SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 19 APRIL 2023

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

A member of the public, speaking on behalf of a number of residents, raised concerns and requested action regarding traffic issues on Church Street. The lack of enforcement of parking restrictions and of penalties for driving offences, the need for active school and parental engagement regarding pupil safety, illegal contractor parking when working on properties with no drives, pavement accessibility and safety, regular gridlock and daily driver altercations, aggression, incidents and accidents, along with increasingly heavy farm traffic, were all noted. The resident asked that the concerns of those that live on Church Street relating to an inordinate change in traffic behaviour in recent years be noted and taken seriously. Members acknowledged all issues, clarified the authority over highway improvements, explained current Parish Council activity and committed to continuing engagement with all stakeholders.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The Clerk noted that

- A response has been received and forwarded to Councillors from Oakbank following the Parish Council's contribution to the Nine Wells Management Consultation.
- Initial contact has been received from the Police and Crime Commissioner's Office about the Community Safety Partnership.
- A new food vendor will start selling at the Memorial Hall car park in May.

REPORTS FROM COUNTY & DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

District Cllr Fane noted various grants available to communities and Parish Councillors.

Cllr Disley requested that any feedback from County Cllr Milnes about the Sawston roundabout be circulated to councillors.

COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS

Neighbourhood Plan

The Steering Group is currently undertaking the mid-term consultation on draft objectives and evidence provided to form policies of the Neighbourhood Plan. The survey is open until mid May and all councillors are requested to complete it and spread the word to their friends and family.

Better Ways than Busways

The Traffic & Transport Infrastructure Working Group will invite the Chair of the BWtB to one of their meetings to understand more about the campaign.

HIGHWAYS MATTERS

Cllr Disley provided an update on work being carried out by the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group and reported that they would like to engage with the Climate Emergency Action Group about the funding for Electric Vehicle charging points.

The Working Group has been reviewing the Greater Cambridge Partnership's responses following the Sawston Greenway Consultation. It was agreed that Cllr Disley will draft a letter to the Greater Cambridge Partnership expressing members' concerns over these responses.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

The Parish Council has been awarded the Quality Level of the Local Council Award Scheme.

Following recent resignations some committees are short of members. Cllr Neil will join the Cemetery & Allotments Committee and Cllr Price will join the Human Resources Committee.

The proposed Social Media Policy was discussed and it was agreed to adopt this.

It was agreed to renew the membership of Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Association of Local Councils, which provides legal advice and support.

A Business Plan for 2023/24 compiled by the Clerk was discussed. The Local Council Award scheme had commented that the business plan was excellent but they would also like to see a plan for three to five years. The Clerk would like to start working on this shortly. It was agreed that the plan should be adopted and used for the year with addition of the Community Hub. It was suggested that there should be a meeting in the next couple of months for councillors to understand the longer term strategy of the council.

Two separate suppliers have been found for utilities for the Memorial Hall; Crown Gas and Power for the gas supply and SSE for the electricity supply, which will save the parish council in excess of £7,500 per annum based on the invoices already received by the Parish Council.

A meeting with Cam Valley Forum about how to best to look after the river bank was held on 20 March. It was agreed that more research should be undertaken.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

It was agreed to offer Parish Council support to OASISS (Open Arms in Shelfords and Stapleford) in their application to the District Council for funding.

Correspondence about an Over 70s Christmas Party was considered and it was agreed to offer the Memorial Hall free of charge and to offer other help that may be required.

There was a general discussion about the 2023 Feast. It was agreed to request a stall for Feast Day and to enter a Council team in the quiz.

Correspondence had been received from a Cam Valley Forum member about possible weir removal at Hauxton. The Parish Council had not known that this removal was being considered. It was agreed to write to Cam Valley Forum to understand who else has been written to, including other parish councils and the MP, and whether it is prudent to get a group together including these bodies and others such as farmers, wild water swimmers, the Greater Cambridge Chalk Stream Project, etc. It was also asked whether this work would worsen the invasive crayfish problem.

