SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 15 SEPTEMBER 2021

No members of the public were present.

REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES

Reports from the County and District Councillors had been circulated prior to the meeting. District Cllr. Sample provided a further update on the proposed Local Plan. During the discussion it was noted that during a recent housing need assessment, it was recorded that 100 affordable houses are needed in Great Shelford. The various committees will bring their comments on the Local Plan to the Full Council meeting ready for the public consultation in November.

FINANCE

It was noted that Cllr. Price and the Clerk would be attending playground inspection training in order to carry out weekly visual inspections of the new playground once complete. It was agreed to appoint Online Playgrounds to carry out quarterly operational inspections and Play Inspection Company to carry out the annual inspection.

There had not been much communication about the Rugby Club's firework display. Cllr. Arnold asked if it would be possible for the Feast to arrange a display if the Rugby Club could not. It was agreed that if either organisation was prepared to do an event, the council would donate £2,500 towards it.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION

Council Branding The Communications Working Group had been tasked with looking at branding for the Council in an attempt to help promote the Council as it increases its visual presence in the village and moves forward with initiatives. Three logos were presented for consideration and one was selected.

Oxford-Cambridge Arc It was agreed that the response to the public consultation should be delegated to the Planning Committee.

Neighbourhood Plan A group of Councillors and residents have been meeting to look at the possibility of resurrecting the Stapleford & Shelford Neighbourhood Plan. A document produced by Cllr Kettel had been circulated to members. It was noted that a Neighbourhood Plan would help the community influence development within the two villages and that the group would need external support to write the plan. It was agreed that Great Shelford Parish Council would continue to support the Neighbourhood Plan and that Cllr. Disley would attend a meeting on 22 September.

HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT

The Scoping Document to look at highway improvements around Church Street, High Street and Woollards Lane was considered by members. It was agreed that the Scoping Document be circulated to various transport consultants and a budget of £25,000 per annum for the next two years be included in the budget for this potential highway initiative.

The ongoing dispute over the power supply for streetlights on private roads was discussed and it was agreed that the Parish Council would pay for the lights up until the end of the financial year (31 March 2022). After this date they will only pay for streetlights where there is public benefit i.e. public access along a private road. The Clerk will write to the residents to let them know of the outcome and the next steps some may need to take.

It was noted that the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group were still interested in looking at a non-motorised route to Little Shelford and happy to explore options. The Group would also like to explore the potential for private enforcement of badly parked vehicles on the road while the discussions at County and District Council are ongoing.

PLANNING

Stapleford wish to apply for a Rule 6 status in respect of the Appeal for a retirement village on the land between Haverhill Road and Hinton Way. This would allow them to speak at the Appeal. Stapleford would like to include the comments from Great Shelford which were given in response to the original application. It was agreed to support Stapleford with the Appeal.

ENVIRONMENT AND BIODIVERSITY

The District Council are offering six trees to each village as part of the carbon offset. It was agreed to accept the offer and, with support from the audit, to plant new trees in a suitable location in the village.

The Clerk and Cllr. Talbott had attended a presentation from the County Council about communities taking part in the Queen's Green Canopy to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee in 2022. It was agreed that Great Shelford should take part and include a tree for this when planting the six above.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

Council support has been requested for a community drive in carol event at Christmas. It was agreed to support the event, based on the same amount spent in 2020, but the Council would prefer to see the event held at the Memorial Hall again. Friends of Great Shelford Parish Church needed a Parish Council representative following the retirement of Mr Nightingale. Cllr. Stanton volunteered to be the representative.

The District Council has some funding for 'Changing Places' toilets which provide facilities for the disabled. It was agreed that the Parish Council would express an interest.



PARISH COUNCIL OCTOBER NEWS

As we roll into autumn, I wanted to update you on what additional changes we have implemented, decisions we have made and improvements we hope you will see in the village.

Great Shelford Village News

As you know it was our intention to not provide the overview of the minutes, but to just provide you with a monthly update of other news. However, there was a very strong feeling from residents that they still wanted to see the minutes in the *Village News* – so we are doing both. Our thanks go to the Editorial Team who take the time to provide you with the overview of the minutes each month.

Community Awards

Great Shelford Parish Council has agreed to create some community awards to recognise the work of community spirited residents within the village. Details will be finalised at the meeting of the Council on 20 October so please keep an eye on the website, Facebook and noticeboards for more information. It is intended to hand out the prizes at the Village meeting in March.

Ground Care

We have been working hard looking at the work carried out by Seamus and that of the ground care contractor. As of October, Seamus has a new job title which we hope will reflect the role he plays in the village – he is Great Shelford's Ranger. In addition, we have created a more formal specification for the grounds maintenance and have gone out to tender asking companies to tender for the ground care for the next 3 years (2022-2024). It should be noted that from January 2022 Seamus will be responsible for the maintenance of the Cemetery which we trust will be a welcome change.

New Website

By the time you receive this Village News, we hope our new website will be up and running. There is no change in the website address: www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk. With it comes a new logo which we hope will reflect the aspirations of the village.

