SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE FINANCE AND GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE MEETING ON 21 AUGUST 2024

ELECTION OF CHAIR

Cllr Malcolm Watson was elected as Chairman of the Finance and General Purposes Committee.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

- a) It was agreed that Cllrs Watson and Stanton would attend the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Association of Local Councils (CAPALC) conference on 20 September, together with the Clerk and Assistant Clerk.
- b) The Council will adopt the model biodiversity policy from the Society of Local Council Clerks and add a page to the Parish Council website advising its current biodiversity actions, including the neighbourhood plan, clay pit and wildflowers.
- c) The deadline for the Cambridgeshire County Council consultation to identify which roads, paths and public rights of way are most important for active travel was Monday 16 September. As this deadline was prior to the next council meeting, individual councillors will respond to this consultation.
- d) A decision on the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority bus franchising consultation was referred to the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group, who were asked to make a recommendation at a future council meeting.
- e) Progress made on actions listed in the Strategic Plan:
 - Cllr Watson reported that East-West Rail (EWR) had sent Land Interest Questionnaires to 53 properties in the CB22 5 area. County Cllrs have been sent a questionnaire regarding EWR, but there has been no consultation with the Parish Council yet.
 - Cllr Watson advised that correspondence had been received from Greater Cambridge Shared Planning regarding the creation of a supplementary planning document for the Cambridge Biomedical Campus (CBC). Following the meeting in June, a joint statement has been prepared by the CBC working group. The CBC working group is seeking a meeting with the landowners of the CBC.
 - The Clerk reported that there have been issues with water leaks at the pavilion and also blocked drains at the pavilion.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

- a) The fireworks event will be held on Saturday 2 November and the Parish Council will donate the budgeted amount.
- b) The Parish Council will waive the booking fee for the Memorial Hall for the Seniors' Christmas Party.
- c) The Parish Council will run the duck race and organise other entertainments for the Playscape Fun Run on Sunday 29 September.
- d) Consideration of any future fundraising events was deferred to the next full council meeting, where a working group could be set up.

FINANCE MATTERS

- a) The monthly accounts were approved. It was agreed that the Clerk will present a budget analysis document to every council meeting.
- b) It was agreed that the committee would review the budget expenditure in detail.
- c) The issue of the wet pour around several items of play equipment was discussed. The quote from Redlynch for the repair of the wet pour and the installation of a scramble net to replace the monkey bars was approved. As Duncan and Grove has denied any responsibility for the failure of the wet pour, the Clerk will request the removal of the Playscape from their website and remove any references to Duncan and Grove from the parish council website.
- d) The Clerk will continue to seek quotes for the repair of the war memorial.
- e) The quotation from Ely Glass for repair of the broken window at the pavilion at a cost of £1190 was approved
- f) The renewal of the contract with Online Playgrounds for the quarterly inspection of the playscape at £100 per visit. was approved.
- g) The renewal of the contract with Dardan at £418.14 per month plus £50 per alarm response callout was approved.
- h) The Clerk was authorised to purchase a new projector at a cost of up to £900.
- i) The Clerk will seek quotes from Latta Hire for an accessible portaloo at the Recreation Ground.

Memorial Hall renovation update

We're in the planning stages of an exciting project to renovate our iconic Memorial Hall. Committee discussions are ongoing and we're exploring options to preserve its rich history while modernising for future use. Your input matters! Stay tuned for updates and opportunities to share your thoughts on this important project.

Parking fines update from South Cambs Civil Parking Enforcement

In the past six months, a total of 75 parking tickets have been issued across the village, with the majority of infractions taking place on Woollards Lane and the High Street.

The most common violations include:

- Parking on yellow lines
- Parking in disabled bays without a badge
- Exceeding the permitted time limit
- Parking over the pedestrian crossings.

Please be mindful of parking rules to avoid fines and help keep our streets safe and accessible.

Water leak at the Recreation Ground

We've identified a water leak in the supply pipe to the pavilion at the recreation ground. Our team is currently investigating and looking into options for reinstatement. We'll keep you updated as we work towards a solution and ensure everything is back to normal as soon as possible. Thank you for your patience.

Infrastructure projects

We're expecting important information to be released soon on key local projects, including Cambridge South East Transport (CSET), East West Rail (EWR) and the Cambridge 2050 project. These updates will follow the upcoming budget announcement, but final information likely won't be available until December. We continue to monitor developments and will share updates as soon as they become available.

