SUMMARY FROM THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 20 MARCH 2019

PUBLIC SESSION

A resident requested information on the status of the Memorial Hall car park, street cleaning and TRO progress of the Traffic Regulation Order for Spinney Drive.

- Cllr Barrie Ashurst reported that South Cambs District Council (SCDC) and Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) perform two sweeps and one gully clean per annum but this was insufficient. The Parish Council is negotiating an allowance to take over the process, pay a private contractor to attend on a more frequent basis and deal with trouble locations as necessary.
- A Traffic Regulation Order application has just been made for parking restrictions on one side of Spinney Drive.

A resident asked if parking restrictions at the car park adjacent to the Co-op in Sawston could be applied to Great Shelford car parks and if large recycle bins could be located in the village centre.

- The Co-op in Sawston has paid for a private contractor to manage a three-hour maximum stay. However, in Great Shelford this would just increase illegal roadside parking, as no police enforcement is available.
- Recycling facilities have previously been discussed and no suitable location is available. The Rugby Club has been suggested for such a facility.

A representative of the Scouts and Guides was interested in general progress on the Memorial Hall and Recreation Ground services.

REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES

District Councillor

A drop-in surgery for residents to discuss district matters is held each month at 7pm in the Memorial Hall before the start of the Parish Council meeting.

There will be a council tax increase on empty homes.

Grants for the Mobile Warden scheme have been awarded to Great Shelford and Stapleford.

East West Rail Consultation: Five route options are currently being consulted on and all include a proposed station either around Cambourne or at Bassingbourn Barracks. The preferred route is due to be announced later in the year. However, the consultation does not make clear how the East West rail line would join the West Anglia Main Line south of Cambridge, and it is

therefore difficult to comment on the implications of this for communities and the environment.

Solar panels have been installed on top of South Cambridgeshire District Council's waste depot at Waterbeach, which will generate around a quarter of all the electricity the building uses.

A new South Cambs Council customer portal allows customers to submit questions and contact the Council about planning, benefits, waste collections, etc. as well as to report problems. The portal can be accessed from the South Cambs Council homepage or on https://mysouthcambs.scambs.gov.uk

County Councillor

No County Councillor was in attendance.

A County Councillor report is available on the website.

An outstanding response is required on the reduction of funding to Shelford School and to Sawston Village College.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES

Highways

Parish Council representatives met with a local resident and Nigel Tarrant (Stagecoach) to discuss the ongoing issue of buses idling in High Green. The Parish Council are applying to CCC for a painted bus stop area more towards the crossing which may alleviate the problem. Stagecoach agreed to mount a 'No idling' sign on the bus stop.

Stagecoach have refused to allow the 7A to stop at Stagecoach stops so that locals could have access to Waitrose. The PC Chair is to contact Stagecoach MD to make a case.

Approval for a large sign to encourage drivers to switch off their engines in Station Road has been received.

The Heritage Direction Sign at the Woollards Lane / High Street junction has been removed, and the Clerk is investigating a possible supplier for a replacement.

The outstanding item for the Stapleford–Sawston Cycleway is the removal of the hedge at Bridge Cottage and its replacement with a fence. CCC are submitting a planning request to SCDC.

The Parish Council will take over the grass cutting of areas presently cut by SCDC from 1 April.

CCC are gathering prices for extensive pothole works in Hinton Way.

The bench on the Memorial Green which had been the centre of noisy behaviour and littering has been moved to a more appropriate position.

Cemetery and Allotments

Available allotment plots are to be allocated after the completion of the annual accounts.

REPORTS FROM COORDINATING OFFICERS

Police

Chris Wiseman has now returned as PCSO for the area and held a well-attended surgery on 6 March 2019 in the Memorial Hall.

Twinning

Scotsdales have offered to donate two significant trees to mark the signing of the Twinning Charter. These will be planted in the Memorial Gardens. There will also be a plaque, to be funded by the Parish Council.

Feast

Cllr Simon Talbott has been co-opted onto the Feast Committee.

A Ceilidh is planned for Sunday 7 July to support the Twinning arrangements.

GSFC & Social Club

Lease and operational arrangements with SSYI are to be established for a 25-year period with a five-year break clause.

OTHER BUSINESS

Recreation Ground Services

The project started on time and despite various problems it is expected to be completed on time, eight weeks from the start.

