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#### SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 17 APRIL 2024

#### PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

A resident raised three items: the Unitary campaign to rationalise local government in Cambridgeshire, an update on the Vision 2050 Assessment carried out by the Parish Council and Trumpington Residents Association and East West Rail.

During discussions it was noted that Peter Freeman has spoken with Anthony Brown MP and is keen to meet with parish councils after the local elections. Peter Freeman is Chair of the new Cambridge Delivery Group, set up by the government to lead the development of the city.

## **REPORTS FROM COUNTY & DISTRICT COUNCILLORS**

No report had been received from County Councillors prior to the meeting. Cllr Milnes provided a brief update before questions were asked by members. Councillors expressed concern about the large number of highways reports raised by residents. Cllr Milnes noted that he has not had the impact he hoped to have had following election.

Members noted that though no progress appears to have been made on highway reporting, they wanted to express their gratitude for the good work of officers working on the Local Highways Improvement initiative.

The District Councillor report had been circulated prior to the meeting. Cllr Fane noted that since sharing the report, the Cambridge Cancer Research hospital has been approved. South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) are putting together proposals to make some changes to the land behind the new Co-op within the De Freville area. Information has been circulated to councillors and there should be an opportunity for the council to comment when firmer plans are circulated.

#### **REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS**

**Highways Committee** The committee have approved the purchase of a new bus shelter outside 95 Cambridge Road and have asked the Combined Authority for additional real time passenger information boards for the bus shelters at Trinity Lane and Bridge Close.

**Neighbourhood Plan** The Regulation 14 Consultation continues to be active and councillors are encouraged to comment and support the process.

## COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

a) Meetings continue with the Chair and Clerk at Stapleford to discuss mutual areas of interest.

**b**) It was agreed to approve and adopt the CCTV policy as drafted.

c) The Chair suggested that a working relationship with 2G3S would help both groups in areas around climate change, the environment and sustainability. Cllr Fane noted that in his personal time he is part of the group which consists of volunteers who hold Repair Cafes and look at items connected to the climate emergency. He stressed that they do not claim to be experts. It was agreed that the Climate Emergency Working Group would instigate a meeting with 2G3S and report back to the June meeting.

d) The review of SCDC's Gambling Act Policy was noted by members.

e) It was noted that the proposed amendments to SCDC's Street Trading Policy could be applied to the Parish Council when considering traders on the site of the Memorial Hall. It was agreed to confirm that the Parish Council are content with the policy and would like to see some enforcement carried out by the SCDC.

**f**) The concept of how the planning authority works with Biodiversity Net Gain was discussed briefly. It was noted that there was not feasibly enough time to comment on the Local Nature Recovery Strategy Survey for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.

## **COMMUNITY MATTERS**

**a)** Members discussed the offer of a textile clothing bank to provide funding towards the parish. It was agreed to seek further information about the disposal of the clothing, obtain references from other users and investigate what sort of financial benefit it would provide to the parish.

**b)** It was confirmed that  $\pounds 1,250.70$  had been raised through two events for charity. It was agreed to pay  $\pounds 625.35$  to both Great Shelford Village Charity and Cambridge Joint Playschemes. It was also agreed to look at charities for 2024-25 at the June meeting.

# HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT

a) Councillors expressed their grateful thanks to the two residents who have taken the time to carry out the work on the pavement survey. It was noted that some of the high priority areas identified have been conflated with others which would be harder to justify for funding. After a brief discussion it was agreed to take the survey back to the working group, to have the areas broken down to areas for maintenance and areas for design improvements. Once complete the report will be shared with the Local Highways Officer to seek an idea of costings for the high priority areas and will subsequently be discussed with the head of Highways at County Council before being circulated to County and District Cllrs.

**b)** Cllr Ashurst provided feedback following a recent meeting with the officer allocated to the Parish Council for the Local Highways Initiative (LHI) application for improvements to Church Street. The application has been revised to focus on congestion rather than speeding. It includes two build outs, double yellow lines and no parking between the build outs, additional bollards outside the cottages to protect the buildings, and bollards on the opposite side of the road. The estimated cost would be £45,000, meaning a Parish Council contribution of £22,500.

