SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE FINANCE AND GENERAL PURPOSES MEETING ON 17 AUGUST 2022

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

A member of the public was present and noted that for many years Shelford has not had enough recreational space for the number of residents. As the village increases in size, this will be even less adequate for the population. Referring to the masterplan for the Recreation Ground, the resident noted that the basketball post/net and kick board were located down towards the river as there was no room nearer the Woollards Lane end of the Recreation Ground.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION

The draft terms of reference for the Human Resources Committee were approved.

A new grant policy and application form for use by local organisations when seeking a grant from the Parish Council was approved.

The draft Design and Access Statement for the Wheelscape project was presented to members. It was noted that it has not really changed very much from the original one. The document is based on the approved statement used for the Playscape project but has the more recent consultations included. It was decided to seek some initial designs for the Wheelscape to take into account the sport on the Recreation Ground and the space available and to bring these to the Full Council Meeting in October. The Business Plan was discussed by members. It was noted that since the last Full Council Meeting the council had achieved the Foundation Level of the Local Council Award Scheme, and the paving had been completed around two sides of the Pavilion and in the storage area for the cricket equipment. The Clerk has chased two companies for their quotations to improve the CCTV coverage on the Recreation Ground and more information is required for the Speed Indicator Device on Hinton Way.

MEMORIAL HALL

The Clerk provided an overview of work undertaken for the transfer of management of the Memorial Hall to the Parish Council with effect from 1 September. It was noted that:

- an online calendar is now available showing when the main hall and meeting rooms are available see links on *www.greatshelfordparish council.gov.uk/memorial-hall/*
- all regular hirers have been contacted and their bookings uploaded to the booking software
- the premises licence, music licence and other contracts have been transferred or are in the process of being set up in the name of the Parish Council
- the contractors, including window cleaners, floor maintenance etc., have all been informed
- the cleaner/caretaker has confirmed that she would like to continue with the Parish Council on a self-employed basis.

The Hiring Policy for the Memorial Hall and the Conditions for Hire were approved. Members discussed the ongoing requirements for the hall in respect to energy efficiency, modernisation, etc. Draft surveys drawn up by the Clerk were considered. It was decided to put a short survey on the website to find out what sort of things residents would be interested to attend there and in addition to send out a survey specifically for existing users.

FINANCE

It was agreed that \pounds 7,500 of the money held under General Improvements within the Highways Cost Centre could be reallocated to the purchase of a bus shelter on Cambridge Road.

In a closed session, it was agreed to increase the Clerk's salary to SCP37 in line with a recent job evaluation.

I write this month's news with a heavy heart.

Loss of Queen Elizabeth II

We mourn the loss of our beloved Queen of more than 70 years. Great Shelford joined in with the national mourning with our flag at half mast, flowers laid at the war memorial and a book of condolence located at St Mary's Church. The book will become part of our archives and we are sending a letter to Buckingham Palace to let them know of its existence and to pass on the sympathies of our residents to the King, his family and the royal household. The flowers which were laid by residents at the war memorial have been collected and will be used as compost when we plant a tree in the Queen's memory. I was pleased to be invited to take part in the Special Commemoration Service on Sunday 18 September which was hosted between St Mary's and the Free Church.

Preparing for winter in uncertain financial times

My colleagues and I are acutely aware that winter is fast approaching and with high levels of inflation and the hike in energy prices, some residents may be struggling this winter and facing difficult choices, whether to keep warm or be able to feed the family. We are talking to other organisations in the village about various ways we can all help with these concerns. One idea we are looking at is a 'Warm Hub' where residents can go, keep warm and socialise. Other ideas include a rota where residents visit different people's homes, so only one person is having to put the heating on at any time. When I ran to be the Member of Parliament for South Cambridgeshire, I committed to working to improve public transport for my constituents. A large proportion of residents commute to London and Cambridge for work.

We all know how congested busy Cambridge's roads can become on workdays. As such, I fully appreciate how challenging the rail strikes will have been for the people of Great Shelford. I am firmly of the view that both sides ought to come to the table to reach a solution that puts commuters and travellers first.

In the last month, I have received a large amount of correspondence from the people of Great Shelford. Some of these have been about passport application delays. I have stressed my dissatisfaction at this matter to colleagues. This is the first summer since Pandemic restrictions have been lifted and I fully appreciate that families looking forward to summer holidays have been left deeply frustrated. I will continue to press for these issues to be resolved and my office will continue to work on individual cases. Of course, if you are experiencing problems with passport applications and are yet to be in touch, I would encourage you to reach out to my office.

