## SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 20 MARCH 2024

## REPORTS FROM COUNTY & DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

Cllrs were disappointed that the reports from the County and District representatives had not been sent in time to be considered before the meeting.

#### REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS

**Neighbourhood plan:** The Regulation 14 Consultation has been launched and runs until 30 April. Everyone who lives, works or has an interest in the Neighbourhood Plan area is invited to take part.

#### COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

**Business Plan:** The costings for the Memorial Hall are due in. Cllr Price and the Executive Officer have looked though the policies. Construction of the skate park has commenced.

#### **COMMUNITY MATTERS**

- a) A report from the Cricket Club and proposals for an artificial wicket were discussed. It was agreed to support the installation of the artificial wicket but to stress to the Cricket Club that it must be maintained by the club and if it falls into disrepair then they must replace/remove it at their cost.
- b) It was agreed to allow signage for the Scout and Guide Clubs to be installed at the Memorial Hall.
- c) A request from an Open Age Men's Football team to use the Recreation Ground Shelford and Stapleford Strikers (SASS) pitch for their home matches next season 2024/25 was discussed. Having received some feedback from SASS Football Team about their plans for 2024/25 it was agreed that the Parish Council would have to turn down this request due to the potential for the ground to be over played.
- d) It was agreed to mark the 80th Anniversary of D-Day on 6 June by purchasing a D-Day flag.

#### HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT

a) The Local Highways Initiative application for Church Street was submitted in January and an initial response has been received from Highways. The officers appear to have misinterpreted some areas and Cllrs Disley and Ashurst will liaise with them to clarify points and if possible, discuss on site. b) Cambridge South East Transport (CSET): £7.2m from the government's budget is being provided to get the scheme for the proposed busway up and running. The assumption of the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) is that the £7.2m will go to them to prepare the Transport and Works Act Orders. Now they have enough money to take the project to the next stage.

#### **FINANCE**

The feasibility and cost of creating an overflow car park near the tennis courts was discussed. It was agreed to seek quotations and find out whether planning permission was required.

#### **EMPLOYMENT MATTERS**

It was agreed to appoint Nicola Webster as Parish Clerk on SCP36 with effect from 15 April 2024.

#### MATTERS FOR FUTURE CONSIDERATION

UK Power Networks are proposing to build three new sub-stations in the area: in Trumpington, Newmarket Road and Shelford Bottom. They are giving a presentation on 25 March about this. They have been asked to come to a planning meeting.

#### REPORTS ON PLANNING MEETINGS

#### **UK Power Networks**

Rachel and Dawn from UK Power Networks explained that the electricity infrastructure for Cambridge is being reinforced and that some of the additional equipment needed will be located within the village boundary. Rachel gave a brief presentation detailing the plans and confirmed that a planning application is due to be put in April/May 2024. If permission is provided, the build will take 12–18 months. UK Power Networks are very conscious that the build is in the green belt and are looking to landscape and protect views. They will be holding public meetings in the village soon.

#### Cambridge Biomedical Campus (CBC) Vision 2050 Assessment

There have been several responses to the Assessment on Vision 2050 produced by the Parish Council and Trumpington Residents Association. Cllr Watson has had a meeting with the Cambridge and Peterborough Combined Authority, who are aware of the Parish Council's view that the Vision is not fit for purpose and needs revisiting. The Combined Authority also supports the Parish Council's view that development should be spread around the county.

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Spring has well and truly sprung and I hope you are able to enjoy a little more time outside – we just need the rain to be less persistent.

#### **Memorial Hall**

We recently engaged with a firm of architects to ask them to look at what is possible with the Memorial Hall by way of modernising, bearing in mind the wish list from our users, our residents and future hirers. They have recently come back to us with outline drawings and we will be engaging with you shortly to consider how we take the project forward.

#### **East West Rail**

We are aware that some residents have received questionnaires from East West Rail with respect to their properties and following this, surveys asking for permission to attend site and carry out non-intrusive surveys. Great Shelford Parish Council has also received these for some of the land that we own.

