Summary from the draft minutes of the 17 May 2017 meeting

Public session

The matter of neighbours having bonfires was raised. The advice was to report to South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) Environmental Services if the bonfires are causing a nuisance.

Election of the officers for the year 2017/18

Cllr Mike Nettleton and Cllr Bridget Hodge were unanimously re-elected as chair and vice-chair respectively. Officers to sub-committees can be seen on the inside front cover of the *Village News*.

Reports from elected representatives

District Cllrs Charlie Nightingale and Ben Shelton

- The cutting of the overgrown hedge at the Granhams Road junction was a subject of legal ownership and could not be done until this was resolved.
- A compulsory purchase of the Tree pub in Stapleford was being considered by SCDC as a community asset.
- SCDC has an annual Community Chest Fund of £150,000. Organisations with Community Links can bid for individual grants of up to £1500. At the time of the meeting there was still money available.

County Cllrs Roger Hickford and Kevin Cuffley

- Following the recent elections, new committees are to be formed soon.
- The verges on the cycleway to Sawston are overgrown and dangerous for users. Some of the verges had been cut that day, but they are cut only twice a year. Sawston Parish Council is working with Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) to resolve the cycleway problems and if there is a safety issue it will be reported immediately. There is a meeting planned with the Highways Officer to review all outstanding issues.

Standing committee reports

Highways There are changes to the Local Highway Initiative (LHI) and Traffic Regulation Order issued but some errors are still to be resolved. It was agreed to purchase a second Speed Indicator Device (SID). A fenced area has been provided at the rear of the Village Hall for 8 to 10 contractors' vans for the Railway Tavern development. This will be charged at £80 per day.

CCC will repair potholes requested by the Parish Council at a cost of £70 per hole, but only after emergency repairs are completed. This was rejected, with all potholes to be identified on the County Council website for investigation. Dangerous pavements and roads in the Village had been previously identified by a parish councillor survey but nothing had been repaired. The Clerk is to locate the previous survey results. A Post Office direction sign, for installation alongside the station direction sign at the Station Road/London Road junction, will be ordered.

- Playscape Liaison The Feast 2017, and proposals for the 2018 Feast, and new
 cricket equipment and football storage facilities are to be reviewed prior to the
 completion of the Playscape Master Plan.
- **Social Media** Website updating is in progress. 2500 residents were contacted to see if they wanted to go on an email circulation list for the Parish Council. There were only 200 replies.

Review of Annual Parish Meeting

Attendance at the meeting was good but it ran out of time due to the length of some of reports. The meeting was meant to reassemble after the break for a Question and Answer session, but this did not happen and the meeting was dissolved. For the 2018 meeting, it was proposed that the report time is shortened and there is no break before the Q&A session.

Finance

Eighteen cheques valued at £6,189.70 were presented for payment. Mr Hugh Holland was appointed Internal Auditor for the year 2017/18.

Correspondence

A request to erect a gravestone for Mr Jan-Willem van den Braak, Plot 154, was agreed, subject to suitable wording. Shelford Support Group asked about the public defibrillator. Cllr Milson said it is progressing and will advise soon. A complaint was received on the lack of maintenance at the Clay Pit, which Cllr Hodge is updating and resolving.

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GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of the Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting 19 April 2017

Present

Cllr Mike Nettleton (Chair) and other Parish Councillors, County Cllr Tony Orgee, District Cllr Ben Shelton, representatives of local sports clubs, associations, schemes, schools and in excess of 100 members of the public.

Annual Report from Chair

Main points from the past year as follows:

- Riverbank development has been carried out, cricket safety netting obtained and a maintenance contract taken out for the recreation ground.
- A Speed Indicator Device (SID) has been utilised, but the zebra crossing
 has been delayed due to the County Council, and a new Local Highways
 Initiative (LHI) grant has been received for flashing school crossing
 warning signs.
- A new Parish Council website was created.
- Three new councillors joined the Parish Council and one left, leaving a vacancy.
- Deputies have been appointed for all committee chairs. An assistant clerk is being recruited.
- Despite difficult circumstances, the Post Office was retained in the village.

Kev issues for 2017/18

- Traffic and parking issues.
- Provision of improved recreation facilities from Playscape and Grange Field.
- Pressures on village facilities school and surgery full, etc.
- The condition and state of roads throughout the village was a concern to many residents.

