### SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 16 OCTOBER 2024

#### PLANS FOR THE SAWSTON GREENWAY

A presentation was received from Kerry Allen detailing the plans for the Sawston Greenway in Great Shelford and Stapleford. There was a robust discussion debating the detail of the plans.

### NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Jenny Flynn presented the final draft submission documents for the Neighbourhood Plan. There was a discussion regarding the more controversial points following the consultation. The Parish Council is happy to proceed with the documents and is grateful for the contribution of the community as a whole, the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, Rachel Hogger and Jenny Flynn.

### REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

District Cllr Fane discussed the proposed changes to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), including the introduction of grey belt and the additional support for rural exception sites. The definition of affordable housing will change, with more emphasis on affordable rent. The area for the Cambridge Delivery Group has not yet been defined, but it may be near to the Great Shelford boundary. There is a grant available for improving High Streets, which could apply to Woollards Lane.

### REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS

- a) The Cambridge Biomedical Campus (CBC) working group has sent a joint response to the complaints received from CBC Ltd. CBC Ltd has published a revised Vision 2050, which contains few changes but does include some points raised by the working group. Errors in this document include the statement that building has started on the new hospital and is due to be completed in 2028, which is not accurate as the full business case is not yet approved and the new hospital review is ongoing. There has been no success in enforcing the no through route for the campus.
- b) East-West Rail (EWR) are awaiting the upcoming budget, then are due to hold a non-statutory consultation for eight weeks, with the expectation that the Development Consent Order will be submitted in 2026 and construction will commence in 2029. There have been challenges to EWR from the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP), Cambridgeshire County Council

(CCC) and South Cambridgeshire County Council (SCDC). There was a discussion regarding the money donated by Great Shelford Parish Council (GSPC) to Cambridge Approaches and the Clerk will write to remind them of the conditions of this donation.

### HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT MATTERS

- a) The Council will write to all County Councillors to restate the Council's established position on Cambridge South East Transport (CSET). It was agreed to amend the draft letter to include the phrase 'as they contradict the will of SCDC' in the first paragraph.
- b) A response to the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority Bus Franchising Consultation was discussed and will be submitted.
- c) The success of the Local Highways Improvement (LHI) bid for the improvements to Church Street was noted.
- d) The feasibility study for the double yellow lines around the junction at Grahams Road was reviewed. It was agreed that the Council approves this work and will seek a contribution from the Co-op.
- e) It was agreed that the consultation on the CCC Highways and Streetlighting Contracts stakeholder surveys will be publicised on the website and Facebook page and in the Village News. Parishioners will be invited to respond as individuals and these surveys should be referred to the Travel and Transport Infrastructure Working Group (TTIWG) for a recommendation regarding whether the Council should respond.

### **COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS**

- a) Owl boxes have been installed in the Pocket Park with the help of the Hawk and Owl Trust. The Council will donate £100 to the Trust.
- b) A report was received following the Fun Day on 29 September.
- c) An update was received on the Christmas lights event on 1 December.
- d) Plans for Remembrance Sunday were discussed and the hire of a van at a cost of £120 was authorised. GSPC will donate £100 to Histon Feast Week for the use of their road signs and authorise the hire of a van to transport them at a cost of £126.
- e) It was agreed that GSPC will support the Christmas Carol Event on Tuesday 17 December in principle and request a detailed budget.
- f) The provisional date for the GSPC Christmas Social is Friday 10 January, dependant on the availability of the venue.
- g) Options for future fundraising events were discussed. TTIWG is requested to discuss a street party on Woollards Lane. Cllrs Price and Niblett were

- write to Greater Cambridge Shared Planning (GCSP) to ask what monitoring it is proposing in relation to the publication of the Water Resources Management Plan by Cambridge Water (CW) and the performance of Cambridge Water, especially as regards its leakage, consumption reduction and smart metering targets.
- write to GCSP to ask what water availability and/or flood-related planning conditions it typically considers so that the Planning Committee can make appropriate suggestions when commenting on planning applications.
- write to CW to urge it to be more ambitious in its suggestions for use reduction or perhaps lobby SCDC or the County Council to do so.
- monitor the development of the water credits scheme and the emerging Local Plan.

