#### SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 20 SEPTEMBER 2023

#### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

It was noted that since the meeting on 19 July the new intruder alarm has been installed at the Pavilion. The Chair and Executive Officer attended the conference held by the Cambridge and Peterborough Association of Local Councils (CAPALC) on 15 September, where there was a talk from Stephen Moir, Chief Executive for Cambridgeshire County Council, and other interesting talks on topics including website accessibility and dealing with difficult people.

#### NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

Additional funding has been secured for the project. A rough draft of the plan would be circulated to all steering group members at the end of September and it was anticipated that the draft will be sent to Greater Cambridge Shared Planning towards the end of October.

Cllr Ashurst queried the Housing Needs Assessment accuracy as dwellings which have been built for locals do not appear to be supporting local residents. It was agreed to write to the Village Charity to find out what the situation is.

#### COMMUNICATIONS WORKING GROUP

The action plan to extend engagement with the community was considered and it was agreed to adopt the plan, with a budget of  $\pounds 3,000$  to be delegated to the Executive Officer with input from the working group. The Chair expressed thanks to the Communications Working Group for the work undertaken.

#### CAMBRIDGE BIOMEDICAL CAMPUS WORKING GROUP

The Chairman updated members on the letter sent out by Nick Kirby of Cambridge Biomedical Campus Limited (CBC) to the Federation of Cambridge Residents' Associations (FeCRA) challenging some information provided by the Community Liaison Group in correspondence to the FeCRA, and the proposed joint letter to be sent from Great Shelford Parish Council and Trumpington Residents Association to the FeCRA correcting errors and misunderstandings in the letter from Mr Kirby. It was agreed that the letter be sent to the FeCRA.



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#### COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

**a)** Cllr Watson updated members on his recent talks with South Cambridgeshire District Council members about how the village can work to retain businesses in Shelford and entice new businesses to the area. He expressed an interest in setting up an Economic Development Working Group to support local businesses. Cllrs Gherseni and Stanton expressed an interest in being part of the Working Group. Cllr Disley will liaise with the group about communications it may require.

**b**) Following review of the Trumpington Residents Association's letter about the Green Belt and CBC, it was agreed to offer the Parish Council's support and to communicate this to other organisations involved in the potential encroachment into the Green Belt.

c) The Rainbow Pre-School, Wacky After-School and Holiday Club have applied for an extension to their planning permission. It was agreed to support the need for the provision of pre, after school and holiday cover when the planning application comes forward (but not a temporary facility). A letter will also be sent to the governing body confirming that the temporary building is not adequate for the needs of the village children, especially those with disabilities and complex needs.

**d**) In relation to concerns about water quality, Cllr Watson noted that Harston Parish Council have joined Cams Valley Forum, meaning that they are able to get their water tested regularly. Two residents have agreed to monitor the water in Great Shelford. It was agreed to join Cams Valley Forum at a cost of £150 as a life member.

e) SSYI have applied to install a cooker hood and extractor fan in the kitchen and to widen the cupboard door at the bottom of the external stairs at the Memorial Hall. It was agreed to permit the SSYI to make the alterations.

#### **COMMUNITY MATTERS**

It was agreed to hold a Christmas light switch-on event on Saturday 2 December with a budget of  $\pounds$ 4,000, to include as many local groups as possible.

#### FINANCE MATTERS

It was noted that following the Priority Zone 1 tree survey, urgent work is required on several trees at the Recreation Ground, Freestones Corner and the Memorial Green. It was agreed to employ Brookfield Groundcare to undertake the required work at a cost of  $\pounds 2,265 + VAT$ .

#### HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT

Cllr Watson updated everyone about ongoing discussions with Cambridgeshire County Council and Jesus College to open up Jenny's Path as an official permissive footpath. Jesus College is prepared to grant a licence to cover the maintenance of the footpath. The ongoing concern is about who is going to pay the licence fee (£1,000 + RPI annually). S106 money is available but it is not clear whether it can be used for this purpose. It was agreed that the Parish Council would be prepared to pay the licence fee + RPI if the S106 money cannot be used.

It was agreed to purchase a Speed Indicator Device to be placed on Hinton Way.

A statement to accompany the second Intermodal Report on the potential for a one-way system in the village was discussed and it has agreed to publish this on the website, together with the report.

Cllr Disley summarised the proposed survey, supporting documents and proposed timeline for initial engagement with residents following the publication of the two Intermodal reports. It was agreed to design and publish the questionnaire.