Reports from elected representatives

County Cllr Tony Orgee reported on:

- Logistics behind County Council Budget for 2017/18.
- LHI grant scheme and benefits to Great Shelford.
- City Deal and the Local Liaison Forum (LLF) developments
- Cambridge Sporting Village development at Trumpington.
- Local Government Boundary Commission review.

Tony Orgee announced that he was standing down at the next election as County Councillor. The Parish Council expressed their thanks for the extensive support and friendship given to the village over many years by Tony.

District Cllr Ben Shelton reported on the Local Plan, Boundary Commission, Planning Performance and Business Rates.

Reports from standing committees

- Planning Cllr Hodge reported that approximately 100 planning applications and 40 tree works had been reviewed in 2016/17. She reminded the meeting that the final decision on all planning applications rests with the District Council. Felled trees are requested to be replaced. The Local Plan is still in the process of public examination and as the District Council does not have the five-year housing supply required by central government it is possible that in the future we may be subjected to speculative development applications within the green belt.
- Cemetery & Allotments Cllr Harwood reported that general maintenance
 of cemetery and allotments is undertaken by a combination of a contractor,
 the Village Man and the Garden Gang. The Garden Gang has been working
 on the High Street flowerbeds, which were in a poor state of maintenance.
- Recreation Ground & Pavilion Cllr Davies reported that the restoration
 of the river bank on the recreation ground was completed in August 2016.
 Playscape work on the copse, the willow den and wildflower planting is all
 being completed.

As grass cutting on the rec is now done by a contractor, the tractor has been sold which has left space for storage for the Feast and the old Feast container in the car park can be removed.

As an experiment, the pavilion was opened during the February half-term break for groups to run as a café. It worked fairly well and we may repeat this during other school holidays.

The main focus during the coming year will be on the Playscape Project and continuing the search for additional recreation space for the village.

- Highways Cllr Ashurst reported that a portable battery-operated Speed Indicator Device (SID) was purchased and has been in operation since December 2016. The PC made a successful bid to fund a zebra crossing in Woollards Lane. This work should begin by early June, along with changes to yellow lines and permitted parking, a 20mph speed limit in Woollards Lane, High and Church Streets, and flashing signs near the school. Car parking, improvement to the Granhams Road and High Street junctions, and road markings are all being reviewed with a view to improvement.
- Representative bodies Full reports were made available about the Neighbourhood Plan, Joint Plan for Stapleford and Great Shelford, and Spotlight Groups formed for Travel & Transport, Village Amenities,

Greenspace and Housing that aim to produce an integrated plan based on a long-term view of village needs.

Local Organisations Reports were received from Playscape, Shelford School, Sawston Village College, Shelford Twinning Association, Great Shelford Community Association, Mobile Warden Scheme, Shelford and Stapleford Youth Initiative, Great Shelford Village News, Great Shelford Cricket Club, Shelford & Stapleford Strikers Football Club, Great Shelford Bowls Club, Great Shelford Tennis Club, Great Shelford Parochial Charities and the Shelford Feast.

Parish Council Financial Statements. These were reported and accepted.

The meeting closed at 9pm.

SOUTH CAMBRIDGESHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL LOCAL PLAN HEARING AND OMISSION SITES IN GREAT SHELFORD

Parish Councillors from Great Shelford and Stapleford were at Cambourne on 6 June to listen to the arguments of developers and owners presented to the Inspector, Laura Graham, that the draft local plan was unsound without an amendment to the development framework to include their sites and that there were exceptional circumstances that meant their sites should be removed from the green belt.

Prior to the preparation of the Draft Local Plan, land owners and developers were asked to put forward sites for inclusion in the development framework of Great Shelford. A total of 17 sites were put forward in Great Shelford and Stapleford (of which seven are wholly in Great Shelford) for assessment by the Local Planning Authority (LPA). The sites were assessed on factors such as sustainability, deliverability and landscape impact, by a process known as the Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA). Of the sites put forward, all were rejected by the LPA as failing to meet the necessary criteria for inclusion, with only one demonstrating limited potential because of its lower impact on the green belt.

Presentations were made by Savills and Bidwells, on behalf of their clients, for land near the Rugby Club, Cambridge Road, near Marfleet Close, at Granhams Farm and at Hinton Way. The arguments were largely based on housing need, the sustainability of Great Shelford as a rural centre, the fact that other sites on the edges of villages have been taken out of the green belt, and the ease of development of the sites.

