SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 19 JANUARY 2022

No members of the public were present.

REPORTS FROM REPRESENTATIVES

County Council

County Cllr Milnes noted that County Council committee meetings had restarted and civilian parking enforcement had moved forward. It was asked if the civilian enforcement could also include littering, idling, dog fouling, etc. To be looked into.

District Council

District Cllr Sample noted that following the Planning Inspectorate's approval of the retirement village on the land between Haverhill Road and Hinton Way, he and District Cllr Fane will be submitting a further response due to its encroachment into the green belt.

The District Council have launched grants for hospitality businesses hit by the pandemic. A request was made to find out if the Memorial Hall is eligible, and also to pass this information on to the landlord of the two pubs in the village.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION

It was agreed to work towards applying for the Foundation Award in the Local Council Award Scheme, which offers councils the opportunity to show they meet the standards set by the sector.

The Council thanked Rev Canon Talbott for all the time he has given the village both in his capacity as Parish Councillor and in his other roles within the village, including trustee of charities, membership of working groups, etc.

HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT

The Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group has met with Traffic Consultants to help with ideas to improve road safety around the High Street, Church Street and Woollards Lane area. It was agreed the funding for this project should be increased from £5,000 to £7,500 to allow for additional help from another consultant if needed.

It was noted that the decision to apply for a Transport and Works Act Order (TWAO) for the guided busway, Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) is to be considered by the County Council on 8 February. County Cllr Milnes was asked if he would support residents of Great Shelford and the written policy of Great Shelford Parish Council, which opposes the CSET proposal in its current form. Cllr Milnes replied that the money is from the government to alleviate

congestion into and out of the city and that it would be 'perverse to object to something the County Council is party to'. It was resolved to send a letter to Cllr Milnes to ask for his support.

Cllr Watson and Cllr Disley have been invited to discussions with a group called 'Better Ways than Busway' which includes Stapleford Parish Council and other interested parties who are opposed to the CSET proposals due to the damage to the green belt. A letter composed by James Littlewood of Cambridge Past Present and Future and Edward Leigh of Smarter Cambridge is to be circulated to Councillors for their information. The group has been discussing the possibility of employing a barrister to act on their behalf at a public enquiry. It was noted that currently there is no budget for Great Shelford to help in this way, but a precedent has been set with the East West Railway campaign. It was agreed to budget up to £15,000 for this and to invite members of the group to the next meeting to discuss their plans.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations were considered by members. After a brief discussion it was agreed to see if other organisations were interested in helping to plan events for the jubilee weekend.

PLANNING MATTERS

The Parish Council has been asked if they wished to place a S106 application (an agreement between a developer and a local planning authority about measures the developer must take to reduce their impact on the community) in respect to the proposed development of retirement apartments on Station Road. It was agreed that the Clerk should put forward an application to be completed by the Council and to do the same with any other applications which may meet the same criteria, including the potential Mingle Lane development and the recently approved Retirement Village.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

The Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group are in need of a secure way to manage their finances. They have asked Great Shelford Parish Council if they would look after the funds for them, as earmarked reserves, and pay invoices as and when necessary from these funds (once approved by the Group). It was agreed to hold the Neighbourhood Plan money to support them in their endeavours.

It was agreed to employ Brookfield Groundcare to carry out Priority 3 tree work following the survey completed in 2021 at a cost of £140 + VAT. It was also agreed to employ Brookfield Groundcare to clear the soil and vegetation and to install palisade fencing around the Feast end of the shed at a total cost of £5,140.00 + VAT.

The draft budget proposed by the Finance and General Purposes Committee was considered by members. Due to the high percentage increase following the Committee's consideration in December, the Clerk and Chairman had been delegated to look at where earmarked reserves could be reallocated to bring the precept more in line with expectations. It was agreed to set the budget at £416,967 expenditure, with £25,000 coming from Earmarked Reserves, £20,000 being carried forward from the 2021/22 financial year (underspend) and a precept of £279,311.20.

