SUMMARY FROM THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 20 FEBRUARY 2019

REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES

County Councillors

No report.

District Councillors

The District Council is in the process of setting budgets and a brief report will be provided later.

REPORTS FROM STANDING COMMITTEES

Highways

It was agreed that the bench on the Memorial Green (or a replacement bench if necessary) should be moved to a more appropriate position.

Planning enforcement is investigating signage issues and car parking on the pavement near Miniworks garage.

The Parish Council is hoping to take over responsibility for cutting all grassed areas in the village; SCDC (South Cambridgeshire District Council) would make a financial contribution towards this.

SCDC have appointed a Senior Executive to progress the issue of parking decriminalisation; there now seems to be an acceptance that action is needed.

Planning

Cllr Kettel has been confirmed as joint Chair of the Planning Committee.

Recreation Ground

The Fire Brigade were called to the Recreation Ground on the morning of 9 February to deal with a serious fire at the back of the Village Man's shed. The Brigade reported this to the Police as arson not endangering life.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES

Neighbourhood Plan

Circulation of a letter and an online survey have been jointly agreed by Stapleford and Great Shelford Parish Councils.

Parochial Charities

Pre-planning application is now with SCDC.

Police

The reporting link for any observed crimes is *https://www.cambs.police.uk/report/REPORT*. A meeting was held on 28 February with Inspector Paul Rogerson to discuss issues around policing in the village.

There was a drop-in Police Surgery on 6 March in the Memorial Hall.

Community Association

The amendment to the lease between the Parish Council and Community Association has been signed. This removes the Sports and Social Club from the area leased by the Community Association. The Community Association have signed a cessation of lease document with the Sports and Social Club. SSYI will lease the 'Sports and Social Club Area' directly from the Parish Council; the lease fee will be nominal.

Twinning Association

Two trees will be planted on the Memorial Green on Sunday 7 July to mark the 30-year signing of the Twinning Charter. This will be followed by speeches and it is hoped to have some PC involvement.

Great Shelford Football Club and Social Club

The Plough Public House will now be utilised for after-match socialising.

Clay Pit

The site has been inspected and is badly overgrown. Further advice is to be sought

Pavilion

Additional tables and storage cupboards have been acquired. The Pavilion will be in use by cricket teams most Saturdays and Sundays this summer, so there will be little opportunity for private hire.

The Air Source heat pump equipment is to be relocated and the water system will be cleaned and descaled.

OTHER BUSINESS

Toilets on the Recreation Ground

Additional options are being investigated for a full report at the March Parish Council meeting.

Feast services project

It was agreed to accept the quotation from Mead Construction of £54,806 and to commence work as soon as possible.

FINANCE

Fifteen cheques to the value of £6,558 50p were presented and signed.

EXTERNAL CORRESPONDENCE

A request has been received for a Mr Taco food van to operate outside the Memorial Hall on Friday lunchtimes. It was agreed that this should have a three-month trial.

A request was received for a suitable site for a textile recycling bank. It was suggested that the Shelford Rugby Club should be approached.

GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL ASBESTOS CONTAMINATION

Work to provide improved services for the Feast started on 5 March and has unfortunately uncovered buried asbestos over a significant area. GSPC has been reassured that the rest of the Recreation Ground where there have been no excavations (e.g. the football pitches, cricket square, children's play area, etc.) does not present any risk from asbestos.

GSPC has had specialist tests run on the contaminated material.

- Chemical tests have confirmed that the contamination is due to white asbestos encased in concrete (chrysotile). Whilst it is classed as a hazardous material, it is encased in concrete and any danger is minimal.
- Air tests have also been performed at multiple points and have confirmed there are no asbestos fibres in the air.
- GSPC is confident that there is no safety risk to the public or to contractors working on the site. Work will continue over the next few weeks to excavate the trenches and drain connection. Some test boreholes will also be drilled to establish the perimeter of any contamination for any future work. During the work there will be onsite monitoring by specialists to ensure that the correct procedures are adhered to and that contractors and the public are completely safe. All excavated material will be removed from the site and taken to a hazardous waste facility. New material will be brought in to replace the contaminated soil.

Where did the contamination come from? We don't know and probably never will, but the finger has been pointed at the following as potential sources:

- a wartime military encampment
- the old Memorial Hall roof
- Robinson's Dairy.

The clean-up exercise is going to be costly. We don't have the final figure, but believe it could be in the region of £35,000–£50,000. GSPC believes it essential to complete the work to safeguard public safety and to ensure we can complete the Feast and Playscape projects.

