SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 18 JANUARY 2023

PRESENTATION ON CAMBRIDGE BIOMEDICAL CAMPUS

Dr Kristen-Anne Rutter provided a presentation on Cambridge Biomedical Campus (CBC) Limited and the spatial framework they are looking to work to. Cllr Disley asked how CBC's vision fitted in with proposals for the 'woodland area for White Hill'. Dr Rutter stated that she did not know anything about that area. Dr Rutter will forward the presentation and a map showing land ownership within the boundaries of the campus to the Clerk.

WHEELSCAPE PRESENTATION

Members of the Playscape Charity provided a presentation on the proposed Wheelscape for the Recreation Ground. It was agreed that the council should move forward with the project and that £12,000 (10% of the expected construction costs including professional fees) would be added to the budget for 2023/24.

REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

Cllr Brown acknowledged the passing of District Councillor Loveluck and condolences will be passed to his colleagues.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS Neighbourhood Plan

An update from the Steering Group Chairman was circulated to members.

TRAFFIC & TRANSPORT INFRASTRUCTURE WORKING GROUP

It was agreed to adopt the recommendations of the traffic consultant's report, which included budgeting an additional £690 for the investigation of one way systems in Woollards Lane and the High Street, £750 for drawings of a signalled proposal for Church Street, for the Parish Council to consult residents about the recommendations and findings of the consultant, to ask residents to submit records of road and pathway incidents including injuries where appropriate, and to liaise with local businesses and service providers. The Parish Council approved the objective: 'To preserve and improve Great Shelford's character as a vibrant and pleasant destination village and acknowledge that addressing the

modern stresses placed on our aged roadways is fundamental to preserving and improving the village character and locality.' This objective could potentially underpin a range of policies and documents e.g. Planning, Highways and the Neighbourhood Plan. The working group was asked to draft an outline transport improvement policy and it was agreed that the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group should be updated regarding the importance of this issue for our parish.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION

Following the resignation of Cllr Shelton, both the Cemetery and Allotments Committee and Highways Committee were short of a member. It was agreed that Cllr Mann should join the Cemetery and Allotments Committee.

Following comments made by Great Shelford Parish Council when considering the planning application for the care home on Station Road in respect to constructor car parking, communication has been received from the constructor for the project, Carter Lauren. They are aware that their constructor traffic could have a detrimental effect on the roads around the vicinity of the project and have made an offer of £5,000 to park on the Recreation Ground for the duration of the project. It was agreed that this offer should be accepted.

A questionnaire to find out what the community wants from the Memorial Hall was presented to members. Its aim is to create a feasibility report for potential work to be carried out on the Hall. It was agreed to look at costs to print and deliver the questionnaires and to bring these to the next meeting. It was also agreed to see whether the Parish Council could apply for funding for this work.

Angli-EAR have offered a contribution towards any new hedging put in along the back of the fence behind their office. Due to lack of maintenance in the past, the hedgerow had become overgrown and the work undertaken had left it looking underwhelming. It was agreed to look at what could be done in this area and discuss at a future meeting.

Progress had been made on items on the Business Plan:

- the CCTV has been installed and is awaiting the final handover
- a draft Action Plan will be circulated for the February meeting with a meeting of the Climate Emergency Working Group to be arranged prior to this
- advice continues to be sought from Miles Water Engineering about the riverbank
- the Quality Level of the Local Council Award Scheme has received by NALC and feedback should be received in February
- work is under way to plant some trees and shrubs in the village.

Community Matters

Great Shelford Warm Hub restarted on 9 January after a two week break for Christmas and New Year. The Hub continues to be quiet with numbers varying from no visitors to a maximum of seven. All dwellings in Great Shelford received a Christmas card with a note explaining the hub but the interest does not really appear to be there. Donations have been received from residents to help towards the running costs of the hub. Volunteers are a little concerned that the Memorial Hall (Wednesdays) is not a comfortable location and feel it is rather a waste of their time as no one attends. It was agreed to stop the Wednesday afternoon sessions and look at ways to increase communication with members of the community who are harder to reach.