CONTRACTUAL MATTERS

It was agreed that the Clerk had passed her probationary period and the role was now substantive.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Elections We have elections in May this year with all 15 seats on the Parish Council up for election. We would love to see some new faces on the Council (we currently have three vacancies) and we would like to have two thirds of the seats elected so we can strive for Quality Council Status and to maintain our 'General Power of Competence' (GPC) which we obtained late in 2021. Holding the GPC means that we have slightly fewer restrictions on what we can and cannot do (providing that it's not illegal!). We are conscious that there are some areas of the community which are not represented on the Council. We would love to welcome you on board; please do speak to Libby if you have any questions, or visit the Electoral Commission's website: https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/candidate-or-agent/parish-council-elections-england.

Residents look to Councillors for help, support and guidance. As a Councillor you will be able to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve and you will see our community change for the better as a result of these decisions. As the role is the first rung on the ladder of public office there is plenty of training available.

Nominations need to be hand delivered to the Returning Officer at South Cambridgeshire District Council between 8:30am and 5:30pm any working day between 28 March and 5 April. Nomination forms can be obtained from the Electoral Commission's website and **must not be posted**.

If you'd like further information, please don't hesitate to contact Libby, who can send you information or have an informal chat about what the role entails.

Precept At our January meeting, Great Shelford Parish Council agreed to set a precept of £279,311.20. We are waiting for the confirmed figures from South Cambs but anticipate the increase to be in the region of 10% for a Band D property which equates to £12.09 per year. In order to keep the precept as low as practically possible the council has agreed to reconfigure some of the Earmarked Reserves amounting to £45,000 towards projects we wish to undertake over the 2022/23 financial year. Please keep an eye out for our Business Plan which we will publish on the website in due course.

LEVELS OF CONTAMINATION IN GREAT SHELFORD WATER SUPPLY

An article published in the *Guardian* on 8 February claimed that over 1080 residents of Great Shelford and Stapleford had been exposed to dangerous levels of a harmful chemical in their water supply.

The chemical, perfluorooctane sulphonate (PFOS) has been linked to high cholesterol, low birthweight and reduced immune response. It is a man-made chemical which persists in the environment for many years. According to the Guardian report, in June 2021, levels more than four times as high as the recommended limit were found in water from the aquifer close to Duxford airport, which supplies the houses of these residents. Use of this aquifer was then discontinued.

MP Anthony Browne contacted the Managing Director of Cambridge Water to express his concern. He asked whether and for how long the contamination had breached legal limits, what monitoring had taken place before and after the incident and why residents had not been informed at the time. He also requested publication of information regarding the contamination and confirmation that the water supply is currently safe.

Great Shelford Parish Council called an emergency public meeting on 9 February to discuss the issue. Andrew Lobley, Operations Director of Cambridge Water (www.cambridge-water.co.uk) and Elinor Cordiner, Head of Drinking Water and Compliance, presented and answered questions.

Andrew Lobley said that levels of PFOS were only restricted in July 2020 following changes in national guidelines after research indicated the potential dangers of the chemical. Water containing PFOs is classified into four tiers, with tier one being the lowest. All houses in Great Shelford and Stapleford receive the same blend of water from four boreholes: the Duxford aquifer and three others. Some water from these boreholes may also go to other villages in the region. When some samples from the Duxford source were found to be at tier two in June 2021, the use of this source was discontinued to avoid any potential risk, although this level was acceptable according to the guidelines and the water supplied to homes remained at tier one. The public was not informed at the time as the closure of the Duxford source was not due to a breach of safety guidelines. He also informed the meeting that the Guardian had not allowed Cambridge Water to reply to the article, but had amended the original article following publication to make it clear that the water was blended with other supplies before it reached households. He said it was unclear what the Guardian's reference to 1080 households was based on, since all houses in Great Shelford and Stapleford receive the same blend of water.

Members of the public expressed their concern at the possibility that the water could have been contaminated for a long period of time before the use of the aquifer was discontinued and it was also felt that that the limits specified as being acceptable in the guidelines may be too low. Questions were raised about the method used to calculate acceptable levels of PFOS and the frequency of monitoring of the water quality, with concern about possible spikes in pollutant levels being missed. Members of the public also asked for full details and figures for levels of PFOS to be made available. Andrew Lobley said that a letter would be sent to all residents in the next few days.

