PUBLIC SESSION

Lisa MacGregor asked the Parish Council to note that some space in the Memorial Hall was used by Scouts and Guides for storing kayaks and camping equipment. The area involved possibly amounts to 90m².

REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES

District Councillors

District Councillors noted that funds might be available for local groups through the South Cambridge District Council Community Chest.

REPORTS FROM COORDINATING OFFICERS

Parochial Charities

Parochial Charities are working on their pre-application for the More's Meadow extension.

MOBILE WARDEN SCHEME

There were discussions on reducing the scheme's dependence on GSPC for funding. Funding of around £500 could be available from the Parochial Charities, and additional funding was likely to be available through the South Cambridge District Council Community Chest. It was agreed to provide initial funding of £2,500 and to request that the scheme apply to other sources, but to underwrite a total sum of £3.500.

CRICKET BALLS

A cricket ball strike survey has been carried out by Labosport. The report has been received and is still under review. Some cost estimates are being obtained.

FINANCE

Cheques to the value of £12,519.29 were received and signed.


MASS RAPID TRANSIT ROUTE

Background The Greater Cambridge City Deal was announced in 2015. It was primarily an 'incentive' payment of up to £500M from central government to the City, District and County councils to 'encourage' them to build 34,480 houses by 2031. There seems to be the expectation that a further £500M could be allocated (from various sources). Money was to be spent on several different categories, but the prime one was transport, with the focus on:

- Bus priority schemes (Milton Road, Madingley Road and Histon Road)
- 2 A428 (Cambourne) to M11 segregated bus route/A428 corridor P & R
- 3 City Centre capacity improvements/cross-city cycle improvements
- 4 A1307 (Linton/Haverhill) corridor to include bus priority/A1307 additional Park & Ride
- 5 Chisholm Trail cycle links/Chisholm Trail bridge

An additional Park & Ride at Trumpington (6) has since been added. The City Deal has also been renamed the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP).

Consultation A large number of consultation meetings have been held over the last two and a half years, primarily on items 2, 4 and 6. These have been attended by your Parish, District and County Councillors. Note: 'Consultation' doesn't mean someone is listening – there is a strong belief that the A428 and Trumpington Park & Ride solutions had been predetermined by GCP and their consulting engineers, and that alternative suggestions such as rail Park & Ride at Whittlesford and Foxton were being ignored.



A1307 Proposals for the A1307 corridor were published at the start of this year. They were in two phases:

- Short term: bus priority, junction improvements, etc.
- Longer term: three separate strategies (not necessarily mutually exclusive):
 - Segregated Mass Rapid Transit route (MRT) bus or tram running on concrete from the A11 via Sawston to the Cambridge Biomedical Campus CBC (this would pass between Great Shelford/Stapleford and the A1307) and a Park & Ride near the A11/A505 junction.
 - 2 New dedicated public transport link between the existing Babraham Road Park & Ride and the CBC, an inbound bus lane from Babraham Research Campus to the Babraham Road Park & Ride and a Park & Ride near the A11/A1307 junction.
 - 3 Inbound bus lane along the A1307 from Babraham Research Campus to the Addenbrooke's Hospital roundabout and a Park & Ride near the A11/A1307 junction.

The result of the consultation exercise was strong support for the MRT option. This is unsurprising – if you live in Linton or Haverhill and you are offered a way to significantly cut journey times into Cambridge (and you do not have to pay for it), that is what you would go for. The only parish councils who opposed this option in its current form were Great Shelford (GSPC) and Stapleford.

GSPC Stance We support the short-term options and longer-term strategies 2 and 3, but oppose the MRT in its current format. There is a recognition that the MRT may be the only viable long-term option on the A1307, but there are major concerns about the impact on the Green Belt of the construction of the MRT and the likelihood that it would create a 'development corridor' around its route. It would be expensive, but putting the last 6km or so of the route into Cambridge in a tunnel would mitigate some of our concerns. We will continue to press for these mitigations to be put in place if this is the option chosen.

We also believe that insufficient attention has been paid to the possibility of light rail on the route of the old Cambridge to Haverhill line. This was not presented as one of the options and we will be pressing for it to be properly considered.

