SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 19 JULY 2023

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

A resident raised concerns about speeding in Hinton Way, saying that the road needs to be reinstated to the way it was before the resurfacing carried out in 2022.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The Clerk reported that the new access system is now up and running at the Memorial Hall and Pavilion with no further access permitted via the kitchen.

Feedback has been received from Stapleford Parish Council who are keen to work together on items of joint interest such as planning, traffic and transport.

REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILS

No reports had been received from County or District Councillors prior to the meeting. District Cllr Fane was in attendance and provided a verbal update on District Council matters.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS

Neighbourhood Plan The Steering Group chair and the planning consultant have been working on the second draft of the Design Guide. The final document will be ready to use in drafting the Neighbourhood Plan.

A draft table of contents has been agreed for the Neighbourhood Plan, including desired policies which build upon work initiated by the planning consultant and the steering group earlier this year and incorporate outcomes of the recent community consultation.

Everything continues to be on track to complete the Neighbourhood Plan towards the end of 2024. Statutory consultation, examination and referendum add significantly to the timeline (and are included within this projected end date) but are fundamental to the process.

Communications Working Group An updated vision to support the strategy of the Parish Council for the next five years was considered by members. It was requested that feedback should be sent to Cllr Disley and that the Communications Working Group would bring this to the September meeting for review.

Cllr Disley summarised a proposal for a plan of action for the next six months, seeking to engage with the community to aid the Parish Council in best representing the community's views and to keep them informed of ongoing progress. It was decided that members of the group would bring some further ideas to the August Finance and General Purposes (F&GP) meeting.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

Banking Hubs The village no longer has an ATM or any other banking facilities for use as an alternative to building societies and the post office. Councillors discussed Banking Hubs, which can be used by residents no matter who they are banking with, and are available via LINK (a cash machine network). Due to the closure of all high street banks in the village, it was agreed to approach LINK to see if it is possible to create a Banking Hub for Great Shelford.

Cambridgeshire Acre It was agreed that membership with Cambridgeshire ACRE, which supports community-run groups, should be reviewed for a further year at a cost of £60.

Business Plan An initial meeting was held with the architect regarding a feasibility plan for the Memorial Hall; a second event will be held on 14 October.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

It was agreed to permit the Cambridge Vets Football team to use the Recreation Ground at a charge of £44 per match.

It was agreed to print and circulate the annual report to all dwellings in the village.

FINANCE

The Clerk provided an update showing the financial situation of the Council on 30 June 2023.

The grant request received from the Shelford Mobile Warden Scheme was considered and it was agreed to provide a grant of £3,500 towards the work that the group undertakes for the community.

The paving on the Memorial Green footpath running behind Halatte Gardens is uneven, with trip hazards and broken slabs. It was agreed to appoint Brookfield to undertake the work at a cost of £3,724.00 + VAT, with money being used from the unused Earmarked Reserves currently allocated for CCTV.

It was noted that the work requested for the Clay Pit is eligible to be covered under the Zero Carbon Grant provided by South Cambridgeshire District Council. It was agreed that the Clerk be authorised to seek funding via this grant, to enable a wider variety of work to be undertaken at the Clay Pit.

The Clerk noted that with the new access system in place it would be useful to have an alarm system in the Pavilion which ties in with the key fobs presented

to users and staff. It was agreed to purchase the alarm system at a cost of £790.00 \pm VAT from Briar and for the money to be used from the CCTV Earmarked Reserve.

The Clerk noted that although the company which provides support for the fire alarm system is supportive, they have at times taken days to turn up to attend call outs due to the distance they travel. A proposal from Briar was considered and it was agreed to employ Briar to carry out routine maintenance and call outs for the fire alarm in both the Memorial Hall and Pavilion.

HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT MATTERS

Members considered the letter being sent by Cambridge Approaches to reiterate their objection to the East-West Rail Route as announced on 26 May. It was agreed to add Great Shelford Parish Council's name to the list.

Cllr Disley informed members that the Intermodal report on the potential for any sort of one-way system in the village was almost ready for publication. It was agreed to publish the report upon receipt of the final version and to undertake a simple consultation on ideas resulting from both Intermodal reports. The Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group (TTIWG) will produce a draft survey for the August F&GP meeting to approve for distribution.

It was agreed that the TTIWG should produce drawings and a scheme of potential options to improve Church Street, with a view to submitting a Local Highways Initiative application in January 2024. The process to be followed includes consultation and updates to the Parish Council for approval before submission of the final bid.

