#### SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 15 NOVEMBER 2023

#### PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

Three members of the public were present.

Jenny Huguet updated members on her role, which involves assisting the Parish Council in monitoring the water in the River Cam. She also described a recent film called *Pure Clean Water* which is based around Nine Wells and shows how the water feeding Nine Wells and Hobson's Brook is dwindling due to over extraction. She requested that the Parish Council investigate whether the film could be shown in the village; the cost of hiring it would be £75.

# **CO-OPTION OF PARISH COUNCILLORS**

Two prospective councillors, Barbara Kettel and Howard Kettel, spoke about their desire to join Great Shelford Parish Council. Following questions to the two prospective councillors, a vote was taken and it was agreed that they should be co-opted as Parish Councillors.

# **OTHER BUSINESS**

It was reported that a new Caretaker would commence work on 4 December.

The topping out ceremony for the Porthaven Care Home was delayed due to bad weather.

# REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

The report from County Councillors was included in the meeting papers. It was noted that no report had been received from District Councillors prior to the meeting. District Cllr Fane informed members that a new housing zone has been approved for Cambridge Biochemical Campus. Following the approval of the Phlebotomy Drive-through, District Cllr Fane noted that he will be working towards ensuring that the permitted rights for agricultural buildings is not 'gamed'.

# **NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN**

The first draft of the plan has been shared with South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) for informal review. The steering group is now working towards Regulation 14 Consultation, due to commence in early 2024.



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# CAMBRIDGE BIOMEDICAL CAMPUS (CBC) WORKING GROUP

The Chair noted that the Local Liaison Group has been disbanded by CBC. David Plank from Trumpington Residents' Association attended the last board meeting and it is not currently clear with what CBC propose to replace the group, though there is potential for a 'local voices group'. The Chair will be attending a farewell meeting on 7 December and may learn a little more then. He noted that it has been useful working with Trumpington Residents' Association as there are common issues and he would like to keep the relationship open.

# **COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS**

a) To consider an offer of six free trees or one larger potted tree from SCDC. It was agreed to request one larger potted tree to replace the tree currently awaiting felling on the Memorial Green.

b) To consider use of solicitors for Parish Council business including assisting with leases, professional advice, etc. The three solicitors considered at the October meeting were reconsidered as there had been no response from the recommended firm. It was agreed to employ Birketts as the Parish Council's solicitor.

c) Several Human Resource (HR) companies have been contacted to find out what services they could provide for the Parish Council. It was agreed to employ Pip Foulsham as the Parish Council's HR support as and when needed.d) It was agreed to adopt the 2023/24 Pay Award as announced by the National Association of Local Councils for all staff and also agreed that all salaries for present and previous staff be backdated to 1 April 2023 to fall in line with the award.

e) Progress made on actions listed in the Business Plan:

- Initial drawings for the Memorial Hall are currently being drawn up with costings
- Sports Club agreements are currently being worked on and the Tennis Club lease is ready for signature
- A public meeting on 22 November will look at transport and traffic infrastructure issues including speeding and parking.

# FINANCE MATTERS

It was agreed to provide a grant of  $\pounds720$  to the Twinning Association towards their events in 2024 to ideally be used for children from lower income families. It was agreed to accept the quotation from Dardan for a key holding service for the Pavilion at  $\pounds300$  and for a call out when the alarm goes off at  $\pounds50$  per time. All users of the pavilion will be informed that if they have not secured the building and the call out is required they will be charged the call out fee.

#### HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT MATTERS

a) The agenda for the public meeting to be held on 22 November was noted. There was a lengthy discussion on the requirements and objectives of the meeting.

b) Cllr Disley presented the draft Traffic Management Strategy. It was agreed to adopt the strategy with amendments and the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group were thanked for all the work they have done.c) Cllrs Disley and Ashurst noted that a large number of respondents to the traffic survey were keen to support some sort of weight restriction in the village. It was agreed to apply to Cambridgeshire County Council for a Private Funded Highway Initiative, which includes an initial fee of £500, to carry out initial investigations.

d) An update was provided on progress for the Local Highway Initiative application for Church Street. The application will be made in January.

