SUMMARY FROM THE ADOPTED MINUTES OF THE MEETING ON 16 APRIL 2025

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION SESSION

Laurence Damary-Homan introduced himself as a candidate for the upcoming County Council elections.

REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERS

District Cllr Fane reported that South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) now meets the requirement for a five year housing land supply. He advised that the upcoming Planning and Infrastructure Bill will authorise the Combined Authority to create spatial development strategies which may have an impact on the local plan. He explained the changes to the criteria for the protection of green belt in the new National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and the creation of the new classification of grey belt (areas of green belt land that are considered less critical to fulfilling the green belt's purposes).

The Chairman read out a request from a member of the public about a talk by Peter Freeman, Chair of the government-appointed Cambridge Growth Company, entitled 'Making Cambridge a Happy City?' to be given to Cambridge City residents on 15 May.

The member of the public suggested that the Parish Council should ask SCDC to organise a similar talk by Peter Freeman for the residents of potentially impacted villages, since the interests of these residents cannot be assumed to be the same as those of residents of the city itself. District Cllr Fane advised that he would raise this issue with the relevant SCDC officers and recommended that GSPC also contact Stephen Kelly and Cllr Graham Cone.

HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT MATTERS

Cllr Stanton reported that the Traffic and Transport Infrastructure Working Group (TTIWG) were going to move to four weekly meetings, with more frequent meetings if necessary_at the discretion of the chair.

The feasibility report for the Privately Funded Highway Improvements (PFHI) application for Hinton Way and Church Street was received. There was some confusion regarding whether this feasibility report covered the points required by the PFHI application and it was agreed that the Clerk will organise a meeting with the relevant Cambridgeshire County Council officers and Cllrs Stanton and Mann.

COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION MATTERS

It was agreed to renew the fire risk assessments for the Memorial Hall and the Pavilion, to renew the picket fence around the flower beds in front of the Memorial Hall and to approve the expenditure for phase 1 of the cemetery extension.

COMMUNITY MATTERS

- a) A grant of £300 to Shelford Library was approved.
- b) Permission was granted for the SSYI to install an extractor hood and it was agreed that the Council will pay for the repair of a water leak.
- c) The Christmas Lights Switch On event will be on Sunday 30 November.
- d) An autumn event loosely linked to harvest and food, including a market, will be held on Sunday 12 October.

The monthly accounts were approved.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

War Memorial Restoration Update

We're pleased to share some positive news; the insurers have confirmed they will cover the cost of closing the road for the phase one works to reseat the War Memorial. The Clerk is now in the process of booking these essential works.

You may remember the Memorial was hit by a car last summer, causing it to become unseated (though it remains stable) and resulting in diesel oil damage to the stone. As it is made from Portland stone, which is highly absorbent, this has posed a significant restoration challenge. After a long search, we've secured a skilled contractor, approved by both the insurers and the Conservation Officer, to carry out the work in two phases:

Phase One: Reseat the memorial on its plinth, which requires a temporary road closure.

Phase Two: Replace the stone sections affected by diesel oil, subject to further approvals.

We hope to schedule the reseating soon and in time for Remembrance Sunday. Further updates will follow once permits and dates are confirmed. Thank you for your patience and understanding as we work to restore this important monument with the care and respect it deserves.

GREAT SHELFORD PARISH CHURCH Saint Mary the Virgin

At St Mary's we welcome **Rev Sarah West** as a <u>curate</u>. She writes: 'I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God provided the growth'

1 Corinthians 3:6

After 18 months away from our house, we have returned to a very overgrown vegetable garden and spent much time preparing the ground ready to receive the young vegetable plants we wanted to grow. Now all we can do is nurture and tend the plants as they grow in the hope and expectation that they will bear fruit. It strikes me, that June is a time of anticipation, hope and change. It is a time of exams as we approach the end of the academic year, of endings and new beginnings. In the church, we approach Petertide (29th June), when those training for ministry prepare to be ordained and start life as curates in a parish.

Perhaps as we tend the plants in our own gardens in the hope of flowers or ripe vegetables or fruit, June can be a time to reflect on our own spiritual or faith journey; to think about our calling and how we might use our gifts as instruments of God's love in the world. A calling is not just for priests, but for everyone. Whether a call to faith, a calling to a role in community, the church or secular job or your personal calling to do or be that which gives meaning and purpose to your life. Something that God calls out from you to be a gift to others. Something felt like a prompting from within that has a sense of rightness about it.