Our short-term preference would be to see construction of Cambridge South Railway Station expedited, and significant rail Park & Ride developments at Foxton and Whittlesford. This would move large amounts of traffic off the roads within 15km of Cambridge at a relatively low cost.



MASS RAPID TRANSIT THROUGH SHELFORD

What is best for the village? What do we want and what effect would this new MTR route have on the people of Shelford?

The route is expected to partly follow the route of the dismantled Haverhill to Cambridge railway line. However, following the old track all the way has been judged too difficult: 'The rail and road dualling concepts were found not to be affordable or deliverable within the scope of the Greater Cambridge Partnership.' (South East Cambridge Transport Study)

The precise line of the new route has not yet been decided but concerns include pressure on street parking on Hinton Way and the fact that it will not only cross Green Belt land but could act as a *de facto* boundary for development. It would not be long before the fields off Hinton Way would be full of new housing.

If the old railway route is not 'deliverable' (why?) then where should the new route cut across Hinton Way – or should it simply follow the existing A1307, where it could use the Babraham Road Park & Ride?

Local resident John Wakefield responded to the request in our last issue for views on this:

'Why dig up the countryside and build a new road through some of our lovely Green Belt when a much less disruptive route still exists in the form of the old Cambridge to Haverhill railway line? The route of this closely follows that of the proposed new route and in fact a good part of it follows the railway route. It would make far more sense to re-instate the



railway line, the route of which is shown on the accompanying map. This would include stations at Granta Park, Abington and Sawston before joining the main line at Shelford for onward journey into Cambridge. In fact it would also leave the way clear for the line to be reconnected back to Haverhill, thus taking more traffic of the A1307.'

Heidi Allen comments: 'I guess it's also just not physically possible to get an offroute solution running through the heart of those villages.'

The Magog Trust gave a full response to transport proposals for the A1307 corridor (South East Cambridge Transport Study), in March this year, saying 'We strongly object to this Strategy 1 as it would have a detrimental effect on the ecology of the existing Nine Wells Nature Reserve, already under threat, as well as County Wildlife Sites along the likely route of the disused railway. Moreover, the scar across the arable fields will create land pockets adjacent to the villages creating areas which would almost certainly be developed. This would result in the loss of the green corridor to the south of the city, through ancient landscape.' The Editors

SHELFORD SCHOOL

'A caring school at the heart of the community'

As if our 175th Anniversary Celebration and the arrival of a new headteacher weren't enough excitement for one half term, the day before we broke up for our autumn break we were visited by OFSTED. Meeting as governors with our inspector, one of the first questions we were asked was what was special about our school. What immediately sprang to mind was not our high academic standards, consistently very good though they are, but the genuine Christian love and care that is apparent here, the fantastic sense of teamwork and the real perception of our place at the heart of the village communities we serve.

It was heartening to read our report and find that the strengths of the school were very apparent to the inspector in his observation of lessons, collective worship, playtimes and interviews with staff and children. The high level of parental satisfaction was also noted, with many commenting on how happy their children were and expressing appreciation for the quality of their well-being and education.

Where next? With our recent staff changes, several of our staff are new to their roles as subject leaders and continuing the development of this aspect will be high on our agenda, as will sharing good practice across the school. So, in a nutshell, Shelford School officially continues to be good, and its safeguarding effective.

Space does not permit more than a whistle-stop tour through other recent highlights, but some of the aspects of our 'rich and challenging curriculum' include our Year 6 visit to Ely, where the children explored the Cathedral through the theme of Remembrance, culminating in poppy petals falling from the octagon tower with each petal representing a fallen soldier. Year 6 then led the rest of the school in a Remembrance Service on the Friday before the centenary weekend.

We recently enjoyed a fantastic day with an international focus, thinking about one of the Global Goals for Sustainable Development: Quality Education for All. An informative and interactive whole school assembly with the charity Campaign for Female Education (CAMFED) helped us consider what it might be like not to be able to go to school. Everyone left the assembly with a lot to think about and much to be thankful for. The school council organised a Used Book Sale, which along with a Cake Stall, raised £321 for CAMFED.

Year 2 enjoyed their trip to 'The Chocolate Lady' and learned how to weld chocolate with help from the Welding Institute. Meanwhile our Year 5 children may have been spotted around the village as part of their Bikeability course while our Reception children confidently wobbled their way round the playground as part of Balanceability.

