SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 16 NOVEMBER 2022

A representative of the Girl Guiding groups provided some information about how they currently use the space at the back of the Scout Hut and their concerns about the proposed Wheelscape.

The Clerk noted that since the last meeting Liz Watts, the CEO of South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC), has circulated the timeline for civil parking enforcement; SCDC have launched a new six free trees incentive which the Clerk has applied for; SCDC's Community Chest has been extended to help with the cost of living crisis and the Clerk is applying for funding to help with the Warm Hub. The report from the Clerk following attendance at the Society of Local Council Clerks was circulated to all members.

REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

District Cllr Fane informed members that there is funding available to assist with the cost of living crisis and that a rough sleeping survey is being undertaken on 17 and 18 November. The Clerk raised concerns about the number of residents who have been contacting her with issues about the upkeep of their properties. A letter will be written by the Council to express their concerns on this.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS

Cllr Price reported that residents had been saying what a good job the Community Payback team have done and thanks were expressed to Cllr Ashurst for finding the group.

Traffic & Transport Infrastructure Working Group

Members of the working group were not satisfied with the response from District Cllr Bridget Smith following the Parish Council's request for clarification about the route for Cambridge South-East Transport (CSET). It was decided to request more information on why the route across the country is better than the route running alongside the road.

An update on progress by the traffic consultant Intermodal was provided by Cllr Disley and Cllr Ashurst, who had met the consultant on 12 November. A draft report has been received along with drawings of proposals for Church Street. Cllr Disley summarised the report and the priorities noted by the consultant. It was agreed that a group of councillors and residents would look at the designs for Church Street, that Intermodal would be engaged to

undertake modelling one way systems in Woollards Lane and the High Street at an estimated cost of £7,000, and that the Parish Council would carry out consultations on Intermodal's proposals.

Neighbourhood Plan

An update from the Steering Group Chairman had been circulated. It was noted that with a grant from Locality and a contribution from Shelford of less than £3,000 to match that made by Stapleford, there may be enough money set aside to get the Plan through to being 'Made' during 2024.

Better Ways For Busways (BW4B)

It was noted that CSET is not on the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) agenda for the forum in December, meaning it may be set back to April 2023. The Chairman provided an update on the campaign by BW4B, noting that there is a new website, a petition has been launched and signage which had been installed has been stolen or vandalised.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

The Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group had put together a draft response to the GCP's *Making Connections* consultation and it was agreed that this should be sent to GCP.

Anglia Water has a consultation open on their proposal for a new reservoir to be built in the Fens. It was agreed that a letter be sent to welcome the reservoir as much needed for the area.

It was noted that the Combined Authority was running a consultation on their Alternative Fuel Strategy.

Documents had been received from the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Association of Local Councils (CAPALC) to approve the budget for 2023/24 and to amend the Articles of Association. It was resolved to agree to the budget and the amendments to the Articles.

The Clerk noted that progress had been made on items on the Business Plan as follows: the CCTV will be installed in January; a draft Action Plan will be circulated shortly from the Climate Emergency Working Group; advice continues to be sought from Miles Water Engineering about the riverbank; the Quality Level of the Local Council Award Scheme has been applied for, and work is under way to plant some trees and shrubs in the village with permission being sought from SCDC for tree planting.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

The Great Shelford Warm Hub launched on Monday 14 November. So far it has been quiet, but it is anticipated that as word spreads and the weather cools

down the Hub will become much busier. Tesco have been very supportive and already donated nearly £40 worth of items for refreshments.

Cllr Stanton informed the meeting that four companies had been approached to provide tenders for the Wheelscape Project, though only two had responded with some indication of design. It was agreed to ask for a fully costed design to be finalised and put into context with the location and for evidence of demand to be provided. This will then be taken to a village meeting.

Cllr Watson asked members what their feelings were about the service currently being received from the medical practice in the village. He noted that in recent times the parish council used to liaise on a regular basis with the medical practice, which is no longer happening since the merger into Granta. It was agreed to invite the CEO to a meeting and provide a list of points to address.

Following the first ever Shelford Community Awards in 2022, the subject of Community Awards for 2023 was considered by members. It was noted that Redmayne, Arnold and Harris were keen to sponsor again to the sum of £350 maximum. It was agreed to simplify the nomination process, allowing nominations via the website or on paper, and for there to be three awards.

EMPLOYMENT

It was agreed to increase the Clerical Assistant's hours from 10 to 15 hours per week from 1 December 2022.

