GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Summary of the draft minutes of the Finance & General Purposes Committee meeting held on 16 August

A quote for the integration of the heating system in the Memorial Hall and demolition of the current plant room was reviewed. Additional quotations will be sought and a quote at a similar cost would be acceptable to the Parish Council. It was noted that:

- Any resulting proposals were unbudgeted in 2017/18 but as the work will be carried out in the summer of 2018, it can be included in the budget for 2018/19.
- The Community Association will be requested to contribute to costs.
- Quotations received will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting.

Asset Register

The Asset Register was reviewed, with a few additional items added to the schedule, principally the valuation of the Sports Pavilion.

The Clerk stated that the revised Asset Value would not be used for the end of year audit, and so the final proposal and variation can be delayed to the December 2017 F&GP meeting.

S106 funds

The status of current S106 funds and balances was reviewed. The Clerk produced income and drawdown information on all S106 funds since August 2014, which will be reviewed again at the December F&GP meeting.

Public Works Loan Board (PWLB)

The status and value of the PWLB repayments on the Pavilion were reviewed. It was proposed that the loan be cleared prior to its full term and the next half yearly payment in November 2017. The Clerk will obtain a payment settlement balance and make payment prior to November 2017, but only if no early repayment penalties would be incurred.

Finance

20 accounts, valued at £14,535, were approved for payment.

Review of 2017/18 Financial Plan

The Clerk presented the year to date Income & Expenditure report, which was discussed for predicted progress by the end of the financial year.

Review of bank account balances

The Clerk recorded that the general business account will exceed the FSCS limits significantly on receipt of the half year precept in September/October 2017, unless considerable expenditure is made over next few months. It was agreed to transfer £10,000 to the CBS and Nationwide accounts. An additional bank account is to be investigated for further discussion.

Emergency defibrillator installed in Woollards Lane

An Automated External Defibrillator (AED) has been installed in a secure cabinet next to Tesco Express in Woollards Lane. This device is for delivering life-saving electric shocks to those suffering from sudden cardiac arrest (SCA), a heart attack that renders the victim unconscious.

unconscious.

While most ambulances are fitted with AEDs, using the device on an SCA victim while waiting for the ambulance



to arrive will significantly improve their chances of survival. The AED has clear instructions and safeguards that prevent improper use. As such, no medical training is required to use an AED.

In order to open the secure cabinet, please call 999 or 112 and request the access code and an ambulance dispatch. Great Shelford Parish Council would like to thank the Shelford Support Group for their generous contribution towards the AED.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN GREAT SHELFORD PARKING SURVEY

On 12 September, four members of the Neighbourhood Plan's Travel and Transport Spotlight Group carried out a full 12-hour survey of the two car parks in Woollards Lane, Great Shelford, reviewing each of about 100 parking spaces every half an hour throughout the day, and noting whether the same car was parked there still, or a different one (or whether it was empty).

The aim was to gather some real and useful data in order to inform the debate about the extent of long-term versus short-term parking in these two car parks. Previous surveys by Great Shelford Parish Council (GSPC) had only recorded numbers of empty spaces at given times of day. Analysis of this latest survey will be shared with GSPC in the first instance, and then be published on the Neighbourhood Plan website <code>www.staplefordandgreatshelford-np.uk/</code>.

OLD £1 COINS WITHDRAWN ON 15 OCTOBER



The new 12-sided £1 coins were introduced earlier this year. The old £1 coins are only legal tender until 15 October, so check your purse, piggy banks, cars, coat pockets, back of the sofa, or anywhere else you stash your cash so that you can use them before then.

After that date you should be able to take them to your bank, but this will only be for a limited time and you should check with your bank that they will accept them.

Note: you may want to check the regular places you use £1 coins (gym lockers, supermarkets etc) to see if they will accept the new coins. If not, you may want to hold on to a few!





SIR PETER HALL ONE TIME SHELFORD RESIDENT

Sir Peter Hall, who founded the Royal Shakespeare Company and was director of the National Theatre, died on 11 September, aged 86.

In his autobiography, 'Making an Exhibition of Myself' he describes living in Great Shelford during the Second World War. His father was stationmaster at Shelford and the family lived 'over the shop' above



what is now the Zara Restaurant. 'Our home, brown and dark and airless, was attached to the station booking hall and office on one of the two platforms.' He kept and milked a goat.

