

SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE FINANCE AND GENERAL PURPOSES MEETING ON 13 DECEMBER 2023

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The Executive Officer noted that since the last Finance and General Purposes meeting, advisory signs to slow down, switch off engines when idling etc with the schoolchildren's designs have been printed and will be put up around the village and a Holm Oak has been ordered as part of the South Cambs District Council six trees initiative and will be planted on the Memorial Green when it is received in the new year.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

Cllr Barbara Kettel will join the Planning Committee and Cllr Howard Kettel will join the Highways Committee and the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group.

Cllr Watson would attend the Annual Meeting of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Association of Local Councils (CAPALC) on 14 December.

The Chair summarised the draft document on the Cambridge Biomedical Campus (CBC) Vision 2050, which had been drafted by members of local communities. Cllrs Watson and Price will look at the document and circulate it to members. The Executive Officer updated members on the work which has been carried out to create the draft Strategy Document. It was agreed that updates be made and it be brought to the February 2024 council meeting for sign off after the budget is approved.

Progress on actions listed in the Business Plan:

- The Local Highways Initiative application for improvements to Church Street will be sent to the County Council before Christmas
- Some items for the Clay Pit have been ordered and should be with the volunteers before Christmas
- The Christmas Light Switch On was a huge success
- Liaison has taken place with Birketts about drawing up an updated lease for the Rugby Club
- The Tennis Club is being chased for a signed lease

COMMUNITY MATTERS

It was agreed to hold the Community Awards again in 2024 at the Annual Parish Meeting in March. The three awards will remain as they were in 2023:

- Young person (under 18 years of age)
- · Good neighbour
- Outstanding contribution

Redmayne Arnold & Harris are interested in sponsoring the event again in 2024.

FINANCE MATTERS

The Executive Officer has concerns over the low General Reserves held by the council. It was resolved to simplify the reserves by bringing several into one single Earmarked Reserve.

The requirements for 2024/25 were discussed, including expenditure for the Neighbourhood Plan. Grant funding has now been fully utilised and it was requested that £5,000 be put in the budget for 2024/25 to ensure that the plan can be completed as planned in 2024. The Executive Officer was instructed to liaise with Stapleford Parish Council and ask them to budget the same as they are lead council for the plan (in name) and costs are shared 50/50.

It was noted that the new caretaker had ceased employment on 8 December and it was agreed to offer the role to the previous caretaker on a temporary basis while a review of requirements is completed.

David's discourse – A reflection for February

'Don't take anything for granted' is good advice at any time but something to think about seriously as another year has begun with perhaps promises of a fresh start, a change of heart or possibly just keeping calm and carrying on.

Taking things for granted in our well developed and reasonably well regulated surroundings is understandable, - yes of course we have to pay for such things as clean water when we turn on the tap, electricity when we throw the switch, a good choice of food and goods in the shops when we go out to buy – and most likely we take it for granted that will always be the case. God's gifts to all of us – starting with life itself – are likewise easy to take for granted, our minds are continually diverted by many of the pressures and some of the trivialities of day to day living. It is not always easy to think about the Author of Life itself and give a 'Thankyou' to Him. Children are frequently accused of taking their parents for granted, failing to appreciate the great love which goes into caring for them and raising them. Only when they become adult – even parents themselves - do they begin to understand what love truly requires of them.

God our Father, our creator, loves us, every one of us. He loves us, His children, unconditionally and that is as we should love him and this world - his creation, always being thankful for what he has given us and never taking Him or His Divine Providence for granted. There are however thousands here in this country and millions around the world, for whom such things as water, clean or otherwise, power or fuel and food are beyond their means to buy in sufficiency or not available at all. Worse still are the conditions for those caught up in wars which are remorselessly destroying their worlds.

Peace, for which we pray so regularly and fervently comes not only from the absence of war, but from the presence of justice. The injustice of adding to or ignoring the plight of the hungry, the homeless, the oppressed, takes for granted that they and their problems will either go away or someone else will look after them. We must pray and work for justice as earnestly as we pray and work for peace. Throughout His life Jesus showed us and told us of the many ways that we must show our love for God through loving and caring for each other as we would have them love and care for us.

