SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 20 NOVEMBER 2024

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

A member of the public reported that there is an issue with graffiti on the railway bridge on London Road and asked the Council to investigate.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Jenny Flynn presented the documents for submission for the Neighbourhood Plan which had been distributed prior to the meeting and gave an opportunity for questions. The Chairman thanked Jenny and her team for their hard work. Great Shelford Parish Council approved the submission version of the Neighbourhood Plan and its accompanying documents and supporting evidence for submission to South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC), and will communicate this in writing to Stapleford Parish Council, the qualifying body for the Neighbourhood Plan.

REPORTS FROM COUNTY & DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

District Cllr Jackson-Wood reported that an informal Cambridge Biomedical Campus (CBC) working group between City and District has been created. District Cllr Fane stated that this group would be happy to meet with the Great Shelford Parish Council (GSPC) CBC working group.

Cllr Ashurst asked for an update of the four-day week. District Cllr Jackson-Wood stated that this is still in a trial period but evidence so far shows that this has been a success. The information used to measure this success includes sickness data, employee feedback and welfare.

Cllr Brown asked whether SCDC had enough information to establish its position on East-West Rail. District Cllr Fane reported that the working group is putting together a formal response.

Cllr Watson asked for feedback regarding the civil parking enforcement and what tickets are issued in Great Shelford.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS

Cambridge Biomedical Campus working group The Chairman and Clerk have attended a meeting with Nick Kirby and Kristin-Anne Rutter. A briefing was held at CBC on the upcoming supplementary planning document. The intention is for the CBC working group to meet with the planning committee to formulate the response to the consultation regarding this document.

East-West Rail The non-statutory consultation has been published. There was a robust discussion regarding the detail of the plans and the effect on Great Shelford. The Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group (TTIWG) will discuss the draft response from the Council, which will be published on the website and Facebook. Parishioners will be invited to comment on the draft, with the decision on the response to be taken at the January meeting of the Council.

HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT MATTERS

- a) The Chairman reported that Cllr Lyn Disley has resigned from the Parish Council. The Council thanked Lyn for her work, especially in the areas of transport and communications. Cllr John Stanton will take over as Chair of TTIWG.
- b) District Cllr Fane presented a report on the siting and condition of broadband cabinets on the pavements. The Council will write to the County Council to support concerns regarding the siting and number of broadband cabinets and request further information about these.
- c) Options for the 25/26 round of the Local Highway Improvement funding were discussed. The Council will publish an online survey to establish community support for the two options of a raised table at the zebra crossing on Church Street or a pedestrian crossing near Scotsdales, which could be a refuge, zebra crossing or signal controlled crossing.
- d) Recommendations for capitally funded highway maintenance were discussed. The council recommends the following:
- resurfacing and white lining in Woollards Lane, Station Road and Tunwells Lane
- drainage at Freestones Corner
- pavement resurfacing and widening in Woollards Lane
- mini roundabout at Granhams Road junction
- e) The lease for the permissive path (Jennys Path) from Great Shelford to Hauxton was discussed and it was agreed that the licence document will be executed.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

The issue of water scarcity and the recommendation of the Planning Committee were discussed and the following recommendations were approved

writing to Greater Cambridge Shared Planning (GCSP) to ask what
monitoring it is proposing in relation to the publication of Cambridge
Water's (CW) final Water Resources Management Plan (WRMP) and
CW's performance against this plan, especially as regards its targets for
leaks, consumption reduction and smart metering.

 writing to CW to urge it to be more ambitious in its suggestions for use reduction

- writing to GCSP to ask what water availability and/or flood-related planning conditions it typically considers, so that the Planning Committee can make appropriate suggestions when commenting on planning applications
- monitoring the development of the water credits scheme and the emerging Local Plan
- asking CW for the technical report underlying its chalk stream restoration plan proposals for the Granta.

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COULD YOU BE A PARISH COUNCILLOR?