### Julie's Jottings

Since the 5th century there has been a tradition on the third Sunday of Advent to have a day of rejoicing. It is called Gaudete (Latin for rejoice) Sunday and marks a shift in focus. Anticipation for something a long way in the future is now close at hand. This is a time to rejoice, to feel or show great joy or delight.

A much enjoyed Advent hymn dates back to the 8<sup>th</sup> century and takes up the theme of rejoicing.

Rejoice, rejoice! Christ is born
Of the Virgin Mary – Rejoice!
The time of grace has come— What we have wished for;
Songs of joy. Let us give back faithfully.
God has become human, With nature marvelling,
The world has been renewed By the reigning Christ.
The closed gate of Ezekiel Is passed through,

### Community Carols at Shelford Memorial Hall Tuesday 17 December 6.30 —7.30pm

'For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.' *Isaiah 9v6 (ESV)* Christmas carols are a way of telling the story of the nativity and the birth of Jesus Christ. They contain great truths - truths of hope, love and joy - something that's hard to find in an age where truth is viewed as relative. Those who know carols have that truth hidden in their hearts, ready to pull it out at a moment's notice.

The word 'carol' actually means a dance or a song of praise and joy celebrating the birth of Christ. The power of music evokes a memory and with those memories come emotions.

In Christmas, the Christian faith brought together traditional winter feasts and celebrations, which were designed to spread light in the dark, deep midwinter months and the celebrations of Jesus's birth. Christmas carols have an appropriately uplifting and celebratory style to honour such an occasion. Over the centuries, songs have been written to help God's people remember the story of Christ's birth and its significance so they could respond in joy or adoration.

One of the earliest recorded Christmas carols was the 'Angel's Hymn' in 129 AD which is said to be the precursor for the carol now known as Hark! The Herald angels sing.

Carols are something that we mostly take for granted at this time of year and we sing them unquestioningly as part of our Christmas celebrations. The fact that we usually sing carols in groups means that we associate them with a sense of community happiness, especially since they are sung at Christmas which is generally thought of as a joyful time of year. Despite their religious origins, they continue to play a large role in many people's Christmas celebrations.

Great Shelford Parish Council and the churches of St. Mary the Virgin and Shelford Free Church invite you to gather with family and friends on Tuesday 17 December at 6.30pm to enjoy the timeless Christmas carols celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ whilst reflecting on the real meaning of Christmas.

During the evening, the Christmas story will be retold through the singing of traditional carols accompanied by the City of Cambridge Brass Band.

Characters from the Christmas story will add their reflections about their experience during the period of the birth of Jesus 2,000 years ago.

After the carols, mulled wine and mince pies, tea, coffee and soft drinks will be served.

### SHELFORD SCHOOL

Year 2 explored the changes brought about by the Great Fire of London. This included study of the materials used to construct medieval buildings and how they influenced the way the fire spread, as well as later changes as building methods developed. The most memorable part of this topic was undoubtedly the visit and demonstration from the fire service. Pupils got to experience the force of modern fire hoses.



A much quieter event came on Remembrance Day when Year 6 led our annual service, looking at the sacrifices made by others that we all benefit from today.

The passing of the seasons is reflected in school life. In October Year 3 led our Harvest Service at St Mary's, using paintings, poetry, music and prayers to help us stop and reflect – a time to be grateful for the food we have and think about those who are less fortunate. As usual we supported Jimmy's Cambridge through donations of food and money.

By the time you read this, autumn will have given way to Advent and the promise of Christmas to come. If you are seeing this soon after publication there may still be time to come to the Lights switch on event on 1st December when the PTA will be supplying essentials such as hot dogs, as well (I hope) as some more traditional Christmas fare. The usual school events will follow, leading up to the carol service and the Shelford Christmas Day before everyone has a well-earned rest.

### PIPPA HEYLINGS MP

The following item features edited extracts from our MP's newsletter. It was a dark day this week, waking to the news of the US election. Families across the UK will be worrying about the damage Trump will do to our economy and our national security, given his record of starting trade wars, undermining NATO and emboldening tyrants like Putin and withdrawing from the climate agreements. Fixing the UK's broken relationship with the EU is even more urgent than before. We must strengthen trade and defence cooperation across Europe to help protect ourselves from the damage Trump will do.

Now more than ever, we must stand up for the core liberal values of equality, democracy, human rights and the rule of law – at home and around the world.

