SUMMARY FROM THE UNADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 15 JANUARY 2025

REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

County Cllr Milnes presented a report including the recent devolution white paper whereby the government proposes to replace district and county councils with unitary councils creating a single tier system of local government, where one authority is responsible for all local services. This aims to simplify governance, reduce bureaucracy and improve efficiency by eliminating duplication of responsibilities between multiple councils. South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) are working with the City Council to produce their outline proposals by the end of March, with the final draft in May and firm proposals by autumn. There was a discussion regarding the formation of a unitary authority, including the effect on the Greater Cambridge Partnership and the Cambridge Growth Company. There was also a discussion of the County Council's response to the East-West Rail (EWR) consultation.

District Cllr Fane reported on the devolution white paper, the postponement of the planning decision regarding the waste water at Honey Hill and the effect on the proposed housing development and the Cambridge Growth Company.

District Cllr Jackson-Wood reported on the four day week and the upcoming consultation on the South Cambridge District Council (SCDC) trial. The consultation is open for anyone to respond to, see – <https://www.scambs.gov.uk/news/councils-four-day-week-public-consultation>. There was also a discussion about civil parking enforcement.

REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES AND WORKING GROUPS

Cemetery & Allotments: A written report was provided and there was a query regarding the height of the new noticeboard at the cemetery.

Cambridge Biomedical Campus Supplementary Planning Document: the Council thanked Annabel Sykes for producing the draft response, which was approved by the Council.

East-West rail and response to the non-statutory consultation: Cllr Brown provided a verbal report on the updated draft document. D Cllr Fane and C Cllr Milnes contributed their knowledge of the proposed active travel options incorporated into the project. It was agreed that the draft will be submitted. The Chairman offered thanks to Cllr Peter Brown, Jim Rickard and the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group (TTIWG) for their contribution to the document.

HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT MATTERS

Cllr Stanton reported that the main focus of the TTIWG has been the EWR response.

Cllr H Kettel provided an update regarding the submission by Cambridgeshire County Council for a Transport and Works Act Order for the Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) busway. It was agreed that the Parish Council's contribution for the CSET opposition will be £5,000. Cllrs Stanton, Mann and Brown were appointed to review the Memorandum of Understanding for CSET on 22 January and decide whether to sign it. It was agreed to waive the fee for the Memorial Hall for the CSET public meeting. The Council will send their previously agreed letter to the Secretary of State for the Department for Transport to officially object to this scheme.

The design for the bus shelters included in the Sawston Greenway on Mingle Lane was approved.

The proposed roll-out of the e-bike and e-scooter trial, phase two of which is to be in Great Shelford, was noted.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

The Council will install a general waste bin at Stonehill allotment entrance at a cost of £417.75, plus £4 per emptying.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

A request from the Shelford Twinning Association for £585 to subsidise children for the visit to Verneuil-en-Halatte was approved.

The Parish Council will buy a VE Day 80 flag and a gas fuelled beacon and organise a beacon event on 8 May.

The Parish Council will hold a Fun Day and Easter Market to coincide with the Parent and Teacher's Association (PTA) Easter egg hunt.

It was agreed that the Community Awards would be repeated.

FINANCE MATTERS

The draft budget for 2025/6 was approved.

The proposed precept for 2025/6 of £390,519 (an increase of 7.7%) was approved.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

PARISH COUNCIL COMMENTS (08.01.2025, 27.01.2025)

At the meeting on 8 January 2025 the Planning Committee considered a response to the consultation for the Greater Cambridge Supplementary Planning Documents which includes documents relating to planning obligations, health impact assessment and Cambridge Biomedical Campus. Points raised during the discussion included the fact that there is nothing in the latter document about hospitals, funding of hospitals and the involvement of hospitals. The current focus is on the commercial and cultural success of the campus. There is a lack of reference to healthcare – fundamental as it is primarily a healthcare site. Engagement with local communities has been poor. Annabel Sykes will draft a response to the consultation (see Parish Council summary of minutes on page 1).

Note: All figures are for nitrogen dioxide and are presented in micrograms per meter cubed.

Levels in Great Shelford are below UK limits (40 µg/m³) but slightly exceed the WHO guideline (10 µg/m³). Yearly fluctuations are expected, with long term trends taking 4–5 years to assess. Additional monitoring, including particulate pollution, is planned for 2025.


Join us for a fantastic day of family fun at our Easter Egg Hunt & Market, hosted in partnership with the PTA. This exciting event promises something for everyone.

Budget Detail

Last month we reported that the Parish Council had approved the budget and precept for the upcoming financial year. The precept has been set at £390,519, representing an increase of £28,013 or 7.7% from the previous year. But do you know on what it is spent?