Jesus came to offer us life at its very best, richer, fuller and eternal, infinitely better than anything we can achieve by our own efforts. We are privileged to

know so much about Jesus and we must be careful to follow His example and guidance, showing to one another the caring love, justice and merciful forgiveness of God for us, his creation. Yes, there is certainly a challenge for us to accept the freely given gifts of God, not to ignore them nor take them for granted, but to shape our lives around them. Our lives and the lives of others around us will be so much better if we do.

TINY TOES



'Let the children come to me. Don't stop Great Shelford them! For the kingdom of heaven Free Church belongs to those who are like these children. And he placed his hands on

their heads and blessed them,' Matt.19:14-15. The Gospels show that children are important to God, at a time when children had few rights. Today it is very different and we acknowledge the importance of children and our need to care for them. But children only thrive if they have good parents, who need support in a role for which there is little training and no rule book.

God wants us to show love and care for all children and one of the ways we do this at the Free Church is to start at the very beginning by welcoming the youngest and their carers to Tiny Toes. We meet on Wednesday afternoons in term time, 1.30 – 3pm (this is a 'come when you can' and 'go when you want to' group). This group enables mums, dads and other carers (sometimes grandparents) to meet others to chat and have a drink or two and biscuits.

Often today new parents do not have family living nearby to support them so it can be a very lonely time. It is especially important to provide a place where they can meet others in the same position and share the joys, frustrations and anxieties of parenthood - especially valuable for new parents. This is a chance to chat to others over a drink and biscuit which will be served to you – we don't expect you to have to collect your drink and juggle that and your baby! All the helpers are grandmothers so have a wealth of experience of what it is like to have a young baby and are happy to chat as well as serve drinks. It is lovely to see some dads come either with their partner or as the main carer.

It is a privilege to serve God in this way and to see these parents enjoy their babies and to see the babies grow and develop, although we are sad when they have to leave us because they are now too old or mums have gone back to work. We love it when mums return with another baby! It is also very rewarding to see some mums grow in confidence with their babies. The session ends with a blessing which is usually given by Diana, our Pastor and founder and leader of the group, but if she is not able to be there one of the other helpers will do this. Thus, we send our babies and carers away with God's blessing and this includes those who have left earlier.

Film evening on Thursday 1 February at 7pm at the Marven Centre at Sawston Village College. The film is called '*PURE CLEAN WATER*: the chalk streams crisis on our doorstep', about the well-documented lack of water in our region and its effect on our chalk streams, which are a unique environment. It is not all doom and gloom. Peter Woods has seen the film, and says:

"'Pure Clean Water' was premiered in Cambridge [Film Festival] last October. The film's director, Tony Eva, introduced the film. It is a documentary that succeeds in intertwining an analysis of the impact of extracting drinking water from the chalk aquifer here with the fascinating history of Hobson's conduit and the ecology of the Nine Wells springs. Many of the filmed locations will be familiar to residents of Sawston, Stapleford and the Shelfords, but there was much detail that was new to me from this excellently researched documentary. As the credits rolled, the whole audience spontaneously applauded! I am sure that I was not alone in having been entertained and informed, but also more engaged with the issues around our 'thirst' for water and the damage resulting from satisfying that demand. I do recommend anyone living locally to see this film. There will be a screening at the Marven Centre in Sawston, organised jointly by 2G3S and Sawston Cinema and Tony Eva will be attending to answer questions and participate in a post screening discussion."



The Great Climate Fight – you may have seen this two part series on Channel 4, in which three hard hitters who do not mince their words, Mary Portas, Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall and Kevin McCloud, looked at the government's own Climate Change Committee's 'Sixth Carbon Budget'. In this report, it lays out how the UK can 'sort climate change' ie get to net zero before 2050 and cut down carbon emissions sufficiently before 2030 to make it possible to keep to a 1.5°C rise in global temperature. The government is not following its own advice: a big increase in onshore wind energy; improved housing standards (we lag behind most European states); cutting subsidies to oil and gas companies (which are £42m a week!); and making oil and gas companies pay for carbon capture technology, to clear up the mess they've profited from. Nothing very outlandish or difficult technically.... as I write this, the programmes are still available on catch up.

