#### SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE FINANCE AND GENERAL PURPOSES MEETING ON 14 DECEMBER 2022

**Community Awards for 2023** It was noted that there are fewer awards this year. It was agreed to have a judging panel to include an outside organisation.

**Bus Shelter** It was agreed that fees for installation of a new bus shelter to be purchased by the Highways Committee should be covered.

**Cemetery** Initial investigations have been carried out on land around the Cemetery to find out if it is suitable for an extension to the Cemetery, bearing in mind the water table levels. The initial findings are favourable, meaning that further investigations are required. It was agreed that a detailed risk assessment should be carried out to enable discussions with landowners to be undertaken.

**Security** During a visit to the Pavilion and Memorial Hall to quote for CCTV, the supplier said that they could provide a system which would allow remote access to turn on/off the alarm at the Pavilion, and prevent hall hirers from entering the Memorial Hall via the kitchen, which is a health and safety issue. It was agreed that this should be installed.

**Charges for Facilities** The recommended charges for council facilities from 1 January 2023 were considered. There is no change on allotment fees or charges for Pavilion hire. Hire of the Memorial Hall has been brought in line with the Pavilion and Cemetery charges have increased by 2% rounded to the nearest £5. The cost of exclusive rights of burial and interment has been doubled for non-Shelford residents. Charges for the sports clubs have also been ratified.

**Budget** The proposed budget for 2023/24, as drawn up by the Responsible Finance Office, was considered at length by members and their amended proposed budget will be taken to Full Council in January 2023.

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## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

**Community Awards** The 2023 Community Awards are now open for nominations. In a change to last year, we have awards available in three categories. These are *Young Person (under 18 years of age)*, *Good Neighbour (was unsung hero)*, *Outstanding Contribution – could be an individual, group or organisation.* We listened to your feedback from 2022 and have made the nomination process much easier with a very simple form online: *https://www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/community-awards-2023/.* The awards will be presented at our Annual Village Meeting on Wednesday 8 March in the Memorial Hall. A massive thank you to Redmayne, Arnold and Harris, who have kindly agreed to sponsor the awards for 2023.

**Dog Fouling** It is unfortunate that I have to write this, but we are seeing increasing instances of dog faeces being left on the Recreation Ground including on the football pitches. We are one of a few villages where dogs are allowed to run free on the Recreation Ground. Please can we remind residents to keep their dogs under control and make sure that they pick up after them.

**Traffic** Last year the Parish Council employed a traffic consultant to look at the village to see if there are ways we can improve traffic safety for pedestrians, cyclists and motor vehicle users. The brief we gave also asked for ways that we could make Woollards Lane and High Street, safe destinations for residents and others. We have now received their report and our next steps are to consult with residents. We will be sending out a short survey in the near future to understand your feelings on this matter. We would encourage as many as possible to fill this in, so that it may guide our decision making.

**Memorial Hall** We came to you in July last year asking you how you wanted to use the Memorial Hall. We now feel that we need to have a more in depth understanding of how the Hall can be best used and future proofed for generations to come. We need to ask you, again, to help us by completing a questionnaire which will guide our discussions with professionals who can draw up plans to improve our Memorial Hall

**Village Market** Before finishing this month, I just wanted to remind you that our new Village Market commenced on 28 January. The market will be held on the fourth Saturday of each month in the Memorial Hall between 10am and 1pm. We hope you will support our local artisans and crafters.

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#### SHELFORD SCHOOL



Whilst readers will be looking forward to spring, at the time of writing the school term has only just started and we are remembering with pleasure that the Shelford School Christmas celebrations were almost back to normal. Reception and Key Stage 1 children performed their Nativity play to proud parents and friends. Meanwhile, pupils in Key Stage 2 led our annual Carol Service. This commenced with the traditional soloist verse of Once in Royal David's City (see photo).

The early days of this term included considering the gifts brought by the Three Kings and exploring the

symbolism behind these for Epiphany. We also looked at another meaning of the word *gifts*, as the talents and skills that we have, learning from the parable of the talents that we can use our skills to develop even further. This picked up on themes in a Growth Mindset morning. One of the key messages of Growth Mindset is that we can all improve, learn and make progress through our efforts. We should think 'I have not perfected this yet' rather than 'I cannot do this'.

We are always pleased to see the children getting involved in activities outside school and rarely more so than at this time of the year with the Little Shelford pantomime. Nearly 30 current or former pupils were in the cast this year, led by Archie Meikle's barnstorming performance as the Dame, and not forgetting many former pupils and parents in various preparatory or behind the scenes roles. You can read more about it in the next issue of the *Village News*, but I can say that the first night's performance was magnificent.