We held our Band Concert in Challis Gardens last month and to say it was a resounding success is an understatement. The Newmarket Band were outstanding. Everyone there was either singing along, tapping their feet or in some cases dancing. Even the weather was kind. We

will be having another Band Concert next year and once details are finalised, we will let you all know.

At the front of all of our Remembrance Parades, at the beginning of the Festival of Remembrance when the Parade of Standards take place or when the RBL is visible at any event, the Standard is there. The standard, originally designed in 1923 by Colonel E. C. Heath, the first General Secretary of the RBL, is looked upon as the rallying point of the Branch. It is also a constant reminder to our members of our motto 'Service not Self'. We hope to display our new Standard on Remembrance Sunday. It has been brought about because we felt that our previous 'Sawston & Pampisford Branch' Standard did not reflect our absorption of other local branches that have closed in the last few years in surrounding villages – hence our decision to have a new Sawston & District Branch Standard in which they can feel that they are also represented.

On 15 September 1940, the Luftwaffe launched a massive air assault in the skies over Britain. It was a day of heavy fighting culminating in the Luftwaffe suffering significant casualties. Since then, this date has been celebrated as Battle of Britain Day. 'Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few.' (Winston Churchill 1940)



Rosey's Reflections

I am forever grateful for the welcome and kindnesses expressed since entering Great Shelford on placement and being licensed as a lay minister for St Mary's in October 2022, the same week Julie Norris was collated to Vicar. We have since welcomed Father Edward and Revd. Chris to our team, learning about their ministry roles and interests. Now it's my turn to outline emphases I have been developing over time, with valued encouragement from Julie and others, including our late lay minister Maureen.

I am a retired teacher of adults learning English, also working in examinations, training and conferences. Though single, I have 12 family members in Surrey (where we grew up), plus adult godchildren and 'great godchildren'. For some years I have worked particularly with older people, backed by Anna Chaplaincy, an organisation which promotes spiritual care – in the broadest senses – among those in later life. I also offer spiritual direction, Quiet Days and talks to community and church groups in different places. Great Shelford ministry has included restarting the Great Shelford Friendship Club, visiting and Care Home work, alongside preaching and leading services in church and elsewhere. We are all going to feel our age sometime; I aim to make that time richer, less anxious and more befriended for people than it sometimes becomes. I'd like to focus attention on two related upcoming events and ask for your support.

Thursday 31 October. A talk by Anna Chaplain speaker, 'Staying Alive and Enriching Later Life' at 7pm in St Mary's Community Room.

CHANGE

'Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert, 'Isaiah 43:19

Autumn is upon us, and for me it ties with spring for the accolade of 'favourite season'. Far more sensible than trying to reinvent oneself in January, the bleakest time of the year, the new academic year seems full of promise, and the opportunity to reassess things.

Sometimes life throws us a season when it's time to let go of intangible things too. It may be a relationship, a habit, a job that has fulfilled us for many years. It may be an attitude, our perceived status or material possessions. Letting go of things is scary and can cause us to feel genuine grief for what has gone.

Yet, as new space opens up, as Christians we can be confident that the God who daily gives us a fresh new morning has a plan for each as yet untrodden pathway. And not only does he promise to guide us into new journeys, he actually gives us a whole new life if we are willing to let go of doing things our way. No longer do God's people have to follow the old way of earning approval through making sacrifices; Jesus is in fact *the* new way and following him is the best swap of 'new for old' we can ever make.

GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICES VACCINATIONS UPDATE

As we approach the colder months, there are a number of vaccines that can help protect you against serious illness, including:

RSV VACCINE (new for 2024)

The RSV vaccine helps protect against Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) that can make babies and older adults seriously ill. This is offered all year round and is recommended if:

• you are pregnant (from 28 weeks onwards) to help protect your baby after they are born

you are aged 75 to 79
 (If you turn 80 on or after 1 September 2024 you're eligible for the RSV vaccine until 31 August 2025. You're not eligible for it if you turned 80 before 1 September 2024)

FLU VACCINE

This vaccine helps protect against flu, which can be a serious or life-threatening illness. It's offered on the NHS every year in autumn or early winter to people at higher risk of getting seriously ill from flu. You can get the vaccine if you are:

- are aged 65 or over
- have certain long-term health conditions
- are pregnant
- live in a care home
- are the main carer for an older or disabled person
- receive a carer's allowance
- live with someone who has a weakened immune system.

