It was noted that during 2021/22, £25,050 was spent by Great Shelford Parish Council for grants under the General Power of Competence including: Mobile Warden Scheme, Shopping Bus, SSYI, Poppy Wreath and donation to the Bowls Club.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS

Members of the Wheelscape Working Group met with the Scout and Guiding groups to discuss the Wheelscape project. The concerns of the Scout and Guiding groups over losing outdoor space close to their building was discussed and members will try and help publicise the groups' need to find additional volunteers. The possibility of allowing the groups to use the pavilion for activities and of roping off areas of the Recreation Ground for their exclusive use could be considered.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

A draft Annual Report was presented to members. It was agreed that this should be printed on recycled paper and circulated to councillors for final comment and approval before being printed and delivered to all dwellings, with a maximum budget of £1,000 + VAT.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

It was agreed to support the WI in their request to replace the clock in the Memorial Hall.

FINANCE MATTERS

It was agreed to purchase software for digital mapping of the allotments and cemetery from Pear Mapping and Epitaph (by Edge IT) at a cost of £2,400 + VAT for year one, which includes training, and £143 + VAT for subsequent years' ongoing support.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

School holidays will soon be upon us and the village is buzzing with events especially the Feast, people visiting our shops and milling around.

This month I wanted to update you on a few behind the scenes things the Parish Council has been involved in over the last couple of months.

Asset of Community Value

We recently nominated both 'The Square and Compasses' and 'The Plough' to become Assets of Community Value. We believe that both of these public houses are an asset to the village as they are used to further the social wellbeing and social interests of the local community and we would like this to continue into the future. South Cambridgeshire District Council supported our application and both public houses are on the register for the next five years.

Farmers Market

We have been approached by a couple of the stallholders from the former Farmers Market which was held in the Memorial Hall on a monthly basis. The Parish Council would be interested in seeing if it is a viable option to reintroduce the market to the community, but we would need to know that there are stallholders willing to attend each month. If you would be interested in selling your produce or know someone who would, please contact Jenny by email office@greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk.

'Shopping' Bus

For a number of years, Great Shelford Parish Council has funded a minibus to take older residents from the Chaston Road/Macaulay Road area into the village to enable them to do their shopping on a weekly basis. It is set up for a Tuesday and was timed to coincide with tea and coffee at Cara's which was organised by the Free Church. Since Covid, this coffee morning has moved to Mondays and the numbers of those using the bus has plummeted, meaning that the cost is not viable to the Parish Council. However, the Council is prepared to consider moving the bus to a Monday – IF there is sufficient interest in this service.

We understand that some residents may still be concerned with Covid so we have spoken to CL Travel who have confirmed the following:

With regards to COVID procedures:

- All our drivers are continuing to wear face coverings.
- Vehicles are cleaned with anti bacterial wipes and spray every day and also during the day when different groups are travelling.

If you would use the bus on a Monday, please call 01223 616622 or email *clerk@greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk* so that we can make an informed decision about the bus. If there is not the desire, unfortunately it may be lost.

Transport

The Combined Authority has launched a public consultation to help them develop a plan for better transport in Cambridgeshire. This is open until 4th August and can be found via the link, *www.yourltcp.co.uk*. The link also details where there will be drop in consultations and places where hard copies can be collected.

Overgrown Hedges

As it is the growing season we are conscious that vegetation bordering footpaths, roads and signage may cause hazards to those using them. Please can we ask that you cast a critical eye at your boundaries from that of a road user and make sure that the hedges are back in line with the boundary of your property, that there are no branches obscuring road signs, traffic lights, etc.

RESULTS OF ANTHONY BROWNE'S SURVEY THE CAMBRIDGE SOUTH EAST TRANSPORT SCHEME (CSET) BUSWAY

81% would definitely not or probably not support the CSET busway. 58% would definitely or probably support the alternative option using the A1307.

85% would never or only rarely use the CSET busway.

71% were already aware of the CSET busway proposal, however, fewer than half (44%) were aware of the Greater Cambridge Partnership's previous consultations on CSET and 68% rated the GCP's level of engagement as poor or very poor.

69% supported the idea of reopening the Haverhill to Cambridge railway line as a longer term alternative to the CSET busway.

While I encourage everyone to give their views on the Local Transport and Connectivity Plan (LTCP) as a whole, I am aware that many of you will be most interested in plans that impact on South Cambridgeshire. These are covered in the Greater Cambridge section of the document.

This section contains two questions, one offering a simple choice of how much you support the proposals and a second box asking for more detailed feedback. If you wish to give feedback directly regarding the CSET scheme, this box is the best place for you to do so.

If you, like me and so many others, oppose the current CSET proposals to build a concrete busway across the Cambridge green belt at the Gog Magog hills, please use this opportunity to tell our local transport authorities to stop these destructive plans.

