SUMMARY FROM THE MINUTES OF THE FINANCE AND GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE MEETING ON 8 DECEMBER 2021

One member of the public was present.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION

The committee considered the situation with leases for the Tennis Club, the Scout Hut and the Memorial Hall. The Clerk will continue to liaise with the clubs and associations.

A revised health and safety policy statement was approved.

The Scheme of Delegation was approved. Terms of Reference for Committees and Working Groups were approved with amendments to move the responsibility for the Clay Pit to the Recreation and Pavilion Committee.

The protocol to mark the death of a Senior Head of State was approved.

FINANCE

Three quotations for an IT solution to meet the needs of the council were considered and it was agreed to work with Microshade VSM at an initial set up fee of £479 + VAT followed by a subscription of £2,154.96 per annum. This will allow Councillors to archive all their emails, there will be a shared calendar and better access to documents. It also means that if an assistant is found for the Clerk, there will be no issues with software being on a standalone machine.

Cllr Watson provided an update with the imminent arrival of a Transport and Works Act Order. The Transport and Traffic Infrastructure Working Group will consider how to seek the views of residents.

The Clerk presented a draft budget for 2022/23. After a very lengthy discussion, it was agreed that the Clerk and the Chairman look at the possibility of taking some money from Earmarked Reserves to lessen the Precept required and bring these to the January meeting for authorisation to submit the Precept request.

CONTRACTS

Within a closed session, it was agreed to use Brookfield Contracting for the grounds maintenance in the village from January 2022 for three years, at a cost of £17,916 per annum.

Renaming of the Pavilion

You may have seen from the last Village News that Great Shelford Parish Council (GSPC) wishes to recognise the many years of service Charlie Nightingale has given to the village, the Parish Council and the District Council. In order to do this, we have decided to rename the sports Pavilion, *The Charlie Nightingale Sports Pavilion*. We will be looking to formally acknowledge this at the Parish Meeting on 3 March 2022.

Elections

In May this year all 15 seats on the Parish Council are up for election. We would love to see some new faces on the Council (we currently have three vacancies) and we would like to have two thirds of the seats elected in order that we can strive for Foundation Council Status, if not Quality Council Status and to maintain our 'General Power of Competence' (GPC) which we obtained late in 2021. Holding the GPC means that we have slightly fewer restrictions on what we can and cannot do (providing that it's not illegal!).

So what does a Parish Council do?

There are 3 categories of responsibility which include:

- 1. Representing the local community of Great Shelford
- 2. Delivering services to meet local needs
- 3. Striving to improve the quality of life in the parish

In addition to the above, we provide, maintain or contribute to:

- Playgrounds, open spaces and recreational space
- Litter bins, dog bins, bus shelters and street lighting
- The Cemetery on Cambridge Road
- Allotments at the Cemetery and Stonehill Road
- Rayment's car park on Woollards Lane
- Local highway initiatives
- Grants to local groups and organisations

We are a statutory consultee on local planning applications.

A Councillor is someone in the community who residents will look to for help, support and guidance. As a Councillor you will have the ability to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve and you will see our community change for the better as a result of the decisions you have helped to make. As the role is the first rung on the ladder of public office there is plenty of training available.



GREAT SHELFORD FREE CHURCH (GSFC)

Sometimes I am surprised by the number of times my grandchildren will want to have the same story read to them, again and again. Children have a liking for routines and traditions because there is an element of security in the familiar. Perhaps you also like to read a book several times, or more commonly, watch a film several times over, because in many ways adults are not that different from children; we too, often feel more comfortable with what we know, which is why the constant changes we have faced during the pandemic have made us feel vulnerable and disorientated.

I read recently that the film, 'The Holiday' was shown on television more than fifty times over the Christmas period, and I expect there will be those who watched it more than once during that period of time, even if they had seen it several times already.

My husband can't understand why I would want to see a film again that we have watched before, or why I might want to re-read a favourite book, and yet I know that I will always perceive something new, something that seemed inconsequential the first time I noticed it, but now as it catches my attention I realise its significance. I also simply enjoy meeting characters I have come to know well over the course of watching and re-watching a film or reading and re-reading a book.

At the beginning of this year, GSFC engaged in a Bible Reading Marathon, which entailed reading aloud the whole of the New Testament and Psalms over the course of four days. During that time all the readers remarked what a blessing it was to hear God's word spoken out and to notice verses or stories that had not impacted them in the past, or which had been forgotten, or misremembered. It certainly was an encouragement to commit to reading and re-reading the scriptures, which can so often be taken for granted.