Nativity and choir rehearsals have started, and our hardworking PTA are into overdrive preparing for the big Christmas Lights Switch-On event on Sunday December 2. We hope to see lots of our readers there.

This Advent Season

The first people who heard about Jesus being born were shepherds out on the hills around Bethlehem. You will have heard the carol *While shepherds* watched their flocks by night.

Christians believe that the first **Advent** (coming/arrival) was the glorious demonstration of God in human form – the uniting of God and man in the person of Jesus, born of a virgin in a lowly stable.

Jesus grew to be a man and to those who believe in Him, in His death and resurrection, we can experience His forgiving grace and saving power.

A common decoration for Christmas is an **Advent wreath**; its circle reminds us of God Himself, eternal and endlessly merciful. It is evergreen – reminding us of the hope of eternal life.

In churches you may also see the wreath surrounding five candles, which remind us that Jesus is the Light of World. An **Advent candle** is lit for each of the four Sundays before Christmas. Various meanings may be attached to these but in total they represent waiting and preparation, whilst the fifth candle, lit on Christmas morning, reminds us that the wait is over. Another carol proclaims *Joy to the world, the Lord has come*.

For children the delight in receiving an **Advent Calendar** is usually for the chocolate or present each day brings. More traditional calendars tell the story of the Nativity in pictures or words. Both lead up to Christmas Day and the final verse of *O come, all ye faithful – Yea, Lord, we greet thee, born this happy morning*.

Advent has a greater meaning though. In pointing to the coming of Jesus it also points us to a time when Christians believe He will come again – the Second Coming. A message of hope; an expectation of His full revelation in Heaven.

Christmas reminds us of our confidence in the promises we read about in the Bible, to expect the return of Jesus Christ, in splendour and majesty.

We welcome you to come and join us to sing carols at the Memorial Hall and at any of the church services leading up to Christmas. Come and sing the final verse on Christmas Day.

We hope that you all enjoy a wonderful Christmas.



READER'S LETTER: MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS

The waiting times for routine doctors' appointments at the Shelford Health Centre were lengthening by up to two weeks a few months ago, but since the incorporation into the Granta practice the situation has worsened greatly. Recently the earliest appointment offered at Shelford or Sawston online was four weeks away (as of now, 25 days) and I had to travel to Royston in order to avoid this delay.

I recently wrote to the practice's Business Manager, Mr Gerard Newnham, about the problem. I made the point that patients would probably have greater confidence if the practice were more proactive in keeping patients advised about the situation and that we all know the NHS is under severe financial pressure. He assured me that the situation was under review and remedial steps were being taken, and that they were using various measures, including local parish magazines, to keep in touch with patients.

I understand from the editor that this December issue of GSVN is due to contain a contribution dealing only with routine matters, and that we have to wait for the January issue to possibly have something that may address the waiting time problem.

The lack of urgency in the provision of relevant information to the *Village News* and the inept handling of the website transfer leads me to believe that the new management has not really grasped the importance of bringing patients with them in what is, no doubt, a complex and difficult situation. I urge everyone to let the practice know, politely of course, how concerned we all are and that we seek improvements as a matter of urgency.

GSVN invited Sandra East, Granta Communications Officer, to respond. She wrote:

We are aware that patients may have to wait for a routine appointment, as is the case with all GP practices. However, should a patient feel they need urgent clinical advice they can request a telephone call from the duty GP. During the call, if it is established that urgent attention is required, the GP can arrange for the patient to be seen. This is in addition to the Rapid Access Clinic, which is accessible to all patients that require on-the-day treatment. With regard to Mr Fuller's other questions:

- 1 There is now a link on the Shelford Medical Practice website to the Granta Medical Practices website, where information about all of the Granta surgeries can be found.
- 2 There are plans to upgrade Shelford Medical Practice's telephone system to the new Granta Medical Practices system. In the meantime you can still call the surgery direct, or you can now use the Freephone number 0300 234 5555 and choose option 6.