Identifying our calling and acting on it involves anticipation, hope and change. My calling is to be a priest and for my final year of curacy, I have joined St Mary's for additional experiences to enable growth in inhabiting that priestly identity. For discernment and training are the seeds that are planted and watered, but God provides the growth. It is for us to listen to where God might be calling us and trust in him for the growth, so that we might have the courage to respond: 'Here I am, send me'.

Time to Play

"Anyone who welcomes a little child like this in my name welcomes me, and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not only me but also the Father who sent me" Mark 9:37

In the spring of 1974, three members of Great Shelford Free Church – Mary Smith, Elsie Moody and Edna Winterflood – started a playgroup in the church hall that would serve mothers with infants in the community, in a welcoming, supportive, safe and informal setting. There were very few facilities then for mothers with small children and the team recognised that while children are a gift from God, parenting is hard work!

Come and Go Playgroup started on Wednesday mornings with few guests and a variety of donated toys and books, a painting table and, later, a slide. Tea, coffee, squash and biscuits were provided and the atmosphere was happy and relaxed, with mothers making new friends whilst their children played nearby. Over the years, the playgroup team grew and changed, extra helpers joined, word spread and soon carers with children were coming from both the Shelfords and surrounding villages.

When our new hall was built, more space became available and extra activities were introduced: music, painting, playdough, story time, nursery rhymes and puzzles. Mary retired from nursing and was persuaded back on to the team: Penny Kite became leader. There were other, more formal considerations: safeguarding checks on all helpers, new fire regulations, rules relating to social services and kitchen hygiene. To reflect both the Ofsted definition and changing times, the playgroup became 'Little Steps Toddler Group' working in tandem with our new church venture – Tiny Toes baby group for the (roughly) under ones.

Since then, we have been through COVID, spending many weeks meeting on Great Shelford recreation ground and although we are back in our building, we still have occasional outdoor trails. Little Steps Toddler Group continues to thrive on the enthusiasm of carers and children, with a dedicated team of helpers. The Free Church has always given wholehearted encouragement and the group itself has supported a huge range of good causes and charities, including an ongoing Freecycle, with items being passed on to Fenland Family and Baby Bank in Wisbech. From those small beginnings Little Steps has grown and flourished. It is owing to the dedication, hard work and prayers that we thank God for 50 years of serving this community.

MILL COURT PLANNING APPLICATION

Opcare Ltd of 1 Mill Court have applied to South Cambs District Council for retrospective planning for an extraction/ventilation unit installed on the premises. Opcare is a provider of prosthetic, orthotic, posture and mobility services working in partnership with the National Health Service (NHS). Local residents have for some time been aware of the noise from the extraction unit which is situated on the south side of the building facing Hinton Way.

It would appear that planning permission was not applied for prior to the installation hence the current application (made in February) for retrospective planning permission. On reading through the various documents it would appear that South Cambs Planning are asking Opcare to conduct some noise tests before considering the application. FIRESTARTER by FRASER GRACE

Local resident Fraser Grace's book "Firestarter" concerns the sensational unexplained fires in Great Shelford in the 1830s when fire fighting skills and equipment were limited.

Incidents are recorded in The Cambridge Chronicle of the time, and the Village News has republished these in recent years.

Here are some extracts:

1 March 1833

On Monday afternoon last, between two and three o'clock, another fire was discovered upon the premises of Mr Henry Headly. The flames were, however, confined to a cart shed (where they were first observed) but which was destroyed. We sincerely regret to state that this is the fourth or fifth incendiary fire that has taken place in that neighbourhood, without any satisfactory clue having been obtained to lead to the detection of the offender.

19 April 1833

FIRES AT GREAT SHELFORD – Last Saturday evening, about six o'clock, a haulm stack on Mr Wm Headly's premises was discovered to be on fire and was speedily consumed. And yesterday ... a fire broke out in a barn

Now suspicion landed on a local man who was seen near the premises of William Dean when a fire was found ...



Spring 2025 Update

What is SSYI? We are a community-based charity founded by local Christians serving young people in the villages of Great and Little Shelford, Stapleford, Sawston and Duxford and beyond.

What do we do? We provide youth activities and clubs open to all local 11–18-year-olds. We particularly focus on those who are marginalised, isolated, at-risk or not accessing other youth provision.

