SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 17 JANUARY 2024

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

The Chair of the Neighbourhood Plan was in attendance to update members on progress with the Neighbourhood Plan and the next steps for community engagement. There will be seven weeks for residents to comment on the draft plan as part of the Regulation 14 Consultation.

Councillors expressed thanks for all the hard work Jenny and the Steering Group have put into the plan to date.

FINANCE

- A grant of £1,250 will be given to Relate Cambridgeshire towards their ongoing work which benefits members of the community in Great Shelford.
- It was agreed to pay £433 for membership of SLCC (Society of Local Council Clerks), which includes discounts on books and training, access to template documents and advice.
- It was agreed that Revive Flooring be employed to sand and seal the floor of the main room in the Pavilion at a cost of £2,640 + VAT.
- The Buildings & Grounds Committee had approved work on the structural pillar of the Pavilion due to rot at the base of the pillar. The supplier has explained that an increase in price is needed due to an error in the ordering process. It was agreed to approve the increase in cost to £2,166 + VAT.
- The proposed budget for 2024-25 was considered at length by Parish Council members. The proposals presented demonstrated the wide ranging activities the Parish Council was considering for the forthcoming year. The initial increase presented showed a 34% increase on a Band D property.
- It was agreed that Earmarked Reserves of £45,000 be moved from Car Park Improvements to the Earmarked Reserves for Traffic Projects; £15,000 be moved from Earmarked Reserves for Land Purchase to Earmarked Reserves for Traffic Projects meaning that the anticipated increase would be 15% on a Band D, or £1.97 per month and that a precept request be submitted to South Cambridgeshire District Council for £362,506.
- Transfer of funds from the CCLA Deposit Fund to the Unity Current account was approved to allow payment of invoices.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

- a) The Community Awards have recently launched for 2024 with Redmayne, Arnold & Harris sponsoring the awards once again. There continue to be three categories with awards being presented at the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 27 March 2024.
- b) The Chair and Executive Officer continue to meet with Stapleford's Chair and Clerk on a regular basis. The next meeting will be on 31 January 2024.
- c) Progress in the business plan:
- Costings and drawings for the Memorial Hall are due to be received.
- Cllr Price and the Executive Officer are still to get together to review policies.
- Items to help volunteers enhance the Clay Pit have been delivered to allow them to proceed with some work. Further items are required.
- The Tennis Club lease is out for signature. Other sports club licences continue to be worked on.
- Construction work on the new skate park is due to commence in early March.

HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT

a) A couple of non-councillor members of the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group are surveying the pavements to see how they are used and what the key issues are. It is hoped to have a report before full council shortly.

The Local Highways Initiative application has been submitted to Cambridgeshire County Council for improvements to Church Street. A weight limit application is in progress but proving to be a little more difficult than anticipated.

- b) A letter has been sent to the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities by Cambridge Past Present & Future pointing out inaccuracies in correspondence sent from the Greater Cambridge Partnership. It was resolved to send a letter in a similar vein to Michael Gove MP.
- c) Cllr Brown has had informal discussions about the temporary diversion of the DNA path. It is not well built, pedestrians have to cross the roundabout and it is considered by many to be dangerous, with accidents already reported. It was agreed to write to Network Rail and Cambridge Biomedical Campus (CBC) to express concerns over the condition of the path for users.

Julie's Jottings

Lent allows us to look inward at how we are developing character and spiritual habits. Habits are those daily activities which move us incrementally to a better place. Lent allows us to recommit ourselves to those healthy options that the busyness of life can take from us. It encourages us to take time to breathe more slowly, to pray or contemplate each day, to reflect on the negative loops we slip into and choose our responses to things that happen to us, in more Christlike ways. There are opportunities in Lent to do this more, particularly through the Holy Week Reflections, or by looking at the Stations of the Cross which are displayed on the pillars of the Church during Lent, or at the Service of the Stations of Cross on Good Friday when music and mediation moves us. All this can make us more curious about ourselves, our world and God.

9.30am: Service by **Great and Little Shelford Primary School** as part of Holy Week, reflecting on the Last Supper and meaning of Maundy Thursday. 6.30pm: Service to reflect on four of the Stations of the Cross, led by Trevor Ward along with Rev Julie Norris.