Whether you are already an avid Bible reader, or if you've only read parts of it long ago, or whether it's something you have never really engaged with, I encourage you to have another look at the book which is the bestselling book of all time. The Bible has sold more than five billion copies, has been translated into more than a thousand languages and has been read again and again. Within its pages, amidst what is familiar or perhaps unfamiliar, there are hidden gems that will delight your heart.

For those of you who are really not into reading, why not listen to the readings we recorded which can be found on the GSFC Facebook page.

I pray that you will be blessed in what you find there.

CAMBRIDGE SOUTH EAST TRANSPORT (CSET) BUSWAY UPDATE

Further to our January 2022 update on the new campaigning group formed (now known as 'Better Ways than Busway'), we are still waiting for the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) to apply to the Department of Transport for a Transport and Works Act Order. This will trigger the start of proceedings – and an ensuing public inquiry – for the GCP to obtain consent to compulsorily acquire land and to build the guided busway.

Accordingly, we have approached new consultants recommended by our solicitors to prepare a background report for an alternative based on the A1307 (given the demise of the Cambridge Autonomous Metro), which will save our countryside and landscape and deliver similar benefits for a fraction of the cost and they have confirmed that they are happy to work with us.

It will be important for residents to contact our County Councillors to tell them that this alternative scheme would deliver most of the benefits of the GCP's proposed scheme but with much less harm to greenbelt countryside, at a much lower cost and more quickly. If you can support the campaign in this way, please contact us, we will be delighted to provide assistance.

COVID VACCINE UPDATE

On 13 December 2021, the government announced that the deadline for every adult to have been offered a Covid-19 booster was being brought forward from 31 January 2022 to 31 December 2021.

Granta staff stepped forward to support the 'Omicron Emergency Booster National Mission' to encourage everyone who is eligible to 'get boosted now'.

Between 15 December and 3 January an extra 7,000 Granta patients were vaccinated. Staff worked the 3 bank holidays, in addition to squeezing extra vaccine clinics into their normal working days, to ensure that as many patients as possible were vaccinated before the new deadline passed.

NEW HOSPITAL HELPLINE FOR PATIENTS

The Covid-19 pandemic has added to the strain on all NHS services. As a result of this, waiting list times for outpatient and specialist appointments and procedures have increased for everybody.

This can cause worry and uncertainty about when you will eventually receive an appointment and unfortunately Granta has no direct access to the hospital appointment lists.

If you have been referred by your GP/are waiting for:

- An outpatient appointment
- An appointment for hospital tests (for example, scans)
- A date for an operation or other treatment
- A follow up from your hospital team

and you have a query about what is happening, there is now a new dedicated Freephone Patient Help Line - **0800 048 5800**.

May we respectfully ask that you only call Granta if your condition has genuinely deteriorated, when you will be reviewed by one of the clinical team and appropriate action can be taken in regard to your hospital care.

And the excitement of Christmas was not forgotten with the school 'Christmas Day' on the last day of term, including a festive lunch.


A collection around these events raised a tremendous total of £507 which was sent to Save the Children. Then at the start of the spring term we marked the end of the

KENNETH WILLIAM STARLING 1927 - 2021



Kenneth (Ken) Starling (Mr Starling to many) was head of Shelford School from 1975 to 1988. He died on December 8, 2021.

This obituary is based on extracts from the address given at his funeral service with additional material from Marjorie Westbrook's book, The Making of a Village School (pp 103–11).

Born in Cambridge in 1927, an only child, Ken was of the 'war time' generation whose Army service was in the Royal Signals rising to the rank of sergeant. After the war and its aftermath he went

into education, training in Abingdon and from there to Arbury Road Junior School as his first post. There he met, and eventually married, his wife Margaret with whom he had two children. Ken also taught at Morley Memorial School before becoming head of Shelford School in 1975.

Former pupils may recall Ken's passion for aeroplanes, his clarinet playing in the school orchestra, the woodworking lessons he gave (boys only), his leading of the 'School Walk' along the Roman Road not to mention his encouragement to 'keep on walking' during the Year 6 Pennine Trip. Following his retirement Ken and Margaret moved to Bury St Edmunds where he maintained those same interests – even obtaining a pilot's licence.

As educational expectations changed during Ken's tenure many of the school's facilities we now take for granted were acquired, not least the large playing field.

But maybe his lasting legacy will be the hundreds, if not thousands, of young lives he influenced and helped as a teacher.

CHEAPER BUS FARES HAVE ARRIVED!