Locally I am calling for certainty about the funding for the new Cambridge Cancer Hospital which is under review. I took the opportunity during the Budget debate to urge the Chancellor to stop further delay on this ground breaking, life saving hospital which already has spades in the ground.

East West Rail (EWR) The government has announced that it wants to go ahead with the full East West Rail route from Oxford to Cambridge. This cannot be a repeat of the "botched job" by the former government. I have already had two meetings with the new CEO of EWR, and I shared my deep concerns about the failure to properly engage with local communities along the route and the lack of any local benefits to those communities, particularly to those most impacted. In South Cambridgeshire, residents need real details that answer the many questions that have been raised for so long without a response; and EWR must demonstrate that they have listened and acted on what I and many others have been saying.

I was somewhat reassured by the more open approach adopted by the new CEO, David Hughes. Whilst acknowledging that there would be significant impacts for some along the proposed route, he assured me that the consultation will reveal significant changes in response to the things we have been shouting about:

- electrification of the route rather than diesel trains
- ensuring connectivity between villages, such as Harlton and Newton
- reducing huge environmental damage (towering embankments, cutting through Chapel Hill), and others.

### SHELFORD FEAST

In 1994 we held the first modern Shelford Feast, in the school grounds, and raised a surprising £1800 for the school. We thought we'd done quite well and so we tried again the following year – and doubled our profits. Roll on thirty years and we are proud to say that, along with entertaining the village for a whole week, we have been able to give £20,000 to deserving local causes in 2024. In total that means we have given away over £390,000 to nearly 100 local groups and causes – so, many thanks to the over 100 volunteers who make The Feast possible and of course to the thousands who attend and enjoy the week.



What had once been a weekend (see this picture from 1920) has turned from a single Feast day into a week long Festival of music, comedy and entertainment and is now a fixture of the summer calendar, with interest from much

wider afield than just the Shelfords. But our aim stays the same: to both entertain and to raise money for local good causes.

So, we are delighted to say that this year's £20,000 will go to thirty groups – £3,000 to three groups and anything from £150 to £500 for others, according to need and to the amount of help they and their supporters can give us. Because if your good cause can run a stall, or your supporters can help fit out the marquee or serve in the food tent, then everyone gains. We depend on volunteers!





### NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

### A neighbourhood plan-shaped Christmas present for our villages?



At its November meeting, Stapleford Parish Councillors voted to approve the submission to the local planning authority of the Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan (NP) and all of its supporting documents. Great Shelford Parish Councillors had the opportunity to do the

same at their full council meeting on 20 November. Whilst this is far from a perfunctory process, at the time of writing this article (8 November) there are signs of a propitious outcome. The NP is, after all, being produced by a volunteer group of residents and councillors on behalf of the two parish councils; the councils have received monthly progress updates over the past three years and authorised various aspects of it along the way; and my detailed report on the submission version of the NP was met favourably by Great Shelford councillors in October.

All being well, we will soon be able to announce submission of the NP to South Cambs District Council (SCDC) via parish council websites and local Facebook pages, although you may also hear my enormous sigh of relief carrying across the fields.

Once submitted, SCDC will conduct a 'Regulation 16' consultation over five weeks to receive comments on our submission NP. It will:

- publish details of the NP on its website and elsewhere
- provide details of where and when the NP can be inspected
- provide details of how to make representations
- directly contact everyone who submitted comments to our Reg. 14 consultation in March/April 2024 (they may wish, for example, to see whether or how their comments influenced the NP and make representations against that).

Comments received during the Reg. 16 consultation will be passed onto an independent examiner appointed by SCDC (and agreed by the parish councils) to determine whether our NP meets the legally binding 'basic conditions' required of it. I'll write more about the examination process another time, suffice to say that if the examiner ticks the box against each of the basic conditions, then there will be only one more hurdle to jump (a community yes/no referendum) before the 21 planning policies in our NP become legally binding and used in the determination of all planning applications coming forward in Stapleford and Great Shelford parishes. We thank residents for their continued support and input and wish everyone a very merry Christmas.

## BUSWAY A Critical Moment Your Last Chance EVER to Save Your Countryside

A pivotal decision has been made that affects the future of our community and environment with Cambridgeshire County Council voting to proceed with plans to build a five mile road through the countryside between the A11 and Cambridge Biomedical Campus. Known as the Cambridge South East Transport Scheme (CSET) the road will be used by buses and now faces a public inquiry. This is your last chance to save the countryside by supporting a better alternative.