'Welcome March with wintry wind, would thou wert not so unkind'

OPEN DOORS

Sometimes you were publicly exposed to insult and persecution; at other times you stood side by side with those who were so treated. Hebrews 10:33

A quick quiz: in which countries are Christian believers a) most likely to be imprisoned? And b) most likely to be killed? One of the organisations we support at Great Shelford Free Church is Open Doors who work with persecuted Christians all over the world and they have just published this year's 'World Watch List' – a list of the countries where believers face the most extreme persecution. The top ten countries are North Korea, Somalia, Yemen, Libya, Sudan, Eritrea, Nigeria, Pakistan, Iran and Afghanistan.

Imprisonment? Most likely in the first country on the list. Martyrdom? Most likely in the seventh, where more Christians were killed in 2024 than in all the rest of the world combined. But you may be even more surprised to learn that in many of the countries where Christians are persecuted for their faith, their number is actually growing. Because there is a risk and a potential cost, Christians learn the value of their faith more clearly than in countries where faith is met with indifference. Incidentally, indifference is the opposite of both love and hate, they are not the opposites of each other.

In early March we begin the period of Lent. Like Advent, this is a period of looking forward, but unlike Advent we are looking forward to remembering an *unhappy* event; not a birth but a death, *the* death of Jesus Christ. On a day known as *Good Friday*. Does that seem to be a contradiction?

From our perspective the death of Christ may appear to be unfortunate, a mistake, something that shouldn't have happened. But from God's perspective this was no mistake and it wasn't the end, we know Jesus was raised from the dead.

Like many Christians around the world, some of our members will be giving up something during Lent, whether it's a type of food, tea, coffee, or even social media. It helps to remind us what Jesus gave up for us and it makes our Easter celebrations more poignant.

Jesus Himself was persecuted and killed. But the hope that He brought through His death and Resurrection is what gives believers around the world the courage to stand firm in their faith whatever hardships they may face. What do you have that's worth dying for? Join us one Sunday and let's help you find out more about Jesus.

EAST WEST RAIL – PARLIAMENTARY PETITION

The East West Rail consultation closed on 24 January, but this project is still generating a good deal of light and heat, especially with the Government's recent 'revival' of the Ox-Cam Arc and talk of an English Silicon Valley.

There is a link and a QR code below for a Parliamentary Petition calling for the plans for Bedford – Cambridge section of East West Rail (EWR) to be paused pending a full, independent review.

As a taxpayer, if EWR goes ahead, you will be contributing to its estimated £8 billion (and rising) cost. The embodied carbon involved in the construction of the railway is huge and it will not solve Greater Cambridge's congestion and public transport issues because it only links Bedford to Cambridge, with just two stations between. Greater Cambridge needs a public transport system that links the many places where people live to the many workplaces in and around Cambridge.

Even if you are in favour of EWR, there are three strong reasons to sign:

1. EWR has chosen a southern approach into Cambridge (arriving at the new Cambridge South station) because it is fixated on the expansion potential of the Cambridge Biomedical Campus (already very near this village) and largely ignores all Greater Cambridge's many other science parks. EWR has ignored the advice of its own consultants that a northern approach to Cambridge would be cheaper and quicker to construct, involve less environmental damage (including less embodied carbon) and would be much better for freight. If a southern approach is taken, freight will need to travel through Cambridge and Newmarket.

2. We do not have enough infrastructure to support the existing population, let alone a larger population in Greater Cambridge. There is not enough water, for example and our hospitals are over stretched. With EWR comes lots of extra housing at Cambourne to justify building the railway and this is as well as the growth in the emerging Greater Cambridge Local Plan.

3. The Cambridge Growth Company (set up by the Government and chaired by Peter Freeman) is also busy making expansion plans for Greater Cambridge. its proposals are at an early stage and are not coordinated with East West Rail. As the Chair of Cambridgeshire County Council said recently in a letter to his colleagues, 'everyone' is busy making plans for Greater Cambridge – but they appear not to be talking to each other'.

THE GUIDED BUSWAY – OBJECT BY 7 MARCH!

LAST CHANCE TO SAVE OUR LOCAL COUNTRYSIDE!

You can support the cause by putting your objections in writing to the Secretary of State for Transport via transportinfrastructure@dft.gov.uk or c/o Transport Infrastructure Planning Unit, Department for Transport, Great Minster House, 33 Horseferry Road, London, SW1P 4DR.

Doing this will help to show the government the strength of support for our alternative and against the plans put forward by the council.

To object you should:

1. Send your response **by Friday 7 March.**
2. State who is making the objection.
3. Include your postal address (even if responding by email).
4. State the grounds of your objection.