# **November Public Meeting**

A big thank you for the 490+ responses to our recent Traffic Survey and to those who attended the public meeting on Wednesday 22 November. We really appreciate the time taken to formulate suggestions and all the comments made.

It is clear from the survey responses and comments that the priority for traffic management was Church Street, above all on the grounds of safety, especially that of children arriving at and leaving school. Great Shelford Parish Council is preparing a Local Highways Initiative Bid application for '*Safety initiatives on Church Street – comprising a give way feature with build-outs (possibly to include a signalling option as this is preferred giving benefits for cyclists and pedestrians) combined with removal/replacement of two/three parking spaces and addition of two wooden Gateway features after the two bridges and near the Plough'. This application is sent to Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) as the Highways Authority for their consideration.* 

We cannot guarantee that our bid will be successful, and ultimately it will be CCC who will produce and implement a detailed design. In the meantime work continues in the background on other possible improvements, including a methodical survey of the state of our pavements, a 7.5 tonne weight limit (on certain roads), traffic islands, a raised zebra crossing on Church Street and more.

Some residents commented that the meeting helped them to understand that these traffic problems are complex and that there is no easy 'all you have to do is...' solution but we are looking at a series of incremental responses, which join up to make a proper difference.

# NEW NURSERY OF THE YEAR NATIONAL AWARD FOR SHELFORD DAY NURSERY



The innovative **Shelford Day Nursery**, which offers a unique Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) pre-school curriculum, won the New Nursery of the Year category in the National Nursery Awards, held at the ExCeL London exhibition centre.

Panash Shah, director of STEMtacular Childcare, said, "We're overjoyed to have won this national award, which recognises our unique curriculum, inspiring learning space and our amazing nursery team. The inspiration for our nursery came from Cambridge's role in some of the world's most important scientific discoveries and we are passionate about introducing children to STEM subjects from a young age.

The emphasis for us is always on encouraging children to learn through play. The STEM based curriculum that we have developed provides structure while still giving the children the opportunity to shape their own learning by exploring our interactive nursery space. We're so proud of the nursery team, who create a fantastic atmosphere for the children and help them to learn in a fun and engaging way that prepares them for the transition to primary education."

Shelford Day Nursery opened in March 2022 following the renovation of a former bank in Great Shelford. The building and its grounds were completely remodelled to offer indoor and outdoor spaces where interactive learning is the major focus.



Children have the opportunity to experiment with water features, discover properties of different materials in sand and gravel pits and even develop their first engineering skills in a 'construction zone'. There is still a place for traditional childhood games, with activities like hopscotch used to develop maths skills. Children can also gain

firsthand experience of the force of gravity on a slide plunging from the first floor of the nursery to the outdoor learning space on the ground floor.

Inside the nursery, children have access to the latest technology, including interactive touch tables and a sensory room featuring colourful lighting and interactive fibre optic installations.

Nursery Manager, Deborah Parfitt said, "Winning this award would not have been possible without the contribution of our nursery team, who have

embraced the idea of centring our curriculum around STEM and encouraging children to learn through exploration and experimentation.

We place a lot of emphasis on staff training and have attracted a fantastic team who are dedicated to developing themselves and continually improving the education we offer to our children.

#### **December Reflection**

Lack of space last month prevented us from printing this item. It follows now: **Truth – what is that?** 

Jesus did not reply to Pilate's question, 'What is truth?'. He had just told Pilate, 'Everyone on the side of truth listens to me' (John 18:37). There were no dictionaries in those days, but if one had been handy Pilate could have found the answer – 'Truth is the apperception of objective reality.' In other words, the seeing and understanding of things as they really are and not otherwise. Pilate would have had a problem with that – for him truth was most probably what the Roman Emperor or the majority of people agreed with, or whatever helped him advance his personal power or political goals. The plain *unvarnished* truth – not a biased or imaginative version of what it suits to believe in at the time. For most situations today there are many truths propounded and this is because we live in an age where knowledge, truth, morality, etc are relative, not absolute, in other words a relativistic society. For many, truth can be more or less what they choose to make it.

When there is no firm basis for truth there can equally be no firm basis for right and wrong. Facing up to the truth can be tough. Jesus is indeed 'the way the truth and the life' (John14:6). It would appear that Pilate thought Jesus did speak the truth and was innocent of the charges made against Him. Pilate may have recognised the truth but chose to reject it. Sadly, there are times when we fail to recognise the truth, but it is even worse when we recognise the truth but fail to follow it.