Thanks to recent heatwaves, South Cambridgeshire faces a rainfall deficit equivalent to three months' worth of rain. There is no getting around the fact that South Cambridgeshire is running out of water, something I know many of you see in the local village ponds, chalk streams and nature reserves. I have long campaigned to protect our local waterways and now I'm asking for your help to flood the internet with snaps of our beleaguered waterways as a call to action on this looming environmental disaster. To continue that campaign and raise awareness across the area, I am asking everyone to raise awareness of the crisis in our local waterways by crowd sourcing evidence of the problem. In their report (*GSVN September, page 2*) the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group (TTIWG) states that 'The local police constable has been invited to visit Church Street ...'

My question is: does Great Shelford still have a police constable? I am sure TTIWG will find that Cambridgeshire Police no longer have individual constables who patrol beats around our village, or any other village for that matter. In fact, they can rarely dispatch an officer to deal with local crime incidents such as stolen bicycles, acts of vandalism or indeed assaults. So I really do not think that Cambs Police will be able to spare an officer to observe and comment on traffic movements!

For a moment I thought the report was on the wrong page and should have been on the Old News (page 40) listing village happenings in 1851!

Great Shelford Parish Council can confirm that Great Shelford does not have a designated Police Constable but is covered by our Neighbourhood Team, see link *https://www.cambs.police.uk/police-forces/cambridgeshire-constabulary/areas/campaigns/nhp/neighbourhood-policing/South-Cambridgeshire/*.

Two Parish Councillors did meet with two Police Constables on 5 July on Church Street and discussed the issues the Parish Council and residents have observed, and possible solutions.

The reality is that to have a dedicated Police Constable is not going to happen, the Police now are focused on using technology to make decisions on priorities and we as a community need to embrace the new systems to identify problems in the village by reporting issues online. *Clerk*

WAYS TO CONTACT CAMBRIDGESHIRE CONSTABULARY

Often when people require police assistance, they immediately think of dialling 999 or 101, but did you know that there are multiple ways to get in touch with police that do not involve making a phone call?

We operate a live web chat service where you can speak to our specialist operators if you need advice or want to report a non-urgent crime.

Simply visit our website at *www.cambs.police.uk* and click the green chat icon at the bottom of the screen to launch a chat.

Your incident will be handled in exactly the same way as 101 calls but can often be faster. Our average response time for web chat over a six month period (February 2022–July 2022) was just 56 seconds.

Not only that, but you can report a crime or provide us with information using our online report forms. These reports are dealt with in the same way as 101 calls and will be reviewed by operators in the demand hub within a matter of hours. If there is sufficient evidence and/or there are witnesses involved, a crime will be raised, and you will be contacted with a crime reference number. This means you will not have to wait on the phone for an operator – simply put all the information into the online form and we will take it from there.

With call handlers receiving up to 600 calls to 999 every single day, we believe that our online services can help to ease the pressure they are under. Please try to only #CallWhenItCounts and go online where you can. (Remember to always call 999 in an emergency situation – and for non-urgent instances, call 101 if you do not have access to online services).

24/7 PRESCRIPTION COLLECTION POINTS

Here at Granta, we recognise that modern life is pretty busy, which often makes remembering to order and collecting your medication challenging.

With our 24/7 prescription collection points, you can pick up your repeat prescriptions on a day and at a time that suits you – even when our dispensaries are closed. You can collect day or night, weekends and bank holidays.

Where can I find the collection points?

We have 24/7 collection points at Granta Sawston and Granta Linton and have just installed a new one at Granta Shelford.

How do they work?

- Order your prescriptions from your surgery in the usual way
- When your medicines are ready to collect you will receive a text on your mobile phone with a unique collection pin
- Type the pin number into the machine and pay any charges via card (if you pay for prescriptions) and the machine will dispense your medication



Are there any items that cannot be collected from a 24/7 collection point?

The collection points cannot be used for the following items:

- Controlled drugs like morphine and oxycodone
- Drugs that need to be stored in a fridge
- Very large bulky items

More ways to manage your repeat prescriptions

The 24/7 collection points add to the range of ways you can now access your medications – direct at the dispensary counter, in your own home with our free home delivery service and now at a date/time of your choice.

Try them out for yourself

For further information and to register, pick up one of our collection point forms or contact us via *granta.dispensing@nhs.net*, stating which collection point you would like your medicines dispensed from. Please note that you do need to have a smartphone to use this service.

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THE SERVANT KING

His Majesty King Charles must still be adjusting to his sudden change of role and lifestyle; one that he has been preparing for all his life and to which he has risen magnificently, but which presents him with a new lifetime challenge. Our new Prime Minister, Liz Truss has also taken on a job that, let's face it, not many of us would be up to. Behind it all, the late Queen Elizabeth has taken her step into eternity, after a lifetime of selfless service that has been described as incomparable.