Do you care about our community and want to see positive change? If so, keep reading—you might be the perfect fit!

What is a Parish Council?

Parish Councils are the local level of government closest to residents, uniquely positioned to serve the community. Parish Councillors serve four-year terms in this voluntary role.

Could you be eligible?

To qualify as a Parish Councillor, you must:

- be at least 18 years old on the day of your nomination.
- be a British, eligible Commonwealth, or European Union citizen.

You must also meet at least one of the following criteria:

- you are a local government elector for the parish.
- you own or rent property in the parish for at least 12 months prior to the nomination and election day.
- your main workplace has been in the parish for the past 12 months.
- you've lived in the parish, or within three miles of it, for at least 12 months.

But what does the Parish Council actually do?

Here are just a few of their responsibilities:

- representing local interests in planning and development.
- supporting local organisations through grants.
- providing amenities such as streetlights, bus shelters and seating.
- managing green spaces, recreational grounds and children's play areas.

Common misconceptions about becoming a Councillor

- 'I'm too young.' If you're 18 or older, you're eligible.
- 'I'm too busy.' Full Council meetings happen just 10 times a year, lasting about two or three hours each. Expect an average commitment of about 2 hours a week.
- 'I'm not qualified.' No formal qualifications are required just an interest in the community. Training and support are available.
- 'I'm new to the area.' Fresh perspectives are valuable! Becoming a Councillor is a great way to learn about the community.
- 'I'm focused on my career.' Demonstrating skills in decision-making, teamwork and community engagement can boost your CV.

Why our Parish Council matters

The Parish Council plays a vital role in maintaining and improving our community spaces and facilities. Thanks to their work, we have:

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- the pocket park as a space to relax and play
- convenient bus shelters and litter bins that keep our village clean
- benches for resting and enjoying our surroundings
- regular grass cutting to keep our spaces inviting
- festive Christmas lights that bring cheer to our village each winter

Key projects and initiatives that have enriched our community:

- A state of the art skatepark was constructed, providing a safe and fun place for local youth to gather and skate.

EXTRACTS FROM OUR MP'S NEWSLETTER

Health and social care: Terminally ill adults (End of Life) Bill

Today I voted in favour of the Terminally Ill Adults (End of Life) Bill: Second Reading. This is a very important, emotive and sensitive issue. I have, therefore, taken the time to read at length and hear from all sides - much of it harrowing evidence from

brave constituents sharing direct personal experience of themselves and loved ones dying or who have died of terminal illnesses, including those receiving palliative care.

Prior to the debate today, I studied the multiple briefings that we as MPs have received from the different professional bodies involved either directly or indirectly in the areas of legal, medical, palliative, psychological and social care. I had an in-depth tour of our local Arthur Rank Hospice and an online meeting with their senior leadership. I have also studied the results of the 14-month inquiry by the Health and Social Care Select Committee into Assisted Dying/Assisted Suicide that looked in-depth at our current state of end of life care, as well as examples across the world where assisted dying has been adopted. I believe we experienced Parliament at its best today, debating meaningfully and with respect on all sides for different views around the right to choice and dignity for the terminally ill.

Health and Social Care: Exempt GPs now from tax hike

We all know how important our family doctors are. That's why it's so worrying when I've heard from GPs all across South Cambridgeshire – from the surgeries in Comberton, Eversden, Harston, Melbourn and Queen Ediths – about being 'pushed to the brink' by the potentially devastating rise in employer National Insurance Contributions announced in the Budget. They see no option but to reduce staff and appointments and some may even have to hand back their contracts, denying patients the opportunity of primary care in their community. I spoke up for GPs on BBC Radio Cambridgeshire. The Government must change course and exempt GPs and independent care providers from this ill thought-through tax hike.

Family Farm Tax

Having spoken up in Parliament in their defence, it was important for me to

meet with farmers from across South Cambridgeshire and hear directly from them about the impacts of the 'family farm tax'. I heard heart-breaking stories from family farmers, many of whom have farmed their land for three generations.