News from St Mary's Church

As we look forward to the annual Feast in Great Shelford, I am reminded of a film which won an Oscar in the 1980's called Babette's Feast. The film is set in the 19th Century in a seaside village in Denmark. Babette has fled from violence in Paris and arrives one foggy morning with nothing and asks the religious community in the village to let her work for them



for nothing in return for refuge and food. Babette was safe in this community, but life was hard and the religious community had its own restricting traditions which Babette learnt to live within. She noted that austerity made people tetchy, there were conflicts and not a lot of space given to love or joy.

One day, Babette receives a letter telling her that she has been given lots of money. Instead of spending it on herself, she decides to give the whole village a feast. She orders special food and wine that people in the place have never tasted. She organises and she cooks and she gets people involved and she invites the village and she watches them relaxing and eating and talking more openly with each other than they usually do. Babette sees this as an act of thanks and love and she delights in their pleasure and the healing of divisions. Only later does it transpire that she had the skills to make this happen because she had, in her previous life, been a head chef in one of Paris's leading restaurants.

Many people will bring hidden skills to the Feast week, from the youngest to the oldest. There are events for every taste. In St Mary's Church on 8 July at 7.30pm, we will host the classical guitarist, Daniela Rossi, accompanied by Sebastian Pompilio. Tickets are available online, from local traders or at the door. Do join us for this special event. I hope that this will be a time when people come together, relax and enjoy.



I wonder if you've ever thought about where your time goes? I sometimes play on our kids' Xbox. When you play computer games it gives a rolling clock of how long you've been playing, hours turn into days and then it can get rather scary. I don't know if you've ever tried to add your time up, how much time you've spent asleep, eating, driving, or watching TV. Time passing can be seen in many different ways, we traditionally in the West have a linear view of time, a beginning and an end, the past behind and future ahead. But that's not the case in every culture; The Aymara people of the Andes see things differently. Because the past is what they have experienced, it lies ahead, where they can see it. The future remains hidden, so it is behind them. That's because visual evidence is particularly important to the Aymara.

As we come to move on from the Free Church having spent the last 70,000 hours (eight years) in Shelford, I can look back on the joys and the sad times. I can dwell on what's gone well and reflect on my regrets. I can't quite get my head around seeing time the other way around, but it does help me see the growth and joy in the experiences of the last eight years, if I look at them head on. If I see them in a visual way, I become aware of the stories and journeys of those with whom I've walked. Because you might think church is all about the building and the Sunday service, but it really isn't. It's about the community that chooses to live in that building and gather on that Sunday morning. Within that community have been times of great joy, as well as pain.

I wonder what visual images come to mind when you look at the past, head on. Maybe you see painful regrets or amazing joys, heartbreak or fulfilment. Whatever image comes to mind, there is a truth that holds in my life experience and that's the ever present understanding that God loves me. That love is what holds all the time together. It's the grand story that the Bible presents, that our time here on Planet Earth is not all the time we have. That this world points to the next, points beyond the suffering and pain we so often experience. That the future is filled with the great fulfilment of that love.

As this is my last article for the Village news. I'll finish by repeating the last few words that so many of the New Testament letters in the Bible end with: 'The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit.'





BOOK REVIEW - A HAVEN FOR FARMLAND BIRDS



Encroaching buildings, roads and rail across our green belt are threats, not only to the people of Great Shelford but also to the wildlife which surrounds us. Engrossed in our own thoughts or plugged into headphones, the walkers, runners and cyclists who use the DNA cycle path near Addenbrooke's may not notice the abundance of wildlife in the fields by Granham's Road.

John Meed has spent ten years studying the birds in that small patch of arable land, recording 93 species, including 21 which are red listed as endangered. His

detailed study explains how this apparently mundane cluster of fields should not be taken for granted, faced as it is with threats from all sides. The original source of water for Cambridge and a rare chalk stream, the rich habitat of Nine Wells and White Hill deserves protection.

Meed's study shows how this small area is a microcosm for global changes which we may find overwhelming. By exchanging the wide screen for the magnifying glass we may be better able to understand our local situation and even make a difference before it's too late.

Meed is a wise companion in a walk around the fields, showing us what we might otherwise have missed, explaining the changes of the influences of the seasons on bird feeding and migration and providing asides on everything from the history and geography to the migration of the albatross. In places he probably offers more detail than the general reader needs (relationship intelligence of the grey partridge is a niche interest) though there is much of interest for the keen birder.

The author provides us with our very own Spring Watch, with good quality photographs. He also warns of the prospect of a silent spring as the populations of all bird species decline, less because of climate change and more through human occupation. Can we balance the convenience of our travel and reduction of cars with the local extinction of some species of birds and butterflies? Can we weigh the need for scientific advancement in one area (the Cambridge Bio-medical campus) against the invasion of a thriving ecosystem?

Whatever the solution the author urges us to seize the opportunity to experience this green belt treasure on our very doorstep, before it's too late.

OASISS (Open Arms in Shelfords and Stapleford)

Thank you for your ongoing support to help refugees from Ukraine to settle in our villages in unsettled times and to make them feel welcome. The number of newcomers continues to grow thanks to the incredible generosity of hosts. At the time of writing, we have 27 adults and 13 children living in our villages connected to OASISS and another 36 adults and 22 children on the way. Some of the Ukrainians already in the Shelfords and Stapleford have started to establish a new life away from home for themselves in many ways. This includes students finishing their university exams remotely to graduate, whilst others have already found jobs with the University, the Babraham Institute and retail outlets or restaurants.

