality report for all! Everyone involved is putting in a great deal of effort. The overall comments about this new approach are very positive and it offers that shared opportunity to support our learners in their journey of developing their potential across a wide range of skills.

By the time you read this, the PTA Challenge 2017 will be close to its action day of Go Ape, on Sunday 23 April at Thetford Forest (High Lodge). Deadlines for the May magazine will mean that you will have to wait until June for a report, but there is still time to be a sponsor. Ask for an old-fashioned sponsorship form or use the BT MyDonate page. The mantra is good – it's going to be 'tree-mendous' and the more people we get swinging through the trees, the more iPads we can buy.

School funding remains a topical issue and for our school, along with many others, parent support is crucial. Our budget is tough. Schools benefit from the Pupil Premium income, which is additional to main school funding. This is seen by government as the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers, by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. We do not have large numbers of children eligible for FSM but it does help if parents who need such support do apply. Thus many thanks are extended to all who support the school in so many different ways.

Our Christian year is now in the season of Lent and we hope that this period of prayer and preparation will lead to a very happy Easter for everyone.

Great Shelford CHURCH AROUND THE Free Church COMMUNION TABLE

Many people have taken communion, either out of duty, social embarrassment, pressure from their parents, or out of a deeply held religious belief. Maybe eating the bread and drinking the wine, or poor quality grape juice, isn't a big deal to you, a throw back to childhood or a leftover English quaint tradition.

But the 'messy meal' we replicate with our little cups and wafers, speaks about something deeply symbolic and community defining.

As we politely drink our wine and break an acceptable amount of bread off, Jesus reclines at a table, covered in food and mess, surrounded by friends, probably having enjoyed a little wine, and sleepy from a full meal. He sits and eats, and that meal speaks of the church God loves. We might not always be good at being that church, we might not always agree, but the messy communion table teaches more about church than 2,000 years of tradition will ever do.

As a family we've had a great amount of fun around our dinner table. It's where good friends have been made, where people have laughed, where people have cried, where prayers have been said, and where little children have been fed. Having a family with small children means our meal times are often chaotic and messy. I'm often the one who's a little bit too bothered about order and more inclined to shout and get cross with silly behaviour. But the mess of meal times is the mess of communion with God

We come to the table with all our mess, the sweat of a hard day's work, the troubles of mental illness, the pains of old age, the disappointment of love lost, the hurts of life. We come and recline with Jesus, we hear his words, not in the quietness of a church service, or the reverence of ordered worship, but in the mess and chaos of a family meal, the gathered table, all different, all facing different realities of living our lives.

We choose to do it all together; to sit, eat, share fellowship with each other, at the same table as Jesus Christ. The Lord of the universe, the Creator of all things, sits with us, speaks to us and cares for us.

Come and sit with us, come and hear his truths, a balm for the world's ills, a balm for our ills.



SSYI & PLAYSCAPE WORK ON THE WILDER SIDE

In February a group of willing SSYI and Playscape volunteers joined Sophie O'Hara Smith down by the basketball court. With quantities of string, tape measures, stakes, line spray (and a touch of mental maths!) we marked out the new meadows and pathways. Seamus then kindly went over the area properly with the line-marking machine. This will mean the contractors will know which areas to leave to grow and we will know where to plant the 1,500 wild flower plant plugs!

Speaking of which, we had a great turn out on Saturday 18 March. Armed with trowels we planted drifts of basil, clustered bellflower, corn cockle, field scabious, greater knapweed, meadow clary, musk mallow, meadow cranesbill, oxeye daisy, oxslip, red clover, tansy, white campion, tufted vetch and yarrow. Now it's just a waiting game! Special thanks to everyone who helped – it was such a great turn-out we were finished by lunchtime, just in time for the rain to



water them all in! Please avoid walking on these areas while the plants establish.

Willow wonder

We've also planted the new living willow dome down by the river. The weaving turned out to be the easy bit, it was getting each upright 30cm deep into the ground so that it will root which was the tough part. It sounded like a blacksmith's whilst we were hammering

metal stakes into the ground! Two of the SSYI crew also did a fantastic job transferring all the bark (kindly donated by Madingley Mulch) down the rec with just a trolley and muscles.

All in all we hope you agree it was worth the effort as with good care a living willow dome can last for decades. The swan was definitely impressed – it got out of the river for a proper look when we'd finished!

Other news

By the time you read this we will have had another community consultation on the latest plans for the play area! Apologies this was not in last month's Village News – arrangements didn't coincide with publishing deadlines however hopefully you will have caught this via posters and social media. We will of course keep you posted about all of this on the website, where you can also find a fascinating blog post about the history of the Recreation Ground – did you know soldiers were billeted there and there used to be a diving board?

KIDS INSPIRING KIDS IN 'STEM'

A group of five pupils in Year 11 at Sawston Village College have been taking part in an Erasmus+ Science project called 'Kids Inspiring Kids in STEM' (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics), or KIKS. Sawston Village College is one of just four schools taking part in the UK.

As part of the project, the five pupils have been writing and executing their own lessons and workshops for younger pupils. Lucy Main and Arera Davies both took their Astronomy GCSEs last year, and have been using this knowledge to teach lessons to the new Astronomy cohort, and to their Physics classes. Antonia Ren and Calum Rayner taught a lesson about the Rosetta mission to the junior STEM club, followed by a DIY Philae lander workshop, where pupils assembled their own circuits and decorated their landers. Izaak van Dongen taught an introduction to chaos theory to a suitably impressed junior STEM – pupils learnt about chaos in rivers and populations, experimented with iteration and the logistic map, and made orderly fractals from dice throws.