They are deeply upset, anxious and call these budget measures 'cruel' and wrongheaded. Our farmers feel no one is listening to them. It was disappointing that Daniel Zeichner MP, Minister for Farming, was unable to join us. I will continue to push the government to axe the family farm tax. Farmers have proposals about fairer ways to deal with inheritance tax and the government should be listening to them.

COP29

Last week I represented the Liberal Democrats at COP29 in Azerbaijan, where leaders from countries all over the world came together to collectively try to address the climate crisis - and at the 11th hour reached a final agreement. I spoke about the UK's Climate and Nature Bill that is to be introduced in January to parliament. The bill has huge cross-party support from all levels of government and civil society. It says that we can only really tackle the climate crisis when we look at these twin emergencies of climate and nature together.

Deteriorating roads and infrastructure

The state of our roads is symptomatic of the mess that the last government left the country in. Like most areas of the country, South Cambridgeshire is struggling with a highways network which has been starved of maintenance or investment for many years.

Without urgent additional government funding to plug the gap left by the Conservatives, Cambridgeshire County Council is unlikely to be able to make any significant progress towards improving our roads. The Cambridgeshire MPs, Charlotte Cane and Ian Sollom, and I have written to the Minister at the Department for Transport asking her to visit our area to see for herself the poor state of our roads

Tackling the crisis in Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) Education

I was inspired by the work of the SEND team at Bassingbourn Community Primary School. Local schools are finding themselves picking up the pieces of the broken systems in health and social care, family support and mental health provision. But they are doing excellent work to integrate some of the highest need children into mainstream education whilst providing safe, high quality education for all. I have called on the Education Secretary to make sure that local schools receive a fair slice of the new SEND funding.

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This is what the LORD says: 'Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls.'

Jeremiah 6:16-20

I recently had the privilege of spending five days at the home of the Northumbria Community, on a retreat entitled 'Life at the Crossroads', based on the verse above. Looking ahead to a new phase of life, I wanted some guidance for the years ahead. Much of my life so far has been measured out in plans, be they for a year, or maybe three or five, with key indicators and reviews along the way. This is how many of our organisations, be they educational, governmental or charities, are programmed to work.

Living in the community and talking to others likewise seeking guidance was interspersed with time alone in silence, walking in one of the few glorious weeks of autumn weather we've had this year. I walked on Lindisfarne, the Holy Island, through woods and by rivers and along glorious vast and empty beaches.

However, far from coming away with some plans for the days ahead, this is what I learnt. Life has a habit of throwing curved balls, be they freak accidents, devastating medical diagnoses or financial catastrophes. Kingdoms and governments rise and fall, and none of us know what is around the next corner. We face moral and ethical dilemmas that cause us anguish and turmoil, and life is full of unresolved questions. But that is OK; the poet Rainer Maria Rilke says 'Be patient toward all that is unsolved in your heart and try to love the questions themselves, like locked rooms and like books that are now written in a very foreign tongue. Do not now seek the answers, which cannot be given you because you would not be able to live them. And the point is, to live everything. Live the questions now. Perhaps you will then gradually, without noticing it, live along some distant day into the answer'

As I walked and allowed myself to become immersed in God's glorious creation, sensing his deep love all around, I realised that there is a profound satisfaction to be found in the waiting, that it is a wonderful thing in itself. I don't know what the future holds, and neither do any of us, but I do know that God holds me, and that is more than enough.

SHELFORD SWIFTS AND MARTINS



In the 1990s Shelford had a huge population of swifts. On summer evenings, they'd race round the village in screaming parties. It was the sound of summer. They nested in the roof of the old British School which had plenty of holes into the roof space. When the building was reroofed, they lost those nesting holes. These days our Shelford swifts are hanging on by a thread, with one known nesting site.

