Summary from the draft minutes of the meeting on 9 April 2018 PUBLIC SESSION

The Chair welcomed and introduced three of the new Parish Councillors due to join the Parish Council after Election Day; Graham Townsend, Judith Wilson and Ian Kydd.

REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES

District Councillor

Energy grants are available as previously reported.

County Councillor

Councillor Kevin Cuffley's report was circulated.

- Shortlisting for those applying to be White Ribbon Campaign Ambassadors had been completed.
- Councillor Cuffley had attended a meeting with the Highways team to discuss general road conditions which are now considered to be poor. He reported that two new road repair machines had been introduced and also that South Cambridgeshire was 'top rated' in spend per capita on roads Parish Councillors requested details of this comparative expenditure.
- Money might be available from a Mobile Warden Innovation Fund.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Highways

- The zebra crossing is in operation but flooding modification work is to be undertaken as soon as possible.
- Work on both yellow and white lines is due to start after 16 April.

Planning

- The Chair and Clerk had met staff from the District Council to review procedures and standard conditions regarding planning applications.
- Councillor Nightingale queried the accuracy of the minutes of the meeting of 4 April regarding planning application S/1041/18/FL. A process review for Planning Committee meetings will take place when new committee is formed in May. Meanwhile updated minutes for 4 April apply.

Playscape

The Erect Architecture planning application has been submitted.

Feast Liaison

Liability insurance is being discussed by the Clerk and the Feast committee.

FINANCE

11 payments (for the period up until the end of March) were presented for approval to a value of $\pounds7857.68$.

10 payments (for the period up until 9 April) were presented for approval to a value of $\pounds 16,099.52$.

OTHER

Internet and CCTV coverage of Memorial Hall, Feast and Pavilion

The Parish Council reviewed and approved the proposal to install equipment with an expenditure of $\pounds 3.5k$ to $\pounds 4k$.

Summer Reading Challenge funding 2018

An application from Cambridgeshire Libraries to make a grant of ± 300 to support the reading scheme in Great Shelford Library was approved.

Response to the A1307 Greater Cambridge Partnership proposals

All three Strategies were reviewed with views and advice from County Councillor Kevin Cuffley. The Chair will complete the survey.

Policy on Green Belt and affordable housing

A draft policy is to be formulated by Councillors Mike Nettleton and Peter Fane for review at the May Parish Council meeting. Final agreement will be reached after a presentation at the June Parish Council meeting.

Correspondence

- SCDC confirmed that Parish Council nominations were uncontested with 15 Councillors elected to serve from May 2018 to April 2022.
- Rayment's Car Park lease: notification of a cost increase and of back payments had been received.

Changes to staff salaries

All staff were reviewed and changes were agreed in line with the nationally agreed pay scales for the sector in the financial year 2018–2019.

The latter is followed by a picnic at the Wale Recreation Ground in Little Shelford. Parents are welcome to join their children for this event which is always a lovely end to the half term.

This has been my first year as a School Governor and I am enjoying getting to know the school, staff and pupils better. As a parent, it has been a real insight to become aware of all the hard work that goes on behind the scenes! I am looking forward to working with fellow Governors to support the school through the upcoming changes and help create the optimal learning environment for our children.

On 10 April I was honoured to join the Prime Minister when she visited Addenbrooke's Hospital. Theresa May spoke to staff, learnt about our pioneering cancer research and treatment work, and also launched a £75 million nationwide fund to improve research into innovative ways of combatting prostate cancer. I am so proud of the hard-working, dedicated commitment of our NHS staff and the Prime Minister's visit showed how important Addenbrooke's is, not only to us locally, but also at a national level. The Prime Minister was briefed on the hospital's wish to build a cancer hospital on the campus. This would both develop our world-leading reputation for cancer diagnosis and treatment, and also free up valuable space for more general hospital work. The Prime Minister grasped the potential of the proposals and I am pleased to report that she suggested I discuss the proposals in more detail with her special advisor. I'll keep you posted!