136 responses had been received to the Memorial Hall survey which closed on 14 April. 43 of these responses were eligible for the cash prize draw. The Clerk used a random name generator in full view of all councillors and the winner was chosen. The Clerk has contacted the architect to find out what information is required for them to look at options for the hall.

FINANCE MATTERS

The Clerk had been trialling the electronic checking of invoices to save time and paper. It was agreed that all invoices should be paid in this way and be approved by two councillors.

Having been in place for over 18 months, the wetpour on the Playscape is ready for a professional clean. Parish Council staff have attempted to clean the surface but are not suitably equipped for this. Quotations had been requested from three companies and it was agreed to ask Prestige to carry out the cleaning subject to references.

Invoices for the Non-Domestic Rates had been received from South Cambridgeshire District Council. It was agreed that direct debits be set up for these to aid cash flow and to ensure that there are no late payments.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

With Malcolm being on annual leave, I am afraid you have me as a substitute this month.

Coronation of King Charles III

A couple of other local residents and I were humbled by being invited to Westminster Abbey on 6 May for the King and Queen's Coronation. Though I am unable to speak on behalf of the others, I feel very fortunate to have been part of only a small number of people to have been so lucky to be invited. Though positioned slightly behind a pillar, I was so close to the door I saw all the comings and goings of the heads of state and Royal Family, the important people taking part in the coronation itself including the choir, the jewels and both Baroness Floella Benjamin and Lord Sebastian Coe. It is definitely a day I will never forget.

Fun Day

I want to take the opportunity to say a massive thank you to my Parish Council colleagues, Jenny and Lewis, who gave up their Sunday to help with the Fun Day on Sunday 7 May. This was in addition to all the local organisations who also helped on the day to make the event such a success including the WI, Shelford Free Church, Playscape, 2G3S, Shelford Scouts, Beavers and Girl Guides, Rainbow Pre-School and Shelford PTA. The Parish Council managed to raise £358 for local charities which will be divided out between the chosen charities at the end of the municipal year, along with any other monies raised from future events.

Verges and Hedgerows

You will have seen with the warm, wet April and May we have had, the grass has been growing at a very fast rate and with the large amount of rain, it has not always been possible to cut it as per the usual schedule. That along with 'No Mow May' (where only the verges which would cause a safety concern are cut) has meant that the verges are much longer than anticipated. Last year was not such a problem; with it being very dry the grass was a little slower in growth. We will be reviewing areas of the village to ensure that this is safe for all users and will think of a contingency for future years where the weather causes disruption due to a warming climate.

I would also like to take this opportunity to ask residents to keep an eye on their vegetation bordering any footpaths or roads. With the very wet weather, trees and shrubs have had much heavier branches which have in turn been lower down and causing issues for people to safely pass. If you could cast a critical eye and make sure vegetation from your property is cut back to the boundary and a minimum of 2.1m up off the pavement, it really would make it

much easier for residents to move safely around the village. Thank you in advance.

Great Shelford Parish Council is keen to provide more events this year. We have already had our Fun Day and the Village Market continues on the fourth Saturday of each month. We would love you to also put 14 October in your diary as we will be holding an event in the evening which will include music and food. Self-care: You can treat many **minor illnesses** such as colds and coughs, sore throats and upset stomachs at home. Make sure you are stocked up with healthcare essentials such as pain relief (e.g Paracetamol), cough and sore throat remedies, upset stomach treatment, rehydration treatment, heartburn/indigestion treatments and a first aid kit.

Use the NHS UK Symptom Checker *www.nhs.uk*: This helpful tool can guide you through your symptoms and direct you to the most appropriate health service for your needs.

Use your local pharmacy: As qualified health professionals, pharmacists can offer you advice and guidance on your symptoms and on the best treatment for you – no appointment required. Pharmacists are available on every high street and in supermarkets, with many being open in the evenings and at weekends. If your symptoms suggest something serious, pharmacists have the right training to make sure you get the help you need.