We have welcomed several new governors during the first half of this school year. Clare Mellor was elected by parents to be a new Parent Governor, whilst two other parents, Alice Walker and Douglas Leckie, have taken up roles as Foundation Governors associated with our two local parish churches. We have also been delighted to welcome Rev Julie Norris from neighbouring St Mary's. But having said thanks and farewell to several governors we are not quite at full strength. #### Julie's Jottings

Lent is one of the themes at the Primary School at the moment. We can expect to see children experience for the first time some of the things we are more used to. They love pancakes to eat on Shrove Tuesday, they enjoy watching or tossing their own pancake. They learn why people have the shape of a cross drawn with ashes on their forehead on Ash Wednesday. They understand the trials of giving up something they really like for 40 days, and the delight at the end when treats are enjoyed once again. They also understand the importance of getting up from mistakes and starting again, because that is very often how we learn.

I have found a poem by Jan Richardson which helps me to engage with Lent despite its familiarity and generally being busy. It starts by focusing on Ash Wednesday when the Church remembers that we came from dust and will return. But it also recognises that the mark of ash can symbolise some of the experiences which have hurt us. Such experiences hurt and form our character and are part of the human experience from the beginning of time. In the poem, Ash Wednesday and Lent become opportunities to marvel at what can come out of the dust.

#### What God can do with dust By Jan Richardson

This is the day we freely say we are scorched.

This is the hour we are marked by what has made it through the burning.

This is the moment we ask for the blessing that lives within the ancient ashes, that makes its home inside the soil of this sacred earth.

So let us be marked not for sorrow. And let us be marked not for shame. Let us be marked not for false humility or for thinking we are less than we are

but for claiming what God can do within the dust, within the dirt, within the stuff of which the world is made and the stars that blaze in our bones and the galaxies that spiral inside the smudge we bear.

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## **ROGER PEARCE**

Apparently, after the ITV programme covering the FIFA World Cup Final last year there was a tribute to one of their 'backroom' staff members who died in Qatar.

That staffer was Roger Pearce, ITV Technical Director, Sport. Search 'Roger Pearce' on the internet and tributes from throughout that industry will be in abundance.

As a boy, Roger and his family lived in Macaulay. He was a few months younger than me but we went through the village primary school, then Sawston Village College at pretty much the same time. We also shared time in the 1st Shelford Cub pack.

Below is a photograph of that motley crew taken in the mid-1960s.

Roger is in the middle on the back row. An imposing figure, even then.

I am far left, back row; my brother David is third from the left, front row and the only other name I know is Trevor (Jethro) Scotcher who is far right, front row. Hopefully there will be readers with better memories than I, to fill in some of the other names.



The tributes and obituaries painted a picture of Roger as a well-loved and hugely respected character. Nothing different to the comments of friends who had stayed in touch with him, albeit briefly in some cases, over the years.

I'd be happy with a fraction of that respect when I've gone.

## **SHELFORD PUBS**

In mid January we heard that the Square and Compasses was to close. This was a significant blow not only to its regular customers but to the village as a whole. It seems that the rent demanded by Greene King and calculated as percentage of the property value was out of proportion to the income and Bill, who has worked so hard over many years, has called it a day. We hope that Bill will be able to retire to the village, where he has been a considerable asset. Details of re-opening of The Square are not known at this time.

More than 32 pubs in England and Wales closed each month in 2022, data reveals. More than 32 pubs closed in England and Wales each month in 2022 as rocketing energy bills and staffing pressures forced businesses to shut for the final time. Of course pubs have always closed, moved or changed their names. We remember that the Navigator in Little Shelford was previously The Plough and The Square and Compasses was simply The Compasses in the nineteenth century. But if I asked you to name as many pubs as you could from Great Shelford, how many could you manage? Try it now before you read on!

We start with The Plough and the Square and Compasses. The Compasses is first mentioned in 1816 but almost certainly is earlier than that. Add The Railway Tavern on Station Road, built at the time of the railway line and closed in the late 1990s. And do you remember the De Freville Arms (1856) on the corner of Granham's Road? You may even realise that Peacocks took its name from The Peacock. But you'd have to be a very early resident to remember The Road and Rail on Freestone's corner. So that's six names.

Then we must add those pubs mentioned in The Great Shelford Chronicle over the years. The Black Swan was mentioned in 1791 and 1837; The George and Dragon still exists as The Old Thatch, next to the church (1803 and 1814); The Carpenter's Arms (1827); The Red Lion (1842) was north of De Freville farm; The Greyhound Inn was on Cambridge Road (1854); and finally add a beer house in Woollards Lane near what is now Spinney Drive.

I count twelve pubs – though not all at the same time! And now, for what we hope is a very short time before reopening, we are down to one. Even if you are not a regular drinker, that is sad.