Nationally swifts are in trouble, but up and down the country, groups are forming to try and turn this round, and there's a lot of expertise about how to go about doing this. Fulbourn, in particular, has successfully increased their population to about 90 birds. We could do the same! The Fulbourn group has offered to advise us. If you'd like to read about their successes, here's a link to their web page: *fulbournforum.org.uk/fulbourn-swifts-group/*

House martins too are struggling, and our local population is small, but has possibilities for growth under the right conditions.

I am interested in forming a Shelford Swift and Martin Group to try and help our birds to a recovery. The goal is to try and find new nesting sites, source grants to help our work and discover how to increase the insect populations that feed the birds.





Shelford Twinning Association was delighted to welcome 60 people to our most recent event, a wine tasting on 26 November. The evening followed our now established format for such events: a welcome glass of sparkling wine or fruit juice, the wine tasting itself, then a meal.

We tasted five wines which were accompanied by various nibbles, intended to clear the palate – olives, pâte, salami, oat biscuits, cherry tomatoes. We started with the two whites – first, a pleasant Sauvignon Blanc, then an excellent (higher priced!) Pouilly Fumé; these were followed by three reds – Saumur Champigny, Chinon, Bourgueuil – all three made with the cabernet franc grape, but being grown in three different areas in the Loire valley, the taste varied greatly. Opinion varied of course as to which were the best wines, which is inevitable as palates vary and everyone has their own wine preferences; in the end it boils down to what you like!

A three course meal followed the tasting – a chicken and vegetable one pot served with slices of baguette, then cheese, and dessert – washed down with the remaining wines.

The Association would like to thank everyone warmly for making the evening such a success – the organisers and the many helpers who set up, served the wine, cooked, cleared up and tidied up all deserve a special mention, but especially thanks to all those who came to support the occasion

and enjoy the *degustation* (tasting) of wines. The chink of glasses and lively buzz of conversation and laughter throughout the evening resulted in a warm and convivial atmosphere.

We plan to hold our next wine tasting in the spring.

All the profits from our evenings go towards the expense of entertaining our French visitors in early July. The arrangement for financing the visits by both countries is that all expenses are borne by the host country; this does mount up, with a full day visit to a place of interest, a party for everyone, and another half day visit for the adults. Accommodation is always provided by families so for the visitors the only expense is the cost of the fare plus a small present for their hosts.

PLAYSCAPE 2024 ROUND UP AND PLANS FOR 2025

Spring 2024 saw the arrival of the **Wheelzone**, the fabulous mini-skatepark that has slotted in perfectly to the Playscape and invited people of all ages and abilities to try some wheeled sports. The response has been tremendous and this new facility is being as well used as we'd hoped. It was officially opened in September by District Cllr Peter Fane, Chair of South Cambs District Council, just before we kicked off the 2024 Shelford Fun Run, as previous years' proceeds were instrumental in bringing the Wheelzone to life.

The **Shelford Fun Run 5k** was a sell-out (again!) and was our biggest event to date with 436 finishers. Despite rising costs all round, it raised an amazing £4,000 for the two charities who run the event: Great Shelford Playscape and CamRARE. George and Jasmine Christmas took back their titles of first male under 18 and female under 18, with George taking the double (coming in first overall). He was swiftly followed by Commonwealth athlete Georgina Schwiening, coming in second overall as well as first female runner. Jack Scott finished in 19:00:8 for under 11 male and Lelaini Collier was the first female under 11 with a time of 25:35:0.

The Great Shelford Parish Council's additional 'fun day' elements (tasty food, bouncy castles and a duck race!) and the Power2Inspire Super Sensory 1k added an extra family-friendly festival vibe to the day.

A huge thank you to everyone who helped on the day, gave up their time to marshal, sponsored the event and ran the 5km. Many thanks also to Cara Coffee for opening and donating proceeds from that morning. We couldn't do this without you all!

3x3 basketball and a workout anyone?

When this project got started, a master plan was drawn up to address the various elements the Rec had to deliver for the community: play provision, sports storage and increased biodiversity to name a few.

