## Summary from the draft minutes of the meeting on 16 May 2018 ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Cllr Mike Nettleton was unanimously re-elected as Chair for 2018–2019, and Cllr Malcolm Watson was unanimously elected as Deputy Chair.

## PUBLIC SESSION

- A member of the public asked about parking issues on the pavement outside Cambridge Miniworks adjacent to the bus stop and shelter. It was agreed to discuss this item at the next Parish Council meeting with views from the Highways Committee.
- An explanation was requested for the referral of a planning application to SCDC by the previous District Councillor. New District Councillor Peter Fane agreed to review this referral.

## **REVIEW OF COMMITTEES**

A proposed chart of all Committees and Co-Ordinators was presented and discussed. [Full details of the agreed chart were published in the June issue of the *Village News*, and a summary of Parish Councillor responsibilities is given on the inside front cover of the *Village News*.]

## **REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES**

## **District Councillors**

- Newly elected District Councillors Peter Fane and Nick Sample introduced themselves.
- Cllr Ashurst requested support for the decriminalisation of village parking from both District Councillors.
- Cllr Fane would provide regular Parish Council reports in advance of Parish Council meetings.
- Energy grants are available for community groups as previously reported.

## **County Councillor**

County Councillor Kevin Cuffley reported that:

- £32m efficiency savings have been made.
- Highways are receiving an extra £2.5m funding for pothole repairs.

Cllr Ashurst requested clarification of bus route 7A stops and timetable and assurance that Great Shelford would receive the same response as Sawston with all village potholes being repaired overnight. County Councillor Kevin Cuffley would support and pressure both topics.

## STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

## Highways

- School signage will continue to operate outside term times. Cllr Nettleton said this was unsatisfactory and would bring the signage into disrepute.
- Yellow and white street lining was to start on 24 May.
- A meeting with County Councillors was requested to discuss performance of CCC Highways.

## **Recreation Ground**

- Vandalism and open fires were responded to by Dardan Security and the Police Community Support Officer.
- A seating quotation of £380 for the green shelter was agreed.
- Sand pit safety repairs were necessary.

## **Cemetery and Allotments**

- Unallocated allotments are to be resolved.
- The water tap at the cemetery allotment has been damaged by users again.

## Neighbourhood Plan

• An open meeting on green spaces and access to the countryside would be held on 23 May jointly with the Wildlife Trusts, Magog Trust and CPPF.

## Playscape

- Shelford Fun Run will be held on 16 September.
- Grant applications are progressing.
- Tender fee proposals and decking at the riverbank are to be reviewed.
- Interpretation boards are to be created.

## Police

- There will be a meeting with PC Hilson, the new Sergeant, on 5 June to discuss policing issues within the village.
- New parking enforcement in Woollards Lane.

## **Community Association**

- Electrical testing and repairs have been completed.
- The wi-fi system is now operational. Notices will be displayed and the range extender will be tested for use in The Feast.

## **Parochial Charities and Schools**

• The Chair requested a meeting with Cllrs Talbott, Fane and Milson along with Bridget Hodge to discuss Mores Meadow extension project.

## Pavilion

- Floor covering repairs will be extended to the ladies' toilet at extra cost.
- Hartbeeps classes end on 24 May.

- Art for Wellbeing classes start in September.
- Players' corridor fire alarm sensors will be replaced with the correct type.

## OTHER

## Christmas planning

• Cllr Carey volunteered to assist.

## The Feast

- Insurance for 2018 will be reviewed by a Feast Committee member with the Clerk.
- 2017 arrangements for services will apply for 2018.

## Memorial Hall and key projects

- It was agreed to have a stall at The Feast to provide an opportunity for the village to engage with key projects.
- Some villagers are attached to the current Memorial Hall but facilities are inefficient and the kitchen needs updating.
- The Health Centre is of great benefit to the village but some Councillors considered its location should be a commercial decision. Others stated the Parish Council should do all it could to keep a Health Centre in the village.