Malcolm Watson, Chair of Great Shelford Parish Council, said 'The *Guardian* article is obviously very concerning and I hope that Cambridge Water quickly provide the data and evidence they promised at the public meeting to back up their statement that "your water supply is, and always was, safe to drink."

UPDATE FROM THE 'BETTER WAYS THAN BUSWAY' GROUP

We mentioned in our February update that Cambridgeshire County Councillors would need to vote on the Cambridge South East Transport scheme (CSET). This has been delayed because the Retirement Village and associated Country Park on land between Haverhill Road and Hinton Way have now been granted planning permission on appeal, meaning that the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) are having to reconsider their original plans for the busway.

Current plans are for the busway to run through, or adjacent to, the designated Country Park between Haverhill Road and Hinton Way, meaning that its environmental impact will increase further.

We wrote to the GCP board members on 1 February asking them to reconsider their plans in light of the significant changes that have taken place and the viability of the alternative route in the A1307 corridor. At the time of writing, we have had no acknowledgement of our letter. We pointed out that:

- 1. Unlike the GCP's route, the alternative route would serve the Cambridge Biomedical Campus extension identified in the new Local Plan.
- 2. One of the deciding factors in the GCP's 2018 decision to discount the A1307 corridor was that it could not form part of the Cambridge Autonomous Metro (CAM). However, the proposal for the CAM has now been dropped.
- 3. Cambridge South Station is likely to get the go ahead. CSET will have to fit around these extensive works and this will cause inevitable delay. It

- would be challenging to build both infrastructure projects in parallel. The A1307 alternative can therefore be delivered much quicker.
- 4. As mentioned above, a route through or alongside the new Country Park will have increased environmental impact.
- 5. There is every indication that most of the benefits of CSET could be delivered at a fraction of the cost by the A1307 corridor. Currently, the assessment is that CSET with its heavily engineered bridges and roadway is entirely uneconomic.

We are now preparing a petition to be presented to the South Cambridgeshire District Council calling for a debate on this subject. Just 100 signatures are needed to trigger this. Please let us know if you can support this petition and we will contact you. We really hope that our local politicians will listen. There was a well above average response to MP Anthony Browne's CSET survey, far more than from the GCP's consultations. This shows that 72% do not support the GCP's route and 75% said they would never use it. Detailed results will be available at www.anthonybrowne.org/cset-survey.

And finally, with the SCDC election coming up in May, please consider voting for whichever political party will openly stand up for our greenbelt and countryside!

News from St Mary's Church

The first thing you see in St Mary's Church as you open the door is usually a beautiful display of flowers. During Lent this is missing. We also don't sing the Gloria. We take things out in order to help us to reassess our personal and corporate life. We enter a time of reflection.



Of course, it is usual to see this as a time to think about our interior life. In addition to this, Archbishop Justin Welby has invited us to reflect on how we find our 'common consciousness' – the shared beliefs, values and moral attitudes – of the groups, church, communities and society that we belong to. He notes that if we don't think about this, it is easy for our collective conscience to be defined by what (and who) we oppose and thereby accentuate our differences, which often results in conflict and hostility and allows prejudice and injustice to prevail. As a society, there may be times when we have unknowingly acted together in ways that exclude people who are not like us. The alternative is to think about how we serve the common good. When we focus on the needs of the community and the interests of others, this draws attention to our mutual dependency and our shared humanity. It could give us new ways to love our neighbour.

At St Mary's our reflection on Justin's invitation will take a number of forms. The **Ash Wednesday service** on 2 March sets the scene for a reflection on how we can develop our interior life and our common life. The **Lent Group** at St Mary's is going to look at the book 'Embracing Justice' by Isabelle Hamley. They will meet in the Community Room at 6pm on Wednesdays from 9 March and welcome newcomers. A **Food Box** has been set up by the Church Council in the Church porch containing tins and dried food. In these difficult times, those who can't make money stretch far enough can take something out of the box and those who have enough can share.

When we eventually get to Easter Day and experience again the scent and sight of the Easter flowers – which are symbolic of resurrection life – we may also appreciate much more the things that we value as a community.