'The garden at Shelford butted straight on to the back of the platform and ran practically the length of it. It was full of flowers. My father grew his vegetables across the road in a plot just opposite the signal box. It was a time of shortages, so we cultivated and reared everything we could. In addition to the goat, we had a flock of Rhode Island Red chickens led by one proud cock. They ran wild in the tiny goods shed. As one of the main commodities brought to the station was grain for the local mill, they waxed very fat and laid many eggs.'

Later he attended The Perse School on a scholarship. He supplemented his pocket money by hand pumping the organ in the church at Stapleford, later as organist playing for weekly children's services.

He writes also of dispiriting visits to The Railway Tavern: 'Now I was grown up, my father asked me each weekend to join him for a half of bitter or a half of cider at the Railway Tavern by the level crossing. I went out of duty, but I hated it. The English pub in those days provided drink cheerlessly. There were few women and of course no children.'

I hope and pray that I'm able to see my time on this planet for what it is, beautifully finite; that I cannot hold onto time, but make the most of everyday for what joy it can bring. Maybe I've got some of it, maybe you do, the more I think about it the more I return to the only person who was able to walk through this world in the deep clarity of their identity and that person was Jesus Christ.

THE OLDEST PHONE BOX MOVES ON



Our Dad, Jerry Brown (pictured left), bought an old public telephone box for just £50 back in 1987 from the County Bowls Club, drawing a lot of attention from the local media. At the time I was just 2, my brother Nick was 4 and we both remember how proud Dad was, insisting on showing every visitor that came to the house his antique phone box —which eventually became a wonderfully grand home for his garden tools!

Sadly, Dad (a well-known Shelfordian responsible for resurrecting the Shelford Feast in 1994) died in 2010 at the young age of 57, leaving his treasured phone box to Nick and me.

His good friend and neighbour, Duncan, had been looking after the phone box – wooden, double glazed, with leaded windows and sound insulated – for a few years while Dad was in between moving house (it's not the sort of thing you can easily up and move!) and so we decided to leave it in Duncan's care.

Earlier this year we were approached by Andrew Hurley from The National Kiosk Collection at the Avoncroft Museum, who has had his eye on the box for a long time – in fact, he approached Dad with an offer 25 years ago which at the time Dad rejected! We agreed it was time for the experts to take over and the museum purchased what they informed us is in fact a 'Norwich Kiosk'.

Letting go of this wonderful piece of history is bitter sweet – whilst it still holds much sentimental value for us, it is now moving to somewhere where it will be lovingly restored by a man and museum who have coveted the box for many years. This very special phone box will have its place in history on show for all to see at the museum. We are delighted and can't wait to visit.

Historical note: This 'Norwich Kiosk' is thought to be the oldest surviving public telephone box in the country. Dating from about 1905 it originally stood in Gonville Place in central Cambridge before being bought by the County Bowls Club in 1934. It has stood in gardens at 43 and 45 Hinton Way, Great Shelford from 1987 until now, when it will be on display as part of the National Telephone Kiosk Collection at the Avoncroft Museum, Bromsgrove.



GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICE

The events at Grenfell Tower in June were horrifying and devastating and will have far reaching consequences for the residents, families, neighbours and Fire Brigade for a long time.

A few hours earlier on the same evening, my son was involved in a house fire. He was upstairs at his girlfriend's house when there was an electrical fire which started in the garage. Within minutes the house was destroyed. He and his girlfriend escaped and thankfully, except for smoke inhalation, no-one was injured. One of the most frightening things about the fire is the rate at which it took hold – he said it took them seconds to get down the stairs but in that time, he couldn't see his hand in front of his face because of the thick dense smoke. So, when you get home...

- Have a conversation with all the family (especially children) about escape routes from the house.
- Check all smoke alarms in the house are working.
- Make sure all the family know what the smoke alarm sounds like, and what action to take if they hear the alarm.
- Check that the escape routes doors, stairs and floors are clear.
- Check keys for doors and windows are accessible in the event of an emergency, know where they are.

The Fire Brigade has lots of useful information online about how to keep safe, what to do in an emergency, where to place smoke alarms and steps to reduce the risk of fire happening in the home.

CAMBRIDGE PAST, PRESENT & FUTURE A GLIMPSE INTO IRON AGE LIFE

You may have recently seen footage of the remains of Wandlebury's Iron Age Hill Fort on BBC's Look East programme. Wandlebury Iron Age site, owned by charity Cambridge Past, Present and Future, is one of 13 such sites in Cambridgeshire. To the modern eye, the Ring ditch at the beautiful country park is a pretty, circular walk, about 1km in length. Hill forts, although in some cases defensive structures, are likely to have been used for festivals, gatherings and trade, similar to the purpose of village halls today.