Greater Cambridge Local Plan

We mentioned previously that the site between Hinton Way and Mingle Lane has been submitted as one of the proposed sites for the next Local Plan 2040. It is our intention to comment on this, as you may wish to, once the public consultation is open within the next couple of months. We will be looking at potentially holding a public meeting to discuss this. Please keep an eye in the usual places for further information.



I wonder how you feel about being in the dark?

When I was a girl, I was scared of the dark. Being in dark places was frightening because my overripe imagination would conjure up images of what might be lurking in the shadows, waiting to pounce. There was always a sense of relief when I was able to reach a place of safety, a place of light, where I felt protected. Over the years I have managed to control my imagination but I have also gained confidence from knowing that in those times of darkness I never walk alone because Jesus walks right beside me – my comforter, my protector and my friend.

As we move into November and the dark winter months there seems to be much darkness all around us, and I recognise that darkness takes many different forms. There's the darkness which comes when daylight decreases, when we've passed the autumnal equinox and the clocks have been put back, the nights become longer and the days much shorter. There's a darkness we refer to when we speak of the news of all that is going on in the world, stories of problems and disasters which may seem like giant bogeymen waiting to ambush and overwhelm us, and can make the whole world seem a pretty dark place right now.

Then there's that unsettling sense of suspecting you are being kept in the dark, of not knowing what is happening, perhaps feeling alienated or fearing an underhand subterfuge is taking place. There's a darkness that comes with ill health, that can cloud our minds and swamp our spirits and steal away our joy. Yet, in all of this darkness, as I discovered all those years ago, there is always hope, there is always a new dawn and there is always someone who walks with you - a comforter, protector and friend. Jesus is the light for the world, he is the bringer of a light that shines in the darkness and the darkness will never overcome it.

In the month ahead you may experience dark days, whatever form they take, I pray that you will recognise there is One who walks with you in the darkness and you will be reassured by the hope and peace that He brings.

I am glad to see the new Shelford Playscape coming along nicely. I am sure it will serve the children of Great Shelford now and long into the future. The Fun Run was a heartening reminder of the strength of community spirit and how fruitful it can be.

I was fortunate enough to visit Scotsdales garden centre in Great Shelford last week. I was intrigued to learn more about the shortage of botanists and gardeners in the country, I will certainly keep this in mind for future conversations with Ministers.

I also want to thank the hundreds of Great Shelford residents who responded to my East West Rail Survey. Locally, results

show that 55 per cent of respondents from Great Shelford do not currently support the construction of East West Rail, with 32 per cent in favour and 13 per cent yet to make up their minds. Indeed, 41 per cent of you called for the cancellation of the railway altogether. The potential usage of the railway by residents was also called into question, with 70 per cent of respondents stating that they would never use East West Rail.

I recently visited Great Shelford with East West Rail's Chief Executive and senior members of his team, highlighting among other concerns the difference in noise between an electric passenger train and a freight train. According to the survey, this concerns 89 per cent of residents and I can assure you all that whatever form East West Rail takes, if any, I am pushing for full electrification along the route and clear rules on freight travel.

This is the kind of vital information we need to ensure East West Rail hears and understands. As I pass your comments to East West Rail and the responsible ministers, I'll be asking for further clarification and far better consultation in early 2021 before any final decision is made on the South Cambs section

Extracts from the Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and republished by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

11 November 1853

LECTURE – On Monday evening the 5th inst. In the National School Room, Mr. Worth delivered a lecture on the planetary system, illustrated by diagrams after which followed a series of dissolving views, descriptive of eminent and illustrious persons, remarkable places and events, ships, battles etc altogether very interesting. The lecture was attended by a respectable and attentive audience who were evidently highly pleased with what they heard and saw.

11 November 1854

MORE EMIGRATION – Shelford and Stapleford are about to be deprived of some more of their able bodied labourers, who it is stated will leave these parishes on the 14th inst. For Australia. Mr. Hayes Powter, the returned and lucky emigrant, we hear is again about to return to the golden regions as he states his exchequer is nearly run out, and Shelford fields will not replenish it, he therefore intends to try his fortune once more at the Antipodes.

November 1854

THE CRIMEA – Three fortunate young soldiers of the 20th Regiment, who fought at the battle of Inkermann, natives of Great Shelford, have been preserved. One of them, Charles Dockerell, writing from the heights of Sebastopol, on November 12, to his father at Shelford says, "We have killed and taken from 15 to 20 thousand of Russians. The early part of the battle on the morning of the 5th of November was very wet and dirty: we are yet very uncomfortable, work very hard, and have only two good nights' rest in a week. Myself, Wm Huckle, and David Trudget have all escaped and are well." These three fine powerful young men were very lately farm labourers in the village: their mothers and fathers are delighted at hearing of their wonderful preservations.

29 November 1862

THE DISTRESS – Two sermons were preached by the Rev. A. T. Crisford, on Sunday last, for the Distressed Operatives* and the two collections amounted to £19.12s.0d.