The Community Awards 2023 have been launched with information on the website, social media, noticeboards and in the *Village News*. Though the nomination process has been simplified, no nominations had been received. Councillors were asked to spread the word.

Finance

Following an onsite meeting with the Chairman and Clerk, the quotation from Brookfield Groundcare of £54 per square metre to carry out remedial work on the mounds in and around the Playscape had been revised to £44 per square metre with a total cost of £16,896 + VAT. This work would cover all mounds and the area in front of the bench to protect the grass from footfall which was taking the grass down to the root stock. £6,900 could be funded from the retention money for Duncan and Grove, with their agreement, and £5,000 from Carter Lauren could be offset against the costs, leaving £4,996.00 to be found by the council. It was agreed to employ Brookfield to carry out the remedial work to make the mounds both safe and durable.



BUDGET AND PRECEPT APRIL 2023-MARCH 2024

Great Shelford Parish Council has met on a number of occasions, both as committees and as full council, to consider the requests from all committees for the items to be included in 2023–24 budget. It is safe to say with the current cost of living crisis, discussions about the budget and precept have been much more difficult this year and it has taken some real soul searching to look at what should continue to be provided going forward and what projects should be started, continued or perhaps even discontinued.

Councillors considered very carefully if there were any services that they could cut from the budget, for example Christmas lights, hanging baskets and the maintenance of green areas in the village. After some discussion, it was felt that

whilst these areas of activity are not essential, they do add to the village's appearance and do bring some pleasure to residents. In order for us to be able to continue to provide them, £47,000 of current Earmarked Reserves has been released to support the budget for 2023–24.

In addition to the above, it was agreed to carry over a total of £23,600 from this financial year into our Earmarked Reserves, money which was budgeted but has not yet been spent yet on projects such as Clay Pit improvements, sports equipment replacement (e.g. goals), Heritage (maintenance of War Memorial) Freestones Corner, etc. The money will sit there until we are able to deliver the projects in the next year or so.

As stated, the Parish Council have committed £47,000 to be released from current Earmarked Reserves meaning that the budget for next year's expenditure is actually in excess of £411,000. In addition to the usual services and amenities the Parish Council provides, other projects to be delivered in 2023/24 include:

- consulting with the community on what they want from their Memorial Hall, allowing for a Feasibility Report to be created to guide designs for refurbishment or potential rebuilding of the hall
- installation of the Wheelscape (as part of the overall Recreation Ground Masterplan)
- increasing provision of events for residents
- trialling some highway initiatives to understand the implications before putting forward any proposals for major highway changes in the village
- investigations into a cemetery extension as our current site is becoming limited for space
- rolling programme of replacement for our bus shelters as our shelters become less structurally sound ... and much more.

Following submission of our request to South Cambridgeshire District Council, they have confirmed our workings for the number of dwellings contributing to the precept. We can confirm that the increase as a whole is 12.10% or £16.55 to a Band D property equivalent charge in 2022/23 (for the year). To understand this a little better, this is the equivalent of £1.38 per month on a B and D property.

If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact Libby by the usual methods. At an extra full council meeting held in January, Great Shelford Parish Council agreed to a precept request of £314,500. Following the meeting of the Parish Council on 15 February 2023, a full, signed copy of the budget will be available on the website:

Julie's Jottings

In conversation with a few people I asked what they thought Lent is about. One said it was about 'wilderness' and another quickly said, 'Wilderness – what a delight! – it would give me a chance to stop doing all the things that I have to do'. The conversation moved to thinking about how in the wilderness there is no scope for luxuries and life is pared down, not just in terms of liberty of thought and action, but also in terms of what is practically at hand to help. The news came on with images of the earthquake in Turkey and Syria. The losses and destruction there are massive and the inclement weather adds to the dismal landscape. This 'wilderness' is not welcome, and gives no respite to refresh the soul.