The LPA reiterated the points made in the SHLAA assessment regarding the contribution of the sites to the purposes of the green belt and to the rural landscape.

Scotsdales requested that their whole site should be removed from the green belt as the designation made development more complicated. The LPA stated the site relates well to the open landscape to the east, contributes to the green belt purpose and is not part of the nature urban area. There were not exceptional circumstances to remove the site from the green belt. Scotsdales stressed they have no plans to use the site other than as a garden centre.

The proposed Sports Village in Trumpington will be considered on 5 July and the Cambridge South Science Park, with up to 1250 houses proposed by Jesus College, on 12 July. Documentation for these sites can be found at https://www.scambs.gov.uk/local-plan-examination-statements-matter-M11.

The inspector will visit all the sites and report later in the year.

In terms of the Neighbourhood Plan (NP) the inspector asked the LPA if there was sufficient flexibility in the plan to allow a NP to endorse development considered to be appropriate by a local community. The LPA responded that a NP could extend development outside the framework. This suggests amendments will be in the hands of local communities.

Recommend refusal. The very close proximity of the proposed access to 5 Red Hill Close and the associated traffic movements will be detrimental to the residential amenities of the residents of that property. As the proposed dwelling is to the south of 6 Red Hill Close it will cut out light and overshadow the southern part of that property. If the planning authority is minded to approve the application, permitted development rights should be removed and a traffic management plan should be required to ensure construction traffic does not cause problems in this small cul-de-sac.

No objections to the property on Plot 1. No objections in principle to a dwelling on Plot 2, as permission has already been granted for a bungalow. Permitted development rights should be removed on Plot 1 to avoid any adverse impact on 228A and 230B Cambridge Road. As Cabbage Moor is very narrow, a traffic management plan should be part of the application to avoid congestion and damage caused by contractors' vehicles.

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

The Revd Tim Fyffe – 60 th Anniversary Celebration

We celebrated a very significant anniversary at St Mary's on Sunday 11 June. The Revd Tim Fyffe, who moved to Shelford about 18 months ago, celebrated the 60th anniversary of his ordination. Tim was the celebrant at the service of Parish Communion that morning and the Rt Revd Mike Bourke,

former Area Bishop of Wolverhampton, gave the address. There were a large number of visitors from Tim's previous parishes and a reception followed in the Community Room.

Tim has had a long and interesting life and ministry. After serving in the army from 1943 to 1946 Tim studied at New College Oxford and then worked as an Assistant District Officer in Nigeria until 1952. He returned to Oxford to study Theology and was ordained. After serving a curacy in Lewisham he returned to



Tim at St Margaret's with members of Wolverhampton Inter-Faith Group

Nigeria to serve as chaplain from 1960–68 at All Saints, Enugu. This was at the difficult time of Nigerian independence and the Biafran War. Tim returned to England and in 1970 became Team Vicar of St Margaret's, Lowestoft. He moved to Wolverhampton in 1980 and served there as Team Vicar of Aldersley and as a hospice chaplain. He

became very active in Wolverhampton Inter-Faith Group which was a pioneering group at the time. Representatives from Wolverhampton Inter-faith Group attended the service here and gave a moving tribute to Tim.

We are delighted that Tim has settled here with us and is making a valuable contribution to the life of the church and community. He has become a familiar figure whizzing around in his electric buggy.

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
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SHELFORD SCHOOL

Recent acts of terrorism in our country, ongoing war and fighting in other countries, political uncertainty and tragic accidents, all leave us asking, how do I find peace in these turbulent waters?

This is what Jesus offered to those reeling from the turbulence of this world:

'Are you tired? Worn out? Burned out on religion? Come to me. Get away with me and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest. Walk with me and work with me – watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace. I won't lay anything heavy or ill-fitting on you. Keep company with me and you'll learn to live freely and lightly.'

Soon the doves will be taken down and given out at the Shelford Feast Community Service. We will encourage people to hang them near their front doors as a symbol that God wants to be present and walk with us through this world.

I pray that you might find the peace of God in this world, that somehow God's quiet voice might speak to you over the shouting in this world. You are more than welcome to join us at the Free Church as we walk together in God's love and rhythm of grace.

Please send us requests for additional supplies of medication at least six weeks in advance of travel. 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PLAYSCAPE AMAZED BY LOCAL GENEROSITY

Playscape has received an unexpected donation of £20,000! The grant, from a donor-advised fund, is to further our charitable purposes and cover professional fees and fundraising expenses. This is such a boost for the team and the project! Supporting the strategic planning financially affirms the holistic and inclusive approach we've taken on this project. We can't thank the donors enough for their financial support and practical encouragement.