A job offer is to be made to a previously interviewed applicant for the role of Caretaker at 15 hours per week.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS PARISH COUNCIL COMMENTS

CCC/22/072/FUL | Development on the A1307/Haverhill Road

Councillors were unhappy with the developer's response to the Parish Council's concern about the increase in traffic and resolved that a letter should be sent to say that this is not acceptable. The developer needs to mitigate the issues which have been raised and to explain what the mitigation is. It was felt that it is too soon to approve this development as CSET has not been finalised and both projects are designed to work together.

Proposed Cancer Research Hospital

Councillors welcomed this much-needed development. However they felt that the building is more in keeping with the original buildings rather than fitting in with the newer Royal Papworth and Astra Zeneca buildings, and would like a more imaginative approach to the building.

JULIE'S JOTTINGS

I must first of all say thank you to all who gave so generously in response to our recent Gift Day appeal.

The challenges of life as we begin the New Year are real. On a personal level there may be things that we want to be different this year from last. On a social level we may be asking how we can heal the wounded NHS, or the broken social care system, let alone the economy.

Recently I had to take someone for a hospital visit. We found that the car parking space was too small for the elderly passenger to get out. I had to hold up a stream of traffic to open the door wide enough. A kind person nipped out of their car and helped to get my elderly passenger out of the car and on to his feet. It was an unexpected kindness in a stressful day.

On the ward, the nurses and the medical team were wonderful. One nurse was a friend, and this was another unexpected good moment as we briefly caught up while she was answering questions about care and sorting out equipment. She told me that despite working with a wonderful team she felt exhausted because there just were not enough of them to do the job as she aimed to do it. Her heart went out to an elderly man who had just arrived on the ward after hours of waiting in A&E. I knew that she would make a difference for him.

Even though our New Year Resolutions usually don't last, the prospect of making a needed change or a new start is good for us and can work to shift blue moments in January, as well as start to move us into a better place. But it is not just at a personal level that we need to be intentional about making change. We build community, society and social institutions by our attitudes and intentions as well as our actions. It really does make a difference when someone is kind, or offers a fresh way of looking at things.

By Candlemas we will be midway between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. Brighter days are coming.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

THE VALUE OF A GOOD LANDSCAPE CHARACTER ASSESSMENT

The Neighbourhood Plan (NP) steering group has recently met for the first time with its external support consultants from Cambridgeshire ACRE. Preparing a NP, which once approved attains the same legal status as a local plan, is not a simple matter, so it is par for the course to employ the assistance of planning consultants and grant funding is available towards this.

At our workshop it was very reassuring to hear Cambridgeshire ACRE praise the outcomes and interpretation of the initial public opinion survey we conducted in spring 2022. Combined with other data which we already have courtesy of work done by a previous iteration of the NP steering group from 2016–19, we are in a very good position to now start drafting a vision for our NP, plus policy themes and objectives.

Perhaps the most significant piece of work that we 'inherited' from the previous steering group is a Landscape Character Assessment (LCA), which was commissioned from landscape planner Sophie O'Hara Smith. An LCA is a tool for identifying the patterns and individual combinations of features – such as hedgerows, field shapes, woodland, land use, patterns of settlements and dwellings – that make each type of landscape distinct and often special to those who live and work in it. These special qualities and distinctive characteristics can be protected, and potentially also enhanced, by planning policies created as part of the NP process.

Our initial public opinion survey clearly showed the high value placed by residents on our landscape setting, so it is critical that this is reflected in our NP. Our landscape is the backbone of our rural, village identity; it helps to protect us and separate us from the urban sprawl of Cambridge; living in a green setting makes us feel better and we'd like more of it and wider access to it; and finally, in the face of increasing development and climate change pressures, we want to protect it for wildlife and future generations.

Stapleford and Great Shelford's LCA divides our NP area into 10 different character types and provides recommendations for how we can protect and enhance each of them.



It's too soon to say which aspects of Stapleford and Great Shelford's LCA will be translated into policies in our NP but work on this will start early in the new year. In the meantime, here are some examples of what other NPs have done:

- 'Development will be supported where it...safeguards open countryside and cherished public views from inside and outside of the parish as defined in the LCA' (Whiteshill and Ruscombe NP, adopted 2016)
- 'Development proposals will only be supported if they do not jeopardise the status of Long Compton's dark skies site. Any applications for new development that requires a lighting scheme should show how the status of dark skies will be protected' (Long Compton NP, adopted 2016).

I look forward to continuing to report on the NP's progress through 2023.