## GDPR (General Data Protection Regulation) compliance

• General progression towards compliance was discussed with working practices to be adopted.

## FINANCE

- Twelve cheques (and two cheques previously signed) for the period up to 30 April with a value of £7,930.34p were presented for approval.
- Fifteen cheques for the month of May with a value of £9,117.07 were presented for approval.
- Mr Hugh Holland was appointed as Internal Auditor for 2018–2019.

## CORRESPONDENCE

• A mission team of volunteers from the USA will be visiting Great Shelford Free Church in the week of 24 June in order to carry out some community activity around the village. It was agreed that they could use the Pavilion for a pop-up coffee shop.

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## **REPORT ON ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 18 APRIL 2018**

**Present:** Councillors Mike Nettleton (Chair), Malcolm Watson, Barrie Ashurst, Richard Davies and other Parish Councillors, District Councillor Ben Shelton, Parish Clerk Mike Winter, local sports club representatives, representatives of local Associations, Schemes and Schools and well over 100 members of the public.

## CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL REPORT

**Recreation and Pavilion:** Further work on the riverbank area has been completed to stabilise the ramps and protect plants during their initial growth period. Playscape planting and general improvements continue.

**Highways:** The zebra crossing originally requested in 2015 is now in place. A second speed indicator board has been installed.

**Planning:** High volumes of planning applications are being reviewed. A lot of work is done on external proposals, e.g. Greater Cambridge Partnership.

**Cemetery and Allotments**: Much good work is done around the Village, e.g. by the Garden Gang.

**Communications:** There have been further improvements to the Parish Council website. Around 200 residents now receive updates from the PC.

## **KEY ISSUES FOR THE VILLAGE**

- Traffic and parking issues.
- Provision of improved recreation facilities Playscape and Grange Field.
- Pressures on village facilities school and surgery full, etc.
- Blue Sky issues: Green Belt and affordable housing, possible Memorial Hall replacement and underground car park, and toilets on the Recreation Ground.

## **REPORTS FROM ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES**

The SCDC representative reported on

- Savings made by managing refuse and recycling services for Cambridge City as well as South Cambs.
- Health and Wellbeing programme.
- Launch of Renewable Energy Grant scheme to support green initiatives.
- Investment in housing for young people.
- Business to Business networking events.

There was no report from the County Council.

## **REPORTS FROM CHAIRS OF PARISH COUNCIL COMMITTEES**

## Planning: Chair Cllr Mike Nettleton

204 planning applications were received between April 2017 and April 2018, including major ones such as the Co-op. There was also monitoring of on-

going developments such as the 'Railway Tavern' development, and contribution to many external initiatives, such as proposals for a guided bus and/or bus lanes from Haverhill to Addenbrookes.

**Cemetery & Allotments**: Chair Cllr Richard Davis

The Cemetery has been kept in good condition. Both Stonehill and the Cemetery Allotment sites are well utilised but have vacancies for the coming season. Improvements to protect the water supply from accidental damage at the Stonehill site have been undertaken during the year.

Recreation Ground & Pavilion: Councillor Malcolm Watson

In addition to the riverbank project and liaison with Playscape, there has been increased use of the Pavilion for community and private events. Projects involving Feast services and relocation and wi-fi/internet provision (including exterior CCTV) have had to be delayed until the next financial year.

Highways: Chair Councillor Barrie Ashurst

A 20mph speed limit has been introduced in the central areas of the village and speed Indicator Devices are now in use. A zebra crossing has been completed in Woollards Lane and a number of yellow line changes have been made. Further improvements are planned to road markings. Flashing signs have been installed near the school. Car parking is still an issue and the PC is pressing SCDC to 'decriminalise' parking so that traffic wardens can be employed.

## **REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVE BODIES**

Reports were received from seventeen local sports club representatives, representatives of local associations, schemes and schools.

## FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The Parish Council Financial Statement for April 2017–March 2018 was presented.