The bus road plans have faced substantial opposition from local residents, environmental groups, businesses and Parish Councils because it is so damaging to our special countryside and rural setting and will unleash development all along its route. Despite these objections, our politicians have pushed ahead, when a better, more cost-effective alternative exists.

The Better Alternative: The alternative solution is to build one mile of bus road and one point two miles of bus lane alongside the A1307, where congestion is an issue. This would have much less environmental impact and cost £100 million less than building five miles of road. Importantly, this would achieve similar transport and economic benefits and could achieve faster results by opening up each phase of the project as it's completed. This is **your last chance** to prevent five miles of bus road from permanently scarring our landscape and losing the green belt and the unique character of South Cambridgeshire forever. Together, we can protect our environment, our community and our future. The alternative scheme in the A1307 corridor saves £100 million, delivers similar benefits faster and is much better for the countryside and environment.

### OLD REWS

### **Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868**

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

### 6 December 1856

THE CRIMEA – Some of the families in the village have been highly delighted during the past week, by the return of sons or brothers from the Crimean army, who after all the dangers, toil and hardship that they have undergone, have returned on Furlough for a few weeks to their native place, safe and sound

### 9 December 1857

CHRISTMAS TURKEYS – Mr William Moore of Gt. Shelford has 135 of the finest cock turkeys in England, which will be in London in a few days for Christmas. He has a large number of hen turkeys for the same market. Mr Richard Brand, of the same village, at the late Birmingham Show gained the two first prizes for fine turkeys. He has a hen turkey in his possession that weighs 24lbs alive.

### 15 December 1860

DRUNKENESS – Simon Pouter, labourer, Little Shelford, was charged with being drunk and incapable in the "streets" of Great Shelford on the previous night. The defendant only had 9s a week and "small beer" and although he had 3 children with the whooping cough and a wife to maintain on this sum, yet he thought a man should have a little "nourishment" sometimes. The man had, it seemed, borne a good character, on the strength of which, and a promise not to repeat the offence, he was sent about his business on agreeing to pay the sum of 2s 6d, mitigated costs, within a week.

### 29 December 1860

On Wednesday the 19<sup>th</sup> inst. a foot race of 100 yards was run between John Main of Sawston, a rather swift-footed gentleman, and Charles Porter, of Great Shelford. The winner was to receive from the loser 30s and this prize, notwithstanding Main's previous fame as a runner was won by his opponent. Porter's time, ten and a half seconds.

### WI

At our November meeting, Eleanor Witter introduced our speaker, Neil Callan who with his wife, Clare shared with us their infectious joint love of gardening.

Some years ago, they began to develop three quarters of an acre of Fen soil from almost nothing, other than a few good trees, into an interesting, colourful and productive garden. Few of us had known that under the fen soil are layers of shells from when it was under the sea. That makes the peaty soil alkaline as opposed to upland peat that is acidic. Clare claims that they had no real plan but the garden now has areas that are stunning at different times of the year.

Neil and Clare are good photographers and treated us to projected images of their 'Garden through the Year' including close ups of many of the flowers starting with wintersweet and snowdrops in the early spring, through the usual and unusual flowers of later spring. Their real passion is for the family of May flowering bearded irises shown in more superb shots. Some of their most colourful irises were potted up for us to buy.

After naming over 70 plants in the photographs, the year ended with the garden blanketed in snow and trees covered in hoar frost. Winter, we were told, is actually a busy time for them with hedging producing mounds of woody stems and branches that can't be composted but that in the countryside can still be burnt on a controlled bonfire.

Throughout, we were told what went well but also comfortingly for many of us what didn't thrive or survive, which plants do well in wet/dry soil and which need sun/shade or do well anywhere. Gardens are not static, they continuously evolve.

After they had answered some excellent questions, Eleanor thanked our speakers and then followed more lively conversation over coffee/tea and biscuits.

Our regular meetings continue with a Christmas party and craft work on 7 December followed by Lestyn Edwards with 'My tutu went AWOL!' on 2 January 2025.

To find out more you will be very welcome to join us at our usual venue, the Community Room behind St Mary's Church, Great Shelford, on the first Thursday of each month at 7.30pm.




