#### Summary from the draft minutes of the meeting on 18 July 2018 PUBLIC SESSION

Concern was raised by a member of the public representing the Scouts and Guides over the plans for redevelopment of the Memorial Hall. It was pointed out that over 120 people attend meetings of the Scout and Guide sections on a weekly basis and that it was ideal for the dedicated space and storage required. Funding to develop the current site had previously been raised directly by the Scout and Guide group.

The Chair replied that the current discussions were blue-sky thinking only, and had no current timescales or detailed plans. It was also recorded at this provisional discussion stage that the Scout and Guide group preferred a dedicated space similar to their current one should any further plans be developed, and that they would be fully involved in any development planning discussions.

#### **REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES**

#### **District Councillors**

Cllr Sample reported that South Cambs District Council would be meeting with police, County Council and other representatives, including the Chair of Great Shelford Parish Council, to further review possible decriminalisation of parking for many areas. He confirmed that the Cambridge City parking enforcement process is to be extended to Trumpington.

Cllr Ashurst asked if the previous information and reports would be utilised to avoid repeating work done at previous meetings. Cllr Sample said that due to the political change some repeat of previous work was unavoidable.

The Chair notified District Councillors that the Planning Application response process was broken and that the Parish Council and public had no confidence in the integrity of the process. The Chair made specific reference to the process on 14 Woollards Lane being ignored and has requested a review of the application process.

#### **REPORTS FROM STANDING COMMITTEES**

#### Highways

- School signage is now in operation.
- Local Highways Improvement (LHI) 2016 project is nearing completion.
- Refreshing of existing white lining will be delayed until Cambridge Road surface repairs have taken place.

- Bus route 7A will stop at Granta Terrace and Tunwells Lane from 31 July.
- LHI bids have been submitted for two central refuges (for safer pedestrian crossing) in Cambridge Road, one near Scotsdales and one near Davey Crescent. The County Council will now undertake a cost and feasibility exercise.

#### **Recreation Ground**

• The skateboard ramp has been damaged for the fourth time in about eight months, with a cost approaching £800 per repair. It is now fully boarded up to prevent use, as previous nets and signs were just pulled down, leaving liability with the Parish Council. Cllrs instructed the Clerk not to repair it until additional CCTV had been installed.

#### **Cemetery and Allotments**

- Stonehill Allotment users have complained that many allotments are unattended and overgrown. All plots have been reviewed by the Clerk and all allotment holders with neglected plots have been contacted. Four of these surrendered their allotments, three agreed to bring them back to an acceptable condition, and four made no response.
- Eight plots are now available for allocation.

#### **REPORTS FROM COORDINATING OFFICERS**

#### Playscape

The meadow and copse have been very successful with families in this hot weather. Copse maintenance and watering of new plants continues There will be an update for the Parish Council at the September meeting.

#### **Neighbourhood Plan**

A professional expert has been commissioned to assist with the Village Design Statement.

#### **Parochial Charities**

The More's Meadow project preplanning meeting was to be held in two or three weeks.

#### Police

The Chair was to attend a Parking Enforcement Meeting on 19 July. Councillor Ashurst and the Clerk would meet Community Safety Officer Rachel Carr to review security on the Recreation Ground.

#### **Twinning Association**

For next year's anniversary the Twinning Association envisage speeches from the Parish Council and possibly a tree planting event.

#### Feast

The Feast appeared to be successful but no details were available to date. The updated services plan for 2019 is going back to the contractors for a requote.

#### **Greater Cambridge Partnership Report**

The cycle path to Sawston is to be improved and resurfaced.

#### Pavilion

Private party bookings have continued to improve during the summer period. A wasp nest was removed adjacent to the players' corridor.

#### Health Centre, Dentist and Pharmacy

The Chair reported that doctors had indicated they are no longer considering moving from the current site but some services would be shared. The Health Centre merger with Granta (Sawston) has taken place and will be effective on 1 September.

#### OTHER

- Complaints of incidents involving cricket balls have been received from the bowls club and local residents. These have been reviewed with the Cricket Club and Cricket East. The Clerk was requested to provide further information to be reviewed at the Finance and General Purposes meeting on August 15.
- Feedback from the Feast Day consultation on village key projects is to be updated at a later meeting when all forms have been received.
- After much discussion, the Green Belt and affordable housing policy was withdrawn for further amendments.
- The Financial Procedure and Processes Policy will be reviewed at the Finance and General Purposes meeting on August 15.
- There have been criminal incidents and antisocial behaviour on the Recreation Ground recently, including major damage to the skateboard ramp. It was agreed that there should be additional security patrols and that CCTV should be implemented with live monitoring.

#### FINANCE

Cheques to the value of  $\pounds 6,582$  were approved and signed.

# Summary from the draft minutes of the extraordinary meeting on 1 August to discuss antisocial behaviour on the Recreation Ground

An extraordinary meeting of the Parish Council was called as a number of issues had occurred on the Recreation Ground.

#### **Club views**

The Cricket Club stated that covers had been interfered with and minor damage caused.

Playscape and SSYI recognised that the damage caused to the skateboard ramp was a concern and that its removal may be necessary prior to the introduction of the proposed new facilities. Playscape stated that the most common and loved use of the ramp was by children with parents and that its loss would be missed.

#### Local residents

There have been various minor intrusions but fencing and hedges have provided some protection.