But how much has changed, for the rest of us? The machinery of state rolls on, regardless of who is at the helm. His Majesty has made this clear in all his statements as king. He is committed, as his mother was, to being a constitutional head of state, with all that this represents. On the other, by his example as a man and through His Holy Spirit in His followers' lives, he shows us what being fully human really is, rather than letting us rely only on ourselves and make a mess of it.

'Your throne is God's throne, ever and always; the sceptre of your royal rule measures right living. You love the right and hate the wrong. And that is why God, your very own God, poured fragrant oil on your head, marking you out as king.' Psalm 45 vv6-7 (The Message)

May our new king be blessed by The Servant King, as his mother was. And may Liz Truss's government lead us towards justice and demonstrate Jesus's heart for the poor and marginalised.

PAROCHIAL CHARITIES NEWS

The new almshouse development is nearing completion and should be ready for occupation early next year. The 21 new homes are grouped in three terraces surrounding a central landscaped green. After much discussion, we have assigned each terrace a name memorialising a local figure who cared for the well being of Shelford people.

Martin Terrace

Great Shelford was amongst the many villages in the area to benefit from the generosity of **Lettice Martin**. Upon her death in 1562, this wealthy landowner of Chrishall, some eight miles south of Shelford, left money to found charities for the poor across 36 parishes. In 1890, Great Shelford's Lettice Martin's Charity merged with two other local charities to form The Parochial Charities.

Pearson Terrace

In addition to housing, the charity in its early years provided other benefits to those in need, most notably the provision of coal but also nursing aid and equipment. Our records show that between 1893 and 1895 - and soon after its foundation - the Parochial Charities paid for nursing duties provided by Elizabeth Pearson, a widow living in Abberley Wood.

Oliver Terrace

Before the health centre opened in 1980, the village surgery was located on the corner of Tunwells Lane and Station Road. And it was here that Dr Hugh Oliver MBE practised, firstly as a locum in the late 1950s and latterly - from 1976 to 1988 - as a much loved village GP. In between, he served as Medical Superintendent at the Mengo Hospital in Kampala, Uganda. Dr Oliver was for many years a trustee of The Parochial Charities, only stepping down in 2014. He died in 2017 aged 87.

What we've been up to

The talk on 5 September, **'Heat Pumps Explained'** by Warren Pope, from Peterborough Environment City Trust, gave a wealth of information and links to companies supplying equipment.

Basically, he stressed that if you decide to go for a heat pump, use a MCS certified installer and ensure their proposals meet the design spec MIS 3005 – that is a guarantee that their proposals will keep you warm and work well. He gave us details about costs, longevity and space needed outside and inside the house for equipment. He suggested alternative low energy heating solutions, such as Warmstone,

2G3S



Laminaheat and infrared heaters. He also discussed hybrid systems, such as a heat pump, topped up with another energy source for very cold weather.

He advised that as the cost of electricity is high and very volatile at present, it may be best to wait a while before installing a pump system, but that in the meantime it makes sense to insulate your home (borrow an infrared camera from Cambridge Carbon Footprint to check where the cold spots are in your house) and to install solar PV if you can. That way you will save money on your energy bills and reduce carbon emissions, whatever energy source you use. Then if the electricity prices settle, you can decide about a heat pump.





Monday 3 October – Low Cost Energy Saving Measures' Our conversation evening will complement the one on heat pumps and is by Bart Hommels, who has retrofitted his own home and featured in Cambridge's Open Eco Homes. It will be at 8pm at the Cox's Close Community Room in Stapleford, just off Church Street, or by Zoom if you prefer (contact details below).

Saturday 15 October – the nature walk with John O'Boyle is at Dernford Lake, from 2-4pm. See our website for more details. These walks are intended to raise awareness of our local wildlife sites and are open to all.

Monday 17 October – social cycle ride starting from Stapleford Pavilion at 10am. Join us for a leisurely ride on quiet roads and traffic free paths of around 20 miles, to include a coffee stop, returning to Stapleford by about 1pm. To book, email *greener@sawston.org*.

Other News

You will recall the climate conference Cop26 hosted in Glasgow last November – lots of fine words but not much action. Instead of insulating homes and speeding up renewables, our government seems hell bent on increasing oil exploration, which will not provide any more energy for about 30 years and will increase climate change.

The next climate Cop, number 27, is in Egypt this year. Developed countries need to commit more to helping less developed countries deal with the floods, droughts, and other climate disasters that they suffer – we have all been moved by the plight of people in Pakistan who have lost everything, again.

Around the same time there is Cop15 for biodiversity, where it is hoped that all countries will sign up to measures to reverse the loss of species, e.g. to protect 30% of the landscape by 2030. As with mitigating climate change, developing countries will need support from the richer countries to enable improvements to be made.