Other recommendations have been made including a road wide speed bump on the way into the village by the water bridges and a gateway with reminders of the 20mph speed limit. These would need to be privately funded.

Cllrs Ashurst and Disley noted that Highways officers have been open minded and helpful working within their own constraints, but that some of the value of the Parish Council's proposals have been lost. There is concern that the revisions will not deter through-traffic and could potentially increase speeding. Members feel that residents, the church and the school will all have valid opinions on the revised scheme and as this starts to become more detailed it is felt they need to be consulted. Overall, it is felt that the proposal should be taken to the next stage and councillors are pleased with the Highways Officers support.

It was agreed to accept the revisions as presented by the highways officers to allow the LHI to progress to the next stage and to work with officers on additional areas which could be taken forward under a privately funded scheme.

c) The Parish Council has received communication from the East West Rail (EWR) Company about the land owned by the Parish Council and access agreements for surveys. It was agreed to query whether money is received for each piece of land, and if not, only to respond about the Clay Pit, Cemetery and Stonehill Allotments as the land closest to the known proposals for EWR.

**d**) It is planned to exclude parish councils from consultation on EWR proposals later this year. It was agreed to write to East West Rail Company to highlight that the Parish Council is unhappy about this, as they will be the most affected, and to ask them to reconsider. In addition, a letter will be written to those who will be consulted, including the Transport and Rail



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Minister, MP, Planning Authority and County Council, setting out the Parish Council's position.

e) The Chair noted that it would be useful to create a separate working group to look at Cambridge 2050 – the Cambridge Biomedical Campus Vision 2050 document setting out their plans for the campus. It was agreed to look at this for the May meeting. It was also agreed to draft a press release to send to the media about the Parish Council's position on Cambridge 2050 and how it will affect the parish.

#### FINANCE

a) An update was provided showing the financial situation of the Council at the end of the financial year. Monthly accounts were unanimously approved.b) It was agreed to provide a grant of £300 to Shelford Library for their Summer Reading Challenge.

To vote in the General Election on 4 July 4 2024 you will need to show **photo ID**. This could be your passport, a UK driving licence, an older or disabled person's bus pass, an identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card) or a number of other documents. # SHELFORD SCHOOL

This update for life at Great and Little Shelford Primary School is being drawn together on Ascension Day – and a check in the archives from 1952, just after the late Queen Elizabeth began to reign, has uncovered a report on life in the school on Ascension Day all those years ago (see copy on facing page).

Ascension Day still features in the school calendar 70 plus years on, with a service in church and a picnic to follow. As Rector of Little Shelford church, I am slightly relieved that the clergy are not expected to provide doughnuts to everyone nowadays.

Even so, at the end of the spring term in our Easter Service, where sometimes there have been presents for the children, this time round there was a decision to supply chocolate to the staff room after a very demanding period during the OFSTED inspection. The holidays came at just the right time! Perhaps I should also say that chocolate wasn't the main focus of the occasion. Year 5 had everyone involved in a powerful re-telling of the Easter story.

Since the start of term there have been numerous trips and activities, with expeditions to Kew Gardens for year 4 and (rather closer to home) year 2 visiting Wandlebury. Education is rightly understood as more holistic than the 'chalk and talk' of former years. So it has been wonderful to see Year 5 outside school on local streets as part of the Bikeability programme. One of the volunteers had done upwards of three hundred such classes since they started – which computes to thousands of children learning biking proficiency. If we can't raise up the next generation of cyclists in the flatlands of Cambridge, then things have gone badly wrong.

But it made me reflect that trips out from school and visits into the school grounds are so enriching - and that in turn emphasises the importance of volunteer involvement in lots of different ways in school life. Are there ways for some of the readers of the village newsletters to contribute in the wider education of girls and boys at our school? Could you get the necessary safeguarding clearance to play a part in helping with reading or class trips? I am sure the school office would be very happy to hear from any such offers to help.