There may be useful insights to glean from giving something up in order to focus on holiness and service. Those who are able, and have relevant skills, may find purpose in dropping everything in order to help those impacted by the earthquake. Most of us don't have those skills and we would find ourselves just being in the way. The best thing we can do is to find out more and to support with money and prayer those who can help and those who most desperately need that help.

This conversation made me think of one more thing we could do in Lent, that would be worthwhile, which is to try to be more consciously aware and informed about global needs, especially when these end up, all but forgotten, beyond the headline news.

REST

For many people, myself included, the default answer to, 'How are you?' has changed from 'Fine' to 'Busy'. It seems almost to be a badge of honour to say how manically occupied we are most of the time. I would be the first to champion an active, connected way of life – in fact my last GSVN article on volunteering did just that – yet lately I have become conscious of a need to make a point of being *not* busy, but to rest. I find this hard. If I have a day in the calendar with no meetings, voluntary activities, visits, errands or urgent emails and paperwork, I feel guilty.

I am not alone in this; a recent study (*The Rest Test – Claudia Hammond https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/books/NBK453237/*) confirmed that many of us feel this way. (It's intriguing to see the 'top twenty' resting activities in the study – I thought spending time alone just meant I was anti-social!) Resting is not doing nothing. It is a time to unwind, calm our minds and recharge our bodies. Like the invisible roots under the winter earth, rejuvenation is going on and this apparent absence of activity is in fact preparation for growth.

God is the originator of the concept of rest. Regardless of whether or not one takes literally the idea that God created the world in seven days, the principle remains that after finishing his creation work, God took a significant rest, blessing the time and making it a holy, special one. In giving Moses the ten commandments by which people should live, he reiterated the need to keep the Sabbath day holy.

We tend to think of the Sabbath as a Sunday and thus it was for many years. (Does anyone else remember stultifying Sunday afternoons as a child, when there was nothing to do?) Yet for anyone involved in church life, Sunday is often the busiest day of the week and so a different day off is better.

Jesus himself challenged the religious leaders of his day for being legalistic about Sabbath keeping, when they criticised him for carrying out healings and picking grain because he and his disciples were hungry. It's not about keeping the letter of the law, but the spirit of it.

The point is that we need the Sabbath or God would not have made it for us. Jesus said that it was 'made for man (or woman in my case)' and that He Himself is the Lord of the Sabbath. I love this prayer (below) by Pete Greig, and leave it with you, whatever time and way you choose to rest.

May this day bring Sabbath rest to my heart and my home.

May God's image in me be restored, and my imagination in God be re-storied. May the gravity of material things be lightened, and the relativity of time slow down.

May I know grace to embrace my own finite smallness in the arms of God's infinite greatness.

May God's Word feed me and His Spirit lead me into the week and life to come.

OBITUARY - DAVID RAYNER



The founder of Scotsdales Garden Centre, David Rayner, has died at the age of 94.

He was a farmer, entrepreneur and benefactor who gave generously to the village, often anonymously, often with flowers and plants. Many will remember the old greenhouses and shop he bought on Cambridge Road in 1968, which has flourished as a business ever since, as well as winning awards at the Chelsea Flower Show. In 2007 he established the Scotsdales' Charitable Foundation helping to raise funds for the Cambridge Cancer Centre.

Charlie Nightingale comments: 'I've known David for about 40 years and he has been a good friend. David was the kindest person you could meet. He had time for everybody; nobody passed him without having a chat.

In the past few years we spent a lot of time with him building the David Rayner building, the home of Cambridge Cancer Centre. This building named after him is a testament to his kindness. He made a donation of £100,000 and use of land at Scotsdales. It is used by many other groups as well now.

David's kindness touched so many people especially in Shelford and there are few groups that he hasn't helped in some way. David sponsored the roundabout at Shelford Bottom which is about to bloom again in the next few weeks. Scotsdales gave large contributions to many Shelford charities — children's playgrounds, Arthur Rank Hospice and Shelford Feast to name but a few. All through the kindness of a truly kind and generous man who many will miss.'