INITIAL PUBLIC OPINION SURVEY RESULTS

At the time of writing, the neighbourhood plan steering group is preparing to publish a report on the outcomes of its initial public opinion survey. Conducted between April and June 2022, our survey sought to understand what matters to local people about issues over which a neighbourhood plan may have some influence.

Broadly speaking, residents' concerns could be described by five main themes, although we recognise the interdependence of many issues. Below, each category is illustrated by a handful of examples:

- 1 Changing village identity expansion of Greater Cambridge; loss of village character and community feel.
- 2 Housing design and unmet needs new build design should complement existing vernacular; lack of small, starter and affordable homes.
- **3** Environmental degradation loss of green belt and biodiversity; protection of important views; planning conditions to protect and enhance wildlife.
- 4 Travel and transport woes growing congestion; poor public transport; reliance on cars.
- 5 Inadequate amenities demand for better local shops and services; improved countryside access.

The outcomes of community engagement will be combined with other information (such as a local housing needs analysis, landscape character assessment and local plan data) to create a large evidence base to underpin development of our neighbourhood planning policies. These are the most important outcomes of any neighbourhood plan because they form part of the statutory development plan against which planning applications are assessed.

OUR SUMMER OUTING (16 AUGUST)

What a wonderful gentle way to spend a balmy summer afternoon, gliding along the River Cam in glorious warm sunshine.

We began our trip with our boatman, Peter, by climbing aboard ROSIE, our long narrow boat – this trip had been postponed due to the pandemic. We met at the Plough at Fen Ditton, which is situated just outside the city boundary of Cambridge and sat poised with cameras at the ready to film the wildlife along the river bank, or sat back to relax and listen to Peter give his knowledgeable talk of the history of that area.

There were ten of us from the Shelfords and we were delighted to welcome three ladies from the Queen Edith's WI. Peter handed us some little black sunflower seeds, a favourite food for the swans, moorhens, cormorants and herons that we saw as we glided along on our solar electric and almost silent boat. Sadly, we did not see the kingfishers that day.

We were able to observe the new exhibition of the solar system on show in the fields beyond as we travelled towards Jesus Lock. As we approached Stourbridge common, we saw the Red Poll cattle, an ancient breed huddled together as they tried to keep cool in the shade of an enormous chestnut tree on this sultry afternoon. Peter pointed out the Split Bridge (pedestrian and cycle) and here we could see the Cambridge Museum of Technology, with its tall towers, a magnificent brick built construction of Victorian technology, open to the public and well worth a visit.

We glided past the boathouses belonging to the colleges of Kings, Selwyn and Churchill, looking quite deserted at this time of the year when the students are away, with only a few people around probably doing essential maintenance work. The huge yellow weedcutters were at work, an important job at this time of the year to keep the water clear of invasive plants and weeds.

It was lovely too to see the young boys fishing along the banks, proudly yelling out their catches of the day to us as they munched their sandwiches by this ancient waterway, which winds its way towards Ely and the fens beyond. We passed under the Fen Ditton Bridge and Peter informed us there had been a Summer Fayre held near here for over 800 Years.

As a result of this summer's drought we could see that the river level was down by about four inches. We passed by the Fort St George Pub used by the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge and saw the Green Dragon Pub where JRR Tolkien had drunk – this was his local. Garlic Row got its name from where



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goods would be uploaded for many of the Cambridge colleges and restaurants in the past. Many of the boats moored alongside the river looked abandoned and neglected, but it was good to see so many entrepreneurial spirits growing tubs of tomatoes and colourful flowers and traders selling coal, wood and coke ready for the colder months of the year.

We so enjoyed our cream tea, with delicious scones baked by Peter's wife and our trip ended back at the Plough one and a half hours later, where we had another cooling drink before our short journey home. Thank you Vanda, for organising a perfect summer day outing.

old Rews

Extracts from the Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and republished by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

18 October 1862

ASSAULT – Richard Brand of Great Shelford was charged with assaulting Joseph Rawlinson of Stapleford, a servant lad in the employ of the Rev Mr Hawthorn, on September 17th. It appeared that the complainant saw Brand's turkeys in his master's garden and drove them out, setting a dog on them. It would seem that the dog killed one of the turkeys and injured another. This rather exasperated Brand, who, next time he met Rawlinson, used a whip to him pretty freely. Brand admitted the assault, but alleged he was provoked to it, as he would not have taken 50s for the turkey. It took the first prize at the Crystal Palace Show. The evidence of Rawlinson and another witness was that the dog did neither hurt nor kill the turkeys and that the little lad who swore it did must have committed perjury. The defendant lashed Rawlinson five or six times with the whip. The magistrates said the case was one of the grossest provocation, and inflicted a penalty of one penny, and divided the costs between the parties.