The various transport projects happening in and around Shelford were discussed and it was agreed to seek support from Cambridgeshire County Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council regarding the concerns raised by local residents and the Parish Council, especially those resulting from plans of the Greater Cambridge Partnership.

Cllr Disley recommended that a simple infographic be produced to demonstrate to residents what the impact of all the changes to traffic and transport would be on the village. It was agreed that this should be produced and brought to the August F&GP meeting.

Cllr Mann highlighted the recent announcement of a consultation on ticket office changes which would affect Shelford Station and presented a draft letter. It was agreed to send the letter on behalf of the Parish Council with an additional question to clarify what will happen with the station building if the proposals go ahead.

Representatives from Better Ways for Busways (BW4B) will be attending the Greater Cambridge Partnership Assembly meeting on 7 September and the board meeting on 28 September.

Members considered the recent news article about Cambridge 2040. A proposed statement was presented and will be published on the website following circulation to members.

PARISH COUNCIL AUGUST NEWS

As quickly as that, the children are back at school and we start looking towards the autumn and cooler months.

Usually we share with you all the things we have been able to achieve as your Parish Council. This time, however, I wanted to show that there are many things we try to do for the benefit of our residents which do not always happen.

Highways We understand your concerns over traffic and have attempted to:

- install a permanent vehicle activated sign on Hinton Way (as you come into the village from the A1307) but this was turned down by the County Council's Highway Authority.
- liaise with the Highways Authority since 2019 about the awful state of Woollards Lane, both road surface and pavements but as you can see nothing has yet happened.
- solve problems with parking, which causes residents a lot of heartache. We
 have informed the Highways Authority over the last two years that double
 yellow lines need refreshing on several roads and that we need to have
 parking restriction enforcement. We agreed to pay Police Community
 Support Officers overtime for this. However, the trial was pulled by the
 police after three months due to payment of overheads.
- looked to monitor air quality in a few places around the village, but South Cambridgeshire District Council were not able to get the equipment to us.
- sought volunteers to help with community gritting last winter, but without success.

Planning The Parish Council is a statutory consultee for all planning applications in the village. The parish council does not approve any application but can simply make recommendations to the planning authority (Greater Cambridge Shared Partnership). These are not always listened to.

Public Open Spaces We realise that our public open spaces are precious and we know that the space we have is well below the recommended amount for the population of the village. We have, therefore, been liaising with other organisations and private individuals to increase the number of designated footpaths in the village, formalise the permissive footpath which is known as 'Jenny's path' and been trying to look at the purchase of more land to provide more open space.

Caring for God's earth has, in the past, seemed an optional extra for the church. It was historically something reserved for those who had people and resources in excess. However, more and more churches are learning that looking after creation is a core part of being a Christian. For, as we love Christ more, so we should care about the things that Christ loves. People and the planet should head that list.

At Great Shelford Free Church we have been on an Eco-journey for the last five years. The Eco church scheme, run by Arocha, *ecochurch.arocha.org.uk*, includes over 2,000 churches in the UK. The scheme was set up to demonstrate that the gospel is good news for God's creation. The scheme looks at five core aspects of the church, including worship, community engagement, land and buildings. You may remember events such as the Swish and the Eco-festival in previous years. This contributed towards and beyond our bronze status. We're excited to be closing in on the Silver Award.

On this journey we have been grateful for a number of volunteers who have helped lead this initiative. Most recently, a team of 10 faithful volunteers formed a work party to make the land behind Cara Coffee more nature friendly. At the end of July, we worked on the creation of a bug hotel from old roof tiles, clearing away dead wood, planting butterfly friendly plants, the building of a compost heap from old pallets (for Cara's coffee granules) and developing a mowing regime to benefit wildflowers.

At the start of our 'Silver' journey, the Land category was the most deficient. But now, due to the hard work of our volunteers, no more! A great thanks to all those who helped. And do pop by and have a look next time you are passing.

Julie's Jottings

Flowers such as roses and lilies appear many times in the Bible and other Christian literature. I came across a short piece by St. Augustine last month when we were celebrating the Dedication of our Parish Church to St Mary the Virgin:

'She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley. Through her birth the nature inherited from our first parents is changed.' St. Augustine

This metaphor reinforces the idea that we don't have to accept our inherited characteristics, but we can make our own choices. Doing so in a Christ-like way can result in wonderful things. And maybe when our actions are scented with a beautiful fragrance, we actually make a difference to others.

Flowers are such powerful and meaningful images in metaphors like this because of their simple but astounding impact on lives. It's hard not to be moved by a delightful garden or exquisite display of flowers.