## QUESTIONS AND STATEMENTS FROM RESIDENTS

**Village Medical Centre merger with Granta**: The Village must actively ensure that the Medical Centre remains within the village. The possibility of alternative sites for the Medical Centre was discussed.

**Green Belt and Low Cost Housing:** The Parish Council will press for any development of 10 or more dwellings to provide affordable housing at less than 80% of market rate.

**Speed Indicator Devices:** these show times and dates of speeding incidents which can be used to provide information for the police.

**Underground Car Park proposal:** the water table may cause problems but solutions are available.

**Proposed Memorial Hall replacement:** The Parish Council would fully consult the Village. Shared spaces for Scout and Guide HQs and storage space would be considered. *JW* 



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## **DISTRICT COUNCIL**

## South Cambs District Council restructuring

One of our group's first actions upon taking control of SCDC has been to establish two new committees and one new working group. The **Climate and Environment Committee** will be looking at all the ways in which the Council can positively influence matters both in its own and its partners' operations to reduce damage to the climate and improve our environment. The new **Grants Committee** is reviewing all the grants currently administered by the Council to make sure that they are providing maximum benefit where it is most needed.

The **Brexit Working Group** will investigate ways in which the Council can help businesses in and around South Cambs to cope with any anticipated or actual consequences of Brexit. One issue is the reliance of the Health Service and care sectors on workers from other EU countries. This covers all professions from our top consultants to physios, emergency responders, nurses and cleaners.

## **Housing Land Supply**

South Cambridgeshire District Council had not been able to demonstrate that it had a rolling five-year land supply for housebuilding. As a result, any policies that sought to restrict residential development were suspended and in particular our village frameworks. We accept we need houses, and quickly, but the development must be planned and delivered properly, making sure provision is made for GPs, schools, roads, and infrastructure.

As of 21 May, SCDC can now demonstrate a five-year housing land supply of 5.0 years for the period 2018–2023 using the stricter calculation required by Government (the Sedgefield method) and applying a 20% buffer. The Local Plan Inspector still has not released her final report, and indeed the Local Inquiry may shortly overtake Sellafield as the longest ever held. We are still not able to give a date for the new Local Plans to come into force.

I have been in discussions with a grant funding body and Gwen has been drafting a grant application for the wheelscape element. Unfortunately the original skate park company who quoted for the project has recently stopped trading. However Zac Britton (SSYI's Youth Worker and our resident skating expert) has helped us find some good alternatives – we'll be meeting with a new company at the end of June to get a new quote.

I wonder what comes to mind when you hear the word 'pilgrimage'?

Traditionally Christians have gone on pilgrimages to holy sites connected with the Bible and the life of Jesus, like Jerusalem or Bethlehem. The word pilgrimage means a journey with a spiritual purpose or destination. The destination is important but then so is the journey. A pilgrimage is not only about sightseeing or getting there as quickly as possible, it is just as much about the time it takes and the experience of getting there. Jesus' ministry could be described as a pilgrimage; he went from place to place, not having anywhere to call home, talking, healing and caring for those people he came upon on the way.

In modern times people might do pilgrimages for other reasons. Every 16 August, Elvis Presley fans from around the world make a pilgrimage to his famous former home, Graceland, to commemorate the anniversary of his death. There might be football fans who do a similar trip to a famous stadium. You might have an important site that you visit, maybe a grave or a significant place.

For it to be a pilgrimage the journey, for example a slow walk taking a few days, is just as much a part of the experience. The things you see along the way, the people you talk to, and the investment of time is all part of it.

You might not be planning on visiting a spiritual or sporting site this summer but the idea of life being a slow journey rather than a race is a refreshing one. If we're not careful we become so focused on the destination – maybe it's our career goals, our house, those holidays or something else – that we forget to appreciate the journey we are on and those people around us.

Whatever your plans for the summer, I hope you can find some time to appreciate the journey not just the destination. Catch yourself in those moments valuing what's going on around you, rather than rushing on to the next new thing, maybe even offering a prayer of thanks in those precious moments.