GREAT SHELFORD PARISH COUNCIL ELECTION 2 MAY 2019

At time of going to press it seems likely that we will have to have an election for a Parish Councillor on 2 May. As background, the electoral process for Parish Councils is as follows:

- If a councillor resigns or is removed mid-term, the normal procedure is to publish a notice of vacancy allowing ten or more electors time to request SCDC (South Cambridgeshire District Council) for an election to be held. If no such request is received, then the Parish Council may go ahead and co-opt to that position.
- However, if ten or more residents wish, they can ask SCDC to hold an election for that position only. This is what has happened and it will necessitate a full-blown election for one seat (it is assumed here that there will be more than one candidate as we know of three already).
- Every four years all Parish Councillors stand down. Nominations are then sought for new councillors. If the number of nominations is less than or equal to the number of seats, all the nominees are elected unopposed. This was what happened with GSPC in 2018. If the number of nominations is more than the number of seats, then an election is held. It's important to understand that this is a full election, with polling stations, tellers, etc. It is a very onerous process.
- An election incurs a significant expense for the village; £3,000–£4,000. (Note that this could happen several times a year).

What GSPC intends to do is to set up a hustings meeting to allow all candidates to be interviewed by GSPC and any villagers who wish to attend. This will be 11 April at 7pm in the Memorial Hall.

GSPC will decide on their preferred/most suitable candidate and inform villagers of that preference. It is obviously up to individuals to decide whether to take that recommendation or vote for an alternative candidate on 2 May.

We have asked SCDC to circulate poll cards to all village residents.

Please note:

- While a hustings is unusual for Parish Council elections, the process is allowable
- It is not compulsory for any nominated individual to take part in the hustings.
- If more than one nomination is received by SCDC, the election process will take place with full costs.
- If only one nomination is received by SCDC, that nomination will be accepted without an election process.
- If no nominations are received by SCDC, we have to keep re-running the election until at least one candidate comes forward.



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

DEPUTY PARISH CLERK

Great Shelford Parish Council is looking for a deputy for Clerk Mike Winter, ideally from April/May 2019. Duties, hours and pay all negotiable, depending on the applicant's skills and interests, but are likely to be something along the following lines:

- Duties: general administration, notices and noticeboard information, management of the Pavilion and bookings, organising meetings, dealing with the public, deputising for the Clerk.
- Hours: flexible, but probably 5–8 hours per week. Occasional, limited evening work.
- Pay: negotiable, but likely to be £10–£15 per hour plus benefits.
- Personal skills/attributes: organised, good with people, reasonable (but not high level) computer skills.
- Location: Great Shelford, probably largely home-based.

ARSON AND VANDALISM

We have had further issues in the centre of the village. The lights on the path from the Health Centre to Ashen Green have been vandalised. A fire was lit on the Recreation Ground towards the riverbank. Finally, and most seriously, on 9 February vandals set fire to various materials used by the Feast and stored behind the Village Man's shed on the Recreation Ground. Several hundred pounds' worth of damage was done, the fire brigade had to be called and the fire was uncomfortably close to Peacocks. In spite of the serious nature of the last incident, the Police appear incapable of taking any action.

If you had been out and about in the villages on the morning of 7 March, you would have been treated to a wonderful parade of storybook characters all making their way to school! As part of World Book Day activities, pupils, staff and even a parent and grandparent or two, arrived in creative and colourful fancy dress to support each class's learning about a specific literary genre or particular author. Book-related activities continued through the day including pupils reading out extracts from their favourites in the dining hall at lunchtime! Strangely, the one room in school excluded from the World Book Day activities was the school library! However this is because it has been undergoing an amazing transformation thanks to the PTA and a team of skilled parent volunteers. The whole area has been cleared out and repainted, beautiful murals have appeared on the walls and fresh flooring, furniture, shelving and of course BOOKS will be reappearing in it very soon. It promises to be a calm and inspiring space for the whole school community to use and we are very grateful to everyone who has been involved in the project.

Another peaceful new area in school is the Prayer Space, supported by GenR8. One of the activities is called a Live Library; this means that instead of finding historical information from books, children listen to stories and anecdotes from local people. We have been honoured to welcome guests recently who have kindly shared with the children reminiscences of their work, their interests and their lives in Shelford.

The school benefits so much from the support of the local church communities and the wider village communities, and we are grateful for the involvement of so many people in enriching our pupils' learning experiences.

HELP PREVENT KEYLESS VEHICLE THEFTS



Following a rise across the eastern region in thieves using more sophisticated techniques to gain access to keyless entry/start button cars, we're issuing advice to help you keep your vehicle secure and protect you from becoming a victim of crime.

When the correct key fob is close by, the fob recognises the signal and transmits its own code, instructing the vehicle to

unlock the doors and to allow the ignition to work on the car. Thieves use wireless transmitters to capture its radio transmission. This is relayed to another device. It allows the thief to open and start your car in the same way.