Thursday 28 March Maundy Thursday

We remember the Last Supper of Jesus and celebrate **Holy Communion.** Then we remember the betrayal and trial of Jesus by stripping the altar and furnishings from the Church. A consecrated Host is taken to the south aisle altar, which is a place of repose like the Garden of Gethsemane and vigil is kept until 9pm when there is a short **service of Compline, or Night Prayer.**

Friday 29 March Good Friday

10am–12 noon: **Easter Garden Workshop** in the Community Room for children and adults.

2pm: Walking the **Stations of the Cross** with reflections, music by the choir and organ and hymns. We imagine the journey of Jesus around Jerusalem and relate it to things that happen to us and in our world. We pray and we are changed.

Saturday 30 March

5pm: We remember the sadness of Jesus' death and we light the Paschal (Easter) Candle from a fire outside the Church and then go into Church to welcome the dawn of new life as we celebrate the first service of Easter. We share in **Holy Communion** at this **Easter Fire and Light Service.**

8pm: Confirmation at Ely Cathedral. Four people from St Mary's will be confirmed at this special Easter Service.

Sunday 31 March Easter Day

8am: Rev Julie Norris will lead a traditional Holy Communion.

10am: Sung Parish Communion Service followed by an Easter Egg hunt.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN



For any community, producing a Neighbourhood Plan is a lengthy process with multiple milestones. So, we are delighted to announce that WE HAVE JUST REACHED A VERY BIG ONE! We now have a draft version of the full Neighbourhood Plan and we'd like to know what you think about it. To do this, Stapleford and Great Shelford Parish Councils are running what, in formal planning terms, is known as a 'Regulation 14 Consultation'.

What is this all about?

Neighbourhood planning gives communities a role in the development and future of their local area. The Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan does precisely this for our villages. Its vision and planning policies have been cocreated by residents and parish councillors and shaped by the community – the people who know and love this area best.

Our 20 planning policies will ultimately carry the same weight as those in South Cambridgeshire District Council's 2018 Local Plan and will be used when reviewing all planning applications, big and small, coming forward in our area. They span six broad planning topics:

- 1. Housing and the built environment
- 2. Our rural setting and landscape
- 3. Climate change and biodiversity
- 4. Community amenities and infrastructure
- 5. Active travel and traffic management
- 6. Countryside access and enhancement.

What's happening now?

In previous community consultations, you told us what's important to you. We listened and learnt; where we hadn't got things quite right, we tweaked them; and we commissioned (with grant funding) a lot of research. The outcome is a full draft of our Neighbourhood Plan and an extensive evidence base.

Regulation 14 Consultation is now an opportunity for the local community to review and comment on this draft and its supporting documents before it is submitted to Greater Cambridge Shared Planning for independent examination.

Why should I take part?

Our villages and surrounding countryside are under enormous pressure. We cannot stop development but, at a time of great change across our region, a Neighbourhood Plan allows us to say what we want and need from growth. This, then, is your chance to shape where you live and/or work for the better.

How do I take part?

You can view the draft Neighbourhood Plan and its supporting documents at www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/SGSNPlan or scan the QR code on the front cover of this magazine. Paper copies are available at Great Shelford Library.

Then let us know what you think by completing the online feedback form (preferred), or by collecting and returning a paper copy at Great Shelford Library, or by writing to:

If for any reason you cannot access the materials or need a copy delivered to your home, call 01223 616622 or email the Executive Officer. You may comment on as much or as little of the draft Neighbourhood Plan and its supporting documents as you wish.

When is this happening?

The consultation runs from 9am on 11 March 2024 until 4pm on 30 April 2024. You will see plenty of banners, posters and social media reminders to take part and every household and business in our parishes should receive a leaflet through their letterbox.

Who can take part?

Anyone who lives, works or runs a business in the Plan area can participate, plus landowners and organisations with an interest in our area. However, we are unable to accept anonymous comments. This is because, later on, Greater Cambridge Shared Planning (GCSP) will run a final consultation on the Neighbourhood Plan. By participating in the Regulation 14 Consultation, you consent to Stapleford and Great Shelford Parish Councils legally collecting and

sharing your contact details with GCSP so it can fulfil its statutory duties. We process personal data in compliance with Data Protection Act 2018 and General Data Protection Regulations. Our privacy statement is available to read on our Neighbourhood Plan webpages. [Apologies for all the T&Cs, but it's important that we are transparent.]