Something very remarkable and rather wonderful has happened at the beginning of 2022: **Stagecoach have reduced their standard bus fares** and even introduced a new type of cheaper fare for 'Young Persons' (5–18 years). What is more, there are further reductions possible if you buy an advance bundle of either 5 or 10 'Flexi' tickets – and those tickets are valid for up to 12 months. Here are the new prices:

	Dayrider	Flexi5/ cost per day	Flexi10/ cost per day
1 Adult	£4.20	£16.80 = £3.36 each day	£29.40 = £2.94 each day
1 Young person (aged 5-18)	£2.80	£11.20 = £2.24 each day	£19.60 = £1.96 each day
'Small group': 1 Adult plus up to 2 Youths	£6.20		
'Large Group': any 5 passengers	£8.40		

These prices are for the tickets which cover 'all you can eat' bus journeys within the Dayrider zone around Cambridge that reaches to Stapleford, Histon/Impington, Milton, Fulbourn, Bar Hill, and Toft. With the Flexi tickets, the zone is also extended to include the Busway services as far as St Ives. Tickets beyond this area are more expensive but have also been reduced in price compared to 2021 prices.

How does one purchase these Flexi tickets in order to take advantage of the bargain prices shown above? That is a good question! Stagecoach now directs you to their Stagecoach Bus App to purchase such tickets. I managed to buy my first Flexi5 ticket on the bus in December (at the then higher price of £18), which came with a physical 'StagecoachSmart card' to load it onto. At the time, the Flexi5 could be bought on the bus – though it took the poor driver nearly ten minutes to work out how to do it and he literally had to 'phone a friend'! But that was apparently a trial and now Flexi5 and Flexi10 tickets are exclusive to the App.

With a day's bus travel now potentially less than £3 for one adult – or the whole family can travel all day for less than the cost of three hours' peak time parking at the Grand Arcade – why not leave the car at home next time you're heading into Cambridge? If you're not sure where to catch the bus, or what connecting services there are, try using Google Maps in the 'Transit' mode rather than just as a 'Car' route – it's the best source that I can find of integrated public transport information.







JAMES WITHERS, 19TH CENTURY POET

James who? You may well ask. Born in Weston Colville, 10 miles east of Great Shelford and living most of his life in Fordham, James Reynolds Withers, despite his impoverished background, gained widespread recognition for his poetry, only to die destitute and in obscurity.

Cambridge University Library holds a collection of Withers' handwritten manuscripts, along with personal letters and memoirs, and on its website tells us:

'... Withers (1812–1892) remains one of the country's most intriguing unknown poets. In his heyday, he received a grant from Queen Victoria and won plaudits from Charles Dickens ... he is of particular interest as a rural, labouring poet, largely self-taught, with no formal education ... As a boy he earned a few pence minding cattle, stone-picking, and bird-scaring, and as an adult he mended shoes and 'picked up a crust' as an agricultural labourer ... in the 1840s he and his young family spent some time in the Newmarket workhouse ... he was reduced to selling cabbages and driving a donkey cart, right up until his death in 1892 while under the care of his grandchildren.'

As far as we know, Withers never set foot in Shelford ... until now! Arts Council England recently provided funding for a series of five films portraying the poet, his life and his work. And who do you suppose played the part of Withers himself? None other than our very own Brian Higgins. You'll know him: taught your kids drama, ran the cricket club, a long suffering Cambridge United supporter? Yes, the very same.

The films are available to view on YouTube. Just search for *Peter Daldorph* – that's the film maker – and you will find a series of five films featuring Brian as James Withers. The films are:

- A Thing of Beauty
- My Native Village
- The Death of my Child
- Scarborough
- The Song of the Incendiary

Do check them out. Brian really nails it as Withers, bringing alive this long forgotten but most deserving poet of rural Victorian England.

This lovely card was posted in 1904 to a Miss Waters of East Ham, London with an amusing message:




As most of you know Woollards Lane was changed to Station Road with the coming of the railway and Shelford Station but in the 1920s was changed back to its original name.





RAINFALL CHARTS


MONTHLY TOTALS 2021

OLD RCHS

Extracts from the Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

16 February 1843

GREAT AND LITTLE SHELFORD SCHOOLS – The building committee are desirous to receive Tenders, on or before the 10th day of March next, for the ERECTION of a DWELLING HOUSE for a Master and Mistress.

21 February 1846

ORDER OF REMOVAL – application was made by the parish officers, for an order of removal to Melbourne of a female pauper, who had for five years left her husband to live with another man. One of the witnesses, a very old man, could not recollect within 30 years what his age was, and the other (his son) being equally oblivious, the magistrates refused to make the order.