The Traffic & Transport Infrastructure Working Group has been working on a plan for Church Street. Residents now need to be consulted on this. It was agreed to have a meeting on 22 (or 29) November 2023.

#### **Highways and Public Meeting**

I hope you will have received and completed our recent Traffic Consultation survey which was delivered to every dwelling in Great Shelford (and was online too). The deadline for completion was 3 November but if you were not able to get your views across in time, fear not. We are holding a public meeting on **Wednesday 22 November at 7pm** in the Memorial Hall to discuss ideas in how to make our streets safer for all users. So please come along and listen to our ideas and provide us with your considered views.

#### **Christmas Lights**

Join us as we turn on the Christmas lights on Saturday 2 December. We are trying something a little new this year with stalls, rides, food and of course Santa making an appearance. Keep an eye on social media, our website and noticeboards for more information as it becomes available.

#### Verges

During October, Libby and Jenny spent a soggy morning on the verges marking up seven areas (five verges) for wildflower planting. We have acknowledged that though we had best intentions with the 'No Mow May' initiative, with warmer wetter weather this is not feasible. We will, therefore, be mowing the verges throughout May, but we are creating around 95 square metres of wildflower areas on verges at:

- the junction of Orchard Road with Hinton Way
- the junction of Mingle Lane with Hinton Way
- Church Street at the end of Kings Mill Lane
- High Green opposite Noel Young Wines
- Cambridge Road by our new bus shelter near Trinity Lane.

#### A reflection ... Blessed are the meek

When Jesus, in his longest recorded sermon, gave us the Beatitudes (Matt 5. 1-12) he described what he was looking for in his followers, or what his followers should aspire to in order to become like Him. 'Blessed are the meek ...' Nowadays meekness is often looked on as weakness, but it is not so at all. It is certainly a direct contradiction of the way many people choose to behave, lacking kindness and courtesy, being self-centered, aggressively proud and mercilessly uncharitable. Easy to understand then why 'meekness' might have no place in their lives. We might well ask where the 'gentle' gentleman or gentlewoman has gone.

Jesus' hearers were left in no doubt that living the beatitudes would not be easy and they would almost certainly meet plenty of opposition, insults and persecution for their efforts. It is important to understand that these eight precious blessings are not as it were a multiple-choice selection, not an *a la carte* menu. They must be taken as a whole, for they describe what we, as Christ's followers, should be like. The beatitudes present us with a challenge to the way we live each day. Blessed indeed are the meek, who show kindness and courtesy to others, are compassionate, not selfish and share their time and resources with those in need, who are not concerned with self-aggrandisement through their charitable giving and works. We need so many more of them!

Centre of Hope - God's Love in Action (GLIA), Dorohoi, Romania

Let's go back to the pre-Covid-19 times of 2019 ...

The Centre of Hope – GLIA– is a much-used community centre in the town of Dorohoi, situated in the far north of Romania. It is run by a local charity, Asociatia (Romanian spelling) Centre of Hope and is funded by a UK-based charity, Centre of Hope – GLIA, that was set up over 25 years ago. The Centre provides around 60 hot meals daily to the impoverished residents of the town and surrounding villages, hosts a mid-week Praise Service and allows homeless, ex-orphanage people to have hot showers. In the grounds there is a children's playground, and several after-school clubs are run at the Centre. Also, the charity distributes food, gas bottles and logs for domestic stoves, plus clothes, toiletries and other items. An educational programme provides much-needed resources and financial help to young people who want to take further education opportunities.

In April 2019 a group of 11 GSFC members visited the Centre and spent a week building an outside under-stair cupboard and painting a number of outside items. Most of the group had never visited Romania before, so the charity founders, Peter and Lesley Butcher, took small groups to visit some of the locals in their homes. All the visitors were shocked that so many people live in such relative poverty in a developed European country. However, it wasn't always like this. As part of the Soviet Union, Romania enjoyed investment from Russia and Dorohoi was a prosperous place thanks to the town's glass and ceramics factories. Then, after the fall of the Soviet Union when the flow of Russian money ceased, no replacement investment was forthcoming and the town became a shadow of its former self, with unemployment steadily rising to the current 80% or more.

During the next two years, Covid-19 arrived, and all the aid provided by the Centre temporarily stopped. Eventually restrictions were relaxed and hot food packets were made available from the driveway of the Centre. However, the Centre could not be used for meetings and the playground remained closed.