PAROCHIAL CHARITIES

NEW ALMSHOUSES FOR GREAT SHELFORD

Five years in the planning, Great Shelford's new £4.4m almshouse development is now complete and has welcomed its first residents.

The 21 new homes, a mix of 1, 2 and 3 bedroom units, are grouped in three curved terraces surrounding a central green. Equipped with air source heat pumps, mechanically ventilated heat recovery systems, triple glazing and high levels of insulation, the homes are designed to minimise energy consumption and keep residents' running costs low.

'Ever since our initial public meeting in July 2018 at which we outlined the need for further affordable housing in Great Shelford, we have been working closely with villagers and both parish and district councillors to bring this project to fruition. And I would particularly like to thank the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority for their generous grant of just over £1m towards the development cost,' said Sarah Rann, Chair of trustees.



Alongside the new development the charity has planted some 250 native trees and laid out allotments, a community garden, footpaths and benches, providing enhanced public access to the eight acres of land it owns on the edge of the village.

The new development brings to 53 the total number of almshouse homes managed by Great Shelford Parochial Charities, providing affordable accommodation for villagers on low incomes and in housing need.

The trustees plan to hold a formal opening later in the year.



LITTLE SHELFORD PANTOMIME JACK(IE) AND THE BEANSTALK REVIEW

The directorial dream team of Dick Wallin and Heidi Meikle straightened the tabs, finessed the flats and cleared the apron ready for another week of panto mischief in Little Shelford.



The curtain rose on 2023 to see our eponymous hero(ine), played with thigh-slapping dynamism by Lucy Christelow, engaged in a chat show of her own devising – Jack and the Beans Talk. Libby Ahluwalia's marvellous script deposited us right at the pun-ishing level the audience needed, and deserved.

Jackie, her brother Arthur (an excellent Alex Cousins who was also a dab hand at guitar) and Jackie's friend Reginald (a barnstorming performance of lovelorn winsomeness and understated comic timing by the delightful Rehan Fernando) conspired to keep the existence of a kleptomaniac giant living in the clouds

from the local royalty, for fear of driving them to America. Reginald had his eyes firmly set on Princess Caroline - Alexa Bendelack with a diamond performance in more ways than one, the anticipation of Neil's Sweet Caroline hung in the air (like many of the sweets tossed to the audience) until the final scenes.

The giant, aptly named Hugh Mungus, partially in order to deliver Disney's crowd pleaser We Don't Talk About Hugh No, and partially because, in Charlie Fulton, it was a towering performance, had a rather more mercenary approach to his covetousness. His gremlins gleefully redistributed the wealth of the kingdom back into his pockets. Social satire bit early as the king and queen (regally portrayed by Zosia Zmija and Rafa Wilkinson) bemoaned the rising cost of living and used their henchmen (a terrifying tattooed triumvirate of Bea White, Emi Munoz and Bella Seymour) to extract extra taxes from our motley collection of villagers,



despite themselves having a goose who laid golden eggs (Imsy Butler-Burd doing her own version of quantitative easing every time one dropped). Special mention to the farmers, the butcher with his disappearing sausages, the greengrocer, ice cream seller, town crier, postman, brewer, florist, and, in a surprising character twist for Jack and the Beanstalk, Worzel Gummidge and Aunt Sally (a straw-stuffed Anni Sainson and Scarlett Wilkinson).

It was up to our heroes to save the day, both romantically and anti-austerity-ly, and luckily they had help in the shape of Dame Dolly, Fairy Godmother and Cow Pat. Archie Meikle was a triumph, bestriding the stage in wig and heels and, once he'd made room in his palm by disposing of the magic beans, he soon refilled the gap by having the audience eating out of it - there truly was nothing like this dame. Fairy Godmother Ellen Arthur moved the story along wand-erfully, and Phoebe Riordan was very a-moo-sing, channelling her inner Nessa from Gavin & Stacey, as the all-dancing, audience-milking cow from the Valleys. Hugh Mungus and his wife (an excellent Sally Hudson) didn't stand a chance.

