We will shortly be commenting on the consultation being circulated by Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority on behalf of the Government about the proposed Oxford—Cambridge Arc. This is a government initiative for growth in the area between Oxford and Cambridge, aiming to create jobs, drive investment, protect and enhance the environment and provide infrastructure in the area. #### ANTHONY BROWNE MP



Last month, I was happy to welcome Simon Blanchflower, the Chief Executive of East West Rail, and his team to South Cambridgeshire. I was able to show Simon some of the communities that would be impacted by East West Rail, including Great Shelford. Since my election, I have received a great number of emails, letters and messages from the people of Great Shelford, as I am sure Mr Blanchflower has too. I am very aware of the strength of feeling regarding the proposals.

As such, I felt it was important that those in charge at East West Rail visited our part of the world so that they could experience it in person. Having grown up in South Cambridgeshire, I know as well as anybody that our communities are more than just names on maps.

It is for the same reason that I have been vocal in my opposition to the Local Plan. I know the people of my constituency to be welcoming and hospitable. I remain supportive of sustainable development. The Local Plan is not sustainable development. It threatens to fundamentally alter our way of life.

Over the last year, I have been emphasising to the Environment Agency the water shortages in South Cambridgeshire. Therefore, I welcome news that South Cambs has officially been designated a water-stressed area. As I am sure many of you will agree, we need new, innovative thinking to overcome this serious issue. I look forward to participating in conversations to find a solution. One thing is for sure – the answer is not 49,000 new homes!

As ever, my team and I remain committed to serving the people of Great Shelford and South Cambridgeshire and I would encourage any of you who need assistance to get in touch.

#### **NEW BEGINNINGS**

It's once again that time of year. Young people are returning to school after a long summer break and the autumn season is upon us. In the past week I've been chatting with my youth group about the beginning of the new academic year. Would they still be able to write, and remember their way to the canteen?

We talked about some greater unknowns too, recognising that there are many possibilities to how this New Year could unfold. Would this be a mundane and ordinary year? Would this be the best school year of their lives? Would it be riddled with difficulties and challenges? The young people expressed mixed feelings about their inability to accurately predict what's ahead.

Similarly, we can't tell what this season has in store for us. But rather than focus on what could be, what if we take each day as it comes? Admittedly, that's not always an easy ask. I wonder what thoughts first greet you in the morning. Some might feel inundated by the burdens of the day and struggle to see where their blessings are hidden.

Learning to rest our minds and live in the present can be difficult when we can't mechanically shut down the barrage of anxious thoughts and worries but this verse reminds me about fresh starts and finding opportunities in our daily living:

The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. 'The Lord is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in him.' (Lamentations 3:22–24)

I'm reminded that it's never too late to start over: to reinvent ourselves, to adopt a new perspective, to read and remember the goodness of God, to pursue life-giving activities and to be inspired by nature. Today my prayer for us is that regardless of the uncertainties we face, we'd see each morning a brandnew chance to start again.

#### SCHOOL NEWS

It's been wonderful to welcome Great and Little Shelford Primary pupils back to school for the autumn term. After an extremely challenging 18 months for teaching staff, a more normal school environment has been warmly welcomed. The class bubble system and restrictive playtime routines have been removed, allowing assemblies and conventional break time play. We have also welcomed our new reception class, who have settled in well, and four new pupils in other school years. Our new Head Boy, Eddie, and Head Girl, Gwen, and their deputies, Reuben and Erica, have also keenly commenced their duties.

One of the major highlights of the return to school at the start of September for the pupils was the shared outside spaces. It has been wonderful to see the mixed age play that is so characteristic of the long-standing vision of the school. This has included exploring some of the new playground markings that were agreed last term by our school council.

We also look forward to our buddy systems returning, most notably our Reception pupils and their Year 6 buddies, along with our reading buddies across the school years. These have always been a particular highlight of the school community, but unfortunately with the restrictive class bubbles we were unable to arrange them during the last academic year. It has been a welcome relief that current guidance allows for a more normal school environment once again.

At the start of the Autumn term our Headteacher, Mr Grey, launched a new curriculum thread – IDENTITY. The topics for each class link to the theme of identity. This may take the form of investigating how our country has been

altered in history, for example Year 2's topic on the Great Fire of London; Year 3's topic on What happened in 1066? and Year 4 studying The Romans: who were they and how did they change Britain? Alternatively, in Year1 and Year 6 this new curriculum thread might explore our own identity or the identity of others in topics such as Marvellous Me, Shelford Stars and HMS Beagle (why did it go? and where did it sail?) Meanwhile Year 5 takes an even wider stance with exploring the identity of our planet from the stargazers perspective.

The pressure on the school budget is always a challenge for the leadership team. At Shelford we are very lucky to have a wonderfully supportive PTA who work tirelessly to raise much-needed funds for the school. This year they are aiming to raise £4,000 to buy additional resources and equipment for the next academic year. While the school has dedicated budgets for each subject area these are very limited, often a few hundred pounds each. This means there is very little left over to fund additional equipment and resources to enrich the teaching of the subjects and make it as fun and interactive as possible for the children. If you are able to donate, it would be very much appreciated and make a big difference to the children's learning experience.