Climate anxiety – if you feel depressed and upset that politicians and companies aren't taking on board quickly enough the importance of tackling climate change, it can help to talk to others and turn your anxiety into action eg if you live in an area liable to flooding, work with your community to increase resilience and help each other. Keep yourself informed and write to MPs, councillors, CEOs of supermarkets, whoever is relevant, to probe them into what they're doing about the problems. See more in a Guardian article on 16 November 2023 (just type 'climate anxiety' in the search box on the Guardian website and the article comes up). And don't assume that because you read lots of disaster stories that reflects an increase in disasters in the real world – progress has been made and people can rise to the occasion when needed! Or read Hans Rosling's book (see above).



BETTER WAYS 4 BUSWAYS

Wow - what a year 2023 was!

The team at Better Ways for Busways extends its thanks to each and every one of you who has offered support, made donations and contributed to our ongoing campaign. It is truly appreciated.

Current Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) (busway) status and BW4B!'s position

Although CSET has officially been 'paused', the Greater Cambridge partnership (GCP) is actively trying to find £162m to build it. We argue that similar or better benefits can be achieved for around £100m less with in-road bus lanes along the A1307. This alternative is quicker to build, provides immediate benefits as each stage is completed (CSET has no benefit until the entire scheme is built) and does much less environmental damage. It is also one of the options that the GCP proposed back in 2018.

Longer term, we support reinstating the railway to Haverhill, which would provide much more significant capacity than the busway. However, building CSET would probably prove fatal to the railway. Railfuture has previously obtained over 5,000 signatures in support of reinstating the railway.

2023: a busy year

A lot happened in 2023, with many articles written for the media and meetings in Westminster (both at the Treasury and with individual ministers), with local government and major local employers. Here is a brief month by month overview of developments:

February: Detailed planning permission was granted for a retirement village on the edge of Stapleford and a new countryside park. CSET will now have to run on land between it and the countryside park, requiring a redesign of the route.

We wrote to the six members of the GCP executive board (and copied all 44 members). We didn't receive a single response.

We worked with our MP Anthony Browne to refine questions in his survey, which was sent to 6,500 residents in villages affected by CSET. We also posted over 6,000 BW4B! flyers, one through every household's letterbox in four villages.

March: We invited the Cambourne 2 Cambridge (C2C) campaign to join us and they reciprocated. C2C is fighting a similar busway proposal to the West of Cambridge and is ahead of CSET in the queue for money and to start construction. It has also done well with its fundraising. We can learn a lot from them.

April: We worked with MP Anthony Browne's office to write a series of letters exposing the consultancy SQW for 'marking their own homework' during a government mandated gateway review of its performance.

May: Stapleford held a very well attended briefing for residents, with presentations by James Littlewood, CEO of Cambridge Past Present and Future (CPPF) and Stephen Partridge-Hicks, Chair of BW4B!

June: We hosted a BW4B! stand at the Stapleford Village Show, raising awareness and signing up many new supporters.

July: BW4B! and CPPF encouraged people to sign a petition against CSET, gaining 5,424 signatures and we met with Anthony Odgers, CFO of Cambridge University.

Michael Gove announced plans to build 250,000 homes in Cambridgeshire and the appointment of Peter Freeman to head a new Development Corporation, the Cambridge Delivery Group.

August: BW4B! held an online briefing for all councillors from Cambridge City, South Cambs District and Cambridgeshire County Councils and members of the GCP Assembly. 42 people attended.

September: CPPF presented our petition to the GCP Assembly and GCP board. We asked several questions and requested development of a low cost alternative 'plan B', all of which were largely ignored. GCP announced that it 'didn't have enough money for CSET' and agreed to a pause. We pushed to have the search for money time limited, but the GCP never minuted what was agreed. We assisted with several media pieces about the pause and possible alternatives.

October: BW4B! met with Roland Sinker, CEO of Cambridge University Health NHS Trust, and Kristen-Anne Rutter and Nick Kirby of Cambridge Biomedical Campus (CBC). They need better transport links for their growing staff and feel obliged to support the GCP's CSET as the scheme proposed by the responsible local authority.

We met Peter Fane, Chair of South Cambs District Council, and Brian Milnes, who is deputy leader of South Cambs District Council, sits on the GCP board and is also our local County Councillor.

November: We met Elliott Page of KMC Transport consultants, who has been hired by Peter Freeman of Cambridge Delivery Group.