We do this by building positive relationships with young people and providing access to activities, to enable them to overcome their challenges, learn, succeed and make a positive contribution to their communities. We have our dedicated Youth Centre above the Memorial Hall in Woollards Lane, Great Shelford where we run 6 youth clubs a week, as well as 3 sessions in Sawston, and a weekly club in the Community Centre in Duxford. Employing 4 Youth workers and working with six volunteers, we reach over 150 young people each week.

Over the winter months activities have included our regular sessions in Great Shelford, Sawston and Duxford, attracting well over 100 young people each week. We also ran 1-2-1 sessions for young people at Sawston Village College and in the local Community, supporting up to 21 young people a week. In the run up to Christmas we ran multiple Christmas meals and parties and took 18 young people to the Winter Wonderland on Parkers Piece. We were also involved in the Shelford light switch on and set up the football cage which despite the cold was a great success.



NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

I have some excellent news to report: after a thorough review of the submitted Stapleford and Great Shelford Neighbourhood Plan and its supporting documents, our independent examiner has recommended that it meets all necessary legal requirements and should proceed to referendum. This is truly something to celebrate.

As is par for the course, some modifications to the Plan have been recommended, but I believe we have achieved most of what we set out to do. At the time of writing, the examiner's 'fact-check report' is not a matter of public record so I can't provide any further details in this respect. However, you will soon be able to read it at https://bit.ly/3FeUSWu.

It is now up to our local planning authority – South Cambs District Council – to decide whether it accepts the examiner's recommendation or requires more changes to be made. This is far from being a mere formality, but we have worked closely with, and sought advice from, SCDC officers throughout the production of our Neighbourhood Plan, doing our best to ensure that there are no last minute surprises for either party.

I'm going to be optimistic and look towards a referendum and here's what I think you can expect.

SCDC will organise a referendum in our neighbourhood area in which all registered voters in the parishes of Stapleford and Great Shelford area can vote, either in person or by post. You will be asked something along the lines of "Do you want SCDC to use the Neighbourhood Plan for Stapleford and Great Shelford to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?" It does not matter how many people vote, but if more than 50% of those voting say "Yes", then our plan will be approved. This means that it will become part of the Local Development Plan and must be used in all planning decisions relating to our neighbourhood area.

Please, please, **PLEASE** vote when the opportunity arises. Don't assume that enough others will do it so you don't need to. The bigger the turnout, the stronger the message we send that the residents of Stapleford and Great Shelford want to be heavily involved in shaping the future of place where we live for the better.

Our neighbours in Pampisford went through this process last month and achieved a 99% 'Yes' vote, so their Neighbourhood Plan has been duly adopted. Thriplow and Heathfield have their own referendum coming up on 12 June. Harston is slightly behind us in the process.

Do keep an eye on local community Facebook pages and our villages' magazines for further news. But we're in a good place.

The film is based on the book of that name by Isabella Tree and describes the transformation of poor farmland in Sussex that was bankrupting the family, into an environment as close to its original state as possible. They have longhorn cattle, Exmoor ponies and other animals that graze the land as old wild herbivores did. They have been rewarded by the appearance of rare butterflies and other creatures and the whole site is a wildlife haven. This is a beautifully shot film to inspire you and there will be an online interview to follow featuring Isabella Tree and her husband. Cambridge Nature Festival, 25 May - 30 June. The Cambridge Nature Festival comprises a series of events during late May and June. Details not yet announced as I write, but keep an eye on the Cambridge Nature Network website.

89% Some of you may have read of a survey that indicated that 89% of people across the world want strong government action on climate. But these people didn't think so many other people thought that way, they thought they were in the minority. The 89 Percent Project has been set up by journalists to spread the word, investigate what kind of action people want and lobby governments to take action, citing this groundswell of public opinion. See 89percent.org/. The study also found that in most countries surveyed, almost 50% people would be prepared to give 1% of their income to fight climate change. So let's be the vocal majority, not the silent majority! Talk to your friends and colleagues about what you can do to reduce your carbon

footprint and boost nature and biodiversity. Your actions (and where you spend your money) affect everyone else.

Ways to try and get change on climate policy were discussed at an event at the Cambridge Literary Festival at the end of April, at which veteran environmental campaigners/writers Tony Juniper and Mike Berners-Lee talked about their new books. They were both eloquent speakers and stressed the need to change the way economics works, rather than assuming neoliberalism and its endless call for growth in consumption is the only way to do things. Instead of measuring a country's growth by GDP, look at growth in health, education, happiness, employment, nature, biodiversity – these measures exist and all help to measure how we thrive. We need to challenge our politicians and businesses to be honest, to not hoodwink us about their green credentials, to not keep putting off difficult decisions. As David Attenborough said, 'infinite growth on a finite planet is madness'. Let's call out the madness.