Offers of help from the members of the community have ranged from donating clothing for our Clothes Hub run by the Great Shelford Rugby Club, baking a cake for our coffee mornings, to offering a guided cycle ride to Cambridge, offering space for coffee mornings at our churches, or yoga sessions. Three people are taking a bus of medical supplies for Ukraine to Poland with a plan to collect five people to drive them to the UK. We are most grateful for every donation and pledge of support – they are critical to the success of this community initiative and to helping people to feel a little more at home in our communities.

Having facilitated many matches, our focus is on asking both hosts and guests what they still need as we look towards summer. People from Ukraine arrive with varied levels of English from bilingual to basic. English language classes in both Cambridge and Saffron Walden are in high demand and some of our new villagers attend these. Transport to lessons would be gratefully received. In response to this need, OASISS is setting up language classes locally for adults. At the same time, volunteers will listen to children and young people read to improve their English. We need volunteers with teaching or TEFL qualifications to teach, adults or young people willing to listen to children read in English or to have simple conversations and people willing to help look after young children whilst their parents are in the same space learning English. There will be a need for safeguarding checks for some of these roles. We are still looking for buddies for host families to support their guests with endless form filling and showing people bus routes, how to search for a job or complete a CV, how to sign up for school, doctors, dentists etc. If you think you could help in any way, please visit our website https://oasiss.uk. The continued support from many people in the Shelfords and Stapleford has already, and will undoubtedly continue, to make a real difference to people from Ukraine through this difficult time.

OID ACHS

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

15 July 1843

BOARD OF EDUCATION – announce with great satisfaction, that the school at Shelford will be opened after Michaelmas.

15 July 1843

HIGHWAY ROBBERY – on Wednesday morning last, between 4 and 5 o'clock, a daring highway robbery attended with great violence was committed near Shelford, upon a person of the name Allen, residing at Bottisham. It appears that Allen was returning from the Shelford Feast, at the time mentioned, when he was overtaken by three men, one of whom (according to his own confession when he was apprehended) asked him for some tobacco. Allen said he had none, upon which they demanded some money, but he refused to give them any. They immediately fell upon him and beat him in a very violent manner and robbed him of a sovereign and a half-crown, with which they made off. Allen made the best of his way to the police-station, in this town, where he gave such a description of the ruffians that one of the police officers went to Barnwell, and apprehended Thomas Newling, Michael Macintyre and Robert Ransome upon the charge. They were taken before Captain Purchas, R.N. one of the magistrates of the county, when the prosecutor identified them all and they were fully committed to take their trial at the ensuing assizes.

9 July 1843

HIGHWAY ROBBERY IN SHELFORD – 3 Cambridge labourers found guilty aged 17, 18 and 18 years, robbed John Allen on the High Road of a purse containing a sovereign and half a crown. Transported for 15 years.

29 July 1843

BURGLARY – Yesterday se'nnight or early on Saturday morning, the chaise-house of Mr. H. Grain, junior, was broken into and a set of brass mounted black leather harness, a bit, a saddle, a snaffle bridle, 2 curb bridles and a gig cover stolen therefrom. A cart was heard by Mr. W. Headley to pass his premises about one o'clock on the morning of Saturday in which were, no doubt, the parties by whom the robbery was effected.





What we've been doing

Some of you will have seen us at the Stapleford Village Show, where we entertained children with Bug Bingo and families with our Challenge Quiz and the Higher-Lower Game. Participants enjoyed home made flapjack or a little gift soap donated by Full Circle and all the completed Quiz sheets will go into a prize draw after the Shelford Feast, with prizes donated by the Cambridge Organic Food Company and Green Weigh. If you missed us at Stapleford, come and see us at the Feast on 3 July.

The Climate Justice Workshop was held on 6 June, put together by Katie Williams who is a member of the UK Youth Climate Coalition, which had a presence at COP26. She reminded us that the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough area has a 25% higher rate of carbon emissions than the UK average and South Cambridgeshire is 45% higher! The A14 and M11 don't help, but there are a lot of two car families in this relatively affluent area and poor public transport. Every journey you do without using your car can bring that percentage down a tiny bit. Every box of grapes from Peru or wherever that you replace with fruit that is either British or can be shipped here (such as bananas, apples, citrus fruits, strawberries) saves some air miles. Every flight you can avoid or replace with train travel will reduce your emissions hugely. Real action on climate change is an enormous international juggernaut to shift, but every little step an individual can take will help. The average carbon footprint of a UK citizen is 12.7 and it is calculated it should be about five to enable us all to get to net zero. Search online for the article I have previously quoted in the Guardian about The Jump, which consists of the six lifestyle changes you can make to reduce your carbon footprint to almost five. Also see our future talks on energy saving, details below.