The Clerk provided an update on the additional costs of monitoring and the disposal of asbestos located on the Recreation Ground. As a precaution, a quote of £1,850 plus VAT has been obtained via Asium Project Management Limited to take nine sample bore holes over a 100sqm area and analyse for asbestos content in areas where future Playscape build activity is proposed.

Summer Reading Challenge

A grant of £300 will be provided for this year's Summer Reading Challenge.

FINANCE

Cheques to the value of £9,089.67p were received and signed.



ANNUAL PARISH MEETING WEDNESDAY 17 APRIL

PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR STATEMENT FOR 2018 - 2019

Recreation and Pavilion Installation of new mains drainage, water, electricity and Internet for Feast, Playscape and general use. Playscape planting and general improvements continue.

Highways We failed to get a grant for a pedestrian crossing in Cambridge Road. Parking continues to be major issue.

Planning 192 planning applications were reviewed in 2018/19. A lot of work was done on external proposals, e.g. Wellcome Trust.

Communications Over 200 residents now receive regular updates from the Parish Council.

Personnel Two Councillors have resigned and there will be an election on 2 May to replace them. We are seeking to recruit a further Deputy Clerk.

Finally The Chair thanked the Parish Councillors and also the village's 'unsung heroes' – people like Eleanor McCrone and the Playscape team, the school PTA, the Feast Committee, the *Village News* team, and individuals like Helen Harwood, Bridget Hodge and John Wakefield. Also Mike Winter our Parish Clerk, Gerard Winter his deputy and Seamus Fegan, our Village Man.

KEY ISSUES AND PROJECTS

Traffic and parking issues GSPC is pressing for improvements to public transport and to roads which would take traffic away from the village, e.g. A505 and A1307.

Memorial Hall and Car Park See letter from Mike Nettleton on page 17

Crime and policing Levels of crime and antisocial behaviour appear to be increasing. GSPC has introduced private security patrols on the rec and more security measures are planned. Police surgeries have been resurrected.

Provision of improved recreation facilities The rec is insufficient for the needs of the Village. It is hoped to improve facilities by purchasing additional space.

Public toilets on the rec Following consultation and quotes, it has been decided that it will be most cost-effective for a standalone toilet to be erected on the rec. Two possibilities are being considered, and the exact location is still to be decided.

Big Lunch See back cover of the *Village News*.

REPORTS

Reports were received from the District and County Councillors, and also from the Chairs of the Planning, Cemetery and Allotments, Highways, and Pavilion and Recreation Committees

Reports were also received from the Village's representative bodies, including the Neighbourhood Plan, Playscape, the Governing Bodies of Shelford School and Sawston Village College, the Mobile Warden Scheme, SSYI, the Village News, the Cricket Club, the Shelford & Stapleford Strikers Football Club, the Bowls Club,

the Parochial Charities, the Twinning Association, the Tennis Club, the Feast, Scouts and Guides, the WI and the St Mary's Bell Ringers.

The Parish Council summary of accounts and balance sheet for 2016/2017 was presented by the Parish Clerk.

ISSUES RAISED BY RESIDENTS

- Concerns about the air quality in Woollards Lane. *The Parish Council will try to get measurements of air quality.*
- Progress of the East-West railway. *The Parish Council will be engaging in the consultation process*.
- Station at Addenbrooke's site. It is believed that this will deliberately not include additional parking
- Dangerous junction at Hinton Way / Chaston Road. Yellow lines are to be requested

At the end of the meeting the Parish Council Chair was thanked for his hard work and commitment throughout the year.

PARISH COUNCILLOR ELECTIONS

Many of you will know by now that the Parish Council has two vacancies for councillors. There have been three nominations and there will therefore be a contested election on **2 May**. The Parish Council organised a hustings on 11 April to allow residents to meet the candidates. We have three very good candidates. It was unfortunate that only 20 residents attended the meeting.

Mike Nettleton

The Village News invited the three candidates to introduce themselves.

Paula Arnold

I have been living locally in Great Shelford for nine years, and previously lived in Harston for 30 years.

I have worked in corporate finance and accounts for 40 years, and am currently working from home. In my career and personal life I have been a good mediator, defusing challenging situations.

Since moving to Shelford, I appreciate and enjoy nature, wildlife and green space far more than I was able to. I love working in the garden, retaining as many of the traditional plants as I can, and even grow some vegetables. I try to implement and encourage more recycling, at home and with friends.