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

3 December 1774

ROBBERY. Monday night the house of Abigail Willis, commonly called Nab Right, at Great Shelford, was broke open by some villains and robbed of 20 guineas in cash, a 20L bank bill, some silver spoons and other plate together with a considerable quantity of linen, to the amount in the whole of upwards of 70L, with which they got off undiscovered.

1 December 1798

COLLAPSE of south west angle, buttress of Church. Six o'clock in the morning of Friday last, the south west angle, with buttress and side walls adjoining, of the lofty and venerable tower of Great Shelford Church, fell to the ground ... At length one half of the tower, to the height of 80 feet, together with the five bells, fell down, and happily without doing any damage to the body of the church or a single individual in the parish.

WORLD WAR I

Sunday 11 November 2018 at 11am marked exactly 100 years after the Armistice which ended fighting on the Western Front. 40 men and two women are listed on the Great Shelford war memorial, built by Sindalls on a plot donated by Mr Sindall, who owned The Elms where Halatte Gardens is today.

Every year we gather to remember them, including those who fought on other fronts and of course those who suffered and died in the Second World War.

For years after their deaths these people would have been mourned by their families and comrades, but no one now has firsthand memories of them. The efforts of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission mean that their graves and memorials are kept in good condition and basic information including the records of their burial places is published on the web. Here I highlight the two women who appear on our memorial.



Gladys Maud Jones VAD (Voluntary Aid Detachment) Nurse. Born 1886 in Cambridge, died on Tuesday 21 August 1917, of malaria, aged 31. Daughter of Alfred and Adelaide Letitia Jones, of The Spinney, Great Shelford. Buried in Mikra British Cemetery, Kalamaria, Greece. Grave 89.

She was awarded the British War Medal and the Victory Medal.


Salonika in Greece was the base of the British Salonika Force and it contained, from time to time, eighteen general and stationary hospitals.

Ada Florence Victoria Sillitoe Member 7201, Leading Aircraftwoman, Women's Royal Air

Force. Born Chesterton 1897, died Friday 8 November 1918. Buried St Mary's Church, Great Shelford (though it appears she may have died of causes unknown in Elham, Kent and been subsequently buried in Shelford).

The WRAF was formed on April 1 1918. Its work was divided into four basic trades: Clerks and Storewomen, Household, Technical and Non-Technical. WRAFs were sent to RAF bases in Britain and later to France and Germany. More detail at https://tinyurl.com/y7j4t3uv and https://tinyurl.com/y7naqu5m



SECURITY ADVICE

Homes with no security measures in place are five times more likely to be burgled than those with simple security measures – and Christmas is a popular time for burglars. - Install good outside lighting
- Get a trusted neighbour to keep an eye on your property
- Leave radios or lights on a timer to make the property appear occupied
- Make sure the fences around your garden are in good condition especially at the rear of the house
- Lock bikes to an immoveable object in a locked shed or garage
- Keep ladders and tools stored away; don't leave them outside where they could be used to break into your home
- Ensure side gates are locked to prevent access to the rear of the house
- Improve natural surveillance at the front of your property, i.e. trim high hedges
- Mark your property with postcode and house number and register your property for free with 'Immobilise'
- Consider joining or forming a Neighbourhood Watch scheme
- Remove valuables from view of ground floor windows
- Store any high value items in a properly secured safe or bank vault

7A and 31 BUS SERVICES

Use of the 7A (Trumpington Park & Ride to Whittlesford) and 31 (Addenbrooke's to Fowlmere) bus services is still low, particularly the 7A, which had a change of route in July to Trumpington rather than Babraham Road Park & Ride to encourage more use.

According to A2B Bus and Coach, operator of both services, unless there is a significant increase in use on the 7A it is likely to be axed when the contract expires in 2019. So it is in the local interest to make use of these services.

For Shelford residents the 7A can provide access to Waitrose at Trumpington or indeed a faster, more direct journey into Cambridge from the bus stop in Tunwells Lane via the Park & Ride or Guided buses.

The 31 is useful for less mobile residents living in the Hinton Way/Mingle Lane area for the shops and medical practice in Great Shelford with stops in the High Street opposite the Square & Compasses and near Woollards Lane, giving passengers around 40 minutes before the bus returns. A concessionary bus pass gives free travel. Both services run Monday to Saturday (not Bank Holidays).