SHINGLES VACCINE

This vaccine helps protect against shingles and is offered all year round. Shingles is a common condition that causes a painful rash. It can sometimes lead to serious problems such as long-lasting pain, hearing loss or blindness. You're more likely to get shingles, and it is more likely to cause serious problems, as you get older or if you have a severely weakened immune system. The vaccine is recommended for:


- people who turn 65 on or after 1 September
- people aged 70 to 79
- people aged 50 and over with a severely weakened immune system.

PNEUMONOCOCCAL (PNEUMONIA) VACCINE

This vaccine is offered all year round. It helps protect against serious illnesses like pneumonia and meningitis and is recommended for:

- babies
- people aged 65 and over
- children and adults at higher risk of getting seriously ill.

Please speak to any member of our reception team to check if you are eligible for any of the above vaccines and to book into a vaccine clinic.

I am sure you are thinking that 'I have got enough going on already' so I thought I would just share with you my experience of taking on the role as a Scout Leader some years ago when my children were coming through the group. I was persuaded by my wife that I really should do something other than work – something which ensured I got out more, contributed more and in particular did something which involved the children more.

Despite having no real experience in crowd control, limited fire lighting experience and no knowledge of knots, I have to say it has been a hugely positive experience. It became two hours of my week when it was impossible to worry about all of the pressures and stresses of work (in my case clinical medicine). Instead, I became absorbed in implausible cooking challenges, civil engineering with anything from paper to poles, and games from the ridiculous to the ingenious. My bookshelf expanded to include useful reference books such as 'Backyard Ballistics' and 'Practical Pyrotechnics'.

More importantly, however, it has also been a huge privilege seeing a number of young people grow up and develop. I have obviously experienced this with my own children (and that is invaluable). But seeing all sorts of young people develop from being incapable to competent, whether that be from struggling to open the door to being able to navigate on a hike, has been hugely rewarding.

I think many people would be surprised as to what they can contribute to Scouting and also how they can benefit from Scouting themselves.

We have three sections: Beavers (6-8 years), Cubs (8–10.5 years) and Scouts (10.5–14 years) and we are looking for help in all three sections. Don't worry if you don't have the skills, that was where I started. We can help with training and support.

All the leaders I have worked with over the years have been busy people. Many are juggling multiple things but those are usually the people who make a difference. So, if you are one of those people or know one of those people who are just about keeping three balls in the air and would like to try adding a fourth, please get in touch.



NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

Comments on the first formal stakeholder consultation back in Spring 2024 (the 'Regulation 14 Consultation') were very gratefully received but, my goodness, there were so many of them! It has been the work of several months to read them, split and sort them according to the part of the Neighbourhood Plan (NP) to which they relate and then respond to them all. One respondent could make comments about, say, 20 different parts of the Plan and all of these need to be noted. Multiply this by the myriad responses we received and you can start to understand the scale of the mountain we have been climbing.

Work in September and October will focus on updating the NP in light of consultation feedback and on producing the 'Consultation Statement' and 'Basic Conditions Statement' which must accompany all NPs when they are submitted to the local authority prior to independent examination. The former explains how the community has been consulted and their views taken into account during the development of the NP, whilst only a NP that meets each of the basic conditions can be put to referendum and, if successful, used to assist in the determination of planning applications.

The main basic conditions require that a NP:

- has regard to national policies and advice contained in guidance issued by the Secretary of State
- contributes to the achievement of sustainable development
- is in general conformity with the strategic policies contained in SCDC's Local Plan (2018)
- does not breach and is otherwise compatible with EU obligations, as incorporated into UK law.

This all sounds very dry – and to an extent it is – but it is a legal requirement of the NP process and, frankly, to be at the point where we are dealing with this is something of an achievement.

The timeline that we are working to should see the 'submission [i.e. final] version' of the NP being signed off by Stapleford and Great Shelford Parish Councils at their November public meetings, with all documents being submitted to Greater Cambridge Shared Planning shortly thereafter. If all goes well at examination stage, we hope to hold a yes/no referendum amongst those registered to vote in our parishes in spring 2025. A majority 'yes' vote will mean that our community – finally – has a say in shaping the development and growth of our area over the coming years. Yay!

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

13 October 1860

STEALING – Susan Pledger, a servant girl in the employ of Mr Allan Ramsay, farmer of Great Shelford, was brought up on remand, charged with stealing the following articles, the property of her master, on the third inst: two towels, one pocket handkerchief, one pair of scissors, a purse, a silver saltspoon, a comb and case, and other articles. Prisoner admitted taking the articles and asked her master to forgive her. Mr Ramsay gave the girl a good character and stated that the present case was the only cause for fault he had to find. The prisoner was sent to gaol for three weeks.