#### **2G3S**

At the end of August we held a nature walk along Jenny's path, from Church Street towards Hauxton. John O'Boyle writes: 'At the start of the walk we heard the joyful sound of bells ringing for a wedding at nearby St. Mary's church. A well-informed local historian was a member of our party and told us that the path was named in honour of Jenny Morris who campaigned for many years to obtain a right of way for this path to Hauxton and led to its permissive footpath status. She also pointed out the archaeological site near the end of the walk where Saxon grain storage pits had been excavated. There were several impressive large oak and ash trees seen during our excursion and enormous walnut trees with immature nuts covered in green cases. A day-flying moth stimulated discussion on the difference between moths and butterflies, the conclusion being there is no clear distinction. Several species of slug were active in the grass verges and we discussed the 'baddies' which attack garden plants and also the 'goodies', which are carnivorous and consume the 'baddies', in addition to snails.'

Hopefully some of you attended Pippa Heylings' talk on *Tackling Climate Change and Biodiversity at a Local Level*. As Chair of SCDC's Planning Committee and of their Climate and Environment Advisory Committee she is a powerful voice locally. After explaining why we have to reduce our carbon emissions urgently to prevent some of the irreversible tipping points that will lock us into large temperature rises, she pointed out the public health effects of a rise in temperatures.

Pippa then went on to talk about what SCDC is doing to reduce carbon and boost biodiversity. They have a Doubling Nature strategy for developers to keep to, a Zero Carbon Strategy (which includes giving grants to villages to undertake green projects that involve communities), and the forthcoming Local Plan stresses the importance of placing developments where the least travelling is involved. The shortage of water and threat to our chalk streams is also part of their planning. The government has told local authorities how many houses to build in their areas, and if those numbers are not planned for in the Local Plan the government can take it over and we lose local control – so the councils' hands are tied to some extent. SCDC also has details of

trusted companies and fitters for renewable energy changes to your house.

What can you do? Apart from reducing your own carbon footprint, take part in consultations by SCDC and other local authorities; hold them to account if carbon emissions will increase as a result of their plans; write to our MP to challenge national decisions and proposals that affect climate change such as new road plans, or the pressure to build a lot of houses when the water infrastructure has not been sorted out, or the new planning bill that takes away local control, or the Environment Bill that wants 10% biodiversity gain in new developments when at least 20% is needed.

#### OLD RCHS

#### **Extracts from the Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868**

Compiled and republished by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

22 October 1842

GROSS ASSAULT – Jane Powter was charged by Sarah Rollinson or Rawlinson, with having grossly assaulted her on the 10<sup>th</sup> of October and used her shameful. It appeared that the greatest miracle which had been heard of for many a day, was her escape with life from the hands of the defendant. She deposed that on various previous occasions, the defendant had solemnly sworn to "brain her" and "do it for her" and, on the day in question, the complainant was running after the defendant's little boy to reward him for some iniquities perpetrated towards herself, when the defendant "made no more to do, but up with her fist and hit me this unlucky blow" – (pointing to an eye that evidenced the receipt of a severe thump of some sort). "I was unsensed at once." Defendant followed up this attack by tearing complainant's hair, pulling her cap to pieces, and rending her gown; and finally gave fierce utterance to a determination to "fight her."

In this outrage defendant was assisted by her three children, who severally used the extreme of their little exertions to further their mother's questionable intention. Defendant of course denied the entire statement, attributing the black eye to a knock against a door, and declaring that, in her anxiety to prevent her child's throat being cut with an oyster-knife by the bloodthirsty complainant, she had torn "all her hair off her head". This description was accompanied with some figurative language peculiar to the defendant's phraseology, which being replied to in a similar way by the complainant, the magistrates conveyed to the ladies their request that they should with all convenient speed get on the other side of the door.

Peace being restored by this arrangement, the bench were enabled quietly to fine Mrs Powter 6d and 11s 6d costs. Mrs Powter expressed a strongly worded opinion that she "didn't intend to pay."

#### 'HAND-STITCHED STORIES' ARE COMING TO STAPLEFORD GRANARY

CEO Kate Romano writes about the extraordinary tactile world of artist Sabine Kaner

Four years ago, I was a freelance producer and working with my good friend, composer Matthew Kaner. We stayed at Matt's parents' house whilst we were filming in Bristol. Wandering around the house, I was immediately drawn to the vibrant, visceral textiles on the walls: hands, gloves, leaves, buttons, string ... scraps and fragments of old fabric, lovingly and unexpectedly given centre stage, bound into a new colourful context by intricate hand-stitch. 'Who made these?' I asked Matt. 'My mum' he said.