Once the magic beans had done what magic beans do the audience marvelled at the bling in evidence festooned around the giant's kitchen, kept spick and span by his poor maids, Nellie and Ellie. An imperious Aga (built by Phil Chatwin over several weeks – the ultimate slow cooker) dominated the set and was used to great comic effect.

The fluorescent scene was out of this world, with a dayglow astronaut striding amongst the Millennium Falcon, butterflies, birds and galaxies, all assembled by Nikki Wilkinson and her luminaries.

Needless to say, mischief was overcome, scores were settled amicably, moral compasses reset, and all to the backdrop of tinkling ivories (a flurry of Greg Morris' fingers), raised singing voices (choruses A and B beautifully complementing the principals) and choreography ably en pointe under the watchful eyes of Cheryl Smythe and Emma Christelow. Francess Richardson's finessed flats were anything but, creating a vivid eye-popping backdrop, full of charm and chiaroscuro in equal effect. Charlotte Chatwin and her team sowed harmony in the wardrobe department, the make-up was lavishly lacquered by Beckie Whitehouse and helpers to tiny faces, and props and scenery, marshalled by Steve Henry and his stagehands were a constant source of delight. Sarah Coppendale brought a steady hand once more to organising the chaos.

Energy saving - with the cost of energy these days and the need to use less fossil fuel, we finally got around to borrowing a thermal imaging camera from Cambridge Carbon Footprint (the group that also co-ordinate the local Repair Cafes). It was very easy to use, after a short online training session and has confirmed some of our suspicions about our own house:

- the hatch to the loft needs insulation board putting on the back of it
- the back door, (a 30 year old UPC double glazed unit), leaks heat to the outside, particularly round the edges where it joins the walls
- the front of the house, which is solid not cavity, leaks heat, so we will be investigating exterior wall insulation
- our comfort will be increased if we carry out some cheap quick tasks, such as reflective foil behind the radiators and using draught excluder strips around doors

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

MARCH UPDATE – BUILDING THE EVIDENCE BASE

Back in January, I wrote about one of the main sources of evidence upon which any Neighbourhood Plan (NP) is based: the Landscape Character Assessment. This identifies the patterns and individual combinations of features – such as hedgerows, field shapes, woodland, land use, patterns of settlements and dwellings – that make each type of landscape distinctive and often special to those who live and work in it. These qualities and characteristics can be protected and potentially also enhanced by planning policies created as part of the NP process.

I'm pleased to say that draft versions of two other major contributors to our evidence base also now exist: a Housing Needs Assessment and a Design Guide.

Housing Needs Assessment

The number of homes needed for our area is set at a strategic level by the Local Plan Authority (LPA). It is perfectly permissible for NPs to recommend that more housing is needed than that identified by the LPA and even to allocate specific sites for housing. However, *this is not something which our NP can do*: (a) we do not have any brownfield sites within the existing village envelope to accommodate development, and (b) the villages are surrounded by greenbelt and NPs are not permitted to allocate land in the greenbelt because this is contrary to existing strategic planning policy.

That said, 'housing need' encompasses far more than just the number of houses. NPs must also understand the specific housing requirements of their area, including the type, size and tenure of housing and demand for affordable and specialist housing. To do this, NP housing policies are normally underpinned by a detailed Housing Needs Assessment, which draws upon extensive secondary data from a wide range of sources. Stapleford and Great Shelford's NP steering group has just received the first draft of its Housing Needs Assessment, completed for us by government contractor AECOM and grant funded. It's a very interesting read for data nerds!

Design Guide

In addition to specifying what kind of housing our area needs, our NP can also influence what that housing will look like. We know from our initial public survey in 2022 that this is something which is important to residents. Many people told us, for example, that new builds should be sympathetic to the rural vernacular and that they should incorporate progressive clean and green technologies.