You've probably heard the phrase 'Reduce, Reuse, Recycle'. But have you heard an extension of this, to include Repair, Rehome, Refill, Regenerate? Reduce by buying less, only what you need, and avoid single use plastic if possible. Reuse nappies, makeup wipes, cups in coffee shops and shopping bags. Repair at one of our Repair Cafes, see the Cambridge Carbon Footprint website to find out all the cafes in the area. Rehome via Cambridge Re-Use, British Heart Foundation, Emmaus, charity shops, or online at Gumtree, Vinted etc. Refill at low waste shops such as Green Weigh in Sawston, and buy loose vegs and fruit. Regenerate by composting your veg and fruit waste and garden trimmings.

Water - one thing we all need to be careful with in this area. Cambridge Water say that the average consumption is 140 litres per person a day. If you can reduce your usage the water companies can extract less water from the aquifer and have less waste to deal with. Water the garden with water from a water butt or from washing up, don't water the lawn and plant drought tolerant plants. Group pots to reduce evaporation. Collect water that you run while waiting for it to run hot (or cold) and use that to water the garden. Don't flush every time you use the loo. See if you can get your consumption to under 100 litres a day!

Political Changes!

Whatever your political preference, it's noteworthy that the new Mayor of the Combined Authority, just elected, has promised to scrap the busways. You can read his manifesto here. www.paulbristow.org.uk/my-manifesto. He will have our active support.

Some may argue that he has no powers to do this (he has also promised to scrap the unelected Greater Cambridge Partnership which is promoting the busways), but he has some significant levers of power that he that he can pull, not least his responsibility for bus franchising. The Mayor now has the powers to organise all bus routes in the county to provide a better service.

Better Ways for Busways has submitted a robust objection to the busway and you can read it here <code>www.bw4b.org/whats-next-march-2025</code> and is preparing its Statement of Case for an impending public inquiry. More funding to support the Better Busways campaign will be needed - but is it possible that the Lib Dems controlling the County Council could be persuaded to work with the new Mayor and abandon the illogical busway?

There are glimmers of hope in our newly elected Lib Dem County Councillors Peter Fane and Laurence Damary-Homan. Let's give them (and the Conservative and Green Councillors) all the encouragement they need to continue to oppose the destruction of our beautiful countryside and to build the better alternative. Every Wednesday, at 9am, the doors of the Memorial Hall open for the Country Market. Our logo reads 'COOK-CRAFT-GROW'. Everything we sell is homemade, home grown or hand crafted and with our freshly made coffee or tea you can select a homemade cookie.

We value our loyal customers who come in all weathers but it is always pleasing when new customers find us and then return. We were all really saddened to learn that our oldest customer, Professor John Davis died on 4 May just three months short of his 102^{nd} birthday. His last visit to the market was about three weeks before Easter. In more recent years he was accompanied by a family member or friend, but he always carried his own big shopping bag and knew just what he wanted from the food table and the bag was quickly filled up. He so enjoyed coming each week and over the years he grew to be a special friend and customer whom we will greatly miss.

The garden section is now in full swing. At the moment the tables are well laden with fine healthy annuals alongside a wide range of perennials and houseplants. Do remember that the best plants are snapped up early. We all welcome blue skies and sunshine but the ground is now very dry. Until it gets a good soaking of warm soft rain it is difficult to say just how much fresh produce and soft fruit there will be. Fortunately, we have already had small bunches of early spring flowers and last week (midMay) saw the first of the freshly picked bunches of sweet william in full flower.





THE SHELFORDS WI

On 1 May we were very pleased to welcome three Guide Dogs and their hosts, a meeting arranged by WI member, Cornelia Ede.

With many amusing stories, Gill Bane outlined the work of Guide Dogs in breeding dogs with suitable temperaments, the puppy training stage of up to about a year, more advanced training at a Guide Dog centre and finally passing to a blind owner.

We were surprised to learn that puppies are removed from their mothers when as young as eight weeks old so that 'potty training' on command can start immediately. Puppies are cuddled to aid bonding and taught how to play nicely. They are fed three weighed meals per day and taught to eat quietly. No jumping up as soon as the tin or packet is opened. They learn to sit quietly at checkouts when taken to shops or garden centres. Puppies quickly learn many skills such as directions left and right by the age of about ten months. Learning and obeying commands and being taken out in cars, buses or trains and into busy places is all part of the training. Quite a challenge for the trainers.