This month we hope you can join us at our **Flower Festival** on **9 and 10 September** and experience flower power for yourself! The theme this year is taken from the hymn 'For the beauty of the earth'. Those who often decorate the church with flowers will be joined by many others to transform the church. Among the arrangements there will be one in memory of David Rayner, whose legacy includes Scotsdales and the Cancer Centre next to it in Great Shelford. The Ministry Team will also be making an arrangement in memory of Maureen Dobson, our own much loved Licensed Lay Minister.

Everyone will get an opportunity to try out their own flower arranging skills with jam jars to fill for children and cups for others. Please come along and experience the beauty, smell the fragrance and enjoy the refreshments.

Following this, at **5pm on Sunday 10 September** we will sing our thankfulness for the beauty of the earth at a **Songs of Praise** where hymns will be chosen by various people from the community.

Our new website: *stmarysgreatshelford.org/* This is now regularly being updated with information about what is going on at St Mary's.

Sunday 3 September Thirteenth after Trinity: Rev Julie Norris will lead a traditional **Trinity Holy Communion** using the Book of Common Prayer at 8am. **Parish Communion Service** will then follow at 10am.

Sunday 10 September Fourteenth after Trinity and Education Sunday: Rev Julie Norris will lead a traditional Holy Communion using the Book of Common Prayer at 8am. This is followed by a Parish and Family Communion Service where the children take part. We will enjoy the Flower Festival and also reflect on education and wonder what we have learnt most recently about the earth. We will also pray for schools and all the children, teachers, assistants and other staff at Great and Little Shelford Primary School. Confirmation Classes also take place. We look at why we might want to read the Old Testament. At 5pm there will be a Songs of Praise as we draw to the close of the Flower Festival based on the hymn, 'For the beauty of the earth'. Different members of the community will tell us why their chosen hymn inspires them.

Sunday 17 September Fifteenth after Trinity: Rev Julie Norris will lead a traditional **Holy Communion** using the Book of Common Prayer at 8am. Our sung contemporary **Parish Communion Service** follows at 10am. At 5pm, the **Youth Group** will meet in the Community Room. Any young people who are over 11 are welcome to come to this. There is tea, coffee or juice available and food.

Sunday 24 September Sixteenth after Trinity: Rev Julie Norris will lead a traditional Book of Common Prayer **Holy Communion** and at 10am we will have a sung contemporary **Parish Communion Service**. At this service Rosey Feuell will be commissioned as an Anna Chaplain. An Anna Chaplain is someone who works with people who are of all faiths and none, to facilitate spiritual growth and development in the later years of life. Later in the day there will also be the **Open Space Activity** for children and families. This starts at 3pm at St Mary's Churchyard outside the Community Room. There will be a range of games and creative activities as well as juice and biscuits for children and tea and coffee for adults.

Zoom Services continue each **Sunday Evening** at 6.30pm and give a space to listen to music and a reading which at the end of the weekend can prepare us for the week ahead.





NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE GOVE SETS SIGHTS ON CAMBRIDGE GREEN BELT

I won't be the only one whose underwhelming summer was further dampened by the drip feed of Michael Gove's as yet detail-free plan for a new urban quarter for Cambridge, comprising a quarter of a million new homes and cutting edge laboratories. Does everyone who lives here work in biotech? I don't.

As Chair of Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan's steering group, this news wasn't a complete shock to me because our Neighbourhood Plan was instigated to help shape our area in light of significant growth expectations. However, the scale of Gove's ambition is staggering; so staggering that it requires a super-squad of leading planners to parachute in, unblock bottlenecks in the current system and bring it into being. It is my understanding that none of these 'leading planners' has yet visited Cambridge.

In light of this news, it is vital that we continue full steam ahead with our Neighbourhood Plan. This cannot prevent development – that is expressly not the purpose of any Neighbourhood Plan – but it can help to ensure that identified local needs and valued places and spaces are not simply bulldozed in any gold rush (or, perhaps more appropriately, 'green belt rush').

Importantly, it is our way to have a say in how we want our area to develop and the right to do this is enshrined in planning law – but only once our Neighbourhood Plan is in place. Hence, time is very much of the essence. Without a Neighbourhood Plan, we remain vulnerable to speculative development and it would be down to individuals and our Parish Councils to raise objections to planning applications. Neighbourhood Plans have the same legal status as Local Plans and the National Planning Policy Framework; individuals and parish councils do not.

So, please keep up to date with the work that the steering group is doing with, and on behalf of, our community. The report on our recent second community consultation is available to read at www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/SGSNPlan, together with a host of additional background information and updates. We are progressing well against our schedule, but a Neighbourhood Plan is an enormous undertaking and there is a lot to do!