## SHELFORD MEDICAL PRACTICE THE NATIONAL FLU IMMUNISATION PROGRAMME 2018/19

This year sees significant changes in how we will be vaccinating our patients, the main one being that there are now two different vaccines for adults:

- 1 The adjuvanted trivalent vaccine (aTIV) for all patients over 65 years old.
- 2 The quadrivalent vaccine (QIV) for patients 18 years old and over and for patients under 65 years old who are eligible for NHS vaccinations.

Eligible children will continue to receive the nasal spray live attenuated influenza vaccine (LAIV).

The following patients are eligible for flu vaccination:

- All children aged 2 to 9 years old (but not 10 years or older) on 31 August 2018
- Patients with clinical need, aged 6 months to under 65 years old
- Pregnant women
- Those aged 65 years and over
- Those in long-stay residential care homes
- Carers

In addition, flu vaccines are recommended for frontline health and social care workers.

The other significant change of note is the way in which we will receive our supply of vaccines – there will be three separate deliveries between the months of September and November.

All of the above means that this year booking your flu appointment won't be quite as straightforward for us as in previous years. We will have to separate adults by age, vaccination type, and by when deliveries are due, so please bear with us as we manage this huge task which could involve up to 15,000 patients!

In the next issue we hope to publish our flu clinic dates. Additionally, text messages will be sent, there will be local posters, and the dates will be published on our websites.

## 7A BUS SERVICE TO TRUMPINGTON PARK & RIDE THE GOOD NEWS AND THE BAD NEWS

The revised 7A bus service route and timetable will start on 30 July. Its destination will now be Trumpington Park and Ride (instead of Babraham Park and Ride) and it will no longer go down Mingle Way or Gog Magog Way. It will continue to serve Hinxton and Whittlesford.

However, this bus will not stop in Great Shelford. There will be **no pickups or setdowns** between Granta Terrace, Stapleford and Trumpington Park and Ride. This means that passengers from Hinxton, Duxford (Woburn Place) and Whittlesford will not have access to shops and the Health Centre in Great Shelford, and Great Shelford residents will not be able to make use of the service to get to Waitrose at Trumpington.

This information has been provided by Brian Clifford, Managing Director of A2B Bus and Coach, which is the operator for the revised 7A service. However, the decision about the reduced setdowns and pickups was made by Cambridgeshire County Council, who give financial support to the 7A, after an objection from Stagecoach that it would lose passengers from its Citi 7 route.

Buses to Trumpington will pick up at Stapleford London Road (Granta Terrace) at 8.47. 10.05, 11.35, 13.05, 15.05, 16.35 and 18.25 Monday to Friday, and at 10.05, 11.35, 13.05 and 15.05 on Saturdays.

Buses will leave Trumpington at 9.00, 10.30, 12.00, 14.00, 15.30, 17.20 and 18.45 Monday to Friday, and at 10.30, 12.00, 14.00 and 15.30 on Saturdays. The first stop will be at Granta Terrace, Stapleford.

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## CAMBRIDGESHIRE ACF BATTLEFIELD TOUR

The local Army Cadet Force (ACF) detachment is based in Sawston (see our website below for details). Cadets from Great Shelford have had many successful years with the ACF.

As part of Cambridgeshire Army Cadet Force World War I programme and the Ministry of Defence project 'Operation Reflect', a party of Cambridgeshire Army Cadets will take part in a Battlefield Tour (BFT) from 21 to 24 October 2018.

In March, we held our first training event for this at Waterbeach Cadet Training Centre and the Imperial War Museum at Duxford. Col Tony Slater gave a lecture on the Cambridgeshire Regiment and the events of 1918. Dr Pamela Linden and Catherine Long from the Imperial War Museum WWI Partnership hosted our visit to Duxford, where lectures were given by the members of the Cambridgeshire Regiment 1914–1918 website. They also brought along exhibits from their collection for the cadets to look at and handle. Catherine gave an interesting lecture on the Lives of the First World War website and how to research individual soldiers.

