SUMMARY FROM THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 17 July 2019

CHAIR AND DEPUTY CHAIR

Deputy Chair Cllr Malcolm Watson agreed to step up to Chair status from July 2019 to May 2020. Cllr Barbara Kettel was elected as Deputy Chair.

PUBLIC SESSION

Resident former Parish Council Chair and Cllr Mike Nettleton raised the following concerns:

- Public toilets on the Recreation Ground should be put back onto the table for reconsideration. Response: It was agreed that the project would be reconsidered at a future date.
- Comments regarding provision of funds for legal services and issues regarding cricket ball netting were noted for future response.
- Chair handover: It was agreed that handover discussions regarding Parish Council Chair activities should be arranged.

FINANCE

Cheques to the value of £62,540.44 were received and signed.

REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES

District Councillor

District Cllr Nick Savage reported on the consultation process for the Local Plan 2040 and beyond.

The Deputy Leader of SCDC has been in contact with various Parish Councils regarding parking issues. Cllr Barrie Ashurst will ensure GSPC views are included.

The Cambridge City Blue Plaque Scheme to honour famous people or events associated with the city is being extended to South Cambridgeshire.

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REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES

Highways

Work is almost complete on the Stapleford–Sawston Cycleway, which is used by many of our youngsters riding to Sawston Village College.

High Green Layby: We await action from the County Council to undertake resurfacing and relining.

The District Council are investigating some cutting back on growth around trees on the De Freville cut through. We have also received a request to put up signs requesting dog walkers not to allow their dogs to foul the area.

Granhams Bridge Lining: The Local Highways Officer is investigating rectifications to the faded lining which was only put down a few months ago.

Footpath outside 167 Cambridge Road: An order has been placed by the County Council for remedial works to prevent flooding; this is scheduled for September.

Hinton Way: The County Council have undertaken extensive works on pot holes. Drain clearance work towards Shelford Bottom is yet to be completed as tree roots were found on the first visit and specialised equipment has to be ordered. The Parish Council has funded hedge cutting in Hinton Way.

2020–2021 Local Highway Improvement application: Speed bumps at various locations in the village are to be proposed.

Planning

Concerns were raised about lack of co-ordination between the District and County Councils regarding planning agreements on De Freville House, 56 High Green. District Councillors confirmed that efforts are being made to find a solution.

Recreation Ground and Pavilion

S&SS FC and Cricket Club use: Combined Youth Sections for football and cricket are coordinating well and it is good to see so many young people in organised activities on the Recreation Ground most evenings.

Feast Storage: A quotation has been requested for providing a secure exterior store area for Feast items, Parish Council cones, etc.

Parking on yellow lined areas in the Memorial Hall Car Park continues to be inconsiderate and a notice regarding parking in yellow hatched areas and outside of marked bays is needed.



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Tel: 01223 250558 Mobile: 07702 250557 Email: paul@neaveselectrical.co.uk Test for Asbestos Bore Holes (previously approved): The Parish Council will proceed with the test bore holes in the proposed Playscape skate park area at a suitable time in the future.

Water Leak in Pavilion Ladies' Toilet: The toilet remains closed. Sawston Flooring (the previous installer) has been contacted for a quotation to repair the flooring.

Update on Antisocial Behaviour: It was proposed

- to agree a process for reporting issues to Crimestoppers, Cambridgeshire Constabulary and the District Council by formally delegating reporting to Cllrs Price and Ashurst.
- the Clerk should update and add any policy documents necessary for agreement by the Parish Council.
- that the Pavilion and Recreation Committee should consider proposed stakeholder members and terms of reference for an Antisocial Behaviour Working Group.

Cemetery and Allotments

Annual invoices are outstanding and available plots are to be allocated. A committee meeting will be called after the return of the committee Chair from holiday in late August.