No doubt doughnuts would be welcome, but I am sure they are not a necessary part of the offer!

#### Truth – what is that? A reflection

Jesus did not reply to Pilate's question, 'What is truth?'. He had just told Pilate, 'Everyone on the side of truth listens to me' (Jn 18:37). There were no dictionaries in those days, but if one had been handy Pilate could have found the answer – 'Truth is the apperception of objective reality,' in other words the seeing and understanding of things as they really are, and not otherwise. Pilate would have had a problem with that – for him truth was most probably what the Roman Emperor or the majority of people agreed with, or whatever helped him advance his personal power or political goals. The plain *unvarnished* truth is not a biased or imaginative version of what it suits to believe at the time. For most situations today there are many truths propounded and this is because we live in an age where knowledge, truth, morality, etc. are relative, not absolute, in other words a relativistic society. For many, truth can be more or less what they choose to make it.

When there is no firm basis for truth there can equally be no firm basis for right and wrong. Facing up to the truth can be tough. Jesus is indeed 'the way, the truth and the life' (Jn14:6). It would appear that Pilate thought Jesus did speak the truth and was innocent of the charges made against Him. Pilate may have recognised the truth but chose to reject it. Sadly, there are times when we fail to recognise the truth, but it is even worse when we recognise the truth but fail to follow it. *David Peacock*

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# STATION FENCING

The March edition of the *Village News* noted that fencing was planned for Shelford railway station and observed that this could not only look ugly in our country environment but could actually spoil the local flora, so well maintained by our station adopters, Philip and Kathryn.

Although work was put on hold for a while, I heard recently that it was going ahead – and in addition the old wall on platform 2 was to be demolished. So I wrote to the Greater Anglia Customer Engagement Manager:

... while adding the fences it is intended to remove a long brick wall along the south platform. As this is the original Victorian wall and the station is in a conservation area I wonder if permission has been sought and given? Its removal would certainly be a loss of character for our station and I can see no advantage to doing so. I would be grateful if you could clarify your plans for this popular station,

explain the purpose of the fencing and whether the old wall is being removed. It all seems so unnecessary.

A prompt reply from Alan Neville came as follows:

A new low-level fence will shortly be installed at Shelford, a station which is not in a conservation area. This is a part of the essential, compliant rewire of the station. The fence will house equipment and lighting. Given the structure and width of the platform there are no other possibilities, and our contractors have taken due cognisance of the amazing work of our station adopters in designing this new structure. In addition, the wall is life expired. This work will commence very soon.

So new lighting requires a fence and the demolition of a wall – though one which was 'life expired.' Take a look at it (here in about 1910) before it takes its final journey ....

**Best talk to Bidwells** 

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'When a foreigner lives with you in your land, don't take advantage of them. Treat the foreigner the same as a native. Love them like one of your own.' (Leviticus 19:33-34)

To some extent we all experience being a stranger or foreigner, whether on holiday or due to a change of circumstances when our usual support structure is taken away from us and we are in unfamiliar surroundings. Many internationals come to the UK to work or study, and experience culture shock and loneliness; by some estimates up to 80% leave the UK without having made friends. The need for belonging is something innate in all of us, indeed it is recognised in Maslow's hierarchy of needs. Christians understand that we have this need because God created human beings in His image and to have a relationship not only with Him, but with other human beings. Through these relationships we can experience love and acceptance.

This month at Great Shelford Free Church our mission focus is on Friends International, a Christian charity which works in 45 university towns and cities across the UK. It aims to show the love of Jesus by creating communities where internationals can meet British people and others in the same situation as them, improve their English language skills and experience friendship and a sense of belonging. Friends International do this in partnership with local churches, helping equip the church to serve, minister, and engage with international visitors, caring for them holistically.