So, thank you, Bill, for your contribution to our community. We hope to see you behind the bar at The Shelford Feast and wish you luck with your future.

# NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

Work on Stapleford and Great Shelford's Neighbourhood Plan (NP) continues apace, with the steering group holding its first workshop in December with consultants from Cambs ACRE, who are providing valuable expert support through this complex process. We reviewed the policy background to neighbourhood planning and then discussed the various strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats facing our NP area. Our consultants have since helped us to translate these into key themes that we could pursue in our NP and the planning policies they could give rise to. Given the external growth pressures that our area faces, we cannot possibly pursue all these within a timeframe that would make having a NP useful, so the steering group will whittle them down to a set of achievable and meaningful objectives, held together by an overarching vision (see below), over the next couple of months.

#### **Retracing our steps**

Although I've been writing regular monthly updates for Stapleford and Great Shelford village magazines for over a year now, it's worth briefly reminding readers what a NP is and what we hope to achieve by it. Our NP is a document that will set out what's important to our community when it comes to planning matters. So, for example:

- what sort of housing gets built, where and what it looks like
- how our green spaces are used
- the kinds of amenities that are developed
- where and how our natural environment needs protecting.

It's being written by and based on the views of the local community – the people who know and love the area – not the local planning authority. A steering group of Stapleford and Great Shelford residents and Parish Councillors are leading the charge and there have been face-to-face and online opportunities for others to contribute, with more such opportunities to come. The ultimate output of our work will be a set of planning policies specific to our area which will be used to help decide planning applications for things like new homes and developments of amenities like shops, playgrounds or offices. You can read more about our NP at *greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/sgsnplan*.

#### Vision + action = change

I mentioned earlier that we are now developing the vision and objectives for our NP, and in time these will also be shared with the local community. But why are we spending time on this? In a nutshell, the vision articulates where we want to be or what we want to be like, whilst the objectives show the actions required to get there. They work in tandem: a vision without actions is just a dream, and actions without a vision are, well, mere faffing about. In NP terms, our vision will be a statement of what our villages aspire to be like at the end of the NP period and it is the basis on which our objectives and policies will be formulated. It must be forward looking, strategic, descriptive, consider the land use and development challenges we face, but remain uncluttered by detail. It must also clearly reflect the planning related priorities of residents and we have a good understanding of what they are following our initial public consultation in April-June 2022.

Here are a couple of NP vision statements adopted by nearby communities:

**Foxton:** 'To retain and enhance the unique rural character and community spirit of Foxton. This will be achieved through positive enhancement of the parish's special landscape character, biodiversity, green spaces, historical character and assets, and local distinctiveness. Foxton's built fabric, both existing and additional modest housing growth, and appropriate new employment, will incorporate sustainability features. Foxton's vibrant community will be served by a range of quality facilities, and sustainability will be at the heart of tackling current and proposed transport issues.'

**Fulbourn:** 'In the period to 2031 Fulbourn village will continue to be a vibrant, sustainable and thriving local community with its own distinctive characteristics, separate from Cambridge yet complementary and benefiting from its proximity. It will have a locally distinctive built and natural environment and a wide provision of local services, supported by the local community. New developments will provide suitable housing, employment, leisure facilities and local services whilst protecting and enhancing its natural and built assets for future generations.'

It is no great surprise that there is some overlap between the aspirations of these villages, given their South Cambridgeshire rural settings and proximity to the city. Stapleford and Great Shelford's NP vision may end up being not a million miles away from these. After all, our initial public opinion survey highlighted some similar concerns amongst our residents: maintaining our village character and community feel; prioritising starter and affordable homes; protecting important views, greenbelt and biodiversity; addressing travel and transport issues; improving local shops, services and countryside access.

It will be interesting to see how the direction of travel pans out over the next few months and I look forward to continuing to report on it.

# **GUIDE TO CONTACTING THE POLICE**

When you need to contact the police, it can often be a distressing time, and with a range of different contact methods available to you, it might not be clear which one you should choose.

**Calling 999** You should call 999 (the emergency line) when someone is in immediate danger, if the crime is still in progress, or you need police help immediately. Also call this number if property is in danger of being damaged or a serious disruption to the public is likely.

**Calling 101** Call this number (the non-emergency line) to report minor and non-emergency crimes that are not currently in progress or to offer evidence in an investigation.

**Live web chat** This is the same as calling 101 but is likely to be much faster. Use it to report non urgent crimes, seek advice, guidance or support, or tell the police about something suspicious you've seen or heard. The simplest way to find this is just to Google 'Cambridge Live web chat'.

**Online report** You can also complete an online report. These are for non urgent crimes. There are dedicated reports for reporting a crime, domestic abuse, missing people, road traffic incidents, antisocial behaviour, lost or stolen vehicles, civil disputes, hate crimes, fraud, bribery and corruption. Once the report has been received you will receive a crime reference number and be informed whether the case will be further investigated or not.