April also saw the Health Minister Lord O'Shaughnessy visit Royal Papworth Hospital. I invited him so he could hear from the world-leading experts there and see the innovative work that they undertake. Papworth are seeking sustainable funding for their DCD (donation after circulatory death) transplant programme – that's essentially the use of hearts which would not traditionally make the grade. Lord O'Shaughnessy left impressed and promised to follow up to see what might be possible.

And now for something completely different and less welcome! In the last few weeks, we have seen a large number of travellers take up residence on land on the A505 at Thriplow. Although increased powers are now available to local authorities to deal with unauthorised caravan sites, the Government is reviewing the powers available and looking at what more needs to be done. Unauthorised encampments continue to be an issue locally and I hope that you can spare a few minutes to take part in the consultation, see *https://tinyurl.com/y78d9fxf* for details.

Supporting local communities is an important part of my role in South Cambridgeshire and in the last month, I have been pleased to support a number of local events and campaigns, including prize giving at the Cambourne 10k Run and meeting with residents in Stapleford who are campaigning to see The Tree public house turned into a community asset. This month sees a new timetable for Great Northern trains and I know that many of you contributed to the train timetable consultation last year. The result is a new timetable from 20 May onwards which affects all Great Northern routes. Nick and I are privileged to have been recently elected as your District Councillors in South Cambridgeshire. We recognise that the hard work starts now to represent all the people of Great Shelford, Little Shelford and Stapleford, however you may have voted, and to justify the confidence you have placed in us.

We recognise too the hard work of our predecessors, particularly Charlie Nightingale, who was a Councillor here for a total of 17 years (including two as Chairman of the Council) and Ben Shelton, who was a Councillor for eight years. We will aim to build on much of what they have done, but also to work in new ways to represent people here.

A high priority for us will be reporting back from the District Council on developments which could affect these villages, and hearing from you about your concerns and priorities. I had an interesting session with young people at the SSYI Youth Club last week, hearing what they want for the future of their villages – what they'd like to change and improve. That's very much the focus of the Neighbourhood Plan too, so that we can decide for ourselves how we want our villages to look in say twenty years' time as well as what needs doing about it now.

Sometimes we spend too much time responding to the plans of others. We are keen to focus on how people who live and work here want the villages to look in the future, what facilities you want us to have, how we make sure there is genuinely affordable housing for people with links to the villages, and how we support the shops and businesses which are so vital to community life.



- Avoid large grassy areas, woodland, cutting the grass and car fumes.

- Use petroleum jelly inside your nose to block inhalation of pollen.
- Don't dry washing outside to avoid pollen sticking to your clothes.
- When you get in from outside wash your hands, face and hair, rinse your eyes and change your clothes.





PLAYSCAPE IMPORTANT FOR EVERYONE?

We spent a glorious day on the beach last month and I was reminded just how engaging the natural world is for children. We know in our hearts we feel better from being outside and research shows that it is crucial for physical and mental well-being too.

George Monbiot nicely sums up why we need to champion communal outdoor spaces: 'A community not built around children is no community at all. A place that functions socially is one in which they are drawn to play outdoors... Without safe and engaging places in which they can come together, no tribe forms. So parents must play the games that children would otherwise play among themselves, and everyone is bored to tears.' I can testify to that: six hours by the sea, no 'I'm bored!' or 'He's being mean!' only tears that we had to go home!

The former mayor of Bogotá, Enrique Peñalosa put it another way: '*Children* are a kind of indicator species. If we can build a successful city for children, we will have a successful city for everyone.' It occurred to me that even though we don't have a village square, the Rec could be a natural replacement for this traditional meeting point. 'Going to the Playscape' of an evening could become a whole community pastime, just like going to the Plazas on the continent.

To make this vision a reality, we're busy organising the Fun Run and writing two grant applications, whilst waiting to hear from the planners. We warmly welcome donations as every pledge helps: you can donate on our website and of course we'd love you to sign up for the Fun Run 2018 at *www.shelfordfunrun.co.uk* (Sunday 16 September). We're counting on raising significant funds again this year and we can only do it with your support.