The local Cambridge branch of Friends International, with the help of volunteers from local churches, run several cafes for internationals. They are attended by English language students, university students, au pairs and other internationals working and living in the area. Each week there is a different activity to facilitate getting to know one another and learning about each other's cultures. There are also optional bible discussions and courses for internationals who wish to explore the Christian faith while they are in the UK. For some internationals it is surprising to discover that the Christian faith is not a Western religion, but open to all people of whatever nationality.

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# NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

Thank you to everyone – residents, statutory consultees and other local stakeholders – who contributed comments to the Regulation 14 Consultation on the draft Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan (S&GS NP), which ran for seven weeks to 30 April. Thanks also to all who let us use their hedge or fence to display one of our big banners and raise awareness, including Scotsdales, The Gog Farm Shop and Magog Trust.



So what happens next? In outline, the steps remaining before we have an adopted NP for our parishes are:

- 1. collate and review all consultation feedback (this work is well under way) and amend the draft report as appropriate
- 2. publish all comments (anonymously, other than where responses are on behalf of an organisation)
- 3. submit a revised version (the 'submission version') of the S&GS NP to the local planning authority, which will then...
- 4. publicise our NP (for a minimum period of six weeks) and arrange for its independent examination
- 5. the examiner will check whether our NP meets certain mandatory 'basic conditions' and may recommend some modifications to meet them
- 6. if successful at examination, the local authority will organise a NP referendum for everyone on the electoral role in our parishes
- 7. a majority 'yes' vote makes the S&GS NP part of the statutory development plan for the area
- 8. all planning decisions from that point on must be made in accordance with the policies in the S&GS NP.

This shortish list belies the work that needs to be done. Every point raised needs to be addressed, if only to say that it has been noted or to explain why it is not relevant to neighbourhood planning in general or to the S&GS NP in particular. Many, however, will need more robust responses and the Steering Group will need to decide, with the agreement of the Parish Councils, which comments should be acted upon in the 'submission version' of the S&GS NP. We will not be able to please everyone.

This is why, once we've submitted this next version of our NP, the local planning authority will make it available for a further six weeks of consultation (step 4 above). This is known as 'Regulation 16 Consultation' and is effectively a chance for everyone who gave feedback in the Regulation 14 Consultation to see how/whether we dealt with their comments and to appeal against this if they wish. These representations will be given to the independent examiner when they review our NP. All consultation feedback must be incorporated into a Consultation Statement to sit alongside our submitted NP. Ours won't look quite the same, but you can view an example at *www.scambs.gov.uk/media/14579/ consultation-statement-final-120120.pdf*.

I keep reminding myself that we have already done an awful lot more than is left to do. One of the frustrations of producing a NP is that some component parts have immutable timeframes attached to them (e.g. there are two minimum six-week statutory consultations) so you must do what you can to work hard and fast during those parts over which you have more control. With The Right Hon. Michael Gove MP and his friends breathing down our collective necks, this has never felt so true.

We are, however, already in a stronger position to respond to planning applications submitted in our parishes. Paragraph 48 of the revised National Planning Policy Framework states that material consideration in decision-making may be given to relevant policies in *emerging* NPs. Since we have now completed our Reg. 14 Consultation, that's us. Consequently, Stapleford Parish Council was able to cite draft policies S&GS 6 and S&GS 12 when objecting to Rangeford's recent application (ref. 24/01190/S73) to locate multiple air source heat pumps on the roof of the retirement village's central pavilion in line of sight of two local landmark views and adding visible urbanising and industrialising clutter to a rural setting.

**Big Green Week** 8-16 June. Great Shelford Library will have a display showcasing some of the books covering green issues that we have discussed at our 2G3S book club meetings since these started in 2022.

**Stapleford Tree Project 2G3S** is proud to support a fantastic plan to protect the trees we have and to plant more around the village. Trees soak up carbon dioxide and pollution from the air, provide shade, and are good for wildlife.