The green spaces in Great Shelford contribute to the appeal of the village, but the roads are struggling. If elected I would strive to improve and maintain our green spaces, by protecting our beautiful old trees that give so much. New replacement saplings are not an equal replacement. I would also like to encourage more

recycling in the village, with either bottle banks, plastic banks, newspapers and textile banks in public places. I would like to see some better roadwork coordination and traffic management, as the tailbacks and the 7traffic pollution are getting really noticeable.

SHELFORD SCHOOL

Spring term was an active one for pupils and teachers alike. 2019 has seen the school renew and refresh its vision, an exercise which involved pupils, staff, governors and parents; the insight and wisdom of even the youngest participant was truly humbling for all involved! Together, they have summed up the school's vision as four key themes: Kindness, Resilience, Responsibility and Creativity.

Pupils have had many opportunities to engage with these themes this term. Showing their kindness, Reception and Year 1 hosted members of their families for an Easter tea in school. Year 2 managed to show their spark of creativity without even leaving the site, by building and (responsibly) setting light to a model street to learn about the Great Fire of London.

In the arts, pupils from Years 2, 3 and 4 performed at a Pianists' Concert and the annual instrumentalists' concerts also took place. Refurbishment of other internal parts of the school is ongoing, as are the plans for developing the new Reflection Garden – something many of the pupils seem very keen to enjoy. This year's PTA Challenge fundraising event is a Coast to Cambridge relay on Sunday 19 May. The School's beloved mascot, Bradley Bear, will travel over 70 miles from Hunstanton to Cambridge by pedal, foot and paddle power, with a teddy bears' picnic finish! Churchyard Care

For many years, our churchyard was tended by a dedicated group of volunteers. In 2000, it was closed to further burials, except for the cremation plots close to the church, and the responsibility for its maintenance was passed to SCDC, who intended to manage it for the benefit of wildlife. However, with the Council struggling to cope with all the varied demands on its funds, the finer points of maintenance have suffered. MEMORIAL HALL REPLACEMENT AND CAR PARK

John Pawley published a letter in the April *Village News* querying the need for additional car parking spaces. He is quite right to raise concern – this is an expensive project and it has to be fully justified and supported by the village. A few things are worth pointing out:

- GSPC is minimising risk by taking a phased approach to the project. We are currently conducting the Feasibility Study. At the end of that there will be a formal review and sign off before proceeding to the Design Phase. The same will happen at the end of the Design Phase before deciding whether to proceed with construction.
- We are way behind where we intended in terms of timescales. Malcolm
 Watson is leading the project and has had a number of unforeseeable work
 commitments to deal with. Other councillors and the Clerk have been tied
 up on other issues such as toilets on the Rec and Feast services (not to
 mention asbestos).
- Whilst John is right that there is currently less traffic in the village following the Barclays closure, it is a fluid situation. As an example, I was told in December that NHS Property Services (who own the surgery) wanted to move 20 mental health staff from Fulbourn to Shelford, all of whom would need parking spaces. I think it is almost inevitable that pressures on parking in the village will continue to grow. We have to take a long-term view and if we don't provide sufficient parking, it will kill what remains of the commercial centre in the village.

We aim now to get the Feasibility Study and consultation completed by early July. The results will be presented at The Feast and at whatever public meetings are required before any decision is made to proceed with the Design Phase.

They were formally Shelford Corn and Coal Company, owned by the George family. It looks as if they are just keeping the servicing side of the business as Shelford Heating, now based at South Cambridge Business Park, Sawston.



JENNY MORRIS: AN APPRECIATION



Jenny Morris died peacefully after a short illness in Arthur Rank Hospice on 28 March. Jenny was a well-known figure in the village and will be sadly missed by many people.

Jenny was born in June 1946 and grew up in rural Hampshire. After school she trained as a nurse in the Bristol Royal Infirmary. There she met Phil, a young medic and, as they say, the rest is history! They married in September 1969 and subsequently lived in Oxford, Canada and the USA before returning to England. Phil took up his appointment at Addenbrooke's in 1983 and it was then that they finally established their family home in Shelford.

Before long Jenny was also working at Addenbrooke's. Having specialised in midwifery, she was ideally equipped for work in the new Rosie Maternity Unit. There she was held in high esteem, not just as a midwife, but for her smiling face and helpful understanding of patient needs. A now experienced doctor told us: 'Jenny was adorable and always supportive of the junior doctors with whom she worked.'