At St Mary's we are looking for new flower arrangers. We are hoping to put on a Flower Festival in September. If you would like to be involved, even if you have never arranged flowers in church before, please get in touch with me.

ONE BODY

I recently woke up in the night and was conscious of some discomfort – not from my chronically aching knees, nor back pain, as had been the case a couple of years ago, but from a tiny cut on my thumb. I was aware of it, albeit intermittently, for the next few days, until it healed. We tend to take the efficient working of our amazing bodies for granted, until something goes wrong. Sometimes it's a major part, such as the heart, at other times something relatively minor and trivial such as my cut thumb, but in both cases our bodies are no longer 'whole'.

So it is with our church community. The apostle Paul put it this way in the 12th chapter of 1 Corinthians:

25-26 The way God designed our bodies is a model for understanding our lives together as a church: every part dependent on every other part, the parts we mention and the parts we don't, the parts we see and the parts we don't. If one part hurts, every other part is involved in the hurt, and in the healing. If one part flourishes, every other part enters into the exuberance. You are Christ's body – that's who you are! You must never forget this.

It's easy to see in a church who does the 'big' jobs such as preaching the sermon and easy too to see church as some kind of performance, with the key players up front while everyone else watches and listens. Yet God places equal importance on those who work behind the scenes; those who phone someone lonely, fill in tedious paperwork, put out the bins or wash the tea towels. If someone is doing nothing because they feel they have nothing of value to offer, that is not God's way – what he wants is not our ability, but our *availability*.

Often in secular life too, we see the big jobs as being the ones that matter, yet the past two years have taught us how those delivery drivers, care home workers, mums who've taken a career hit to allow them to home school are as valuable, if not more so, than those who run the country.

God never despises the little things. When the boy brought his five loaves and two fish, one of the disciples said to Jesus, 'What are they among so many?' (John 6:8). God did not despise the boy's small lunch and we should not despise the little things that we have right now, even though other people may do so. In God's hands, the little things in your hands can multiply and grow.

VACCINATIONS

Are you up to date with all of your vaccinations? There are a number of vaccines available on the NHS, the more common of which are listed below. If you are unsure whether you are eligible or would like further information, please do not hesitate to call us on 0300 234 5555 or visit www.NHS.UK

Pneumonia vaccine

Who is eligible?

- Babies, as part of the national immunisation programme
- Adults aged 65 and over
- Children and adults with certain long term health conditions, such as a serious heart or kidney conditions.

The pneumonia vaccine protects against serious pneumococcal infections and encourages your body to produce antibodies against pneumococcal bacteria.

If you have a long term health condition you may need a single one off vaccination or a vaccination every five years, depending on your underlying problem.

Shingles vaccine

Who is eligible?

Adults 70 to 79 years

You only need to have the shingles vaccine once and you can have it at any time of year. Whilst it is a very effective vaccine, some vaccinated people can still develop shingles at a later stage, but the illness will be milder. It is also fine to have the shingles vaccine if you have already had shingles, as it will boost your immunity against further shingles attacks.

There is a new vaccine available for people who are immunosuppressed called Shingrix and this is available at all of our surgeries as a two dose course.





SHAPING WHERE WE LIVE STAPLEFORD AND GREAT SHELFORD NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

A steering group of Stapleford and Great Shelford Parish Councillors and residents has been making good progress on the early stages of the villages' combined neighbourhood plan. This is our unique opportunity to create a shared vision of what is important to us and how we want to develop and use our land over the next 15–20 years.

Once completed, the plan will provide a set of legal policies – tailored specifically to our area – and sit alongside the Greater Cambridge local plan and the National Planning Policy Framework when assessing planning applications in our area.

Preparing for initial community engagement

We are preparing for initial consultation with residents in spring 2022. Consciously or subconsciously, we have all weighed up what is important to us about the place we live. Without asking too many detailed questions too early in the process, this is what the steering group needs to begin to pin down so we can then think about what needs to be done to make Stapleford and Great Shelford better places to live and work.