**Silent 999 calls** If you are unable to speak freely but still require immediate police assistance, you can still call 999. If making a sound would put you or someone else in danger, you will be transferred to a Silent Solution system and given instructions on how to communicate safely.

**Social Media** If you need support, advice or guidance, you can send a direct message on any of the police social media pages to save you waiting in line for an operator. The social media inboxes are always monitored. You can find these @CambsCops on Twitter, Facebook or Instagram at any time and operators on the Digital Desk will see your message and respond in due course. This is often the quickest, easiest way of receiving advice or information from police in a non-emergency situation.

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### old Rews

#### **Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868**

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

#### 13 February 1847

ASSAULT AT SHELFORD STATION – Three men of working appearance, but who stated they were marines, called at the above station for the purpose of begging, and the officer refusing to relieve them, they became very disorderly and assaulted the constable, upon which they were forced into the lock-up. But in the morning, to the surprise of the constable, the birds had flown. It is supposed the vagabonds had skeleton keys in their possession and by that means effected their escape. They have not since been heard of.

#### 3 February 1855

CAUTION TO HOUSEHOLDERS – An expert and cunning imposter, very respectably dressed, went on Monday last to a poor old widow named Moore, stating that he was a foreman for a builder and that he wanted board and lodging for a time. The old lady, being glad to get a lodger, offered to lodge him and find him with a breakfast every morning for 7s a week, and this was agreed to. After bargaining with the old lady he borrowed 4s on the pretence that he could not get change for a £5 note and then went away, taking the 4s, and has not since been heard of. The police are on the search for the impudent thief and it is hoped he will not escape detection.

### 16 February 1856

REMITTANCE FROM ABROAD – Within the last few weeks, two young soldiers in the Crimea, William Wright and Daniel Thorn, who have escaped the awful vicissitudes of war, remitted £3 each to their friends in this, their native village. The above sums are amounts that they have amassed since they have been soldiers in the Crimea. James Britten, a married man, who emigrated from Shelford about three years since to Australia, has sent to his wife's friends at Stapleford £10 and the same amount to his relatives at Shelford. We hear also of many other acts of generosity having been displayed by emigrants to their friends at Shelford and Stapleford.



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### TENNIS CLUB MEET YOUR COMMITTEE

### EXERCISE CLASSES FOR PEOPLE WITH PARKINSON'S DISEASE



Parkinson's Disease is the fastest growing neurological condition in the world and its symptoms can include tremor, rigidity, stiffness and slowness of movement, poor balance and poor coordination. Unfortunately, there is no known cure at present, but exercise can really help address the symptoms

and is as important as taking any prescribed medication.

Specialised exercise classes are held in Sawston on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons. Tuesday and Wednesday classes are based on the Parkinson's Warrior regime and Friday is Nordic Walking for People with Parkinson's (or Smoveys – an upper body workout using special weighted rings – as an indoor alternative).

All classes are led by our award winning instructor, Paul Goddard, who has many years' experience as a neurological disease exercise instructor, and are fun, enjoyable and motivational.

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### 2G3S

**Dr Bike 'Making your bike better'** is run by volunteers at the Slaughterhouse in Church Street, Stapleford and will now run until at least Easter. Sessions are on Thursdays from 3pm to 5.30pm.

In our first sessions, until just before Christmas, we fixed numerous bikes, some only needing minor adjustments to get them into fine fettle, but common faults were worn or corroded brake or gear cables, or just lack of lubrication. We can show you the required 22-point check, for your or your children's bikes and usually fix any issues. That knowledge should help you in the future. We even have a supply of minor parts that are often all that's needed to make your bike better.

We have a band of experienced amateur bike fixers, but also need more helpers to build up a team so we can run into the summer. For each session we need one experienced person capable of understanding and fixing those difficult to find issues, but we also need volunteers for minor fixes or adjustments - all that is needed is a little DIY skill, the right tool (which we have), those few spares and our printed check sheet. If you have those sorts of DIY mechanic skills and can spare a Thursday afternoon just once a month, we need you.

For those of you with a bike that isn't quite right, or a child's bike that has seen better days, please bring it along and we'll do our best to make it better. All we ask is that you follow our 22-point check, to see how best you can maintain your bike, and that if adjustments or minor repairs are needed that you leave us a donation to help maintain our stock of minor parts and consumables. We want to continue to run this service for those who live in our local villages, but this needs both customers and volunteer helpers.

This scheme is supported by 2G3S (Green Groups in Stapleford, Shelford and Sawston), as well as the local Repair Café organisation. We can be contacted via *drbikestapleford@gmail.com*.