^{*}The Lancashire Cotton Famine (1861–65), was a depression in the textile industry of North West England, brought about by overproduction in a time of contracting world markets. It coincided with the interruption of baled cotton imports caused by the American Civil War and caused great suffering amongst communities that relied on cotton mills for their living.

CARBON CAPTURE AT MORE'S MEADOW

The Parochial Charities have received a £4,610 grant to plant native trees on their land at More's Meadow. Awarded by South Cambridgeshire District Council under its Zero Carbon Communities Scheme, the money will purchase 22 mature trees including field maple, hornbeam, hazel, hawthorn, beech, crab apple, oak, wild service and rowan.

Thanking SCDC for their generosity, Parochial Charities trustee, Keith Sugden said, "The Charity has a number of initiatives underway to enhance the village environment and combat climate change. Already, we have laid out new allotments, planted some 80 trees - including a community orchard – established a community garden and laid wheelchair accessible paths alongside our raised planting beds."

The Charity's land, approximately seven acres between Cambridge Road and the railway, is open to all and there are three points of access: at the end of Bridge Close / More's Meadow, at the end of The Hectare and via the railway footbridge. The Hectare entrance is designed for wheelchair access.

SHELFORD RAILWAY CROSSING

Sometimes described as "a necessary evil" by those who are held up at the crossing barriers, but appreciated as the downside of having our own railway station, the railway crossing at Station Road has recently been named the worst in the country after eleven people ignored the barriers, bells and flashing lights

to cross the tracks in 2020.



There are some 6000 level crossings in Britain and increasing numbers are being closed for safety reasons. Two rarely used crossings have been effectively closed between Shelford and Cambridge as Network Rail reduce the risk in light of deaths such as those of two girls at Elsenham in 2005.

Network Rail claim to have closed over 1250 level crossings in their commitment towards providing a safer railway.

Although the risk for individual users is assessed as moderate, the collective risk is viewed as high because 130 trains per day travel through the station at up to 90 miles per hour. The estimated daily usage is 4401 vehicles and 871 pedestrians or cyclists per day.

The obvious message to people using the Shelford Station or crossing the tracks is "Don't take risks". Having "the worst railway crossing in the country" is not something to be proud of

Coronavirus (COVID-19) booster vaccine

The coronavirus boosters are being given by NHS vaccination centres in our area and you will be contacted direct when it is your turn to book. The booster vaccine dose helps improve the protection you have from your first two doses of the vaccine and also helps gives you longer term protection against getting seriously ill from COVID-19.

Who can get a COVID-19 booster vaccine?

Booster vaccine doses are available to those most at risk from COVID-19 who have had a second dose of vaccine at least 6 months ago. This includes:

- People aged 50 and over
- People who live and work in care homes
- Frontline health and social care workers
- People aged 16 and over with a health condition that puts them at high risk of getting seriously ill from COVID-19
- Carers aged 16 and over
- People aged 16 and over who live with someone who is more likely to get infections (such as someone who has HIV, has had a transplant or is having certain treatments for cancer, lupus or rheumatoid arthritis)

If you are pregnant and in one of the eligible groups listed above, you can also get a booster dose.



GREAT SHELFORD LIBRARY'S YEAR OF THE PLANET



To coincide with the start of COP26 (The United Nations Climate Change Conference) on 31 October, the Friends of Great Shelford Library and Cambridgeshire Libraries have teamed up to offer a year round selection of books to delight, amaze and inform you about the wonders of our planet and the challenges it is facing. The Friends are funding the purchase of a range of new books on nature and wildlife, gardening for wildlife, ecology, climate change and on ways to live a greener, more climate

friendly life. These will come on stream over the course of the year.

Our first offering of books – available from the end of October - will include Derek Niemann's 'A Tale of Trees', an account of Waresley Wood, which is just 20 miles from Shelford, and a history of woodlands since the Second World War; 'Woodlands' by Oliver Rackham, Cambridge scholar and expert on woodlands, who taught us to value England's ancient woodland again; and Isabella Tree's 'Rewilding', inspiring a whole new movement within conservation and is a heartening read about how to recover biodiversity.

Zoologist E O Wilson has been called "one of the 20th century's greatest thinkers" and the New Darwin, yet, for all his eminence, his books are very easy to read. Try "The Diversity of Life", "Half Earth" or "Letters to a Young Scientist". Mike Berners Lee's 'How Bad are Bananas' is a fun book, but with the serious goal of informing you about how to reduce your carbon footprint, while Guy Pearse's 'Greenwash Effect' will give you insight into the ways businesses try to deceive us into thinking they're green.

Authors Tony Juniper, James Lovelock, Jonathan Porritt and Elizabeth Kolbert all in different ways shed light on the climate crisis and our need to address our carbon emissions and over consumption of resources.

For younger readers we have many great reads, including 'Fantastically Great Women who Saved the Planet', 'Greta's Story' and 'The Book of Brilliant Bugs'.

Over the coming months we will be adding further titles to the collection, including some 'spotter's guides' to help you explore the natural world when you're out and about. So do come and browse the collection. It will only increase your wonder and your desire to care for the planet.