Example wording

- Title of letter/email = Objection to Transport and Work Act Order to the Department for Transport (DfT) for a new busway to the southeast of Cambridge
- I... (Name) of Postal Address am writing to make a formal objection to the “Application for a Transport and Work Act Order to the Department for Transport (DfT) for a new busway to the southeast of

Cambridge”, as submitted by the Cambridge Greater Partnership on 9 January 2025.

Key points and ideas for your objection could include the following (please use your own words):

- The construction of five miles of new road through open countryside is unnecessary to deliver improvements in transport. Similar transport and economic benefits can be achieved by building a version of the scheme first proposed by the GCP in 2018. This would involve building sections of bus lane adjacent to the A1307 and one mile of new road (busway).
- This alternative would avoid building two bridges over the River Granta chalk stream and putting Hobson's Conduit chalk stream into a culvert.
- This alternative would avoid creating a scar in the Gog Magog Hills landscape, one of the most important landscapes in the Cambridge area.
- This alternative would avoid building a new road through a countryside park, to the detriment of its future users and nature.
- This alternative would avoid severing fields close to villages making them vulnerable to development and further harm to the countryside.
- This alternative would better serve the planned expansion of the Cambridge Biomedical Campus and serve more of the Campus.
- Cycle routes in this area are already under construction and include Linton Greenway which will connect Cambridge to Babraham, Granta Park and Linton; and Sawston Greenway that will connect Cambridge to Sawston. Stapleford and Shelford are already served by the DNA path.

You might also give your view on the potential local use of use the proposed five-mile busway. The GCP say the main reason they have chosen that route is to serve the villages but the bus stops are on uphill edges of our villages.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN:

The final public consultation on the Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan (NP) – the so-called ‘Regulation 16’ consultation, run by the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning (GCSP) service on behalf of SCDC – wrapped up on 12 Feb 2025. This was effectively a last opportunity for those who submitted comments to the Reg. 14 consultation in 2024 to see how/whether their feedback had influenced development of the submitted Plan.

Whilst the Reg. 16 consultation was ongoing, GCSP tendered for an independent examiner for our Plan, with the NP steering group and Stapleford and Great Shelford Parish Councils choosing Andrew Ashworth from the short list of four. Mr Ashworth is a very experienced examiner of more than 300 NPs, including several in the S Cambs area (most recently, South Newnham NP and Pampisford NP). From our perspective, there is a degree of overlap between the kinds of policies in these NPs and in ours and an understanding of the broader planning environment and pressures in our region can only be helpful.

The role of an independent examiner is defined in legislation: to determine whether a submitted Plan meets the basic conditions and Convention Rights and other statutory requirements. In doing this, they will visit the NP area, consider the content of the Plan and, where necessary, recommend changes to its policies and supporting text. The resulting report will also recommend whether a Plan should proceed to local community referendum.

All Reg. 16 consultation comments have been fed back to the NP steering group and it is now our job to review them and, where necessary, justify our approach to the independent examiner. The majority of comments arise from land agents reiterating the forceful objections they made at Reg. 14 consultation to several of our NP policies. Remember that NPs cannot prevent development, but they can shape it to meet local needs. It is this which often leads to an impasse between what a community aspires to for its future and the development potential that land agents seek to optimise for their clients.

We were very pleased in early February to welcome Dr Caroline Shenton who had been Director of Archives at the Houses of Parliament to tell us about 'The Day Parliament Burned Down'.

Soon after starting in the role, she looked for early records of the 800 year old royal palace that preceded our current and iconic House of Parliament, which was then adapted for parliamentary use. Nearly all records were lost in a massive fire that started on 16 October 1834 ravaging the House of Lords, House of Commons and the adjacent Law Courts and Chancery buildings.

She put together the story of the layout and use of the buildings before the fire, immediately after and since the rebuilding of the current parliament building. She illustrated her story with excellent images of the buildings, both drawings and two watercolours by JMW Turner who was an eyewitness. Charles Dickens was a young journalist in 1834 and used his personal memory of the fire in several novels including Oliver Twist.

Luckily the wind blew the flames and smoke towards the Thames and away from Westminster Abbey. The stonework of some of the old mediaeval buildings survived the fire but only Westminster Hall was reroofed and incorporated into the new building of 1847.

We were privileged to have such a well-qualified and brilliant speaker giving a totally absorbing talk.