The group met their international peers on Friday, 17 March, where they gave talks on their process (and were photographed for the Cambridge News). They also ran stalls at Schoolzone, a Science Festival event, running activities for the public.



GARDEN CLUB – GARDENS OF MADEIRA

Roy Nunn has visited Madeira more than once, staying in the fishing village of Câmara de Lobos on the south coast near the capital, Funchal and in the town of Machico on the east coast. The mild climate is wettest in the northwest and the central mountainous area, where a network of irrigation channels, known as *levadas* bring water down to the agricultural areas in the south. Fruit including bananas and vegetables are grown on terraces.

The gardens of Madeira are not confined to grand houses and fine hotels – each patio and stairway is crammed with pots, and plants fill residents' gardens. Plants observed while walking down the street included white-flowered franghipani, acalypha known as the 'Match-me-if-you-can tree' because of its brightly coloured leaves, giant agave, sword aloe, orange and purple-flowered 'birds of paradise,' angel's trumpet with hanging flowers, red rock orchid and an 8-foot-tall blue-flowered ginger.

The municipal garden and market place in Funchal have some impressive trees, such as the mauve-flowered jacaranda, red tulip tree, and kapok tree producing giant seed pods filled with fluffy white fibres, which in the past were used for filling life jackets, cushions and pillows. Cable cars from the old town of Funchal provide transport to Monte, a hill town above the city. Cool lush greenery dominates Monte's public garden with fuchsia longiflora and begonia minor both growing 6 feet high. Plants of interest include the mauve spider flower, so called because its stamens resemble spider legs. The garden at Monte Palace has shady, dramatic moss-covered rocks with tree ferns and cascading water. The woodlands are coloured by drifts of pink azaleas, beneath which orange-flowered clivias cover the ground. This leads to an oriental garden with walkways from one level to another with strident, red decorative railing. Patterned paving, poinsettia trees, large terracotta pots, and tiled panels with pictures depicting the history of the island are features of the garden. The return downhill to Funchal can be rapid if taken by basket sled, a traditional means of transport, controlled by two men with ropes.

Blandy's Garden at Quinta do Palheiro Ferreiro has a history stretching over 200 years. Notable plants include the red-flowered flame tree and clematis *grandiflora*. Endemic to Madeira is the imposing pinkish, magenta-flowered geranium *maderense*, growing to a height of 4 or 5 feet. Echium *candicans* with towering blue spires of flowers is known as the 'Pride of Madeira.'

A surprising feature in the garden is a collection of topiary hens seated in topiary nests around a shallow stone pool.

The visits to Madeira were made during October/November and April/May. A favourable climate means flowering plants can be seen throughout the year.

PRIMULA PARADE

Few plants raise a gardener's spirit more than the sight of early spring flowering primroses (*Primula vulgaris*). Thriving in the dappled shade of woodlands throughout most of Europe, they mark the end of cold, bleak winter months and herald the beginning of the explosion of growth in the woodland. Primroses are one of around 600 primulas found largely throughout the northern hemisphere. They come in a bewildering array of sizes and flower forms, and fill widely differing ecological niches. In the Alpine House at the Cambridge University Botanic Garden, starting in February through March is the amazing *Primula allionii*. In Southeast France and Italy these flowers cling to life in crevices in limestone cliffs until the spring when these surprisingly small plants pack a huge floral punch, covering themselves in an array of pink to white flowers. Next to flower in the Alpine House is *Primula auricula* with elaborate flowers straight out of a catalogue of beautiful buttons. Later in the spring and summer by the streamside and Bog Garden, and also this year in our Alpine House Himalayan display, we will have a range of some of the Asiatic moisture-loving primulas. These start with the purple drumsticks of *Primula* denticulata followed by a host of others until their floral peak in the summer with the tiered magenta *Primula japonica* and nodding yellow bells of *Primula* sikkimensis.

Primulas all have in common a crafty way of ensuring they are cross-pollinated. They have two flower forms – either 'pin' or 'thrum'. 'Pin' plants have their stigma (receptive tip of the female part of the flower) sticking out of the petal tube and their stamens (male pollen-bearing parts) held deep inside. With 'thrum' plants it is the other way round. This helps to make sure that pollen transferred by an insect onto the receptive stigma must come from a primula flower of the opposite form. Only the pollen from a 'pin' flower will reach down far enough into the petal tube for a 'thrum' flower and only the pollen from the raised up 'thrum' stamens will reach the similarly raised 'pin' stigma.

What floral delights we and the bees have to look forward to these next few months!

The Cambridge University Botanic Garden is open from 10am–6pm, April–September 7 days a week. The Glasshouses and Café close 30 minutes before the Garden and the Botanic Garden Shop at Brookside closes 15 minutes before the Garden. The Stonehill Road site is a friendly one, and you will enjoy any time you spend there.



RECTORY FARM – A JOURNEY THROUGH EIGHT CENTURIES OF SHELFORD HISTORY



Almost everyone knows of Rectory Farm – it's the place to take a walk, the place next to the school, the farm that backs onto the Rugby Club or the allotments in Stonehill Road, or maybe even the place you live, if you moved into the converted barns. It's a place which has played a huge part in Shelford history. Rectory Farmhouse sits in the oldest part of the village and is one of its oldest houses, and

has for over 600 years been at the heart of commerce and change in the village – a fact which seems hard to believe today, when the last village farmer has retired, and getting a return out of the land seems to require forming it into ever bigger units: Rectory Farm is now run as part of the Trumpington Estate. This talk will go back to the beginning and look at the farm's evolution and its role in shaping the village. It will range from church ownership, to ownership by Jesus College, from the time of rich tenants to the families that farmed it in recent times, and will account for its emergence from Enclosure as the biggest farm in Great Shelford.