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# **HOPES AND DREAMS**

At the beginning of a new year countless resolutions are made; people resolve to do a variety of things to attempt to improve their lives in some way. I wonder if you have made any resolutions and, if so, will they become permanent changes or will they quickly fall by the wayside - perhaps even before the month is over?

Apparently the top 10 new year's resolutions include losing weight, getting fitter, spending less/saving more, giving up a bad habit and changing jobs. The fact that these are in the top 10 year after year is perhaps an indication that people fail in their resolve and decide to try again the following year.

I gave up making new year's resolutions many years ago as I found I was constantly making the same resolutions and yet never managing to keep to them (perhaps you are more successful at this than I was) but whether or not you make, or keep, such resolutions there is something appealing about the idea of 'a new year, a new me,' although it is a little unrealistic. It is much more likely that small changes made over a long period of time will be more effective in bringing permanent change.

However, whether you make big or small resolutions, or no resolutions at all, at the start of a new year you will all have hopes and dreams for the year ahead. These hopes may be for yourself, for your own circumstances, for friends and family or for the wider world we live in.

At Great Shelford Free Church (GSFC) our verse for the year for 2024 comes from Proverbs 3:5-6.

*Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him and He will direct your paths.* 

For me, trusting completely in God is something I aspire to. This is a resolution worth making on a daily basis. Putting my trust in Him in good times as well as when life is tough, helps me to get through difficult situations; recognising his presence in everything I do and in all the decisions I make, enables me to follow his leading.

In the year ahead I pray that you too, will trust Him to guide you in the decisions you have to make, whether they are for yourselves, or how you relate and react to friends and family, or for the wider world. May you journey through 2024 knowing His presence is with you always.

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# NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

#### NEW PLANNING POLICIES TO MEET OUR VILLAGES' CURRENT AND FUTURE HOUSING NEEDS

I'm starting the new year as I mean to continue, with a deep(ish) dive into one of the objectives of the Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan (NP) and the planning policies we have created to achieve it. This month it's housing. If you've ever worried that you or your children can't get onto the local housing ladder, or that developers build too many expensive executive homes, or that you'd really like to downsize but can't find anything suitable nearby, then the housing policies in the NP seek to redress this imbalance.

Our NP's housing objective, generated with residents' input, is:

New residential development proposals will contribute to addressing existing and future housing needs in Stapleford and Great Shelford in terms of affordability, accessibility, tenure and its suitability for all stages of life.

The planning policies we have drafted in the NP to meet this objective cover:

- 1. **Housing mix:** New housing should be of an appropriate type, size, affordability and design, reflecting the existing and future needs of the plan area's population. So, for example, our housing needs assessment shows that at least 50% of new homes should have three bedrooms, with the rest a mix of one, two and four bedrooms.
- 2. **Prioritising local needs in the allocation of affordable housing:** Due to the evidenced high level of unmet affordable housing need in the plan area, all new affordable housing should first be prioritised for people with a local connection (eg the applicant has worked in the plan area for the last 12 months or lived there for more than five years out of the last eight years).
- 3. **Rural exceptions housing:** The NP supports affordable housing located outside a settlement boundary as an exception to normal planning policy where there is proof of local unmet affordable housing need (More's Meadow, a new development of 21 affordable homes for residents of Great Shelford, is a recent local example of this).
- 4. Meeting the needs of the older population: In 2021, 13.3% of the population of Stapleford and Great Shelford were aged 75+ and this is forecast to increase to 20.7% of the population in 2043. Therefore, we have a policy to ensure that all new housing is adaptable and accessible so it can meet the needs of people as they age and another requiring specialist housing schemes to be located close to shops, services and

5. **Residential annexes:** Homes suitable for multi-generational living play a part in meeting a specific housing need, eg allowing older people to downsize and stay close to their existing community whilst being close to family members to support them as their needs change.

I hope that the above gives a flavour of five of the 20 planning policies in our NP. The policies themselves are too meaty to replicate here (I'm not supposed to write more than 900 words!) but all residents will have a chance to read them in full and respond to them as we move into the next phase of the NP process in Spring 2024.