With the Wheelzone completed, we're making it down the to-do list! Next up is supporting the council to introduce a safer pedestrian entrance and also to look at the basketball provision.

Since the masterplan was agreed, however, patterns of use on the Rec have subtly changed and so the working group have a new proposal to improve basketball facilities. Instead of bringing the practice hoop up to the top of the Rec (which is now much busier) we think we can improve it in situ by upgrading it to a playable 3x3 basketball court. This is where teams of three play on a half size basketball court with one hoop; this creates a fast and furious but very entertaining game, as seen at the Olympics this summer. The footprint would increase ever so slightly, but the playability would be greatly improved.

We'd also like to introduce a set of level monkey bars onto the Rec (the bars on the Playscape have been replaced with a scramble net) as they are great for improving strength and coordination. And ... if we're going to do that, we would like to install some other static fitness apparatus to create an activity trail that will appeal to adults and teens alike. The Parish Council has asked us to get some quotes and investigate suitable locations and grant opportunities. Keep your eyes peeled for proposals that we'll consult with you on shortly!

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EAST WEST RAIL NON-STATUTORY CONSULTATION CLOSING 24 JANUARY

East West Rail published its consultation documents in November, continuing with a southern approach to Cambridge and joining the existing Royston line at Harston. There is nothing new about its business case in these documents. There will be another consultation process before the Development Consent Order application.

The more important proposals around Great Shelford are:

Track alterations – some track reconfiguring at Shepreth Branch Junction (SBJ) and two new tracks from there to Cambridge station on the western side of the existing tracks. These require extensive works outside normal working hours (including mid-week night, weekend and public holiday line closures). Long Road bridge also has to be replaced and will be closed for several months. The pedestrian bridge at SBJ will also be replaced.

DNA path – to be diverted. The proposals look cyclist unfriendly and seem to be around a balancing pond (used to regulate water flow) and a rail systems compound. It is not clear whether a temporary closure of the cycle path will be needed.

Hauxton Road level crossing – to be closed, with the road realigned to the Harston side of Little Shelford and the possibility of a footbridge closer to the level crossing. Construction traffic would come from the A10.

Harston – almost every road to Harston is to be altered and realigned, including the A10. The existing railway line is being altered to create a grade-separated junction where the line goes over a new EWR line and there are to be two freight loops.

Construction compounds and access – a large compound is proposed off Granhams Road near the level crossing, which will be accessed via Granhams Road.

Other railway infrastructure – track access routes are proposed next to the A1301 bridge and (seemingly) along Jenny's path. We may also have an infrastructure maintenance depot.

EWR favour discontinuous electrification with overhead lines only be installed on some sections of the route and, for the remainder, trains would use onboard batteries for power. This means freight trains using the line will continue to be diesel-powered.

Two freight services per day are proposed initially. The consultation document says, 'Additional services, particularly from the east of England ... would only be possible with significant additional

investment and infrastructure both on the East West Rail and the national network.' Could these later improvements include additional tracks through the village or a flyover junction at SBJ? Neither is proposed in the consultation documents.

Detailed plans and profile drawings can be seen at https://eastwestrail.co.uk/consultation2024, and these documents can also be seen (but only at A3 size) in Shelford library. Members of the public can also attend drop-in consultations at the Clayton Hotel in Cambridge on 19 January (12–5pm) and St Andrew's at Cherry Hinton on 21 January (2–7pm).

OLD RCHS

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

31 January 1857

AUDACIOUS ROBBERY – On the afternoon of Saturday last, as Mr Creasey, a chemist and druggist of Linton and Sawston, was indulging himself and some friends with a pipe and glass, and giving illustrations of his vocal abilities, his horse and cart were missed from the yard of the De Freville Arms Inn, in this place, where he was stopping. One of the company was also missed, whom Mr C. had picked up on the road, being a stranger in the neighbourhood. After a short time, Mr Creasey became uneasy at his horse and vehicle not being returned. At length the policeman was applied to. A search was made, but no horse, cart or driver could be heard of for many hours. Eventually the horse and cart were discovered at West Wratting, where they had been offered for sale, but detained. The thief escaped and we have not heard whether he is yet captured.