The cadets were then given the names of two Cambridgeshire Regiment soldiers to research using sources such as Medal Index cards, data from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, census information and other websites. Their aim was to find out where the soldiers were born, where they lived, when they joined the Cambridgeshire Regiment, which medals they were awarded, if they were killed in action, whether they survived the War, if they appear on a War Memorial locally and where they are buried.

Some of the cadets were very successful in their research and others found it challenging to find information due to the absence of records for some of the soldiers.

Cadet Charlotte Wallace from Cambridge Detachment has provided an excellent report on 765792 2nd Lt Henry William Huckle. Here is some of the story she discovered.

Second Lieutenant Huckle was born in 1886 to Henry and Emma Huckle in Hitchin, Herts. He moved three times, including to Cardiff where he married Mary Anne Elizabeth Porter in 1914. His daughter was born in 1915 and the family moved to 182 Shelford Road, Trumpington, Cambridge; the house name was Tourmaline. Whilst in Cambridge, Henry was employed as chief clerk at Oxford and Cambridge Examinations Board. In 1917 his second daughter, Betty Mary Huckle, was born and in March 1917 he enlisted with the Cambridgeshire Regiment to fight in WWI.

On 5 and 6 September 1918 the Cambridgeshire Regiment were engaged in the battle for Nurlu. The Company Commander, Lt Orbell, was killed in action and Henry took over the role of Company Commander. Later that same day, he was killed in action after just 16 days on the battlefield.

Lt Orbell and 2nd Lt Huckle are buried next to each other at the Perrone Communal Cemetery extension. Henry William Huckle is commemorated in the UK at both the Trumpington and Hitchin War Memorials and in Trumpington Village Hall. His wife Mary is buried in Trumpington Cemetery, where Henry is also remembered.

To date we have researched some 60 soldiers from the Cambridgeshire Regiment in WWI and will continue to research the battles at Nurlu, Epehy and the St Quentin Canal, and the cemeteries at Epehy and Perronne before our visit to the battlefields in October 2018. There we will honour the soldiers of the Cambridgeshire Regiment who stood on that ground 100 years ago.

This project has been sponsored by the Heritage Lottery Fund, the Army Cadet Force Association and the Reserve Forces and Cadets Association for East Anglia.

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## THE MARY CHALLIS GARDEN AND MUSEUM

Mary Challis was born in Sawston and lived there for nearly her entire life. She never married and had no close relatives, and when she passed away in 2006, very generously left her house and garden in trust 'for the benefit of the inhabitants of the village of Sawston and the neighbourhood'.

The A M Challis Trust was set up in 2007 to manage the house and two-acre garden in keeping with Mary's wishes.

## The Garden

The garden has been faithfully restored by volunteers and was formally opened in May 2009 by Christopher South. It opens to the public every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 10am to 12 noon, and on Sunday afternoons from 2–4pm (1–3pm in winter). Admission is free.

Mary Challis was clearly passionate about her garden and its wildlife. She was well educated and studied horticulture at college. She had a fondness for animals, and kept chickens, ducks and geese, as well as numerous cats and other pets. She was also a keen beekeeper. After her father died in 1942 when Mary was only 17, she dedicated her life to looking after her mother and the garden. In its heyday, Mary ran a small horticultural business from the garden,



selling fresh fruit, vegetables and glasshouse produce, eggs and honey. However, she was not able to manage the garden in later years and it became very overgrown. It was a huge task to restore the garden and outbuildings to their present standard.

The garden extends to two acres, and comprises formal herbaceous beds, lawns, a summer wildflower meadow, an orchard, a pond, raised vegetable beds, glasshouses, a winter/spring walk, an apiary, a bee border and mature trees and shrubs. A succession of spring bulbs – snowdrops, crocuses, aconites, daffodils, tulips and bluebells – make a great display at the start of the flowering season. There are a number of specimen trees including golden rain tree, false acacia, Kentucky yellowwood and gingko. So plenty to see in all seasons. We sell plants, fresh produce, honey, preserves, jam and logs to raise funds for the garden.