Jenny retired from the Rosie in 2001 but very quickly immersed herself in the village community and in the life of the Church. For 13 years she served as treasurer on the Parochial Church Council. Sometimes the figures would frustrate her but then she would say 'I'm a nurse, not an accountant!' Whilst on the PCC, Jenny undertook the daunting task of researching Jesus College's historical liability for repairs to the Chancel of the Church. With the pro bono help of a specialist solicitor she ensured the Church's interest was duly registered – a complex responsibility for the PCC and Jenny's contribution was much appreciated.

Alongside these formal duties Jenny enjoyed using her many talents to engage with church life. She loved to sing and her fine soprano voice will be sorely missed by the church choir. During her final stay at Addenbrooke's, she gave much pleasure to three fellow patients by her singing from her hospital bed. Whenever possible, her Tuesday afternoons would be reserved for relaxing and singing with the Magog Singers.

Jenny was a great champion for the Shelford Mobile Warden Scheme, which supports elderly people living at home. She first became involved in 2002, then

served as treasurer and took the chair in 2013. She was always there to support and guide the wardens and she worked tirelessly to promote the scheme and search for the financial support on which it relies.

Jenny had a keen interest in local history. As a member of the Great Shelford Oral History Group, she helped interview and make recordings of the more senior villagers. Jenny loved this interaction with the older folk and learned so much about them and about life in Shelford in bygone years.

Another of her interests was footpaths. When a Parish Council Committee was convened to review footpath access, Jenny, though not a councillor, volunteered to help. She did much of the research with Jesus College on the right of way through Rectory Farm to Hauxton. The College agreed permissive access so Jenny and her golden retriever Mindy were able to continue with their favourite walks

Always on the lookout for new opportunities, Jenny also started an informal sewing group that meets each Monday in the Church Community Room. They have no rules and no fixed agenda – they simply work on their own handicrafts, giving help and advice to one another. In all this, Jenny's help, kindness and generosity shone through and long may the group continue.

Jenny was a truly gifted and caring lady. She was loved and respected by so many. She touched so many lives. Her smile and laughter, her compassion and kindness, and her spirit of understanding and generosity will continue to inspire us all.





Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

13 May 1797

WANTED – a steady PERSON to undertake the MANAGEMENT of the WORKHOUSE at Great Shelford. For further particulars enquire of the Churchwardens and Overseers of the said parish.

5 May 1809

LIVES SAVED – Rev. Mr. Thomason, late of Shelford, his wife and children were on board the Travers East Indiaman that lately foundered in the Bay of Bengal; their lives were providentially preserved, but they lost all their property. Their friends in this town had the pleasure of hearing from them last week, mentioning their arrival in Calcutta.

25 May 1810

FLYING WAGGONS – From Cambridge to London in 20 hours, Robert Marsh and I.L. Marsh and Sons. The butchers and poulters and all those who send meat and provisions to London, are hereby informed that for their better accommodation during the summer months, a Flying Waggon will set out from the office of Marsh and Sons, Sidney Street, every Tuesday and Friday mornings at seven o'clock precisely which will arrive in London in time for market on the following Wednesday and Saturday mornings. [They possibly passed through Shelford on the London Road.]

GAS GUN NOISE IN THE SHELFORDS

Both my dog, an elderly collie cross rescue, and myself, a not so elderly resident of Little Shelford for the past 27 years, are finding that there seem to be many more gas guns in operation this year and that they are much louder!

Whilst walking next to farmers' fields at this time of year I do expect there to be some gas gun noise. But what I'm finding this year is that I can hear them wherever I go in either of the Shelfords – for example, on Great Shelford Rec, Little Shelford Rec, Great Shelford High Street, Whittlesford Road in Little Shelford, and in my house in Hauxton Road (even when indoors).

My understanding is that gas guns are used by farmers when the crops are young and their shoots tender to prevent birds, particularly pigeons, from eating the young shoots. Whilst I also understand that it is for a relatively short period every year, I do not understand why they are so much louder this year! It makes me wonder whether both my dog's ears and my ears have suddenly become more sensitive. I don't think this is very likely! Or maybe the gas guns being used are more powerful and therefore louder? Or maybe the birds and pigeons are getting deafer?

My dog gets very frightened of the gas gun noises, and is now reluctant to go out in our own garden, as well getting very upset when we are out walking.

Do any dog walkers know of anywhere local where my dog and I can walk in peace for the next few weeks?