East West Rail have also arranged a series of public meetings that they are calling *'Nine Community Conversation Events'* and these are taking place ahead of the first stage of the statutory consultation that they need to go through. The events near us are in Cambourne, Cambridge and Comberton. We have been pushing for a meeting to be held in Great Shelford.

#### Cambridge 2040

You may be aware that Michael Gove MP has made an announcement about his plans to increase the size of Greater Cambridge by building a further 150,000 dwellings. The Government has set up a Cambridge Delivery Group, headed up by Peter Freeman, who is Chair of Homes England. We have asked Mr Freeman to meet with us so that we can build a relationship and express our concerns and our desires for the area. Though we chased for a response, we are at the time of writing still waiting.

#### Changes

Finally, by the time you read this Libby White, our clerk for the last three years, will have left us for her new role as Town Clerk at St Ives Town Council. We wish Libby well in her new role and thank her for all that she has done for the parish council in her time with us. Nicola Webster joined us on 1 April, to have a handover from Libby and we look forward to a long working relationship with Nicola.

#### GRAFFITI ON THE MAGOG DOWN

For more than 30 years, the Magog Down has provided a peaceful and picturesque setting for the quiet recreation of its many visitors. Successive groups of Trustees have endeavoured to maintain its unspoilt rural setting but,



in recent months, the graffiti spray can has intruded on our site. Visitors cannot have failed to notice the daubing on noticeboards, ticket machines, the road, the boardwalk and on North Down.

When it first appeared, we went to some lengths to clean the paint immediately but this seemed to spur on the culprits. So, sadly, the Trustees have decided to leave the graffiti for the time being. However, that does not seem to have satisfied the vandals. All told, their actions have caused several thousand pounds of damage.

The police are investigating, but without hard evidence as to the identities of the perpetrators, who act at night, their options are limited. We have been advised to install CCTV cameras and the Trustees have decided on a temporary system (as used to protect building sites) until a permanent solution can be found. One which, we hope, will be as visually

harmonious as possible.

The Trustees are sure that readers will be outraged at these events. If anyone has any pertinent information, we would ask you to contact the police (crime ref no 35/20011/24). Under no circumstances should the perpetrators be confronted directly. Thank you.

#### BIRDS

Recently, I've loved waking up to the sound of birds singing outside my bedroom window: a cacophony of praise in their delight in a new day and as I write this, I am anticipating the return of the swallows who make their home in the nearby barn each year and who perch on the telephone wires just outside the house and whose presence fills me with joy.

I wonder how many of you are avid bird watchers – those who can recognise, at a glance the birds you see from their markings and hue, or from their silhouettes, or even from hearing their call? I confess that I have an envious admiration of those who can identify varieties of birds by their song, it's a talent I would like to develop. But, whether or not you can name all the species visiting your garden, you may still have a favourite bird, the sight of which gladdens your heart.

For some it is the robin, that cheery red breast and willingness to come close make it a welcome visitor to most gardens. For some it is the amazing red kite soaring high above us, viewed as a symbol of freedom and strength. For some it is the kingfisher – seeing that flash of blue darting along the river in its quest to find food and even more stunning if you are lucky enough to see him dive to catch a fish. It's a real treat to catch sight of this elusive bird.

I love to see a heron standing patiently in the river, or stream, waiting for a fish. Standing so still and statuesque, with his graceful and elegant silhouette. His calm stillness signifying peace and serenity and his endless patience reminding me of my need to wait patiently for God's purposes to unfold. And when, startled by my appearance nearby, he spreads his broad wings and flies off, with his long legs stuck out straight behind him, I catch my breath as I am struck again by the magnificence of this bird as a part of God's wonderful creation.

Whichever is your favourite and for whatever reason, every bird is created to be beautiful in its own way, each is unique, and each is loved by the Creator, from the lowly sparrow to the magnificent eagle. Yet, Jesus told us we are valued and loved and cared for far more than any of these.

'Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care. And even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows.' Matthew 10:29-31

So, when you are watching those birds in your garden and delighting in their plumage, or their song, or marvelling at the fledglings learning to fly, remember that you are cared for and loved to a far greater measure and remember to give thanks for the goodness and faithfulness of God.




#### Summer Term

#### HAVERHILL TO CAMBRIDGE

Shelford is a point of focus for several building and transport services. It's sometimes hard to keep up with the changes – especially when some announcements are not detailed enough to know quite what's going on. In fact, that does seem to be a tactic used by planners. As one local resident said: "It seems they pluck these ideas out of thin air, let them float around a while then if noone complains they set it in to motion. Then they have 'consultations' with residents but they don't listen and simply carry on until the place is wrecked!'

While that may be a negative attitude there is no doubt that different plans, which are rarely integrated and may even conflict with each other, are on the move at the moment and a great deal of money has already been wasted.

Great Shelford Parish Council (GSPC) believes 'that no transport projects should be progressed without reference to a well researched strategic plan for county wide transport infrastructure, with vision for 2030 and beyond and which integrates interdependent projects to provide a sustainable network.'

It's fair to say that the Parish Council sees few advantages to the village from these expensive developments and finds the lack of meaningful consultation unhelpful.

GSPC more detailed response is on their website at <a href="https://www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/gcp-cset-the-busway/">https://www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/gcp-cset-the-busway/</a> and <a href="https://www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/local-transport-developments/">https://www.greatshelfordparishcouncil.gov.uk/local-transport-developments/</a> Last month in The Village News we detailed some of these plans but it is worth reminding ourselves of one more, the re-establishment of the old rail line from Haverhill to Cambridge, a plan which seems to have gone on the back burner, but which still stands as an alternative to the A1307 / cross country route from Babraham.

Railfuture East argues that 'the railway would serve Haverhill with its fast growing population, its strong links to the Cambridge jobs market, its potential as a railhead for 100,000 people east of Haverhill who otherwise drive to access the Cambridge region.' It would take cars away from Cambridge and the A1307, while providing a light rail solution.

Anthony Browne MP offered his support to studying the idea back in 2021, arguing it would be 'faster and less environmentally destructive than the CSET busway, taking a better route to major employment sites without the need for giant car parks in open countryside.'



**No Mow May** Can you find a part of your lawn that you can leave unmown for at least the month of May? Then wildflowers can grow up and flower, which gives food for bees and butterflies, and the longer grass gives shelter as

well. If you can leave the grass uncut for June and beyond, later flowering plants can flourish too. Find out more at

plantlife.org.uk/campaigns/nomowmay If you don't want to go this far, then cutting 'less short and less often' (once a month), to a height of 2.5–5cm will allow small wildflowers to flower, giving food to insects, whilst keeping your lawn reasonably tidy.

### OLD REWS

### Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

### 1 May 1829

On Monday last, about ten minutes past nine o'clock, an alarming fire occurred. The flames were observed to issue from the haulm stack in the rick-yard of Mr Stacey, and communicated to a barn, containing about 30 loads of wheat, which together with some spires in the yard, were consumed. The Shelford engine being promptly on the spot, was highly serviceable; whilst the Hertford, Norwich, Royal Exchange, Phoenix, and Sun engines, were dispatched from Cambridge without loss of time and prevented the further extension of the destructive element. The damage, we understand, amounts to about £200: the property was insured with the Sun office. We regret to state that there is every reason to believe the fire was occasioned by an incendiary. It being a very dark night, the flames were seen at a considerable distance; at St Neots, full 20 miles from Shelford, it was supposed the fire was only a few miles off; at March it was also very perceptible; and many of the inhabitants of this place presumed it was at the entrance of the town, consequently the Trumpington road was speedily lined with hundreds of spectators. The wheel of the Royal Exchange engine broke down during its progress in Trinity Street, owing to the number of persons riding on the engine, by which a man named Holmes had his leg severely fractured. He was immediately conveyed to the hospital and is going on well.