Soon after the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, Ukrainian refugees appeared in Dorohoi as they crossed the Ukrainian and Moldavian borders, and the Centre made accommodation available to them. In total, the Centre helped over 200 refugees over a 12-week period.

By October 2022, the Wednesday evening Praise Services and the playground were reinstated, albeit not to the same level as pre-Covid times. Peter and Lesley are concerned by the loss of the social lunches and are thinking of ways to increase the level of pastoral care provided. When they lived in the Centre, which they did from 2002 to 2009, they spent a lot of time visiting the local residents, but the amount of time they can do this at present is limited by the fact that they now live in Lossiemouth, Scotland, and are in their mid-seventies, although they still visit a few times a year. They would like to employ a local person to do the pastoral visits, but finding the right individual is proving difficult.

GSFC has generously supported Centre of Hope – GLIA with donations of money and time for the last five years. Another working visit of GSFC members is currently being planned for May 2024. So the work goes on ... !

## **READERS LETTER** THE LAST RACE TRACK IN SOUTH CAMBS?

As I drive through villages next to or near Great Shelford, nearly every week I notice new speed limits or new measures for cars and motorcycles to keep to the speed limit. Nothing of that kind seems to be happening in Great Shelford. Quite the opposite, it seems. For example, the 30mph sign that used to be painted on the road near the roundabout in Hinton Way has not been re-instated since the road was resurfaced (one or two or more years ago?) Working Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) are a rare sight and not effective.

Cars and motorcycles drive along the straight stretch of the 30 mph Hinton Way, between the top of the hill and the roundabout, at up to or over 70mph and 40–50mph seems the default speed. This stretch must be the last racing track left in South Cambs.

As for the Parish Council's support for the proposed phlebotomy centre in Hinton Way, maybe this is a way of slowing down the traffic?

This year we were also very fortunate to be given £1,828 by the residents of Waverley Park. In 2008 the Watling family, the original owners of Waverley Park, decided to retire and sell the Park. This gave rise to concerns within the village about the possibility of inappropriate potential purchasers and a 'fighting fund' was raised. Nothing came from these concerns and after the Morrisons, the new and current owners, had taken over, the 'fighting fund' was closed and the balance given to the residents of Waverley Park. Knowing that the Feast raises money exclusively for village related needs, they gave it to the Feast to dispense.

#### **REPAIRING ACROSS THE WORLD**

I recently attended the second ever European Repair Café Conference, an online event with speakers and attendees from the UK, Europe and the USA. We know that our own Repair Cafes are very popular, but we suspect that there are a lot of people out there who have not even heard of them, and we are always trying to think of ways to expand awareness of Repair Cafes and the whole 'Reduce-Repair-Reuse-Recycle' mentality. It seems we are not alone, with similar thoughts being expressed by several of the speakers at the conference.

But while we try to find ways to appeal to a wider audience, and particularly to be inclusive of younger people, there is a trend in continental Europe toward making the idea of repairing, rather than throwing away, mainstream. Since January 2021, shoppers in electronics and appliance shops around France have seen new colour-coded labels on some products, giving a score indicating how easy it should be to have the product repaired. The scores are part of the world's first repair index; campaigners believe it could have a global impact.

More recently, France has initiated a clothing repair programme intended to reduce waste. Each year in France around 772,000 tons of clothes are discarded. Two-thirds of these items – many probably perfectly wearable – are

just adding to the heaps of usable 'trash' in landfills. The new scheme involves the government offering a 'repair bonus' for people to have their clothes mended. Starting in October 2023, those joining the programme will be able to receive a credit of  $\notin 6-25$  for bringing their shoes and clothes to a cobbler or workshop to be mended.

The European Union (EU) is drafting legislation that would apply throughout the EU requiring manufacturers to provide a repairability rating for their products, similar in concept to the A+, A, B, C, D etc 'energy rating' we are familiar with. The legislation would also require manufacturers to make information (and spare parts) available to consumers and repairers. This reminds me of what we are already used to, for motor vehicles – it's not affordable to scrap a car because, say, the radiator is leaking, but replacement radiators are available and there are plenty of competent workshops who can carry out the repair (for a fee of course). This contrasts with what we find at our Repair Cafés even for quite expensive electrical and electronic items, where it may not even be possible to access the interior of a device without damaging it; and when a fault can be traced to a defective component, no spare is available. Repair Cafés are explicitly considered in the draft EU legislation, which is an indicator of how influential the Repair Café movement has become.