Much discussion has been going on behind the scenes to finalise a few points of the design and we are happy we've found a satisfying conclusion for everyone. Erect Architecture has been given the go-ahead to prepare the planning application and the Parish Council have scheduled a tree survey, a necessary requirement of the application.

The copse

It has been a real pleasure to hear how much people are enjoying the new meadow, willow dome and den-building area in the copse: every time I visit new dens have appeared and logs have been rearranged. The grass is now high, which is fun, although it'll be a few years before the wildflowers are fully established.

An old willow tree had to be felled on Woollards Lane and was kindly donated to the copse project. We had intended to do some more installations in the copse with the logs, however people's desire to cross the ditch has meant they are now installed there! Crossing points were always part of the design so we will be installing some stepping stones and have applied for a grant to help fund a bridge across the ditch for an accessible crossing too.

Also, a dozen young native shrubs (dogwood, elder and holly) have been planted and we've sourced a pile of reclaimed timber that we will site around the meadow and copse as benches and balancing logs.

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

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
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BOOK REVIEW 50 LITERATURE IDEAS YOU REALLY NEED TO KNOW BY JOHN SUTHERLAND

In this column, we've read a lot of great fiction. July's review is the first non-fiction book we've had, and it's by the academic John Sutherland. In his excellent book, he's taken a complex theme and made it simple to read. Its title is: 50 Literature Ideas You Really Need to Know (2010).



Whether you're a bookworm consuming Virginia Woolf's superb body of work or just starting to read your first airport page-turning novel, Sutherland's book will help you enjoy reading on a deeper level. He offers 50 different thoughts about what makes literature or what is involved in literature, and writes them in a coherent fashion that can be consumed. remembered and appreciated when next reading. He talks about wellknown ideas such as 'genre', and travels into less trodden areas of 'defamiliarisation', 'deconstruction' and 'postmodernism' to name only a few

What makes this non-fiction book so easy to consume is its structure. Each idea consists of only four short pages, each page arranged in the same way; a brief overview of the idea, an insight into the history of the idea, a deeper dive into what the idea is, and finally a condensed idea.

A nice companion book to Sutherland's would be John Mullan's *How Novels Work* (2006), another simple read talking about literature in a way that is a pleasure to consume.

50 Literature Ideas You Really Need to Know is a pleasant book that talks about important components of literature that are often difficult to understand, and makes them digestible to anyone with a passion for reading. This would be a great first book for someone taking a literature or writing course, and would benefit any reader.

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GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICES

Practice update

During April the Barley Practice (Barley and Market Hill Surgery in Royston) merged with the Granta Medical Practices (Linton and Sawston) to form one practice. The obvious question is why.

The NHS as a whole and general practice in particular, is facing major challenges. The average rate for all users of consulting a GP has more than doubled per head of the population in the last decade. More and more patients who would previously have been in hospital with complex problems are now being treated in the community by the practice team. This is only made possible through moving from the traditional 'Dr Finlay' model of general practice into a team-based service, with a mix of skills, training and backgrounds.

This team can only work effectively at a certain scale – and NHS England has made it clear that future investment in general practice will be directed to those practices who have between 30,000 and 50,000 registered patients.

The merger of Linton, Barley, Royston and Sawston into one practice has created a single practice of some 34,000 patients. More importantly, the mergers have come about because of a shared aspiration and belief within our teams that by merging we can better meet our local healthcare needs.

By coming together, patients of the Granta Medical Practices now have access to services across four sites, including extended opening hours every day of the working week. The practice also has Emergency Care Practitioners (Paramedics) supporting the doctors and nurses in providing rapid home assessments for those unable to attend the surgeries. With a bigger team comes the opportunity to share expertise and specialist skills across a bigger population.

Granta Medical Practices has just been recognised nationally as a 'Primary Care Home' – an entity seen as one sustainable model for the future of the NHS. Over time, as a Primary Care Home, the practice will gradually provide more and more services, including some currently delivered in hospital outpatients or day case surgery. The model encourages all those working around our patients to come together in a single structure, where patient needs come first and traditional NHS boundaries between organisations become more fluid. We are hopeful that this status will give us enhanced access to new funds and support as it becomes available.