December: The GCP wrote to Michael Gove, Secretary of State for levelling up, asking for £162m – the letter is full of mistakes. CPPF, Stapleford and

Great Shelford Parish Councils wrote to explain that there is a better option that has local support.

Michael Gove announced plans to build 150,000 homes in Cambridgeshire (down from 250,000 in July). There is also talk of a new 'mass transit' scheme.

Looking ahead. So what comes next?

- the threat of public inquiry has not gone away and we need to raise significant funds to defeat the GCP. This will be a big ask
- we will continue to engage with the GCP, Cambridge Delivery Group and large organisations such as CBC, AstraZeneca and Granta Park to help steer transport policy as much as we can
- we also welcome you to join us at BW4B! Whether your expertise is legal, research, social media or simply being available to help, we would be delighted to have you on board. We meet roughly once every three months via Zoom. Please do get in touch at hello@bw4b.org.

READER'S LETTER


I am one of the editors of GSVN. I have read with interest the work of the groups campaigning to clarify the busway proposals and plans for East West Rail.



NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

- 1. Introducing new planning policies to protect and improve our rural setting and landscape
- 2. Preparing for a big neighbourhood planning milestone Regulation 14 consultation

Having last month profiled the housing-related planning policies in the emerging Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan (NP), this time I will turn my attention to those intended to protect and improve our rural setting and landscape. I also want to start laying the ground for our upcoming 'Regulation 14' consultation, in which all residents, workers, landowners and other stakeholders in our Plan area will have an opportunity to review and comment on the draft Plan.

Our rural setting and landscape

The draft NP contains 20 planning policies. Five of these sit under the following objective, generated with residents' input and rated the most important of all of our objectives by respondents to our community consultation in April-June 2023:

New development will actively minimise its impact on the landscape character of the Plan area, recognising the value of long views and vistas into and out of the rural setting of the villages, the open spaces within it and, critically, the separation of the villages from the expanding urbanised Greater Cambridge area.

The new planning policies we have drafted in the NP to meet this objective cover:

- 1. Protecting and enhancing Stapleford's and Great Shelford's landscape and character all development proposals shall be sensitive to the distinctive landscape and settlement character of the Plan area (eg retaining/enhancing existing features of value, such as trees and hedgerows) and retain the existing area of separation between Stapleford and Great Shelford and the City of Cambridge; landscape mitigation measures will ensure that development is sensitively screened and assimilated into its surroundings.
- 2. Important views and visually important areas of open land in Stapleford and Great Shelford to be supported, development proposals must maintain or enhance the key features and their setting of 29 listed views into and out of the settlement.
- 3. 'Important Countryside Frontages' these tracts of undeveloped land penetrate or sweep into the built up area, providing a significant

- connection to the rural area beyond or an important break between two detached settled areas two already exist in the Plan area and we are proposing three more. Planning permission compromising them will be refused.
- 4. 'Local Green Spaces' (LGS) and 'Protected Village Amenity Areas' (PVAA) these tightly defined terms refer to different types of undeveloped areas deserving of protection from development. Four new LGSs and six new PVAAs are proposed in the Neighbourhood Plan. Development proposals on these sites will only be supported in very special circumstances.

- 5. **Preserving our dark landscape** development proposals which include external lighting will only be permitted if the night sky is protected from light pollution.
- 6. The precise wording of the five planning policies is far longer and more detailed than I can replicate here but I hope that the above gives some sense of the direction of travel. All residents will have an opportunity to read the policies in full and respond to them during the impending Regulation 14 consultation.

I make no apologies for repeating myself every month, so please remember that NPs can neither prevent development nor reinvent the wheel. The aim of our NP is to think *local*: to find gaps in existing policy (ie South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC)'s Local Plan 2018 and the National Planning Policy Framework) which might leave Stapleford and Great Shelford vulnerable to inappropriate development and fill them with new policies tailored to the specific needs of our villages. Therefore, if you think something is missing from our rural setting and landscape related planning policies, it will almost certainly be because it is covered by existing planning policy.

Regulation 14 consultation

We aim to complete our NP this year. In a significant step towards achieving this goal, the steering group is currently preparing for a formal consultation on the pre submission draft of the Stapleford and Great Shelford NP.