DON KING 1931-2023

Dad was born in Pampisford. His father was a farm labourer and moved around the country where the work was. The family travelled mainly around Norfolk, Cambridgeshire and Hertfordshire. He went to school (think Laurie Lee's school in *Cider with Rosie*) at Odsey near Royston. Living at Therfield meant a significant walk to school. Occasional lifts from army lorries helped.

His working life started on the farm and the family moved to Great Shelford. In November 1947 he went to a local fireworks party attended by villagers from both sides of the 'Water Bridges'. One of the attendees was a young lady



called Mary Cage. There started a seven decade long love affair.

After marrying in 1954, they lived in farms and cottages along Granhams Road. The first family home was in Macaulay. Eventually they settled in Granhams Close, where Dad stayed until he passed away in July this year.

Dad became one of the village postmen – a job he loved. He was soon a well known character in the village. The job bought him in contact with all sorts of people from all walks of life. He treated them all the same; and they him (mostly). Mutual respect was earned. One of the houses on his regular round had the front door with its letter box directly onto the footpath. Dad had developed the knack of feeding the letters through the slot while still cycling and without stopping ... until one day unknown to him, new owners had put a stronger spring on the letter box flap. He wasn't sure how he didn't lose a couple of fingers. His dignity took a knock though. No more cycling through without stopping.

In his youth Dad was quite sporty. He played football and cricket for Great Shelford. Part of the attraction was possibly the post-game social, invariably at the De Freville Arms; he also worked there as part time barman and cellar

man. Not that he was a stranger in the other village hostelries. He had friends all over. Bar billiards and darts were other good reasons to go to the pub.

Various health issues finally caught up with him, leading to early retirement in the 1980s. To aid his independence he purchased the first of several Reliant three wheelers (Plastic Pigs). He and Mum went miles at weekends; occasionally to the coast. A favourite destination was Happisburgh. Here a friend had a yacht moored on the Broads and would invite them to cruises around Norfolk's waterways. They both loved this.

Eventually, even the car had to go. It made way for a string of mobility scooters; something Mum was not happy in mastering, so the sight of the pair of them going along the road in formation never materialised. Shame. In his later years he wasn't blessed with the best of health. Various joints and limbs gave him pain, but he rarely complained *enough*. He was also diagnosed with a form of blood cancer in 2021 which added to a myriad of other ailments. On paper he had so many things wrong with him that his grandson Ollie christened him 'Teflon Don', meaning that he had all these things wrong with him but nothing stuck.

However, some things did stick and he couldn't fight any more. Dad is now at peace and in a better place, together again with Mum. We'll all miss him; his mind was still sharp, as was his tongue occasionally. At nearly 92 he was one of the older residents of the village and one of, if not the, oldest surviving member of the Cricket Club. Not that he would go a village club for 'old' people.

Truly the end of an era.

Talk/conversation evening – at the time of writing this will be in Sawston at the Free Church, at 7.30pm on Monday 25 September. Two officers from South Cambridge District Council (SCDC) will talk about ways we can all save energy, in particular tenants, who cannot install solar panels, insulation, and so on. Check our website or posters then come along and get ready for cooler weather!

Repair Cafe – if you missed our last one at the Rugby Club in Great Shelford (see photo on cover), the next one is on Saturday 18 November in Sawston. In Great Shelford, our team of repairers dealt with well over 50 items, repairing over 70% of them and helping the owners of the items understand what they were doing, in case future repairs were needed. We used the extra space at the Club for a SWISH clothes swap, which again was very successful, taking in donations of 57lbs of good quality clothes and only being left with 19lbs to take to the Arthur Rank Hub in Sawston. There is a lovely friendly, social atmosphere at these events, helped by copious amounts of cake! Repairs and

clothes were not charged for, though donations were gratefully received, as we have to pay for the premises, the hire of tool kits from Mackays and support for Cambridge Carbon Footprint, who coordinate and promote all the repair cafes in the region.

Other green matters

The BBC has shown two interesting programmes recently, one on electric cars, and the other on air source heat pumps. In the case of the heat pump programme, they look at alternatives for heating homes (such as hydrogen), electricity generation and whether the national grid can cope, with interviews and case studies. See BBC iPlayer.

Some of you will have come across critical comments by Alan Titchmarsh, amongst others, concerning wilding, letting grass grow and so on. However, 'wilding' doesn't mean 'never mow' – if you just leave your lawn or verges and never cut them, over time you get dominant species like certain grasses, nettles, brambles and thistles taking over. There is a need to manage your mowing – see advice on the website *plantlife.org.uk*, depending on what wildlife you want to attract. If you have not cut an area of grass since the spring it's probably a good idea to do it now.