What happens next?

All feedback will be read and may result in changes to the next version of the Neighbourhood Plan. Comments will be published as part of its supporting documents. Names will be anonymised, other than where an individual is commenting on behalf of an organisation.

At the very last stage of the Neighbourhood Plan-making journey and once the Plan has passed examination, it will proceed to a community wide 'yes/no' referendum open to the electorate in both parishes. All being well, we aim to do this in late 2024.

ROAD CLOSURES AHEAD



You could hardly have missed the amount of digging that has been going on (and under) Cambridge roads recently. Well, prepare for more disruption as South Cambridgeshire has announced more road works – and closures – in the next few months.

As we go to print Station Road remains closed between Freestones Corner and

Shelford Park Avenue for work related to the care home. This is expected to be finished by **March 1** and work is being done in turn by the county council, Virgin Media, Eclipse Power Networks, Openreach and UK Power Networks.



So we may be inconvenienced but we can be pleased that five different companies are using the opportunity to access the same trench!

On the other side of

the rails, Hinton Way is planned to be partly closed from **March 4 to June 7** at the junction of Orchard Way, for gas works.

Woollards Lane is also planned to have work from **15 to 19 April** for UK Power Networks.

In Stapleford, London Road and Church Street has works from **April 10 to April 24**, so there's no escape this spring.

Looking several weeks ahead is often helpful, yet these dates are flexible as

work can be delayed when emergencies occur elsewhere. The best solution (short of escaping for a long holiday) may be to visit the

THE TUTORS'

SHELFORD SCHOOL NEWS

As the New Year began and the new school term started, the children arrived back to enjoy the exciting curriculum school has to offer. Let's start though, by reflecting on the many activities children enjoyed in the build up to Christmas.

Christmas Performances

On 11 and 12 December, Reception and KS1 children put on a fantastic nativity performance. Children and staff had clearly been working hard on catchy songs and well-delivered lines and a wonderful time was had by all. Each class had their own performance time, either on stage or around the hall, and performers showed true enjoyment as they delighted a hall full of families.

KS2 children invited us to watch their Carols by Candlelight at St Mary's Church and the church was full to the brim with smiling, singing families. The service included lessons read by children in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 as well as an individual class performance from each year group. The school choir and orchestra also performed festive numbers and a small ensemble of singers from Year 6 wowed the audience with their performance as well.

Burwell Residential

Now to this term and Year 5 children have already been on overnight adventures. On Monday 8 January, children arrived at school with smiles and suitcases ready to board the coach to Burwell House. The group enjoyed a fantastic range of activities, from exploring the grounds and orienteering to learning about the technical aspects of the TV studio and performing scripts they had worked on at school. They returned to their families on Wednesday afternoon, full of stories and excitement about their time away.

Young Voices

On Monday 15 January choir members from Years 4, 5 and 6 travelled to the O2 Arena in London to be part of an 8,000-strong children's choir with Young Voices 2024. All the time spent rehearsing songs, harmonies and dance moves paid off and the children had a fantastic time entertaining families and audience members who had travelled to watch them. This term we have moved into other new experiences for the children which included the Year 2 involvement in Candlemas.

Candlemas

On 2 February the whole school came into St Mary's Church to celebrate a service of Candlemas led by Year 2 children. The service was a brilliant combination of narration, tableaux and readings. The children and parents said that the words in the readings were long and hard to read, but the children had practised well and so were able to tell the story beautifully. The tableaux told

the story of how Simeon and Anna had waited patiently for a long time to meet the promised Jesus and were delighted when at last he arrived in the temple.

Congratulations to Year 2

The school received a letter from the Minister for Schools, Damian Hinds, congratulating the current Year 2s for the excellent performance in the phonics screening check carried out last year when they were in Year 1. 100% of the children achieved the expected standard, showing the staff team how well their preparation is working to equip children to read. The children did so well thanks to everyone involved: children, families, the team and Miss Beck, the Early Reading and Phonics Leader.