At the next WI meeting at 7.30pm on Thursday 6 March a talk by Sarah Harrison will be titled 'You couldn't make it up' (a look at life) followed by a refreshment break and short AGM. Food – Maybe you’ve been trying to eat more healthily in 2025. You might have heard the phrase ‘eat 30 different plants a week’ rather than the five a day recommendation. You can boost this number by sprinkling seeds on a salad or on a quiche, adding to a casserole or pasta dish, cooking with different herbs or eat multi-grain/multi-seed bread. ‘Eat a rainbow’ is another mantra you may have heard – this means eat lots of different coloured fruit and veg, as they contain various antioxidants and other compounds that are useful to your body.

Something to bear in mind if you are reducing your meat intake is to ensure you have enough iron – green vegetables like spinach, chard and kale contain it and absorption can be boosted by having vitamin C at the same meal e.g. by using a citrus dressing on the greens, or having an orange for dessert.

You may be trying to buy local food and this will reduce food miles (i.e. the number of miles between farm and fork), supports the local economy, strengthens food security by shortening the supply chain, is fresher and therefore more nutritious and helps to build the local community.

And if you can get organic, even better. When crops are sprayed with pesticides you absorb a little of them yourself. Wildlife is reduced when strong pesticides are used. The neonicotinoids that have been officially banned (but in this area are often allowed for use on sugar beet) disorientate bees if they don't kill them – and one teaspoon is enough to kill over a billion honeybees! Organic farmers do use pesticides, but they tend to be less harmful ones and used in a very targeted way, or they will use another method e.g. a mulch to control weeds, or a natural predator for a pest. And antibiotics are only given to livestock on an organic farm if they are ill, never as a preventative measure. This helps to slow down the resistance that many bacteria are developing to antibiotics, due to their overuse.

The first was on 8 June 2023 at the funeral of Richard Goat at St Mary's church Great Shelford, David was the organist for the service. After the service I spoke to David about the church organ; he took me up to the organ loft via a narrow spiral staircase. Cheekily I asked David if I could play it as I have an interest in organs and play in an amateur way for my own enjoyment on a Yamaha electronic.

Obligingly, David fired up the organ and I had a go. The piece I played was not church music but a rendering of *Perfidia*, the Glen Miller classic. David enhanced my performance by pulling out the right stops, and even if I say it myself it sounded good. Sadly, we only had the time for the one tune as David had to go off for another appointment and me to Richard's wake in The Square & Compasses; I could easily have stayed and played for the rest of the afternoon. David, although a very accomplished and qualified musician was not fussed by the fact that I play by ear and can't read a note of music. I think his attitude was that music is for enjoyment, and you don't need a diploma or qualification to enjoy it.

The second time I met David was only a couple weeks later at St Andrews Church Stapleford where David was the organist at David Pepperell's funeral. I was quite surprised to hear David play a rendering of *Whiter Shade of Pale* as part of the music played whilst the congregation were assembling for the service. David had a wide taste in music and demonstrated well that a church organ can also play pop music. RIP David.

OLD NEWS**Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868**

*Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle,
Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993*

14 March 1857

TRIAL OF THE STATION MASTER – The trial of this unfortunate man [Richard Lines] took place yesterday at the County Sessions. Pretty nearly the whole staff of the Accountant office were produced to prove the embezzlement of three sums paid by Mr Maris. It was endeavoured to be shown by Mr Naylor, who was counsel for the prisoner, that the defalcations arose from his not looking sharply after the return to himself by the company of the amount, paid by him for overcharges. It was also endeavoured to be made out that according to the evidence of one of the witnesses as to the rule of the company, that if Lines was a defaulter almost all the station master were, but all the defence was upset by the production of a letter of the prisoner, where the prisoner pretty well acknowledged the offence, and on a remark from the bench that it seemed useless to go on after that, Mr Naylor advised his client to withdraw his plea and plead guilty. He was sentenced to only 12 months imprisonment, no doubt owing to the high character given him by the prosecutor and several other gentlemen.

5 March 1859

MELANCHOLY EVENT – A young man named Charles Free, aged 16, a native of Hadstock, has lately been engaged assisting Mr James Winter, lime-burner, of the Heathfield, Gt Shelford, in burning lime. He was so engaged on Tuesday last, and on being sought for, was found seated near the top of the lime-kiln, apparently for the warmth but quite dead, when found between five and six o'clock in the evening, the noxious gases from the burning lime having, it appears, suffocated him.

12 March 1859

BEE SWARMING – As proof of the mildness with which the month of March began this year, it may be mentioned that on Friday, March 4th a swarm of bees, issued from a willow tree in a close, rented by Mr Richard Wright, from Caius College, Cambridge, and after flying across the road leading to Stapleford, alighted on the bough of a tree in a close occupied by Mr R. Headly. They were observed and followed by a person named Gifford, who procured a hive and safely shook them in. But it seems the bees were not particularly partial to their new habitation, for after hanging about the hive a few hours, they in a body returned to the hollow tree.