REPORTS FROM COORDINATING OFFICERS

Police The Clerk and Cllrs Price and Ashurst had a meeting with Sergeant Emma Hilson on 23 June. We had hoped Inspector Rogerson would attend but he was unavailable. A 15-minute meeting has been arranged with the Police and Crime Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite, on 26 July. Cllrs Fane and Ashurst will attend. The link for the public to report any observed crimes is *www.cambs.police.uk/report*.

Community Association No meeting has yet been held to discuss the possibility of the Parish Council funding a new kitchen.

Scout/SSYI doors: quotations are being organised to replace the existing wooden doors with metal ones to match the ones on the Memorial Hall.

SSYI: A new lease will be drafted by a solicitor; this is likely to take three to four months. A separate water meter needs to be installed so that SSYI can be charged for water and sewerage.

Buildings insurance is being finalised; we are aiming for one policy to cover the Memorial Hall, Scout and Guide HQ and SSYI, funded by the Parish Council. The Parish Council will not be responsible for contents or public liability. **Twinning Association** The village welcomed 51 visitors from France for the Twinning Event.

Feast The Feast and use of the new Recreation Ground services went well, with a few administrative issues. Following the Friday evening event, Dardan Security found the Pavilion had been left fully open with the interior lights on. This will be discussed at the Feast/Parish Council meeting.

The Clerk and Cllr Ashurst requested Mead Construction to change the concealed underground connections to surface cover plates due to the difficulty in locating them and the restoration work involved after their use this year. The cost is to be advised.

OTHER BUSINESS

New Councillor Vacancy

The status and timescale of the election or co-option of a new Councillor was discussed.

S137 Applications

Applications for £3,500 for the Mobile Warden Scheme and £2,500 for Sawston Village College Arts Appeal Fund were approved.

Cricket Ball Netting

Residential Area: A meeting with the two residents involved for a review of the current status and their views will be arranged, followed by a proposal to the next standard Parish Council meeting of an agreed solution.

Playground Area: The budget available is £10,000. No progress to date.

Parish Council Big Lunch

It was felt this was an excellent initiative which should be continued. However, use of the Memorial Hall kitchen area requires review. An afternoon tea event, similar to those held by The Feast and Twinning Association was considered as a suitable addition. Cllr Price will make proposals for an afternoon tea event to be held in early 2020.

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GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICES FLU CLINICS

The Department of Health have assured us that there will be no delivery problems, and this year we will be using a highly effective quadrivalent influenza vaccine.

Patients eligible for flu vaccinations include those in an 'at risk' group, e.g. asthma, COPD, chronic heart problems, diabetes, etc., carers and pregnant women. Children aged 2 to 10 and adults over 65 years old by 31 January 2020 are also eligible. Please contact us if you are not sure if you are eligible.

As well flu clinics held on weekdays, there will be Saturday morning clinics at the Great Shelford surgery on **12** and **26 October** and additional dates at our other surgeries. Granta patients can go to any surgery to have their vaccination so to book an appointment for your flu jab telephone 0300 234 5555.

Private Flu Vaccinations

If you would like a flu vaccination but are not eligible for the free vaccination, we also offer a private service via Granta Pharmacy. This is by far the easiest way of getting your private vaccination as we already have your medical records and there are no forms to fill in. Simply ring and book an appointment at any Granta surgery and pay on the day (£12.99).

In my last newsletter, I discussed the Parliamentary debate that I secured to highlight the funding issue facing Cambridgeshire's NHS services. We continue to be the third lowest funded county per head in England and I have been working closely with our Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) to evidence this. This was followed with a meeting with the Minister, Stephen Hammond, at which the Accountable Officer of our CCG, Jan Thomas presented our findings. The Minister was receptive to our points and explained that the funding formula which determines allocations could not respond quickly enough to our rapidly growing population. Mr Hammond committed to work with the CCG and NHS England to look again at ways to correct the historical underfunding and ensure future growth projections better reflect actual growth, thus reducing the mismatch with per patient funding allocations. I will continue to follow this up with the Department of Health and the CCG to ensure that the new administration honour this commitment.