To ensure that new housing is appropriately designed, many NPs commission a Design Guide and we have done the same. Our Design Guide looks at how

buildings, streets, spaces, landscape and materials combine to create specific areas within our villages with distinctive identities and characteristics and sets out how new developments should enhance rather than detract from them. It achieves a pretty granular level of detail.

A Design Guide was commissioned in 2019 by an earlier iteration of the NP steering group and is accessible via

https://staplefordparishcouncil.gov.uk/planning/. Please note that independent of the NP this document has no statutory role in planning decisions and is in the process of being updated, with an expected delivery date any day now.

Next steps

By the time I write my next update, the steering group will have firmed up the vision and objectives for Stapleford and Great Shelford's NP. We will also have been busy planning a second period of community engagement during which we will be inviting comments on our plans and sharing some of our evidence base. Materials and feedback channels will be available online and pop-up events in Great Shelford and Stapleford are being scheduled.

ANTHONY BROWNE

The week of writing, I attended President Zelensky's address to both Houses of Parliament. It was a moment comparable to the most historic occasions in Westminster Hall's storied history.

It is a building that has hosted such freedom fighters as Nelson Mandela, Winston Churchill and, indeed William Wallace. President Zelensky and the Ukrainian people's courage is a reminder that struggles against tyranny are not consigned to history.

It was an honour to hear President Zelensky's speech. I am confident that the bravery of the Ukrainians will win through. Listening to President Zelensky, I was moved to think of the immense generosity of my own constituents. The people in South Cambridgeshire signed up to the Homes for Ukraine scheme in their droves.

In perhaps more prosaic matters, I also spoke this week in the House of Commons on our research and development policy. South Cambridgeshire is a life science superpower, and the R&D tax credits regime is absolutely crucial to our cutting-edge industries.

I know our Government is committed to tackling fraud in this sector and, as a taxpayer, so am I. Nonetheless, it is of paramount importance that we do not throw the baby out with the bathwater so to speak. We need to support our leading industries, so I was delighted when the Chancellor recommitted to the science and technology industry in response to my question.

Lastly, I have continued to work on opposing the inappropriate plans for a congestion charge in Cambridge. The plan will unfairly penalise drivers who have no realistic alternative to driving through the new charging zone, imposing up to £1300 in extra taxes each year on local shift workers, working parents, tradespeople, the frail, the vulnerable and their carers.

It effectively imposes a charge to use our city's hospitals, including Addenbrooke's and Royal Papworth. This will cause an additional difficulty for those who have long term or regular treatment. People undergoing treatment often have other significant financial challenges without worrying about an additional payment to the combined authority.

Lastly, the Greater Cambridge Partnership's own analysis shows a potential fifteen percent traffic increase in local villages. This would cause a significant impact to the tranquil life that my constituents have chosen.



OLD RCHS

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

24 March 1849

ACCIDENT – An alarming accident (and which in its effects might have been calamitous) happened on Saturday evening last, on the road between Gt. Shelford and Trumpington, at a short distance from the house of Mr. William Moore, Greyhound Inn, Gt. Shelford. As Mr. W. Trigg, corn merchant of Lt. Shelford, was returning in his gig from Cambridge market accompanied by his sister, Miss Trigg, between 8 and 9 o'clock in the evening, and had nearly reached The Greyhound, they were met by three people on horses riding at full speed.

Mr. Trigg, although driving on the proper side of the road, was run against by one of them, when the gig shaft running into the chest of the horse killed it instantly. It appeared that the parties were some University gentlemen who had been to the Walden Fair, and after copious libations were thus recklessly returning to Cambridge.

The horse killed had been hired from Mr. Hunn and is said to be the third that gentleman has had killed in a somewhat similar manner this winter. Strange to say, although both shafts of the gig were broken, and Mr. Trigg, his sister and the gentlemen were all hurled to the ground together, providentially none of them received any serious injury, Miss Trigg alone being slightly bruised.