James Littlewood, CEO of CambridgePPF said 'In future we hope to improve on what we know about the Hill Fort at Wandlebury, and in time we hope to build an iron age structure to give people a real idea of how it would have looked, and what life in the iron age may have been like.'

On Saturday 7 October there is a fantastic opportunity to learn first-hand about Wandlebury's history and archaeology at CambridgePPF's Wonderful Wandlebury fun day to be held at the Park from 12 noon until 4.30pm. The Editor

I am writing in response to the article in the *Village News* (August issue). My husband and I are very inconvenienced by the change to the route. We are not drivers and used the bus frequently for shopping at Waitrose and also to connect to the Park and Ride in Trumpington. As far as we are concerned, the supposed shortened journey time to Cambridge centre is heavily outweighed by our inability to get to Waitrose and Trumpington Park and Ride.

When speaking to Stagecoach they said that the changed route had been brought about as a result of Sawston passengers wanting a shorter journey time into Cambridge. It seems strange that sections of major roads – Shelford Road, Trumpington High Street and Long Road – are no longer served by this route. We have been told by Stagecoach that Waitrose is accessible by changing buses at Addenbrookes and taking a second bus to Maris Lane – heavily loaded with shopping. Both my husband and I are in our late seventies. The walk from the bus stop in Addenbrookes Road is far too distant and clearly out of the question, particularly in the winter.

I note in her letter (September issue) Miranda Fyfe talks about the loss of the No 31 Whippet operated bus service. This is not so. The 31 service continues to run Monday to Saturday through Little Shelford, Great Shelford and Stapleford to Addenbrookes Hospital, where there are very frequent connecting bus services between Addenbrookes and the City Centre. The first run in the morning at 7.45am from High Street, Great Shelford, the last two return at around 4.10pm and 6.25pm, from Drummer Street. They still run the complete route. Although this is not much (if any) quicker, than the re-routed Citi 7, it does serve those parts of Shelford (Church Street, Mingle Lane and Hinton Way), which are some walking distance from the Citi 7 route.

Whilst writing I would also mention that the 7a service through Mingle Lane and Hinton Way connecting with Babraham Road Park and Ride buses continues to run with a new operator, A2B Bus & Coach.

HOW PLANTS TELL THE TIME

As I write in September, the trees are covered in lush green leaves. By October, as you read this it is likely the leaves of the deciduous trees will have changed from green to red, orange or yellow before turning brown and falling. I can make this certain prediction about what will happen in October because the seasonal changes in the life cycles of plants, from seed germination to flowering and the fall of leaves, occur at defined times in the year. This temporal sequencing of life happens because plants can measure time. Plants use an internal clock to count the hours of light, such as the shorter days of Autumn, to establish the season and to control biological changes such as leaf fall or flowering in the Spring. Biologists call this a circadian clock, from the Latin 'circa diem' meaning around a day.

While the circadian clock ticks deep within the cells of the plant, we can observe the results of its ticking using the naked eye, or time lapse cameras. A good example of how a plant is regulated by circadian clocks can be seen in the daily movements of the petals of plants such as daisies. This old English name of the 'day's eye' refers to the opening of the petals during the light of the day. This is to expose the reproductive organs of the flowers for pollination by dayactive insects. At night the petals close to protect the reproductive material from the cold of night. Remarkably the circadian clock can keep ticking even without the changes in light and temperature that occur across the day and night. This can be seen when we put daisy plants in constant light in a laboratory and watch the petals continue to open and close for many days, showing the ticking of the 24 hour circadian clock.

The circadian clock acts as the timing device, allowing plants to measure changes in day length, and regulate the time of year when they flower, and therefore set seed. If we consider that the three most eaten foodstuffs on the planet are products of the seeds of wheat, rice and maize (sweetcorn), we can conclude the correct functioning of the circadian clock is important for agriculture. My laboratory is working with the National Institute of Agricultural Botany in Cambridge and Bayer CropScience to find ways to use our knowledge of the circadian clock to develop improved crop varieties.

The Circadian display beds in the Cambridge University Botanic Garden demonstrate how plants tell the time and are in flower from spring through to late autumn.