The Challis Trust runs several events over the year for the people of Sawston and surrounding villages, including an Easter event, an Anniversary Fete, Open Gardens (for the National Gardens Scheme), the Jo Cox memorial picnic, the Horticultural Show, Apple Day and a Halloween event. These are very popular, usually attracting 200–300 visitors. The garden can be booked by clubs and groups for private visits (please see our website *www.challistrust.org.uk*); it is especially popular with gardening clubs, youth groups, WI and artists.

## The Museum

In keeping with her wishes, Mary's house at 68 High Street, Sawston, has been completely renovated to become a museum for the village and to house the village history archive and artefacts. The Mary Challis Museum and Archive was formally opened on 27 April 2018.

The current collection includes the archive assembled by Sawston Village History Society. Most of the material has been donated by Sawston residents. It includes a set of *Sawston Scenes*, the *Sawston Crier* and a number of local and national newspapers as well as photographs taken of the village in 2000 and other photographs from the less recent past. Cataloguing is still in progress but a list of the various files is available. There is also a small range of books on the history of Sawston and the surrounding area. Books of which the Trust has multiple copies may be borrowed.

The Mary Challis Museum and Archive is open regularly on Tuesdays from 10am to 12 noon. It is hoped, in due course, to open on additional days, provided there are stewards and archivists available to welcome visitors.

## THE SHELFORDS WI



The life and work of William Morris was the theme of our June meeting. We discovered that whilst many of us were familiar with William Morris' work we actually knew very little about the man.

In a beautifully illustrated talk, Fiona Rose revealed William Morris' life. We learned that his love of flora and fauna, which feature in his famous designs, was the result of his childhood spent at Woodford Hall in Essex. He originally intended to become a clergyman but then began an apprenticeship as an architect. He eventually decided this did not suit him and after beginning to paint he turned to the design of tiles, textiles, wallpaper and furniture. He became a committed socialist and founded the Socialist League in 1884. He died at the age of 62 having 'done the work of ten men' according to his doctor.

GSVN is managed by a small team of volunteers. The editors receive articles from contributors and information regarding contacts for local groups via the GSVN email address, paper copy or telephone. Advertisers submit their adverts to the advertisement coordinator via the GSVN email. Subscribers complete a paper subscription form, or give name and address details in a letter, by telephone or via the GSVN email to request delivery. Payments of cash or cheque for subscriptions are managed by the subscription coordinator and treasurer. Distributors deliver the magazines to subscribers. Personal data received by GSVN is processed in accordance with the GDPR which came into force on 25 May 2018. The team acts collectively as the Data Controller and Data Processors. According to the GDPR criteria, we are not required to appoint a Data Protection Officer. The Privacy Notice is reviewed annually.

#### WHAT DATA IS HELD AND WHY

**Contributors:** name, email address, home address (if provided), telephone number (if provided). These details are required to process the contributions received.

**Subscribers:** name, address and method of payment. These are recorded to enable delivery of the magazine and to manage the recording of payments of subscriptions. Subscription forms/paper information is kept for a period of six years for financial audit purposes and then destroyed. Electronic records are kept on a secure, password-protected spreadsheet.

Advertisers: name, email address, phone number and telephone number. These are required to process the advertisement and to issue invoices for payment. Details are held for a period of six years and then destroyed.

**Any other contacts:** email addresses or personal information of people who contact GSVN are only kept whilst the reason for contact is still valid.

#### DATA SHARING

Data is only shared between members of the GSVN team for legitimate use to produce and deliver the magazine.

#### INDIVIDUALS' RIGHTS

Individuals can ask what data is held by the GSVN team and can ask for it to be removed, although this might mean that any contract between us has to cease (e.g. magazines cannot be delivered as we can no longer hold the address. We want you to be confident that we are treating your personal data responsibly and that we are doing everything we can to make sure that the only people who can access it have a genuine need to do so. If you feel that we have mishandled your data in some way you have a right to complain; please address this to the ICO via their website: *www.ico.org.uk*.