Every single policy is underpinned by a robust body of evidence. When it comes to housing, we commissioned a detailed study of current and forecast housing requirements in our area (by government contractor, AECOM) and sought residents' input during community consultation in 2022 and 2023. You can read the full AECOM report and the outputs of community consultation on our dedicated NP webpages:

www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/neighbourhood-plan\_evidence-base/.

Finally, do please remember that NPs can't prevent development and neither can they reinvent the wheel. SCDC's Local Plan 2018 and the National Planning Policy Framework obviously have plenty to say about residential development but, by definition, they take a regional or national perspective. The aim of our NP is to think *locally*: to find gaps in existing policy which might leave Stapleford and Great Shelford vulnerable to inappropriate development and plug them with new policies tailored to the specific needs of our villages. Therefore, if you think something is missing from our NP's housing related planning policies, it's very likely because it's covered by existing planning policy.



Five wines were presented: two whites – a *chenin* and *sauvignon blanc* – and three reds – a *St Emilion, Graves* and *Medoc* – all sourced in France.

To accompany them there was a selection of nibbles on each table – crackers, pâté, olives, pistachios, salami... we were encouraged to try the wine, and then having eaten one or more of the nibbles to have a second sip and to note the difference in taste. The formal tasting over, the guests were served with a hot meal of beef and vegetable stew, or a vegetarian option, followed by a selection of cheeses and desserts. All the excellent cooked dishes were prepared by committee members or friends thereof, to whom we are most grateful.

There was a happy and convivial atmosphere throughout and as people left there were appreciative comments on the event, the food and the value for money.

# **New Year Resolutions**

Your resolutions could be green this year, especially around food. Many of these actions will also save you money:

- Sign up for Veganuary at *veganuary.com*, even if you only manage it for a week it's worth experimenting. They send out lots of helpful tips and recipes. You can save money by eating more plant protein rather than meat.
- If veganism is too much, try Meat-Free Mondays and try oat milk. Cutting down meat and dairy are the most effective ways to reduce the impact your diet makes on the planet. You could also save money.
- Next resolution is reducing food waste again, saves money.
- Look to buy food from small producers not the corporates like Coca-Cola, Nestlé, Danone and Unilever.
- Buy organic if you can afford it.
- Avoid large numbers of food miles (don't buy anything that's been flown in bananas are fine, but grapes from Brazil aren't).
- Eat seasonally.

- Buy sustainable fish (MSC certified).
- Avoid large amounts of packaging. Try Green Weigh and Mary's in Sawston, or order a veg box from one of the companies that deliver eg Cambridge Organic Food.
- Look at the website *takethejump.org* for six things you can do to help reduce carbon emissions dietary changes as above; reduce/reuse/recycle the 'stuff' you buy, including electronic goods and fashion; drive less; fly less; install energy saving measures in your house; invest in a green/ethical pension provider and savings; write to your MP about issues that you feel the government should be tackling.

#### COP28

As I write this, and reading the environmental pages in the Guardian, COP28 is just getting underway in Dubai. In a year that is going to be the hottest since records began, when we already have an atmosphere  $1.1-1.2^{\circ}$ C above pre-industrial levels, it really is imperative that governments do better at reducing carbon emissions. It's no good crawling to net zero in 2050, emissions need to be greatly reduced before 2030 if we are to have a chance of keeping the global temperature rise to  $1.5^{\circ}$ C, which will avoid some of the worst disruption to our climate and our way of life – heat, drought, famine, leading to mass migration from affected countries.

So apart from reducing our use of fossil fuels, the richer nations need to commit funds to help affected countries (which are usually poorer countries that do not produce a lot of carbon but suffer the consequences of our historic carbon emissions). There have been moves towards these targets, but can we hope the UAE, one of the oil rich countries in the Middle East, will be able to direct enough action this time? The leader of the summit claims he has the ear of the fossil fuel giants, but when they can't even stop illegal flaring of 'waste' gas, a process that pollutes the air across the region, I do wonder. Air pollution from fossil fuels is estimated to cause the death of five million people across the world each year.

On a positive note, although China and the US presidents are not attending, they have agreed to triple renewable energy capacity globally by 2030, to enable a large shift to renewables to occur.