Stapleford Village Weekend, 27-30 June We will have a stall at the Show on the Saturday afternoon. On Thursday 27 June at 7pm we will be showing the film 'Pure Clean Water', which we showed in Sawston to a sell-out audience in February. Here is your chance to see the film if you missed it before, or want to see it again - you don't need to be a Stapleford resident! It is beautifully shot in Cambridge and along the chalk streams locally, examines the water supply and usage in the area and its effects on the environment and features interviews with the Environment Agency, Cambridge Water, and other people involved in managing our water. With all the talk about building up to 150,000 new houses in the area by 2040, managing the water supply to all the new developments is crucial and even with the wet winter we've had, the pressure on the underground source of our water is intense. The Environment Agency objected to the proposed new Cancer Hospital on the Biomedical Campus, due to lack of water. See staplefordweekend.com for details and to get tickets, and find out more about the film at PureCleanWater.film.

**Saving water** Now the weather is warming up, and your plants are growing and need water, think about minimising the amount you take from the tap. Have you a water butt to collect rainwater? Can you use washing up water to water your pots? Choose plants that don't need too much water (lavender, pelargoniums, mediterranean plants) and group pots together to reduce evaporation. Collect up water in the kitchen from rinsing vegetables, fruit, and your hands and put that on your plants. Don't flush the loo after every use and use bathwater to flush the loo, or to water plants. Have short showers and only wash clothes if they're dirty. **Birdsong** Some of you may have read about how the soundscape of birdsong has changed over the years – a man in the US has been recording at dawn on the same day every year for 30 years at the same spot in Yellowstone Park and has evidence of the gradual reduction in birdsong in recent years, until this year his tape was silent. Closer to home, Tony Juniper (who used to run Friends of the Earth) has done a similar thing in Cambridge, with similar results. He reckons the heatwave in 2022 was a significant reason for the recent sudden decline in birdsong. Songbirds have declined for a number of reasons, including a loss of habitat due to intensive farming and loss of woodlands, and less available food due to the effects of climate change and pesticide use on numbers of invertebrates. Thus our gardens are so important in supporting wildlife, and we can help this by not using pesticides, keeping corners where creatures can shelter, planting a tree if possible, making a pond (even a small one) and planting nectar-rich plants.





A week later we were away at Cambourne. After getting some early wickets a couple of lapses in the field allowed Cambourne to pass 200, but with a fast outfield this looked within range. We kept up with the required rate but Mark Milne's 65 was not quite enough and we lost by 19 runs. In both the first two matches we slightly handicapped ourselves by only having ten players, so if there's anyone interested in joining us, please get in touch!

The Under 11s have played twice at the time of writing, losing against City of Cambridge but bouncing back to beat Royston. The Under 13s lost against Haddenham, but put up a creditable performance with a young mixed team, including two players very new to the game.

We would like to install an artificial pitch at the edge of the cricket square. This is mainly to benefit our growing junior section, but it will also be very helpful for practice sessions throughout the club, particularly at the beginning of the season when the groundsman's work preparing pitches means that we generally cannot use the square. The Parish Council have given us their blessing for this change on the Rec, and we have therefore started fundraising. If anyone can support us we would be most grateful.

## **Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774–1868**

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

## 21 JUNE 1851

HORTICULTURAL SHOW – The annual show of the Horticultural Society established in this village, will be held at the Railway Tavern on Wed. next. The numbers of the society have increased since last year, so that a pleasant party may be anticipated: those who joined the one which assembled last year will readily believe this. The subscription is very low and the good effect the society has already had upon the morals of the labouring portion of the inhabitants, in fostering habits of industry, unquestionable.

### 25 June 1853

THE FARMERS AND LABOURERS – The farmers of this parish and neighbouring villages are already endeavouring to engage their labourers for the ensuing harvest and they have offered considerably to raise their wages above those given last harvest. This has, in nearly every instance, been refused by the men. It has been generally anticipated that labourers would be very scarce at the ensuing harvest, in consequence of so many able-bodied men emigrating, and as Ireland is so drained by the emigration mania, we must not expect many labourers from there. The crops have such a prospect of being abundant that we fear the farmers will be short of hands to secure them in good time.