To prevent this from happening, use car key signal blocker cases/sleeves, they cost less than £10, or an aluminium tin at home. Find a safe place for your keys at home and check to ensure they are out of range.

Following some of these other steps will also help to protect your vehicle:

- Use a good quality crook lock or full cover steering wheel security lock to immobilise your vehicle.
- Consider fitting an 'OBD safe' device, a secure lockable device that fits over the vehicle's on board diagnostic port in the vehicle cabin. This prevents criminals using software to code an electronic key for the vehicle.
- If your vehicle is fitted with on board wi-fi, consider switching this facility off if you do not need it. This will reduce the chance of criminals hacking into the vehicle's system, your banking details or personal data from linked devices.
- Criminals can also employ remote/keyless entry jamming equipment so make sure your car is locked physically by trying the door handle and noting that the indicators flash before leaving it.

William 'Willie' Sutton was born in 1901 and was a profligate US bank robber. During his forty-year criminal career, he stole an estimated \$2 million (about £45 million in today's money) and eventually spent more than half of his adult life in prison. For his talent at executing robberies in disguises, he gained two nicknames, Willie the Actor and Slick Willie. There is a quote attributed to Slick Willie and it appears in a number of US prisons: 'Don't serve time, let time serve you'. During our recent sermon series on Joseph, we spent some time thinking about Joseph's many years behind bars. In his case, he was innocent but still doing 'time'. What must it feel like to be an innocent person behind bars day after day? Did he 'serve time or let time serve him'?

The quote pokes at something we all might need to learn to do. It is so easy when we face difficulties in life to just wish it was all better and tread water until the problem resolves itself. In some cases, we can end up wishing away half our life just serving time with our issues and problems. We can be heard saying phrases such as 'If I could just get through this' or 'Maybe when this is over'. As a Church community, we have been thinking about how God supported Joseph, not by breaking him out of his prison cell – but by joining him behind the bars. The same can be true in our walk with God; he doesn't break us out of our prison cell but journeys with us in the difficulties of life, whatever they may be. I say this knowing that many go through extremely difficult personal traumas, so I don't say it lightly but from first-hand experience of people who have allowed their sufferings to serve them – to build their faith and enrich their (and others') lives.

We might need to remind ourselves that God does not cause all the horrible things to happen to us in this world, but he also doesn't stand idly by; he joins us in that suffering, *he serves* us in that suffering. No better example of this is Jesus' life and death 2000 years ago – Jesus, joining humanity and dying in our place – it's the Easter Story behind those Easter Eggs we eat every year. God wants to be with us, sharing our troubles. Jesus said 'I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world, you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world.' (John 16:33)

My prayer is that you might have peace in your troubles and allow God to join you in the time we have walking this planet. *Don't serve time, let time serve you!*

Take heart and God bless.

DIGGING HOLES TO HELP US

The roads are being dug up again, there are temporary traffic lights around the village and now the car park is closed for more digging. What's going on?

Irritating as it is, this is work that will benefit us all. And as grandma used to say, 'You can't make an omelette without breaking eggs.' In the case of the roads it's filling potholes before they get even worse and become a danger to cyclists. In the car park it is a long-term plan of improvements to the Recreation Ground supervised by the Parish Council with whom the contractors have agreed the necessary closures.

The Parish Council, The Feast and Playscape have worked together for several years to get water, sewerage and electricity on to the Recreation Ground. This means we will have the infrastructure for a water fountain, a public toilet, irrigation or whatever future developments we want for the Rec.

For The Feast it means a ready and safe supply of water for cleaning and cooling, electricity for our chiller vans and for light and sound, and sewerage so that the mobile toilet blocks can be safely plumbed in alongside the marquee. Previously all these services came through temporary pipes and cables draped along the ground from the Scout & Guide HQ.

All these improvements will benefit the whole village for years to come. The Parish Council has supported the development and The Feast will make a significant financial contribution. So by the time you visit the marquee in Feast Week (the week leading up to Sunday 14 July 2019 – tickets are on sale now!) you'll be able to enjoy cool drinks and great music. And the inconvenience of the car park in April will give way to the conveniences on the Rec!

On a positive note we were delighted to receive over £3,500 from two Benevity donations, an online workplace-giving platform, which includes corporate match funding. So a huge thank you to these generous donors – this is so encouraging and another step towards building a new Playscape for the village!





GARDEN CLUB GROUND COVER PLANTS

Tim Fuller of the Plantsman's Preference nursery in South Lopham, near Diss in Norfolk, returned to speak about plants suitable for ground cover in shady and sunny areas.