Community Pharmacist Consultation Service (CPCS): This service enables patients to have a same day appointment with their community pharmacist for minor illnesses or an urgent supply of a regular medicine. Should you need to be escalated or referred to an alternative service, the pharmacist can arrange this. Please speak to a member of our reception team to be referred into this service.

Ring NHS 111, Option 2: If you are experiencing a **mental health crisis** this First Response Service puts your mental health first. There are a team of specialist mental health clinicians on hand 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year, to offer advice and support and signpost you as appropriate.

Non-urgent appointments: Before ringing us, check availability of appointments online. You can do this if you have online access via SystmOnline, the Airmid app or the NHS app.

Medication: If you need to **order your repeat medication**, please do this online via SystmOnline, the NHS app or the Airmid app. Details of how to do this can be found on our website *www.grantamedicalpractices.co.uk*. If you do not have internet or mobile telephone access, you can send in your repeat medication slip or write in with your repeat request.

UPDATE ON OUR WORK

2022-2023 has been an exciting year for Shelford & Stapleford Youth Initiative. We have seen continued growth and development of our work, both in numbers and variety of sessions and the

support and activities that we offer. SSYI's work was carried out this year by our skilled team of youth workers, Charlie Trueblood, Tilly Akoto, Sophie Hurst, Tina Woodstock and our lead youth worker, Zac Britton. Jon Sanders the head of the Romsey Mill Youth Development Team has management oversight.

In the first half of the summer term of 2022, we were running seven weekly youth clubs, three of which were traditional community based open access sessions, where young people can come and go as they please, engage with youth workers, play games, and access support. Two were wellbeing focused sessions for two different age brackets and the remaining two were a football-

based session and a targeted girl's group.

We ran a jam-packed programme over the summer including regular open access youth clubs in Sawston and Shelford and trips to The Gauntlet (a youth motorbike charity in Ramsey), Wyboston Lakes Aqua Park, an outdoor activity day and more! We also took fourteen of our young people away for a three-night

Residential to Skreens Park in Chelmsford, where we did a load of activities including paddle boarding, high ropes, raft building and axe throwing. This was also a great opportunity for us to strengthen our relationships with our young people and encourage them to grow inconfidence and self esteem.

In September we were able to resume an even larger programme of activities in the autumn term including running a second open access session in Sawston. Along with all our detached work and one to one work in the community, we have been engaging with over 200 young people at Sawston Village College.

We have seen growth in young people attending sessions, including a large number from the Shelfords and Stapleford but also from villages such as Whittlesford and Harston. We have run one to one support sessions with 20 young people this year, many of these on a long term basis.

Our relationship with Sawston Village College has gone from strength to strength and we currently do ten hours of one to ones, detached and group

work in the school per week. Young people are facing growing challenges year on year and we are privileged to be providing valuable support to many local young people.

We have also recently started a new recycling initiative. We now have a specific aluminium can recycling bin in the youth centre (above Shelford Memorial Hall) along with a



general recycling bin for paper, card, cartons, and plastic. We are grateful to the Parish Council for providing a recycling bin for us to use. The young people that attend are being educated on recycling and encouraged to participate in being more environmentally aware.

In May 2023 we released our annual report with a great selection of case studies, statistics and quotes from young people giving a detailed overview of all that we have been doing over the last year. We are so grateful to all of those who support our work including parish councils, churches and individuals.

Julie's Jottings:

During the civic service to commemorate the coronation of King Charles III last month, the children asked the whole congregation to write on a crown shaped piece of card their hopes and prayers for the King. Ninety six people responded. This is how:

- 16 people focused on peace and unity
- 10 people focused on the environment and climate challenges
- 14 people wanted the King to advocate for the disadvantaged
- 13 hoped the King would promote and advise government to bring justice and equity
- 13 were looking for him to be a good example in society by showing kindness and being Christ-like
- 13 were hoping that the King will serve his people as he promised in the coronation service
- 4 expressly wanted him to listen and speak to people
- 6 people hoped and prayed that he would be healthy and happy in his role as King (and enjoy his grandchildren)
- and 7 coloured in their crown.