31 January 1857

COCKFIGHTING – One of these disgraceful and unlawful exhibitions at the public house in this place, took place on the 22nd inst. It was what was termed by lovers of the brutal amusement "a grand day", as we hear it was patronised by many persons, and not of the lowest class. Several of the poor creatures were killed. A cock from Stapleford won six fights out of eight.

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NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE CONSULTATION ON THE SUBMITTED PLAN IS UNDERWAY

The Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan (NP) and its accompanying documents were submitted to the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning (GCSP) team on 21 Nov 2024. This effectively means that, after three years of community consultation, research, development, mapping and writing, we have done as much as we can.

There now follows a final 'Regulation 16 consultation' on the NP, organised by GCSP. This is running from 18 December 2024 to 12 February 2025, with an extra two weeks added to the statutory six weeks to compensate for holiday closures.

Individuals and organisations who contributed comments to the Regulation 14 consultation held in March/April 2024 will, if they supplied their personal details, receive notification from GCSP that the submitted NP is available to view.

Further comments can be made – this is mainly an opportunity for people who have contributed ideas to see whether or how they influenced development of the Plan – and these will be returned to the NP steering group to review and respond to before being submitted alongside the NP to an independent examiner in early Spring 2025.

We fully anticipate that the various land agents who have given extensive and often negative feedback on several aspects of the Plan will once again repeat their concerns. But I guess it would be unusual for developers' and residents' aspirations for the future of any area to closely align because competing factors are at play.

At the time of writing (late November 2024), I cannot supply a definitive link to the Regulation 16 consultation, but I anticipate that the relevant materials will be available at www.scambs.gov.uk/planning/local-plan-and-neighbourhood-planning/stapleford-and-great-shelford-neighbourhood-plan.

Paper copies are being held for the duration of the consultation at Great Shelford Library. Take a pipe, slippers and sustenance: there are several hundred pages of documentation to wade through!

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

team Milton were dispatched 4-0 at home in the first round of the Premier League Cup before a superb performance away to West Wratting saw them come away with a 4-2 win. A satisfactory month ended with a close 1-0 home win against Hemingfords United.

Our annual foray in the Cambs Invitation Cup usually ends in the first round after a good performance but close defeat. This year, however, away to Parsons Drove from the Eastern Counties league first division, an excellent 2-1 win took us to the next round for the first time in many years. Over Sports had already beaten us away this year and unfortunately, after another very close hard-fought game, two converted penalties saw them complete the double against us. Foxton had been going well since we beat them earlier in the season, so the home second round Premier Leage Cup game was expected to be difficult. However, an excellent performance saw us through to the semi-final with a repeat of the 3-0 league win. Cambridge University Press were next up on the day Storm Darragh arrived and a 4-1 home win in difficult conditions justified the decision to go ahead with the game.

The second round of the Invitation Cup saw us drawn away to Ely City, who are flying high in the Eastern Counties league Premier division. After an even first half with one goal apiece, Ely turned up the heat in the second period, but an exceptional display from keeper Robert Smyth ensured the tie went to penalties. Unfortunately, after four successful spot kicks from both sides we failed with the last and Ely converted to go through to the next round.

The reserves team had started well in the higher division and continue to hold their own. 4-1 and 4-0 league wins away to Orwell and Bluntisham respectively were followed by a hard fought 1-1 draw to fellow promoted team Wimblington, leaving the team sitting comfortably in the top half of the table. An excellent 1-0 home win against West Wratting reserves saw them proceed in the William Cockell Cup, but the joy was short lived when Bluntisham took revenge with a 2-1 second round win.

Sadly, we must announce that difficulties in raising a side have meant withdrawing our 'A' side from the league. The situation will be reviewed for next season.