In spite of the funding shortfall, our local NHS services continue to provide outstanding care and clinical expertise to those in need. I was delighted to nominate the Arthur Rank Hospice (representatives pictured below) for the NHS Parliamentary Care and Compassion Award and they proved to be worthy winners for the East of England category. The team at the Hospice go above and beyond to deliver high quality care with compassion and expertise.



Of course, summer holidays and warmer weather means that it's fete season here in South Cambridgeshire and I was delighted to open the Bar Hill Fete promptly followed by a stint in the food tent at **The Shelford Feast** Go West Evening (pictured below). Many hands really did make light work and the food on offer was outstanding.



Phil and I really enjoyed meeting new and old faces at both of these events and I look forward to seeing many more of you at local events in the constituency throughout the summer.

Great Shelford Parochial Charities owns 32 houses – one-, two- and threebedroom homes – at More's Meadow, where we provide affordable tenancies for Great Shelford people. We also own the allotments and open land at the bottom of More's Meadow, extending behind Bridge Close, Hobsons Acre, Walden Way and The Hectare.

The Charity is seeking planning permission to build a further 21 affordable homes on the site currently occupied by the allotments. The allotments would be relocated to the field behind The Hectare.

We have appointed an architect and engaged consultants to undertake the various surveys – landscape, ecology, archaeology, highways, drainage, etc. – required for planning consent.

Please join us at the drop-in session in the Memorial Hall. This gives an opportunity for villagers to meet the Trustees, inspect the plans, ask questions and share opinions.

SHELFORD SCHOOL

This time last year we were celebrating 175 years at Great and Little Shelford School with a service at St Mary's, and since then there have been many other reflective events in the Christian year.

On 24 July we attended a service celebrating our Year Six leavers, many of whom had been at the school for the full seven years. During the service each pupil shared a memory as they ended their primary school years and looked forward to their secondary education. All the churches from Great and Little Shelford were involved in the service. Year Six were encouraged to look forward to the future and 'be strong and courageous', a quote from one of the readings in the service. They were given Bibles and sent out into the future, encouraged to read Isaiah chapter 55 verse 6, the basis of the hymn which was sung as they left (*You Shall Go Out With Joy*). After the service Year 6 were welcomed to their celebration by the rest of the school and they enjoyed the refreshments provided by their parents, including a special cake.

A few days previously the governors said farewell to Carol Kellock and Bev Dasher who had, between them, given 51 years of service to the school. As a girl, Carol was a pupil, as were her own children. The Henry family has also just ended 18 years of having pupils at the school. Is this a record?

James Doubleday and Sarah Bullock have retired from the Board of Governors and we welcome two new parent governors, Maria Lazarus and Frances Dye. They will join the team of 14 governors from a variety of backgrounds and expertise who represent the Diocese of Ely, All Saints Little Shelford, St Mary's Great Shelford, the Local Authority, staff and parents. The governors support the school in many ways but primarily as 'critical friends', to oversee the financial performance of the school and to ensure clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction'. Of course, they can also be seen as being involved in other ways; for example, helping to run a stall at The Feast as well as writing this article every month!

At the start of the school year in September, 30 new pupils join the Reception Class as well as pupils in other years. We hope that they will soon settle into the school and become part of a very happy community. In seven years' time perhaps some of them will relate a memory from their time in Reception as they attend their leavers' service.

And finally, this time last year we welcomed our new Headteacher, Mr Chris Grey. Congratulations to him and all the staff for a very successful year as we look forward to the start of our new year.

MAGOG DOWN



Thirty years ago the Magog Trust purchased the arable farmland of Magog Down and started recreating chalk grassland and woods for recreation and conservation. However, as visitors to the Down who venture further than North Down will know, a substantial area of land (60 acres)

below the sheep pastures has been retained to grow arable crops – peas and wheat this year. These crops, which are excellently managed by Adam Rayner of David Rayner Farms, provide an income to help pay for part of the cost of running the Down.