#### **Councillors' views**

- Additional CCTV and monitoring is necessary.
- Facilities are for the use of everyone, but bad practice should be discouraged. If the police take no action, civil action could be considered, dependant on costs and the likelihood of success if suitable evidence is available.
- The skateboard ramp should be repaired after the installation of CCTV
- Additional support from SSYI would assist but their funding limits additional meetings.
- Restricted space was not the answer and the youths who are on site should be encouraged to identify offenders.
- Doing nothing is not an option as legitimate and casual users are being intimidated. The groups involved should be engaged with to identify their preferences for the Recreation Ground.
- It is essential for youths to be able to use the Recreation Ground, but respectfully.
- Ten years ago there were problems every weekend, but intervention by Police Community Support Officers improved the situation.
- It is essential to provide local facilities for the youths. However, when combined with alcohol and other substances, things can get out of hand.

- Close the Recreation Ground during the hours of darkness.
  - A challenge to achieve and manage

- The Chair and Police Liaison Coordinator are meeting the police again on 15 August.
  - Escalate to the police and Crime Commissioner
  - Canvas for District Council and County Council support
  - Write to the local MP (Heidi Allen)
- Youth engagement.
  - SSYI to re-engage via Zac
  - Potential additional support to SSYI for extra meeting evenings
- Establish a Table Tennis Club.
- Further improve the Green Shelter with lighting.
- Memorial Hall exterior CCTV system with live monitoring.
- Consider the extension of additional security patrols after the end of August.
- Invest in the Youth Club (SSYI) to encourage youth responsibility.
- Invite youths to assist in Recreation Ground Maintenance and thus feel involved.

'Church' and 'sustainability'? These words rarely appear together. Why should the church care about sustainability? Shouldn't we be busy helping the poor and reaching the lost? Yes, you are right. As Christians our primary calling is to worship our wonderful Saviour; an apt response to His love for us. And everything we do is fuelled from this core. But, if heaven is calling us, why care about the current state of our planet?

Bob White, our local Professor of Geophysics at Cambridge University says that 'The Bible's view is that the earth is less like the *Titanic*, doomed to ultimate destruction, and more like the original *Queen Mary*, sailing into the distant sunrise where it will be rebuilt yet more gloriously.' This gospel is good news for all people and God's earth.

At Great Shelford Free Church we have been learning about the sustainability of our church. Following an initiative by AROCHA, the Eco-church survey provides a measure of every aspect of church life, from the way we worship to the management of our buildings, land and our own lifestyles. The programme then allows a church to set targets to reach bronze, silver and gold sustainability ratings. So far there are over 950 registered Eco-churches in the UK. Our own survey results showed we were some way off the podium. However we have made a commitment to the bronze award and it has been wonderful to see the ideas and hard work from our members toward this goal. These include planting flowers outside the church, installation of a bird box, promoting walking and cycling to church and organising a community litter pick. Ultimately it is not the plaque we seek but the aim of improving our environmental footprint.

What I have been struck by is that a big difference can be made by lots of small changes, many of which require little effort. We cannot bring about the global solution to the environment ourselves. However, imagine the impact for Great Shelford if we each made a small change to our habits to improve our own environmental footprint. Whether it's turning the tap off as we brush our teeth or walking to the shop instead of driving; maybe all our small actions can add up to a bigger change. Oh, and please pop by to see our bronze plaque at the end of the year, all being well!

11 Aug	Formatted remaining contributions.
12 Aug	Today is the day to pull the issue together! It's a fairly small issue, so a lot of juggling was needed to get all the advertisements in with contributions around them as we don't want ads running on consecutive pages. Once this was done, completed the Contents

#### THE SHELFORDS WI



We do not hold a meeting in August but fifteen of our members visited The Manor at Hemingford Grey on 2 August. It was a very hot day and our party displayed a pretty selection of charming sun hats. We soon arrived in the village at Hemingford Grey and were seated in the outside area where we enjoyed our pre-ordered lunches and jugs of cold

water. The community rooms were spotless with mostly volunteer waitresses cheerfully serving our teas and coffees. We wandered along the river bank, admiring the grand and smaller cottages en route; the village had a gentle and bygone feel, with a post office and small school. There was plenty of time to stroll around the beautiful grounds of the Manor House and sit under the trees before our guided tour of the house began at 2pm. Despite its close proximity to the river, the garden was clearly suffering from the drought and heat. Nevertheless the rambling roses and numerous other scented herbaceous plants were a joy to behold.

Diana Boston, who lives in the house now, enthusiastically showed us around her property which is crammed with paintings, collections, toys and treasures from the past. This fascinating property is a rare survival of a moated twostorey Norman hall built in the twelfth century and packed full with objects of the previous owner, Lucy Boston, who created in the house scenes from her world-famous children's books. This house has been continuously lived in and has not been allowed to fall into disrepair; it is truly amazing that it has survived for 900 years, despite fire and two World Wars. During the last war, the RAF sent recovering service men to stay there and musical evenings were held in the upper hall, where we were privileged to listen to music played on the old record player using a bamboo needle. We also saw perhaps the most amazing collection of quilted patchwork bedspreads in the country, which had been created over many years by Lucy Boston who was still creating her stunning pieces until her death aged over 97.

Our monthly meetings resume on Thursday 6 September when Hilary Ritchie will speak about the history of Addenbrooke's Hospital.

Please note that we have changed our meeting venue and from September we will meet in the Community Room behind St Mary's Church in Great Shelford.

We are always ready to welcome new members and visitors at every meeting. We meet on the first Thursday of every month (except August) at 7.30pm.