These responses reflect shared values and concerns. There is a desire for living together in concord and harmony, as well as for justice which empowers those who are disadvantaged and easily forgotten, so that they have a chance at fullness of life. Anxiety about the planet is also something which is widely felt.

In the Big Help Out, after the coronation, many people were engaged in voluntary work in their community. The hopes and aspirations for the King were matched by people's own endeavours to build the kind of community we want to live in.

This month we will have some special activities at St Mary's to which all are welcome. Please look below for details and join us if you can. These include looking at Trinity from different perspectives, including a child's eye view, on the first Sunday of the month. We celebrate new life when we welcome Sophie Thomas in Baptism and once again we will be joining with the Free Church for an Open Space adventure, this time in the Churchyard at St Mary's. There will be a garden party in the vicarage garden, No. 12 Church Street, with cream teas and games to play. There is also a Brass Band concert to look forward to.

Sundays in June

- **4 June, Trinity Sunday** Rev Adrian Daffern will lead a traditional Trinity Holy Communion using the Book of Common Prayer (BCP) at 8am. He will also lead the Family and Parish Communion service at 10am, along with Gillian Pett. This is a service where children can help adults to understand what Trinity means.
- 11 June we celebrate the **Feast of St Barnabas the Apostle** at both the 8am and 10am service. Barnabas means 'son of encouragement,' and the Apostle Barnabas was known to be a wise mentor. It is remarkable what a difference it can make when someone else believes in you. Someone saying, 'I think you can' makes it much more likely that we will try.
- **18 June** a traditional BCP Communion service at 8am. **The Baptism of Sophie Thomas** will take place at the 10am Parish Communion service.
- The Youth Group will meet at 5 pm in the Community Room. Any young people who are over 11 are welcome to come to this. There is tea, coffee, juice and food available.
- **25 June** The Bible readings for this day are a challenge. They focus on the value of human life and how to respond to bullying. At 8am there will be a traditional BCP Holy Communion and at 10am we will have a sung contemporary Parish Communion service.

Later there is the **Open Space Activity** for children and families. This starts at 3pm at St Mary's just outside the Community Room and in the Church Yard for games and creative activities as well as juice and biscuits for children and tea and coffee for adults.

Saturday 17 June 2–5pm. Garden Party and Gift Day will take place in the Vicarage Garden, at 12 Church Street. There will be cream teas, children's games and bric-a-brac and book stalls. *We hope that the weather will be good!*

Friday 23 June The City of Cambridge Brass Band will visit St Mary's Church once again for a concert. The programme will be 'A Celebration of Our British Isles', carrying forward the patriotic spirit of the coronation. Tickets £15 for adults, accompanied children under 16 free. This concert is in aid of the Friends of St Mary's.

Valentine's Day suppers for two, Shrove Tuesday pancakes, Easter eggs, hot cross buns, not to mention this year's extra treats of coronation this-and-that and now the approach of barbecue weather: food in its various forms is our constant companion in our progress through the year. Sadly, an increasing number of households struggle to feed themselves and have no treats.

There is quite a lot about eating in the Bible. On one occasion a crowd of some 5,000 people followed Jesus up a mountain to listen to him teach them. They listened to him until evening and by then they were hungry. When his companions asked Jesus how these people were going to be fed, Jesus replied, 'You give them something to eat.' (Mark 6:37). They were able to do just that, but only after Jesus had used his godly power to stretch a small basket of bread and fish to feed the entire crowd, with generous leftovers.

'You give them something to eat.' One of the ways we try to do this is by supporting a food bank. Our nearest food bank operates from the John Huntingdon's Charity (JHC) at Sawston. You can contact the food bank on 01223 492492. Please do not hesitate to contact them if you are in need, and, equally, please donate any of the items below, if you can.

From June 1 we are moving the hamper for your donations from outside the church back inside the Ashen Green entrance. As well as on Sunday mornings, the church is staffed on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 8.30am until 1.30pm. Ring the doorbell and someone will come and let you in. We deliver your donations to the foodbank once or twice weekly.