As I write we have all the dreadful wildfires in the Mediterranean, Asia and North America, which climate scientists say would be almost impossible if it wasn't for global warming. Yet we have UK politicians diluting their commitment to net zero. Measures to cut carbon certainly need to be introduced in a way that doesn't penalise those people most unable to afford any extra cost. But when Centrica, Shell and other companies in the fossil fuel industries declare record profits, there has to be something to address. At a personal level, many things you do to help the environment can actually save you money, e.g. switching off your car engine while in a queue at road works/traffic lights/level crossings or idling will save you money as well as reducing air pollution for nearby residents and passers by; or only buying the food you need and using up/freezing leftovers; or eating less meat; or improving the insulation of your home.

BW4B UPDATE: MICHAEL GOVE'S SUPERCITY AND THE ILLOGICALITY OF BUILDING BUS ROADS

Housing Secretary Michael Gove has announced plans for a new 'urban quarter' in the Cambridge region, including an extra 250,000 homes in addition to the roughly 50,000 already planned in the emerging Greater Cambridge Local Plan. To achieve this, Peter Freeman, Chair of Homes England (the government's housing and regeneration agency), has been appointed to lead the soon-to-be Cambridge Development Group. Where this new urban quarter – 'in keeping with the beauty of the historic centre' – will be built has not yet been revealed.

Our MP, Anthony Browne, has vowed 'to do everything' to stop the 'nonsense plans to improve mass housebuilding in Cambridge'. He has also pointed out that the Environment Agency is objecting to 'all new major housing developments in South Cambridgeshire, due to concerns about water scarcity.'

There is common consensus that Mr Gove's plans will irrevocably destroy the amenity of Cambridgeshire's rural environment as we know it today. The only silver lining seems to be an emphasis on affordable housing and significant investment in a transformative and sustainable transport network.

What this should throw into perspective is the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP)'s underwhelming strategy of building busways: unconnected bus roads which terminate at the City edge, just where traffic relief is most needed.

The eye watering cost of these bus roads, which under the GCP's own modelling will never pay for themselves, is economically illiterate. It will involve the destruction of the irreplaceable biodiversity of a 100 year old orchard at Coton and the opening up of countryside for development which could not otherwise be justified.

The GCP (whose Executive Board is a joint committee of the County Council, City Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council) refuses to look at alternative proposals for on-road improvements (including junction improvements and bus lanes), which would deliver similar transportation benefits at a fraction of the cost. Many consider that the GCP's current strategy defies any logic save that of saying 'we've got this far so we have to continue.'

However, in light of Mr Gove's ambitious future plans for Cambridge, should not our local leaders recognise that a far more modern and sustainable transport infrastructure is needed? For example, a light rail option (proven to be both feasible and affordable) would render busways obsolete.

With widespread horror expressed in response to Mr Gove's proposals, it remains to be seen how this will develop, but there is a sense that central

government of any political background will consider Cambridge to be of national importance to the UK's growth. Surely for anyone with concern for our natural environment, this is a time for action to preserve our countryside.


We want as many people as possible in our villages to be informed about how damaging and utterly ridiculous the GCP's busway plan is, and to this end watch this space! We will hold a public meeting in the Autumn to give all residents the opportunity to contribute towards BW4B's fundraising target. A public enquiry with our own legal representation and expert witnesses representing the interests of our villages is the price of democracy.





OLD RCHS

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

19 September 1857

GARDEN ROBBERY – On Tuesday night, some thief or thieves entered the garden of Mrs Garrett, of this village, and stole about half a bushel of very fine apples. A few weeks since this lady lost a quantity of peas. A party is suspected, and will be watched and if caught an example will be made of them, they may depend.

27 September 1862


THANKSGIVING SERVICE – A harvest thanksgiving sermon was preached in Great Shelford church last Sunday, by the vicar, the Rev. A.T.Crisford, when the sum of £15.12s.4d was collected on behalf of Addenbrooke's Hospital, and has since been paid over to the funds of that institution.

23 September 1865

THEFT – Alfred Tabor, of Great Shelford was committed for trial for stealing nine cattle cabbages* of the farm of Mr Henry Hurrell.

* cattle cabbages – also known as Jersey kale and tree cabbages. They are native to the Channel Islands and can grow up to 20 feet tall.

They were used as animal fodder and also for making walking sticks.



CRICKET CLUB

But more important than all of that was the enjoyment gained by players of all teams and their improving skills. Huge thanks are due to the various coaches and team managers, without whom none of this would happen.




