4oz/115g <u>each</u> of dark muscovado sugar, black treacle, golden syrup 9fl oz/250ml milk

1 egg

#### Method

Grease and line an 18cm/7in round, deep cake tin. Sift together all dry ingredients. Rub the butter into the flour mixture. Melt together the sugar, treacle and syrup and heat gently until sugar has dissolved. Turn up the heat and bring mixture to just below boiling point. Combine flour mixture, syrup mixture, milk and beaten egg until you have a smooth batter. Pour into the prepared tin and cook at 180C/fan 160C/Gas4 for 50mins to 1 hour.Leave in the tin until completly cold befor turning out.