Please be aware that all items must be in tins, jars, packets or pouches. There are no facilities for keeping fresh foods. Recommended items are meat, fish, vegetables, fruit, pasta, rice, beans and spaghetti in tomato sauce, cartons of UHT milk and juice, tea, coffee, chocolate powder or cocoa, biscuits and bake it yourself bread. The food must be in date. Sadly homemade items aren't accepted. Basic toiletries and cleaning products are welcome, but no cosmetics. Everything you donate will be greatly appreciated and you will know for certain that you have helped someone.

GOODBYE, PAROCHIAL CHARITIES . . .

... HELLO, GREAT SHELFORD VILLAGE CHARITY

Still going strong after 133 years, but under a new name.

When first registered with the Charity Commission in 1890, the Parochial Charities owned just a handful of cottages and smallholdings and one of its key activities was the distribution of coal to villagers who would otherwise freeze in winter. These days, while we no longer distribute coal, the charity has a larger scale of operation, providing homes for around 100 villagers and, with the completion of the new £4.4M almshouse development, it also has substantial financial commitments.

Being a charitable trust, the Parochial Charities had no legal personality, which meant that all contracts, legal actions (sue and be sued, etc) and other liabilities were underwritten personally by the trustees. Having taken legal advice — and with the approval of the Charity Commission — we have restructured the charity under a new name, **The Great Shelford Village Charity**, and appointed **GSVC Trustee Ltd** as its sole corporate trustee. The former trustees become unpaid directors of this not for profit charitable company.

Chair of the charity, Sarah Rann said, 'We are not alone in doing this; other almshouse charities, such as those in Girton and Saffron Walden, have adopted similar structures. The Parochial Charities and its forerunners have assisted local people in need down the centuries and, rest assured, the directors of The Great Shelford Village Charity remain fully committed to continuing this work long into the future.'

The Charity Commission has also approved extending the reach of the charity so that assistance can be provided to a wider pool of beneficiaries. The 1890 charter did not allow assistance to be provided to anyone living outside Great Shelford, no matter how strong otherwise their connection to the village might be. Under our new constitution, we can now assist people who live in the village *or the surrounding area, or who otherwise have a strong connection to the village*. This allows us to help, for example, individuals who have been brought up within the village, who have had to move away because of the expense of local accommodation and who now wish or need to return.

We hope to combine it with a clothes swap or jumble sale to expand on the idea of making the most of what we already have and reducing our impact at the same time. There will be a link for booking in items for repair on the Cambridge Carbon Footprint events web pages where you can also find details of other local repair cafes. Remember: Reduce, Repair, Reuse, or Recycle if all else fails.

Hopefully you are adopting **wildlife friendly gardening** in some way: feeding birds, growing nectar rich plants or following No Mow May. Don't forget, if you saw flowers and insects on your unmown lawn, do send in pictures to our email address.

Many residents will have received a letter from James Littlewood, the CEO of Cambridge PPF, about **the busway**. Do consider helping the campaign if you can, more info at *bw4b.org*. People living in Great Shelford and Stapleford have had the opportunity to give their views on the Neighbourhood Plan proposals. It's important to use your voice when you can, don't just think you can't influence decisions and policies.

DR BIKE CONTINUES

NOW ON TUESDAYS, 3-5.30PM THROUGHOUT THE SUMMER

Dr Bike, 'Making your bike better' is run by volunteers at the Slaughterhouse in Church Street, Stapleford, used with kind permission of the Parish Council.

Throughout the winter we have fixed numerous bikes, some only needing minor adjustments to get them into fine fettle, but common faults have been worn or corroded brakes or gear cables or just lack of lubrication. We can show you a 22 point check, for your, or your children's bikes, and can normally fix issues. We ask you to stay throughout the process, to better understand your bike. That knowledge should help you in the future. With donations received, we now even have a supply of minor parts that are often all that's needed to make your bike better. If we can't help we'll suggest a local bike shop.