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## **BETTER WAYS FOR BUSWAYS UPDATE** SO WHERE DO THINGS GO FROM HERE?

On 9 October, a packed hall at the Stapleford Jubilee Pavilion listened intently to an update by James Littlewood (CEO of Cambridge Past, Present & Future) on the 8km Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) busway which the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) wants to run across countryside from Babraham through Stapleford to the Biomedical Campus.



The audience learned that, despite all the arguments presented by Better Ways for Busways (BW4B) at various GCP meetings, the GCP Board voted in September to continue spending money on getting busway plans ready for submission to government. However, the busway would be 'paused' until the GCP had found the money for it, something which could take some time.

James explained that the GCP's plans continue to defy any logic:

- The same benefits could be achieved for £100m less with an on-road A1307 scheme, could be achieved more quickly and could be built in phases such that benefits could start to accrue early in the construction process.
- The GCP has failed to explain how the buses could be fitted with the two self-guided steering systems required to make them work both on- and off-road (one of which does not currently exist).
- Buses running into Cambridge will have to leave the busway and continue their journey to the bus station on existing roads; this offers no gain to passengers wanting to go to the city centre and may result in a dilution of existing bus services.

- The alternative advocated by BW4B can be built on land already owned by the County Council.
- The main supporter for the off-road route was former Mayor, James Palmer who wanted a Cambridge Metro, a proposal which has since been completely abandoned.
- The only argument for the off-road route is 'future proofing', yet the busway has limited capacity. Instead, the possibility of re-opening the Haverhill railway line should be revisited, which would provide the capacity for the expansion predicted at the Biomedical Campus. This was previously considered by the County Council and rejected, despite providing an equivalent performance to that of current busway proposals.
- The GCP continues to refuse to disclose its Environmental Impact Assessment and origin-destination flow data. We think its position on this is becoming untenable.

Our position is that a scheme is needed now and that the alternative on-road route should be taken forward without delay. Kicking the can down the road is not an option.

Of course, there is one reason which would account for the GCP's pursuit of its illogical busway and councillors' support for it: carving up the South Cambs greenbelt into neat parcels for development. And if this is the rationale, then it's perfectly possible that developers could be quickly lured by the promise of virgin land in exchange for a financial contribution to a busway passing through it.

Whilst we are not actively fundraising at this time, we are ever mindful that if/when the GCP finds the money to continue with CSET, triggering a public inquiry next year, our objection to the scheme requires us to raise around  $\pounds 150,000-\pounds 250,000$  for professional representation of our case, comprising independent analysis by a transport consultant, plus solicitor and barrister support.

We are encouraged by the significant support and engagement evident at the meeting to oppose the GCP's plans and to advocate for the logical alternative A1307 scheme, and we will continue to attempt to engage with the GCP and our local councillors, who are the final decision makers. For our October meeting we welcomed Catherine Armstrong, the only daughter of an Army Diplomat, Patrick Reardon, and his wife Margaret. Catherine grew up in Africa, the Western Pacific and later in the Caribbean, where her father was the Chief Secretary and Deputy Governor of the Turks and Caicos Islands.

During her husband's many postings to far-away places, Catherine's mother kept diaries, which describe her fascinating life at a time now long since gone. In her role as a Diplomat's wife, Margaret Reardon was expected to travel, entertain, attend functions and meet dignities, always of course wearing stockings, gloves and a hat! Although her husband was often away for many weeks at a time, Margaret was only allowed to return to England every three years. Her extraordinary life was spent mostly in Eritrea, Tanganyika (now Tanzania) and South Africa. Life was hard and very challenging. The temperature often reached 110° Fahrenheit (43°C) and she had to learn to live with snakes, scorpions and cockroaches.

Margaret's book, *An Unexpected Journey*, was published in 2015 and makes fascinating reading, highlighting the role of women at a time of great change. Women like Margaret dedicated their lives to supporting their husbands, accompanying them on lonely and often difficult postings, a long way from the comfort of home.

We were delighted to welcome five new ladies this time and hope they will return for our next meeting. This will be held on 2 November at 7.30pm, when Neil Callan will give a talk entitled *Crowbar to Crocosmia*. We meet in the community hall behind St. Mary's Church on the first Thursday of the month.