This is a legally required stage in creating any NP and a chance for the community and other bodies to comment on the draft Plan before it is submitted to the local authority (in our case Greater Cambridge Shared Planning) for independent examination.

We will make a lot of noise to publicise the consultation when it is live, which will be for a minimum period of six weeks in Spring 2024.

Look out for banners, local social media posts, individual household leaflet drops and posters on Parish Council noticeboards and other public places, all of which will explain how you can take part.

The draft NP will be available online at www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/SGSNPlan and a hard copy will be accessible at Great Shelford Library.

Participation is not designed to be onerous and is obviously entirely optional. After this, the community's final opportunity to influence the NP will be in a straightforward yes/no referendum in which you will have the chance to either accept or reject your NP.

I've said it before, and I will say it again and again: we *can* change the place where we live – and *this* is how.

GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICES

Here at Granta, we continue to offer a mixture of face to face, telephone and online appointments. How does our appointments system work and what is available to Granta patients?

First, please be assured that no one apart from clinicians make clinical decisions about your care when you first contact us. Our reception teams have clear criteria, set by GPs, as to what can be put straight onto a clinician's urgent list. However, if they or you are unsure, they will take your details and discuss your concerns with the clinical team and then get back to you.

When ringing for an appointment you will be asked if there is a particular clinician you would like to see, either for continuity of your presenting problem or continuity of overall care. It may be that you don't mind who you see – you just need to speak to someone about your current medical problem.

Please do help our reception team by providing as much information as possible. All information is treated as confidential and will only be used for triage purposes. They are simply trying to make sure you are seen by the right person, in the right place, at the right time.

If you do feel that your problem is not urgent, you will be asked if a routine appointment may be more suitable, or perhaps a long term medical conditions appointment, a palliative care appointment, or whether we can help you in any other way. If your appointment starts with a telephone call then, together with the clinician, it can be decided whether a face to face appointment will be the appropriate next step.

Routine appointments are available a few weeks in advance, all pre bookable via our reception teams and online. New routine appointments are released daily at 8am and at 2pm to allow for regular availability. If you ring and there is nothing available, our reception team can send you a link that is valid for seven days (that you can check daily) to pre book a face to face or telephone appointment, so that you do not need to ring back. Alternatively, if you would prefer, you could use Accurx Patient Triage via our website to have an online consultation with a clinician. We do ask however that you only send routine queries as it can take up to 72 hours to respond.

There will always be sickness, annual leave and the perception that clinicians are not seeing patients. However, on average, Granta's doctors and nurses see around 4,000 patients face to face per week, and consult with another 3,500 via the telephone and online. We continue to try and accommodate all of our patients in a way that suits and please be assured that we are continuously reviewing and revising patient access.





GID ACHS

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

8 February 1833

FIRE – Yesterday evening a fire was discovered on the premises of Mr. Henry Headly, but which providentially was prevented extending beyond the haulm stack, in which it commenced; there is no doubt but that it was the act of an incendiary. A large quantity of property was consumed upon the same premises about fourteen months since.

20 February 1847

A SERMON – On Saturday last, a sermon was preached by the Rev. W. Castlehowe, in aid of the distressed Irish and Scotch, when the sum of £13.2s.9d was collected.

3 February 1855

EMIGRATION – On Thursday morning the 1st instant another family, consisting of 13 individuals, father and mother and nine children, together with the husbands of the two eldest daughters, who are married, left their native place and country for that of Australia. The man (Henry Poulter) is uncle to the oft mentioned Hays Poulter, whose return to Australia was noticed in this paper a few week since. Such a continued run of emigration would seem to thin the population, but not the slightest likelihood of a short supply in the labour market is at present apprehended.

9 February 1856

ACCIDENT – A serious accident happened at Great Shelford on Tuesday last, 5th inst. To a man named Gifford, a labourer, in the employment of Mr H. Grain, farmer, at that village. Gifford (who it appears is an excellent labourer) was feeding a threshing machine and by some means or other – whether he slipped or not is not known – one of his legs was drawn into the works and most fearfully crushed. He was immediately taken to that excellent institution, Addenbrooke's Hospital, when it was found that the injury was so great that it feared the amputation of the limb will be requisite.