#### Greenwashing

You have probably heard this term. It's used to describe companies' claims that they are selling planet friendly products, when in fact they aren't really,

they are misleading you into thinking they are helping the environment more than they are and they are probably charging you a premium for it! Here are some common examples of vague woolly terms to help you spot greenwashing, adapted from the Everyday Plastic website *eveydayplastic.org*.

**Eco-friendly** – there are no rules that require companies to prove something is beneficial to the environment so this term is often exploited.

**Natural** – this term isn't regulated and does not guarantee that it's better for the environment or healthier. What does it actually mean?!

**Chemical-free** – everything is a chemical, but not all are bad, so check out the ingredient list. If you can't pronounce it, it's probably best to avoid it.

**Biodegradable** – this claim can be misleading if the product only biodegrades under specific conditions that usually don't exist in a landfill. Biodegradable packaging is also unlikely to be home compostable and can cause issues if put into the recycling.

**100% recyclable** – soft, flexible plastic is very hard to recycle, as there is little infrastructure to do so in the UK. If a bread bag says so, exercise your sceptical side (but put in the bin in the Shelford Co-op just in case).

Carbon neutral – this doesn't mean that the brand doesn't produce any emissions. Instead, it means that the company has 'offset' its emissions by investing in projects which supposedly absorb an equal amount of greenhouse gases from the atmosphere. Some companies have been in the news for manipulating their figures to look better than they are. Currently it is very hard to prove a product is carbon neutral.

**Green** – this phrase is vague and misleading, as it lacks any specific details about the product's sustainability.

## PARISH COUNCIL RESPONSE TO READER'S LETTER (DECEMBER EDITION)

Great Shelford Parish Council is exploring a suite of measures that could help make the centre of the village a safer and more attractive shopping/leisure space, which would in turn support businesses and help keep our community thriving.

Many villagers have told us that they do not feel safe walking or even cycling down Woollards Lane, particularly at peak times and with young children. Vehicles frequently mount the pavements when it gets congested, and it is more by luck than design that an injury hasn't occurred yet.

Despite a few social media posts to the contrary there is no official one way proposal yet. What the Parish Council has done is to commission a report from a traffic consultant to explore potential one way solutions using computer modelling (from data collected from the village) to see what impact they would have and to inform further discussion on this issue.

Any one way system would be intended to slow traffic but keep it moving and hopefully create more parking and better environment for all users. The recent survey has indicated that residents would like us to continue to explore options.

If a one way system was to be proposed, this would only be after further analysis, potentially a trial and of course, full public and business consultation.



## **Old Rews**

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868 Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

#### 13 January 1855

LEFT HIS COUNTRY FOR HIS COUNTRY'S GOOD – A few days since, Hayes Powter, who has frequently been charged before the magistrates for poaching, left the quiet village of Great Shelford to return a second time to the gold regions. He came home about eight months back from Australia, where he had been fortunate and brought with him upwards of £100. On his departure he gave orders to have the bells rung, which request was granted, at his own expense. During his stay here he has received many admonitions from the worthy resident magistrate and on Saturday last a warrant was issued against him for a breach of his good behaviour, which he has now evaded. The whole of the inhabitants of the village express a wish that he may not return again, but if he does, it is hoped that his future course of conduct will be greatly improved.

It may be mentioned, that this worthy is not alone in adding to the quietude of this village by departure from it, as during the last fortnight the following celebrated characters have enrolled their names among the brave soldiers of the army: Wm. Wright, alias "Samby", Jess Boutell, alias "Jet", John Cole alias "Nobby", David Robinson, alias "Dopper", and Daniel Thorn.

## 13 January 1855

ANNUAL TREAT – On Tuesday last, Mr Wm. Headly, of this village, gave his annual treat of beef and plum-pudding, and a pint of beer each to the old inhabitants of this parish.

#### 20 January 1855

ROBBERY AT THE RAILWAY STATION – On Wednesday morning last, a lad accompanied by his mother from Babraham, stole a newspaper from the above-named village, the property of Mr Headly, of Stapleford. Mr Headly was at the station at the time and saw the lad walk down the platform with a newspaper in his hand, but did not think it was his at the time. The paper was afterwards posted, so Mr Headly obtained it eventually safe.