Termly Curriculum Thread

The children are engaging in some interesting topics this term, with each year group following a particular curriculum thread to explore and focus their writing skills. Reception have been undertaking a topic called 'It's freezing here!'. Year 1 are also looking at the weather in their 'Wonderful Weather!' topic. Year 2 are focusing on Chinese New Year. The Year 3 children are embarking on a Mighty Mountain topic in the English writing curriculum, with a special visitor coming in to help them explore and write about it.

Year 4 are looking at Europe Now and Ancient Egypt. Year 5 are looking at Life on the Nile and Year 6 are focusing on the Anglo Saxons, exploring where they settled and how we know this.

Shelford School will be engaging in their own Holy Week activities and reflections starting on 25 March. Our Easter Service will take place at All Saints, Little Shelford on 28 March at 1.30pm and this will conclude the Spring Term.

Boxes from the east of England went to the Balkans, Central Asia, West Africa, Moldova, Romania, Belarus, Serbia and Ukraine.



HAPPY 21ST BIRTHDAY!

We have recently hosted a 21st birthday party at GSFC, not for a person, but for GenR8, one of the organisations we support. The charity's name came about because of this verse from Psalm 78:

We will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, his power, and the wonders he has done

As a child, practically everyone I knew, even if not a churchgoer, was familiar with the basic beliefs of the Christian faith. This is no longer the case and just this last Christmas we heard of people who did not know the 'real' Christmas story. Regardless of whether or not one chooses to believe the 'praiseworthy deeds and wonders', it is important that people at least know the tenets on which this country's government, education and hospital systems are based. But children will never know, unless they are told, and that is why, as 95% of children don't go to church, but do go to school, we go there. We share what we as Christians believe, without ever pressurising children to do the same, hence our strapline of 'Presenting Christianity', as opposed to promoting it.

In addition to leading termly acts of collective worship, (100 Cambridgeshire schools visited last term in addition to Shelford) GenR8's army of volunteers provides Inspire Prayer Spaces, Cool Choices and It's Your Move sessions to help children make sense of peer pressure and transition to secondary school, plus several other initiatives, all with the aim of presenting children with the heart of what the Christian gospel is about.

At Great Shelford Free Church, a sizeable chunk of our income is spent on supporting mission organisations, both home and abroad, offering practical support such as medical care, food, education etc. However, we couple this practical support with sharing the reason for the hope that is within us; that of God's love for the world. In the words of one of GenR8's best loved songs,



BETTER WAYS FOR BUSWAYS! UPDATE

A brief update this month to keep you apprised of how things stand...

What we know:

- The busway, Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) is on pause.
- Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) wrote to the government last October asking for £162million of funding to build it.
- The GCP is continuing to spend significant sums of money on CSET to get it ready to build as soon as it secures funding.
- Local councillors will determine whether it is built.
- Great Shelford Parish Council, Stapleford Parish Council and Cambridge Past Present and Future have all written to the government pointing out that, while they are in favour of improving transport infrastructure, it can be done for £100 million via a scheme that better connects Addenbrooke's and does not go through our countryside.
- This scheme (which the GCP originally proposed some years ago) provides a bus lane along the A1307, with a new road from the Hinton Way roundabout directly into Cambridge Biomedical Campus and can be delivered in stages starting now, without delay.

What we don't know:

- How long the GCP will wait, keeping much needed transport improvements on hold.
- What the government's formal reaction will be after such a long delay.

Action:

Please write to our local councillors (see addresses in this magazine) and prospective Parliamentary candidates setting out the rational case.

On 1 February, we welcomed Kate Osborne, who was talking about the shingle beaches around Suffolk and the interesting treasures that can be found on them.

From Lowestoft in the North and beyond Felixstowe in the south, the tides of that coastline are likely to wash up interesting finds, especially from September to March. These may include Hag stones (the ones that have holes in the middle), common whelk shells, mermaid's purses (the egg cases of shark, skate or ray), limpets, crab shells and many seaweeds. On one occasion, Kate discovered the tooth of a baby woolly mammoth.