Dee Bevan brought Pepi with her to expand on the puppy training stage. Jackie Keenan brought a lively Brodie who is boarding with her while his owner is on a foreign holiday. During advanced training dogs are taught to lead a blind person, crossing roads safely and avoiding obstacles. Guide dogs are carefully matched with blind recipients such as owner, Diane Rose who came with Zen. They have been together for several years and Zen has made a huge difference to Diane's life. She can access places that neither she nor Zen have been to before and have no fear of being in a tricky or dangerous position. What a lifeline for her. And for us, what an entertaining and informative evening.

At the 5 June WI meeting we will welcome Fiona Chesterton whose topic is 'Secrets never to be told – a story about an unexpected inheritance'. As usual visitors, and prospective new members will be made very welcome at 7.30pm in the Community Room behind St Mary's Church Great Shelford.

The following two WI meeting involve gardens. In July we will visit the garden of Neil and Clare Cullen, regular speakers at our WI. Our own garden Party will be in August.

OLD NEWS

Extracts from The Great Shelford Chronicle 1774-1868

Compiled and re-published by Anne George, Glynis Trundle, Margaret Ward and Alan Bullwinkle, 1993

27 June 1863

MALICIOUS DAMAGE – Philip Colville was charged with having maliciously broken two panes of glass in the window of John Sand Wright, landlord of "The Compasses" Great Shelford on the night of Sunday, June 7th, doing damage to the amount of 2s. The defendant went to the publichouse in a tipsy state, used very bad language and when asked to go out, refused. After some trouble the landlady got him into the passage, where he commenced kicking an unoffending door, and threatened to break Mrs Wright's neck. When the man got outside, the door was locked inside, and not being able to get in again he broke 2 windows. Defendant alleged that Mrs. Wright admitted taking his clothes, but did so because he owed her 4s. Fined 6d, 13s costs and 2s damages. Paid.

SHELFORD TWINNING OUIZ

The Shelford Twinning Association held a quiz evening on 16 May and was delighted by the good attendance and most importantly, the high standard yet again of the quiz set by our usual quiz master David Beresford.

Once again David taxed our memories and our brains with a wide variety of excellent questions. 

FOOTBALL CLUB



Regular followers of the club would have been aware that just like last season the first team entered the final month knowing that if they won their remaining four games they would again be crowned Premier League Champions. A hard fought 0-0 draw at home to Ely City Reserves was not the

A home 2-1 win against March Town Reserves, themselves still hoping for that spot, was followed by a hard fought 1-1 draw away to the same opponents, which kept the hope alive. When Bluntisham Rangers could not field a team and the three points were automatically awarded to us, it meant a win in the final game away to Wimblington would see us in second spot. The hosts had also been near the top of the table for most of the season, so a hard game was expected – and transpired.

Unfortunately, the match was moved to an all-weather pitch and even though winter seemed to have returned with a vengeance the teams produced a match worthy of the seasons they had both had. After going behind to three first half goals our boys fought back well, scoring two of their own, before being edged out 3-2 and ending up in a very credible fourth spot in the table.

CRICKET

Just before the start of the season we were delighted to get the artificial pitch installed at the edge of the cricket square on the Rec. This will provide great benefit for training at all levels of the club and will be used for some junior matches. Cambourne struggled on a tricky early season pitch, though that probably doesn't explain their two broken bats. Our fielding was also notable, the first wicket falling to a good catch by Nusrat Hamid after which Stuart Creed probably rendered any "catch of the season" competition irrelevant with an extraordinary take when it appeared that even arms as long as those of the legendary Mr Tickle would not have been enough to reach the ball.

Faz Lee led the way amongst the bowlers with 4 for 16, after which the spin twins Nusrat Hamid and Mark Milne snuffed out Cambourne's hopes of recovery with combined figures of 3 for 33 off 16 overs. A target of just 91 looked straightforward, but less so once we lost our first three wickets for just two runs. The game remained in the balance until Mark Milne and Theo Wilson added 40 unbroken to take us to a 5 wicket win.

The season for our junior teams is also well underway, as are the All Stars and Dynamos sessions for children from age five upwards. One of our two Under 11 teams has made a flying start with victories in their first three matches.