Happy New Year; let's hope in 2023 the world makes some progress over control of global temperatures, climate justice for developing nations, and the decline of nature, despite a rather disappointing Cop27. Have you made any resolutions to go greener? For some tips, see *takethejump.org/* – to paraphrase:

- Eat a largely plant-based diet, with healthy portions and no waste (contact COFCO for vegetable boxes, reduce packaging by using Green Weigh and local greengrocers).
- Buy no more than three new items of clothing per year.
- Keep electrical products for at least seven years (and repair/recycle the old ones at a Repair Café).
- Take no more than one short haul flight every three years and one long haul flight every eight years.
- Get rid of personal motor vehicles if you can and if not keep hold of your existing vehicle for longer (use the bus, share lifts or hire a car if you only need occasional use).
- Make at least one life shift to nudge the system, like moving to a green energy, insulating your home or changing your pension supplier.

In past columns and in our newsletters we have suggested all sorts of ways to reduce your own impact on the environment (i.e. your carbon footprint). See our website for these suggestions. Even taking a small step will help.

Dr Bike, our bike repair shed in the Stapleford Slaughterhouse, was very busy before Christmas, and I hope if you've visited you have been enjoying riding your revamped bike. Do consider whether you can offer occasional help, to enable the repair sessions to continue.

We've been liaising with Eco Whittlesford https://www.ecowhittlesford.org.uk and the Haslingfield and Harlton Eco Group https://www.hheco.co.uk to organise a family-friendly event aimed at bringing together people from neighbouring villages.

A defibrillator is a life saving device designed to give a high energy electric shock to the heart of someone in cardiac arrest.

Funded by the Parochial Charities, two more defibrillators have been bought and installed in village phone boxes – on Hinton Way and High Green – bringing to eight the total number available in Great Shelford.

Defibrillators with 24x7 public access

- Hinton Way / Chaston Rd junction, in the telephone box
- High Green, in the telephone box
- Tesco, on the outer wall
- Rugby Club, on the outer wall
- Fenland Flat Roofing, 9 High Green, in the car park

Defibrillators with restricted access

- Scotsdales, inside at the information desk
- Health Centre, inside
- Rec Pavilion, inside

Anyone can use a defibrillator and you don't need training. Once you turn it on, it gives clear instructions on how to attach the pads. The device checks the heart rhythm and will only apply a shock if needed. You can't shock someone accidentally.

A 999 call will direct you to the nearest known device and provide further guidance on use.

Defibrillation; it's a shocking way to live!

Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) has been delayed again with Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) officers now saying that they will submit a Transport and Works Act Order (TWAO) to the Government in the first quarter of the next financial year (i.e. April-June).

We will then need to object to the TWAO, drawing on our expertise and resources to set out our carefully researched reasons. We need to object at this stage if we are to be permitted to make representations at the subsequent public enquiry. Whilst we can still be focusing our campaign and raising the necessary funds, the time for significant action is advancing.



OLD NEWS

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle,

Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

13 January 1849

PARISH FEUDS – A man called Pratt, who formerly resided at Gt Shelford, went to Australia some years ago and left two children who, being incapable of earning their own living, would have become chargeable to the Parish, if they had not been taken under the care of a man named Scott, their brother-in-law, who married Pratt's daughter.

Scott entered upon a rood of land, which Pratt rented from the Charity Feofees, and continued in occupation until Michaelmas, when he became backward in his rent. The Feofees then let the land to a man named Docherel, who took possession and planted some young cabbages. Scott imagining his title to be good, entered and destroyed the cabbages, and Docherel summoned him before the Magistrates for trespass. The case was dismissed by the bench (Lord Godolphin and the late George Tisher Esq.) on the ground that the case was one involving a disputed title to possession: and the Feofees then let the land to a man named Ellam, antedating his tenancy to cover Docherel's occupancy. Ellam took possession, and Scott summoned him for trespass in the County Court, where the case was dismissed, the judge having no jurisdiction. Scott (by his agent one of the children of Pratt Snr.) then went out and destroyed Ellam's plantings, in the shape of some more young cabbages.

Ellam summoned Pratt before the Magistrates on Saturday last, and obtained a conviction, the Magistrate on this occasion not hesitating to decide on the question of title, and the evidence of the Feofees being given in Ellam's favour. Scott had to pay 19s to free his daughter-in-law and this case which involves the letting of a rood of land for 6s a year, is not yet ended. Scott stated that he had been unable to obtain work in the Parish though he had relieved it of the burden of supporting the two children before mentioned, and said that he left a crop of rye on the land when the Feofees took it out of his possession and for this he had not been able to obtain any return.