Kate explained the importance of the delicate balance in nature between the plants and animals that thrive in the ocean. These all have their part to play in providing food and shelter for the ocean's microorganisms. There are, of course, many dos and don'ts relating to beach combing and Kate pointed out how we must be responsible and observe all signs along the pathways and on the beaches. The salty and windy conditions of the coastline of Suffolk makes an ideal habitat for many sea creatures, birds and plants, precious things that we should not take for granted. A sad reflection of human behaviour is the amount of rubbish left behind or washed up by the tides. This never really disappears and can have a devastating effect, causing the deaths of millions of sea birds, whales, dolphins and turtles.

Our next meeting will be held on Thursday 7 March at St Mary's Community Hall at 7.30pm, when Susan Grossey will talk about writing historical fiction. We will also vote for new members to join our committee. As President I have enjoyed my three years in this WI and must thank my enthusiastic and kind committee for all their efforts in making this organisation work so well in this fantastic village.

Pure Clean Water This excellent film was screened to a sell-out audience at Sawston Cinema. It showed Hobson's Conduit in its glory days before the drought of 1976 destroyed its SSSI status. In more recent years, the fall in the water table means that, despite augmentation by pumping water from the aquifer to the chalk stream system, watercourses can regularly run very low or dry, e.g. in the 2022 drought. Over abstraction is the cause, and the Environment Agency has said abstraction needs to reduce by 60% for the streams to recover.

Householders in the Cambridge Water Company region use on average 140 litres per person per day. The Eddington development was built to allow 80 litres, by harvesting rainwater and using grey water to flush toilets and water gardens. If we all conserved this precious water and the water company fixed leaks faster, we could greatly reduce our consumption. One panel member, a councillor, had reduced their household consumption to 45 litres per day per person! And no, she didn't smell, her hair was clean and her clothes were clean! You can save water by not using a hosepipe, watering plants with washing up water, not flushing the toilet every time you wee and saving water as it warms up in the tap and using it to wash vegetables, water the garden or flush the loo. You can check your water consumption by looking at your bills. You can also read the Local Nature Recovery Strategy on the Natural Cambridgeshire website, and respond to their forthcoming questionnaire. And write to your MP about how the regional water shortage will be affected by new housing developments – these rarely include water conservation measures. You could also write to Cambridge Water Company to ask them to bring in a hosepipe ban and to fix leaks faster.

This film was made before Mr Gove proposed the quadrupling of the number of households in the Cambridge region. As current plans stand, the proposed Fens Reservoir will need to be built as soon as possible, or else our chalk streams ecosystem will be irreversibly lost. Spending the reservoir money on retrofitting grey water usage and rainwater harvesting to existing properties could be a viable option. See *purecleanwater.film* for more information.

Cambridge Sustainable Food gave us a very interesting talk at the end of January, with lots of discussion and a quiz to test our knowledge. The organisation has been in existence for 10 years and works to build a more sustainable food system, with less waste, fairer distribution, food security and healthier food. A lot of their work at present is running eight food hubs, which they supply with excess food from supermarkets. Last year they redistributed 187 tons of food!

We discussed how our choices of food affect our health and the planet. If you choose to do just one thing to really make a difference to the carbon footprint of your diet, eat less meat (especially beef) and dairy. There are lots of recipes on the Veganuary website and also on the Love Food Hate Waste site.

To read more about the dysfunctional food system in this country, read 'Ravenous' by Henry Dimbleby, who was called the Food Czar, having worked on the National Food Strategy, the School Food Plan and with DEFRA

Hedgehog Highways East Cambridgeshire District Council surveyed constituents about the animals they most wanted to help and hedgehogs topped the poll. The Council is now working with developers of new housing estates to incorporate hedgehog-friendly measures such as creating holes at the bottom of fences to enable hedgehogs to pass from one garden to another. You can do this in your own garden. You can also put out water and cat or dog food for them and leave a pile of leaves for them to lie in or make a house. More information on the RSPCA website.

Old News

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

11 March 1854 Within the last two years, upwards of 120 persons have emigrated from this village, Lt. Shelford and Stapleford. There is scarcely a ship that is not the bearer of communications from emigrants there, to their relations or friends here; and it is gratifying to state that nearly every letter received is couched in language the most satisfactory. Many of the senders strongly advise their friends to follow them and some have offered to send money, providing parties here could, or the parish would, make up sufficient to pay the outfit and the expenses. Many of our own able-bodied labourers have a severe attack of the emigration fever and are determined if possible to follow their relations for the land of gold.