Over the years regular visitors to the Down will have seen several different crops being grown and some may wonder what lies behind the choice of crops. Of course variation in market price plays a role in this but biological limitations are usually just as, or more, important. Autumn sown wheat (winter wheat) is

generally the most profitable crop grown in eastern England, so why doesn't Adam grow wheat year after year on the whole area? The reason is that after the first wheat crop the yield of grain falls away, due mainly to the root damage caused by takeall, a soil-borne disease which builds up under wheat (see picture). Attempts to breed takeall resistant wheats have failed so Adam always grows a non-cereal crop such as sugar beet, oilseed rape or peas before the wheat. These one year 'break' crops

reduce the level of take-all in the soil ensuring that the subsequent wheats
achieve their full potential. Barley is less damaged by take-all than wheat and so in some years you will see autumn-sown barley on the Down and enjoy the waves progressing through the barley as the plants sway in the wind.

For many years sugar beet has been a profitable and reliable break crop for loamy soils like those of Magog Down. However, although Adam still grows beet on the Down, it has become less attractive, partly because of the decline in market price, but also because of the recent ban on the use of neonicotinoid insecticides. This ban has left the crop at risk of attack from an aphid-borne virus potentially causing a major reduction in the yield of sugar. Similarly, oilseed rape has become a much less reliable break crop because the neonicotinoid ban has greatly increased the risk of crop failure caused by the cabbage stem flea beetle – readers may have noticed much less yellow in local fields.

This year Adam has decided to grow peas as the break crop; it is harvested early giving plenty of time to establish winter wheat at the optimum date and is not affected by the neonicotinoid ban. However peas require long-term protection from birds with gas guns which, unfortunately, has meant that several dog owners have had to find other places to walk until after harvest. The gas guns have been successful in keeping the pigeons away with only two small damaged patches near Vestey Wood.

The reservoir area was opened for public access last year following amelioration of the former gravel quarry. There is a meadow flora around the reservoir and some interesting bird life including goosanders, great crested grebes, tufted ducks and a pair of common terns on the small island. Sturdy footwear is advised.

Meet at the car park next to the reservoir. Directions: go south out of Stapleford and take the first right after the bridge, turning up the former quarry service road. Continue for 250 yards and the small car park is on the right. Map reference TL471511.

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Old Rews

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

27 September 1839

TRESPASS – Elijah Tarrant was charged on the information of Henry Grain with having trespassed in a certain field in search of game. The defendant was convicted in the full penalty. Purcell Sadler was charged on the information of Mr. Headley, with trespassing in search of game on land belonging to Mr. Skinner. Mr. H. Grain saw the defendant beating a field of potatoes with a dog. He had a gun and witness saw him shoot a bird, believed to be a partridge. The defendant was fined in penalty and costs £2.13s.

22 September 1841

SHELFORD NATIONAL SCHOOLS – A general MEETING of the subscribers to the Great and Little Shelford Schools, now building, will be held at the Swan Public House at G.S. at 12 o'clock, on Tuesday the 27th inst. To receive the Report of the Building Committee, and for making further arrangements for completing their charitable objects.

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BUS STOPS



Eight new bus stop signs (commonly known as flags) have been erected in Great Shelford along Hinton Way, Mingle Lane and the High Street. These replace old and dilapidated ones on the No 31 bus route. The signs have been made by Steve Edmondson of Haslingfield with help from me. Also receiving attention were a number of timetable cases where the acrylic front panel was broken, missing or had become opaque with age; new acrylic panels and timetables have been placed in these

Steve decided to do something himself about the poor state of bus stops and timetables on local bus routes after he found that Cambridgeshire County Council had no money available for bus stop/timetable replacements despite subsidising the noncommercially profitable bus services. Steve has already replaced signs in his own area around Haslingfield, and in Hauxton and Stapleford, where

he has received donations to costs (each bus top flag costs £25) from the Parish Councils. It is hoped that Great Shelford Parish Council will also make a contribution to the cost of the new signs in Great Shelford.

The No 31 bus runs between Fowlmere to Addenbrooke's on five return trips per day, serving Thriplow, Newton, Hauxton, Little Shelford, Great Shelford and Stapleford.