We will start by asking basic questions about planning related matters across seven main categories, such as:

Categories	Questions
Housing	
Local design and character	What's good and needs conserving?
Heritage	
Natural environment and green spaces	What needs fixing?
Amenities and infrastructure	
Transport and travel	What's missing?
Economy and employment	


Answers to these questions will shape more detailed surveys, focus groups and other meetings with residents, businesses, workers, service providers and landowners. It is our aim that everyone will have opportunities to participate, whether face to face, by phone, online or via social media. It does not matter whether you wish to comment on one, a selection, or all of these categories; your views are invaluable.

Turning engagement into evidence ... and evidence into policies

The outcomes of community engagement will be combined with other information (such as housing needs analysis, local character assessment and local plan data) to create a large evidence base. From this, the steering group will distil a vision for what Stapleford and Great Shelford aspire to look like at the end of the neighbourhood plan period, roughly 20 years from now. A set of more specific objectives will describe what needs to be done to deliver this vision, for example promote a range of housing sizes and types which are integrated into the community; protect, enhance and expand our green spaces and access to the surrounding countryside, linking them for the benefit of wildlife and nonmotorised users. The vision and objectives will be the subjects of further community input.

Following this, a set of planning policies will be created to turn the objectives into action. These are the most important outcomes of any neighbourhood plan because they form part of the statutory development plan against which planning applications are assessed.

In the final stages, the draft neighbourhood plan will be put out for consultation to the people who live, work or run businesses in Stapleford and Great Shelford, plus various bodies whose interests may be affected by the plan, such as the Environment Agency and Natural England. A revised plan is then submitted for independent examination. The examiner will consider whether the proposed neighbourhood plan meets the basic conditions and other legal requirements set out by law. If found satisfactory, the neighbourhood plan will return to Stapleford and Great Shelford for a referendum – a yes/no poll in which you will be asked 'Do you want South Cambridgeshire District Council to use the neighbourhood plan for Stapleford and Great Shelford to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?' If more than 50% of those voting say 'yes', then our plan will come into force.



Final thoughts

Producing a neighbourhood plan is very definitely a lengthy and intricate process with many different parts! But, by the end of it we – the people who know and love Stapleford and Great Shelford most of all – will have written new planning laws and achieved greater control over development in our area. And that really is a vision worth aspiring to.

Robin attempted throughout to win the heart of Maid Marian and Theo Lury as Robin and Chloe Freeman as Marian proved more than adept at the big power ballads.

It takes allsorts to create panto magic and the expertly staged fluorescent scene was no exception, with Bertie Bassett himself making an appearance, thanks to the brilliance of Nikki Wilkinson and her team. menacingly comedic familiars played by Ellen Arthurs and Sally Hudson and a pair of hapless wolves in the shape of Jonathan Eames-Cartwright and Charlie Fulton, both of whom were determined to make a quick meal of Little Red Riding Hood (Poppy Henson).

Red was more than capable of looking after herself though, with

her band of fairytale sisters in Goldilocks, Rapunzel, Mary Quite Contrary and the Little Misses Bo Peep and Muffett, played with panache by Eira Sheridan, Rafaela Wilkinson, Zosia Zmija, Freya Cameron and Alexa Bendelack respectively.





Following a comic turn by a scene stealing quartet of cantankerous Yorkshiremen, out-Pythoning Monty Python in their tales of lockdown hardship, Robin and his Merry Men gathered their courage to thwart the evil machinations of the dastardly Sheriff of Nottingham, played with villainous vigour by Thomas Milne.

The musical accompaniment throughout was excellently provided by the diligent digits of Greg Morris and the repertoire was as wide as the audience acclaim,

with songs stretching from Dukas to Duran, Sinatra (Frank AND Nancy) and Sugarhill Gang with all stops in between. A particular highlight was a tearjerking 'Bright Eyes' performed by clear voiced rabbits and hedgehogs. The future of Little Shelford panto looks safe in the hands of all its talented young chorus members.

All of our heroes happily escaped unscathed as the more carnivorous amongst the Pantoland gangsters decided not to put the fairytale folk in the pot, but opt for a meat free January instead.

GREAT SHELFORD MOBILE WARDEN SCHEME

The Great Shelford Mobile Warden Scheme was established in 1996 and is an asset valued by the elderly residents of our village.