Matt's parents were away and so I didn't get to talk to Sabine Kaner about her work, but over the years, I met her a few times at concerts. Sabine is warm, astute, deeply honest, thoughtful and modest and I liked her immediately. Four years ago, her textiles were not so well known. 'My mum isn't good at promoting her work' Matt had confided in me (with a gentle sense of frustration) as we both admired the pieces on the walls, which were clearly very special indeed.

Sabine grew up in London during the 1960s. Both her parents were immigrants. Her mother was from Germany and her Jamaican father was one of thousands



of Windrush migrants arriving in the UK. Mixed marriages were frowned upon at the time and there was racism and bullying. The family lived in poor housing, sharing just one room with inadequate facilities.

Whilst struggling to integrate on a personal and social level, she excelled at art at school and with the support of a good art teacher, she was accepted to study an art foundation course.



at Saint Martins in London. She was the first person in her family to go on to higher education. A visit to an exhibition at the Haywood Gallery in 1979 changed everything. *Outsiders – an art without precedent or tradition* was curated by pioneering poet and art dealer Victor Musgrave, the first gallerist to show Bridget Riley in Britain. There were over 400 works by 42 artists from France, Switzerland, Germany, Austria, England and the USA. There were drawings, paintings, sculpted wood, stuffed sculpture, mobiles and large-scale architectural structures. Musgrave described the work as 'lyrical, powerful, delicate' and 'violent'.

In an interview for *textileartist.org*, Sabine spoke of the immediate impact of the exhibition on her. 'It suggested to me the power that art could have in documenting an artist's life. It was also a way to explore identity, emotions and experiences whilst avoiding traditional art materials, either by choice or necessity'


But it would be a few more years until Sabine rejected traditional art materials to find her own unique voice in nontraditional ones — charity-shop finds, locally sourced felt, strands of her mother's embroidery thread. She studied fine art print-making at Manchester but to her delight, realised that there was an option to specialise in embroidery. She fell in love with textiles and rekindled a childhood passion for sewing.

Like her parents, Sabine Kaner worked hard, quietly. The immigrant experience has left a deep fingerprint on all she creates, as have the experiences of her life. Looking at Sabine's growing body of work now, I recall that strong feeling of 'sensing a story' in the art on the walls of her home four years ago. You can't take in Sabine's work quickly. It's easy to be initially beguiled by the warm, soft colourful felt and wool. But her work consists of layers – visual, emotional, political, social, cultural – and there is meaning in everything. A grey glove ('emotional distance' says Kaner)... a deep red cut ('blood and urgency' she says). Sleeves are another recurring icon ('wearing your heart on your sleeve'). Intermingling scattered swirls are flanked by two pieces of an old purple hand-knitted jumper ... 'My daughter and I both wore it until it fell apart,' says Sabine.

At Stapleford Granary, we'll be exhibiting 15 artworks by Sabine Kaner plus two pieces of bespoke furniture made by her husband, Professor Jake Kaner. Through film, conversation and selected items we'll be exploring her

fascinating creative process – from sketch-books and the reusing of fabric oddments to experimental stitches, print experiments and mark making, all intuitively bound together by a love of colour. We'll also be learning about the music she listens to as she works - mostly jazz and the music of her composer son, Matthew.

Four years after I first saw it, it's wonderful to see Sabine's work starting to attract more and more attention. I'm so proud that we are able to bring *hand-Stitched Stories* to the Granary and hope you'll join us to launch this very special exhibition on Friday 22 October (evening) and Saturday 23 October (mid-morning). The exhibition will run until 22 January 2022 See *What's On* page 43 for booking details.

#### NEWS FROM ARTHUR RANK

#### The Retail Hub

It has been over a year since the Hospice took over and transformed Unit 35 on the Eastern Counties Leather Industrial Estate, between Sawston and Pampisford, into a busy shopping hub. Due to the pandemic and various lockdowns, plans for the Retail Hub's original opening have had to be postponed several times. However, customers are now able to once again visit and shop for good quality furniture and discounted bargains between 10am and 4pm, Tuesday to Saturday.

Due to limitations on space and rules related to Covid, there have been limits on the volume of donations which can be safely accepted, meaning that the Hub has periodically been unable to accept donations. 

#### **GREAT SHELFORD POSTCARD NO 4**

There was no identification on the front of this postcard and it hadn't been through the post. Someone had written on the back 'Great Shelford, Cambs'. To see if this was correct, my wife and I visited St Mary's over 20 years ago. It certainly wasn't the front view but walking around the back was like going back in time.

The school is just the other side of the wall on the left. The tall 'angel' grave nearby belongs to Henry Albert Kimpton who was killed in the railway disaster at Grantham in September 1906, aged 52. When we visited the churchyard, there was a grave to the left belonging to William Thos. Sindall who died in May 1923, aged 37. The card must therefore have been issued between these dates.

On Sunday 29 August 2021 I revisited the church yard and was dismayed how overgrown the area on the card was, with thick undergrowth and high bushes and trees. The vicar informed me that one of the councils couldn't afford to clear the area. What are your reader's views on this?

PS. My parents were married in St Mary's in February 1927.