If you want your bike, or your children's bikes to be safer and easier to ride please bring them to us.

We've a good band of experienced, but amateur bike fixers, but we also need more helpers to build up a team during the summer. For each session we need just one person capable of understanding and fixing those difficult to diagnose issues, but for the majority of fixes or adjustments all that is needed is a few DIY skills, the right tools, which we generally already have, our checklist, and possibly a few of our spares.

If you have DIY mechanical skills and can spare a Tuesday afternoon just once each month, we need you.

For those of you with a bike that isn't quite right, or a child's bike that has seen better days, please bring them along and we'll do our best to make them better. It is rewarding to fix those minor faults on a quality, but 30 year old bike, and then see the owner returning from a test ride with a big grin on their face. All we ask is that you follow our 22 point check, to see how best you can maintain your bike. If adjustments or minor repairs are needed we request a donation to help maintain our stock of minor parts and consumables.

We want to continue to run this service for those who live in our local villages, but this needs both customers and volunteer helpers, to ensure better bikes for all in our villages.

We'll also be at the 'Tour de Stapleford' on Sunday June 25 from 10am



CORONATION REFLECTIONS

I received the initial invitation by email, to my great surprise, weeks ago. I almost missed it, being away at the time. And I could not work out 'why me?' But I immediately booked hotel and train. It was not until Buckingham Palace announced that 450 recipients of the British Empire Medal had been invited, especially those that had received the award to recognise their work during COVID-19, that it became clear why: I was one of them. My focus had been helping 100s of Cambridge homeless people off the streets, arranging good accommodation and excellent food and support, bringing together a wide network of volunteers and organisations. All part of It Takes a City, the community response to homelessness I founded in 2018.

The beautifully inscribed and handwritten invitation arrived in the post a couple of weeks before the Coronation – envelopes stamped Buckingham Palace do not arrive very often!

The day dawned cool but clear, with the threat of rain. All of us, small and great alike, queued from just after 7am and were shepherded through a long line of 'street-liners'— wonderful cheerful volunteers who had all been up since 2.30am— and into the security area. Perhaps the friendliest bag check ever.

The Abbey hits you on first entry – the colours, the coronation theatre, the scale, the array of people from the suited and day dressed to the ermined and robed all mixed together, all trying to find their seats. I got lost but was eventually guided.

In my seat – no wandering around please and no photos! – by about 8am, it was time to study the large and beautifully printed order of service. Looking around I did not recognise anyone – some with BEMs like me, some with extensive rows of medals, some with none.

Most in the Abbey had to see most of the proceedings on a TV screen, not always nearby – we were a small group with a big screen so were really engaged. It was a profound experience, spiritually, lending my voice to the King and Queen and saying amen to the Archbishop's proclamations, and musically, an extraordinary quality of composition and playing. I downloaded the recording – it still moves me.

The time flew by as we concentrated on the words and the actions – over five hours of sitting was relieved by a lot of standing during the service – but once the main procession had left, we could 'wander around'. After leaving the Abbey it was not possible to walk round to see the procession to Buckingham Palace o it was back to the hotel, a cup of coffee with a fellow attendee, lunch and a wander home, digesting the sights and sounds into a life long memory of a great day, a great privilege and a great blessing.

OLD REWS

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

3 June 1825

EDUCATION – The Rev. J Heafford receives into his family a number of young gentlemen, who are boarded and educated under his own personal care, assisted by his son. His plan of tuition includes reading, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping by double entry, English grammar, history, geography, etc., Terms:- Twenty-four Guineas per annum. By the union of solid instruction, domestic comfort and affectionate solicitude, with important religious advantages, J. Heafford hopes to merit the approbation of those parents who wish to promote the best interests of their children.

NOTE: Rev. Heafford was the Baptist Minister.

17 June 1843

FIRE ENGINE – At Great Shelford a fire engine is kept in the church (a common but scandalous practice) and the walls adorned with rows of black buckets. All the windows of the chancel have their tracery blocked with mortar, and the east window is square with wooden mullions.


CRICKET CLUB