Our aim is to help our members remain in their own homes. We achieve this by providing daily phone calls, regular visits to help with shopping, post office collections, and management of prescriptions, and by undertaking other essential jobs in the local area. As well as carrying out small tasks such as helping members carry out instructions from medical services or changing a light bulb, the Scheme helps the elderly maintain social contact and therefore reduces the risk of isolation and depression.

SAWSTON FUN RUN IS BACK ON 8 MAY

The Fun Run and Walk, having already raised over half a million pounds over the years, is set to return to its pre Covid highly successful format on 8 May with entry registrations being available from mid-February, exclusively on the new improved event's website *www.sawstonfunrun.org*.

OLD RCHS

Extracts from the Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and republished by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

1 March 1845

THE RAILWAY – a temporary bridge has been made over the road, where the Railroad crosses the same between Shelford and Stapleford, until a more substantial one can be erected for the convenience of passengers along the road, while the trains will cross beneath. An immense quantity of earth forming an inclined plane, an approach on each side to the above, has been thrown up some months, and for the last few weeks has been used with safety for all the purposes of an old established road. On Wednesday morning last, Cleminson's wagon, from St Ives to London was detained a few hours, owing to the wheels sinking in, and the horses being unable to move it. Not the slightest blame attaches to any person; the detention arose from the heavy and continued rain of Tuesday night. It is but justice to the Company to state, they keep a man with a powerful team of horses to help teams up the slopes during the day – but this happening about four in the morning, the waggoner very wisely baited his six horses until about eight o'clock when getting assistance, he started – the waggon being drawn to Stapleford by ten horses. Two watchmen with lamps are constantly engaged during the night.

22 March 1856

LAYING THE FOUNDATIONS OF A NEW BAPTIST CHAPEL –

On Wednesday last the village of Gt. Shelford was visited by a numerous assembly of persons from Cambridge and the surrounding neighbourhood to witness the ceremony of the laying of the foundation stone of the new Baptist Chapel. A special train left Cambridge for that place and having reached its destination the company immediately proceeded to the site of the new building, a very suitable piece of ground in the centre of the village, presented by Mr Richard Maris, and over which a large tent had been erected.

At five o'clock tea was provided in Mr Clark's barn, generously lent for the occasion, and to which a very large marquee was attached. Nearly five hundred persons were present. In the evening a very impressive and eloquent sermon was preached by the Rev. C. H. Spurgeon, to a congregation of about one thousand persons.

JULIAN MEREDITH: MIGRATION NEW PRINT EXHIBITION AT STAPLEFORD GRANARY

It's a sunny day in August 2021 and artist and beekeeper Julian Meredith is pacing around the little orchard area at the back of the Granary looking out to the field. He's curious about how long and how quickly the grass grows and wondering if he can 'mow something' into it.

This is Julian's first site visit to Stapleford Granary in preparation for his solo artist exhibition in March 2022. Since that day, I've had endlessly fascinating conversations with Julian and the idea that he might mow something in the grass now seems unsurprising and entirely in keeping with the unique way he sees and moves through the world.

Meredith's art is a practice that grows directly from the natural world. Railing against the loss of habitat and the extinction of familiar creatures, he creates powerful life size prints of dead animals in his signature Prussian blue, from huge 8 foot long tuna and the fins of whales down to a tiny 4cm shrew. His outdoor sand sculptures and earth works in chalk and stone include a 400 foot white whale cut into the limestone of the Coed Hills. His art is suggestive of something that 'once was'... a trace of life, a fossil, a remnant. Speaking about his hand burnished elm wood prints, he describes the printed paper coming off the block as being 'like the spirit of fossilized wood'.



Conversation with Julian Meredith also shifts seamlessly between art and nature. Over a couple of hours we talk about eels, paper, light, tuna, bees, the colour blue, shrews, observation, water, salmon, ink, fishing, chalk streams ... I'll be chatting to Julian again here at the Granary on **Friday 4 March** at the launch of his MIGRATION exhibition. We'll be exhibiting a range of his extraordinary and thought provoking prints until **24 May.** (To avoid disappointment, looking at the grass right now I have to say that I think its unlikely there will be 'something mown' in the next few weeks... maybe he'll drop in again before the exhibition ends!)