As a practice we are positive that these changes will strengthen our ability to provide high-quality personal and human care to our local villages. Already,

the practice is getting other GPs asking to come and work within Granta – and this is happening at a time when there is a national and regional recruitment crisis for GPs. This is a major vote of confidence from the profession for Granta and will help ensure that all of us continue to have access to high quality general practice for years to come.

We are enormously grateful to all our patients for their support during the transition and look forward to developing the service in partnership in the months and years ahead.

Hay fever

Hay fever is caused by an allergy to grass or hay pollens. Grass pollen is the most common and tends to affect people from about May to July. However the term hay fever is often used when allergies are caused by other pollens such as tree pollens, which tend to be from March to May, and weeds (such as nettles and dock) from early spring to early autumn.

Symptoms are due to your immune system reacting to the pollen. Hay fever is also called seasonal allergic rhinitis because symptoms tend to occur at the same time or in the same season each year.

Hay fever is very common and affects about two in ten people in the UK and tends to run in families. You are also more likely to develop hay fever if you already have asthma or eczema. Asthma, eczema and hay fever are collectively known as atopic conditions, or atopy. A tendency to atopy also runs in families.

Common symptoms are runny or blocked nose, itchy nose and/or throat, sneezing, itchy and watery red eyes. Less common symptoms include loss of smell, face pain, sweats and headache. Asthma symptoms, such as wheezing or breathlessness, may get worse if you already have asthma. Some people have asthma symptoms only during the hay fever season.

Your doctor can usually diagnose hay fever from your typical symptoms. Commonly used treatments are antihistamine nasal sprays, antihistamine tablets, steroid nasal sprays and eye drops. If your hay fever symptoms are not controlled on the medication you are taking after two to four weeks, you should discuss this with your doctor as you may need to try a different treatment.

If you develop asthma symptoms during the hay fever season you may be prescribed an inhaler. If you already have asthma, you may require a change in the dose of your usual inhalers.


SAWSTON VILLAGE COLLEGE PUPILS AT CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY

On Friday 28 April, I had the privilege of accompanying fourteen Year 7 and 8 Sawston Village College pupils on a Cambridge Colleges' Physics Experience Day. This event was put together by the Department of Physics at the Cavendish Laboratory, along with St Catharine's College, with the aim of informing pupils about university life and boosting confidence in Physics.

The day began at St Catharine's College with a talk given by Jessy Ahluwalia, the Schools' Liaison Officer. She gave pupils an insight into student life at the College, and as well as hearing about the lectures and tutorials, we were interested to learn about the fantastic social events arranged by the students. For example, a recent Formal Dinner had a Harry Potter theme, with the actual Sorting Hat from the films and owls flying around the dining hall.

Jessy explained that prospective Cambridge students are expected to be able to express their ideas and put forward a persuasive argument. With this in mind, she led a lively debate, in which pupils were encouraged to give their opinions on questions such as 'Should the voting age be changed?' and 'Should parents be punished for their children's mistakes?'

This was followed by a tour of the College given by a current undergraduate student. We were intrigued to see the way modern architecture has been

blended with the old College buildings, retaining the grandeur befitting a College founded in 1473, while providing up-to-date facilities for its current students. Highlights of the tour included the College Chapel, completed and consecrated in 1704, and the Sherlock Library, one of three libraries at the College.

Our visit to St Catharine's concluded with a delicious lunch in the College Dining Hall, and this gave us the energy for a brisk walk across town to the Cavendish Laboratory. Dr Steve Martin, Assistant Educational Outreach Officer, welcomed us with an overview of the research carried out at the laboratory, past and present. Living near Cambridge, it is all too easy to take for granted the amazing research carried out at the University. We were amazed to learn that in total 29 researchers at the Cavendish have been awarded a Nobel Prize. This is a fantastic achievement considering the total for the UK as a whole is 124, and that only five countries in the world have more than 29 Nobel Laureates.

One of the aims for the afternoon was to emphasise to pupils the importance of collaboration between scientists, so with this in mind, pupils from each of the three schools attending the event were divided into four groups. Each group were given the task to design a spacecraft to land on Mars and a vehicle that could explore the planet's surface. I was extremely proud of our pupils working well with young people from other schools and using their scientific knowledge to come up with effective designs. Our visit to the University for this CCPE event was inspiring and thoroughly enjoyable, and who knows, could it be that as a result, one of our pupils turns out to be a future Nobel Laureate?



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
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CRICKET CLUB