Dry shade under deciduous trees and shrubs

Geranium macrorrhizum – useful for the north-facing side of a fence or wall. Spreading clump of semi-evergreen, aromatic leaves with white, pink or deep pink flowers in spring.

Wood melick (*Melica uniflora*) – low clumps of grassy leaves with many long-lasting, miniature translucent seed heads, which will lighten up semi-shaded areas.

Box (*Buxus sempervirens*) – green and variegated forms effective as individual or closely planted evergreen bushes, lightly clipped to form hummocks.

Cyclamen hederifolium – autumn-flowering carpets of pink or white flowers, followed by silver-patterned, green leaves through to spring before becoming dormant in summer.

Wood sage (*Teucrium scorodonia* 'Crispum Marginatum') – low-growing semi–evergreen with spikes of very small creamy, green flowers and attractive crinkled leaves.

Lesser periwinkle *Vinca minor* 'Ralph Shugert' – creeping evergreen with variegated leaves and violet-blue flowers. Cut back unwanted shoots in spring to control spreading.

Geum 'Herterton Primrose' – one of the newer lower-growing forms, flowering March to May, which forms a carpet when several are planted together. Looks effective planted under silver birch or next to a willow hedge.

Ophiopogon planiscapus 'Nigrescens' – low spreading clumps of black grass-like leaves, which can look effective interplanted with the variegated sedge *Carex oshimensis* 'Evergold' or the deciduous red-tipped Japanese blood grass *Imperata cylindrica* 'Rubra'.

Lamium maculatum 'Pink Pewter' – low-growing, white-striped foliage with pale pink flowers.

Sunny areas

Campanula poscharskyana variegated – low, cream and green foliage with mauve flower bells.

Autumn moor grass *Sesleria autumnalis* forms a clump of pale yellow-green leaves with silvery-grey flower spikes covered with silky white stamens, from late summer onwards. Useful as a border edging plant or as a feature on the curve of a protruding bed.

Cotoneaster horizontalis – small, young plants once established can form effective cover on a dry bank and can be successfully combined with heathers in an open situation.

Rudbeckia fulgida var. sullivantii 'Goldsturm' – award-winning knee-high, golden yellow daisies suitable for planting in drifts in moderately fertile soil. Salvia nemorosa 'Amethyst' – spikes of purple flowers above a clump of soft green foliage, for well-drained soil in full sun.

Houttuynia cordata 'Jokers Gold' – spreading plant with heart-shaped, multicoloured leaves with white flowers, suitable for moist soil in a contained bog garden.

Persicaria amplexicaulis 'Rosea' – slowly spreading clump with spikes of pink flowers, best in moist but well-drained soil, in full sun or light shade.

Geranium 'Light Dilys' – red-veined, pink flowers on trailing stems from May to October.

Sweet pea (*Lathyrus odoratus* var. *nanellus* 'Pink Cupid', 'Crimson Cherub', 'Northern Lights Cherub') – trailing varieties with many flowers specially bred for ground cover.



Old News

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

23 April 1791

STOLEN – from the Stables of Thomas Stacey of Great Shelford ...

A YELLOW BAY HORSE, 5 years old, 15 hands high, two white heels behind, and a blaze in his face, long tail and mane.

And also a BROWN HORSE, about 14 hands high, blind of the off eye, and hair chafed off his back and sides, switch tail and mane, the near fore foot white, the property of Mr Robert Gee.

Whoever will give information where the said horses may be found, or the person or persons who stole them, shall upon conviction receive FIVE GUINEAS reward from THOMAS STACEY.

13 April 1805

THEFT – Joseph Haatley, Samuel Robinson and John Pratt, of Great Shelford, were committed to the Castle by the Rev. Andrew Perinea, on suspicion of stealing, killing and carrying away some ducks, the property of Mr Henry Headly, of Great Shelford.

30 April 1819

SUSANNNAH CHAMBERS – the wife of a schoolmaster at Great Shelford, was indicted for assault on Sarah Dean, the wife of a shopkeeper in the same parish. The prosecutrix deposed, that on applying to defendant for a bill owing for shop goods, she was not only abused, but beaten over the back with a Bible, which had caused her to be indisposed ever since, to corroborate which, a little boy was called, who said the defendant had only pushed the prosecutrix from her door with the Bible, however, the jury found her guilty, and she was fined 6d.

20 April 1827

TWELVE MONTHS HARD LABOUR – John Adams indicted for having stolen three bushels of wheat from the barn of Messrs Stacey. Ann Pouter lives next door to the prisoner and heard his door open several times on the night of the robbery at about one o'clock. He was proved guilty and sentenced to twelve months hard labour.


